Dissent's Clearest, Strongest Voice With all due deference to the standing and talent of previous critics of the Johnson administration's conduct of our affairs in Southeast Asia, the most impressive and perhaps effective-if there still time and room for anything to be effective-blow seems to have been that of Senator George McGovern, the South Dakota Democrat, in his speech in the

Senator McGovern spoke not only with especial clarity, but also with more "grasping the nettle" type of frankness than is customary among the dissenters. He seemed to be saying exactly what he meant, without regard for his own political safety. Such a performance is welcome. There may indeed be little time left in which it will make much difference whether men dare to be men. Senator McGovern addressed his first bluntness to the question of dissent it-

"In trying to imply that it is American dissent which is causing the Vietnamese to continue the war," said the South Dakota Senator, "the Administration is only confessing the weakness of its own case by trying to silence its critics and confuse the American people. "It is not the impact of the dissent on Hanoi that worries the Administration; it is the fact that the dissenters have exposed the contradictions, the falsehoods, and the resulting credibility gap which surrounds Administration policy. "Hanoi knows very well that America is not going to surrender or withdraw from this war.

"Hanoi knows very well that not a single U.S. Senator has advocated either U.S. surrender or U.S. withdrawal. "What we have advocated is that the Administration quit widening the war; that the Administration quit sending more and more American boys to do the job that ought to be done by Asian

More than one-third of us are cramboys. . . . I do not intend to remain ellent in the face of what I regard as a policy of madness which, sooner or later, will envelop my son and American youth by the millions for years to "Our deepening involvement in Vietnam," said Senator McGovern in the main portion of his speech, "represents the most tragic diplomatic and moral failure in our national experience. The mightlest nation in history-a nation with a glorious democratic tradition based on the dignity and brotherhood of man-is with allegedly good motives

He quoted General MacArthur's celebrated warning that "Anyone who commits American forces to a land war in Asia ought to have his head examined." Having stated what will undoubtedly, to many Americans, seem their own private position, Senator McGovern then attempted to deal with it, as follows. "It is a strange piece of logic, indeed," he said, "which holds that, once committed to error, we must compound the error to salvage the original mistake. It would seem more reasonable, having accepted the premise of error in our involvement, to avoid further widening of the war while devoting our most imaginative efforts to finding a way to

end the killing." It would be our reading of the national situation that, at the very moment President Johnson is trying his hardest to create national unity on the war in Vietnam, the criticism of his and our role in that war is gaining in stature, in clarity, and in strength. And the simplest reason for this may be found in me word Benster McGovern used.

Regardless of how we got where we are, or who brought us here, what we are locked into is indeed a "policy of madness" in which we seem capable of doing nothing but move forward toward our own doom.

Or perhaps, as one conclusion to the McGovern speech or to the feelings and convictions of all other dissenters, one should quote the remarks of Rev. Dr Eugene Carson Blake, general secretary of the World Council of Churches, at Norwalk last night.

"Our course," said he, "has all the elements of high tragedy. More like Hamlet or King Lear than MacBeth or Julius Caesar, unable to distinguish friend from foe, caught in a dilemma which makes any decision increasingly difficult, the United States seems to be stumbling on towards final disaster."

We are not only a growing nation we are still a changing nation. By 1985, the number of us living in urban areas will equal more than today's total population of the United States. But let us step down from the rarified air of statistics and recall any recent plane trip you made-any trip into any large American city. A glance out the window meets the brown-gray shroud of smog obscuring the horizon. Then you see a glistening chain of shiny metal encircling the city: A regular feature of urban life called "rush hour." If we could open the windows the din of background sound would intrude: Air hammers, juke boxes, roaring airplanes and diesel exhausts - interwoven with the plaintive bleat of the commuter's

The airplane lands. Reality strikes. The soft sound of recorded music and the gentle concern of the stewardess are left behind. At the end of a mile's hike for baggage the fight for a cab begins. Then the long ride-in the heat of blistering sun-toward a distant downtown goal. Life in twentieth century cities is an

endurance test. Too many people trying to outwit too few buses and too many cars-living in too much soot and too little open space-accepting outrageous fortune as the inevitable price of something called "progress." Is our urban condition inevitable? Neither the problems we face nor the concern we express is new. In the 1860's, London experienced daily traffic jams up to four miles long, composed of commuters walking to work in the city from the suburbs. The American Planning Officials report contains recommendations for legislation to be undertaken in the 1969 biennium, according to Burns. He charged that passage of the Connecticut Development Act this session would be inopportune.

Wilcox denied any connection between the APO report and the Development act now before the Legislature.

Wilcox presented an outline of the proposed act to the CRPA members, adding that some amendments and adjustments may be made.

The Communty Development Acts and Fund with the sequent sub-duties would probably fall under the jurisdiction of the Connecticut Development Commission. Wilcox did say, however, that this might be changed, due to comments that have been made at the legislative hearings on the proposal.

The sub-duties of the Development Act would include research programs, in fields such as housing construction, rehabilitation techniques and

mortgage financing. Also included under the act would be the funding of various programs by state grants. These grants would amount to either one-half of the federal share or two-thirds of the net cost if federal funds are not available. This section would include physical and economic development activities, such as existing urban renewal assistance and industrial development programs. Also included in this category are such programs as extended low rental housing, housing site development and

capital improvement grants. An additional state fund subprogram was referred to as Human Resource Supplemental grants, by Wilcox. This would include projects involved with the Office of Economic Opportunity, legal aid, and socially oriented poverty programs. State grants would be awarded on the same basis as the Pro-

gram Grants. To qualify for convinued state aid for the instituted programs under the Program Grant category, municipalities would be required to complete a Community Development Action Plan, within two years. The municipality would be required to undertake a survey and inventory of the town, its needed resources, and planning studies; an analysis and evaluation of CDC problems now and in the future, such as housing and economical and industrial development; followed by formulation of a Community Development and Improvement pro-




