Opening Lead—K.
When today's hand was played by a rather conservative group of men, South took the first trick with the ace of clubs, but out the ace of trumps and continued with the jack of trumps. West won and tried to cash the queen of clubs, but South ruffed high and led his low trump to dummy's eight in order to return the queen of diamonds for a ruff.
West won with the king of diamonds and panicked at the sight of dummy's long suit. Surely, West thought, declarer would manage to discard his spade losers on the diamonds if he were given time to do so. West desperately led the ace of spades in the hope of collecting two spade tricks in a hurry. South thereupon spread his hand to show that he could easily take the rest of the tricks.
West might have defeated the contract if he had been able to see two—because that he might have counted up to 13. West knew that South had started with exactly five hearts and one club. This left him with seven cards in spades and diamonds combined. South could play five of those seven cards on dummy's diamonds, but he would still have two spades left after finishing with the diamonds.
After taking the king of diamonds West should return a diamond, forcing declarer to take by himself.
South would have to lose two spade tricks, and this would cost him the game and rubber.

As dealer, you hold: Spades, A-8-7-3; Hearts, K-6; Diamonds, K-6-3; Clubs, K-Q-10-7. What do you say?
Answer: Bid one club. If partner responds in hearts or diamonds you can bid one spade and thus show both of your

Bills Heard On Tax Cut For Elderly
LAST Wednesday was "tax relief for the elderly day" at the state Capitol, according to Roland's State Rep. Robert D. King of the 48th District.
The General Assembly's Joint Finance Committee spent last Wednesday hearing what must be close to a record number of bills on one subject, he said. Sixty-three bills relating to the providing of tax relief for the elderly were aired before the Committee.
King predicted the committee's recommendation of the "so-called administration bill." The administration bill, recommended by Governor John Dempsey, provides a \$1,000 tax assessment exemption to the elderly who own their own homes. To qualify they would have to earn less than \$5,000 a year and live in homes with real property tax assessments of \$10,000 or less.
The benefit to the elderly homeowners could average about \$50 a year under the administration bill, according to King.
"While this amount is not calculated to send our senior citizens packing for a winter in Florida, the principle of direct relief from the real property tax will have been established. There may be some consolation in that," King stated. The tax exemption due will first have to come from the towns in which the properties are located. The state will pay back to the towns the tax revenue lost by the exemption, so the program will not cost the state budget for the 1967-68 biennium, he explained.
"Members of the General Assembly in both parties are certain to be disappointed with the tax relief for the elderly program that will be adopted this year," he predicted. "They are, however, aware of an unbeatable equation of government to the people must come first from taxes levied on the people."
"As a popular song writer said a few years ago on another subject, but applicable here, 'You can't have one without the other,'" King said.

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Tolland Kindergartens Hinge On Budget Meeting

The final hurdle facing a plan to open a kindergarten in Tolland is approval by the Board of Education Tuesday of the budget for the program.
The budget will be taken up at the annual budget meeting in the Hittels School at 8 p.m.
If the kindergarten item is cut from the budget, as some people in town are advocating, it now appears the town would be forced to provide them next year to comply with state regulations.
The Education Committee of the General Assembly passed a favorable report yesterday on a bill which would require every public school district in the state to maintain kindergarten classes by the start of school in September 1968. The bill as reported, contains no special funding or incentives to towns to start such a program.
The bill will now be presented to both the House and Senate, for action and then to the Governor.
Approval of the budgetary allocation to provide kindergarten locally will culminate a long series of meetings and negotiations on the subject.
The Board of Education chairman David Cook and school superintendent Robert Stratton met with the Rev. Donald Miller, member of the executive boards of both co-operative kindergartens Jan. 24 to investigate the possibilities of establishing kindergartens at the Christian Education Building, off the Green, with parents picking up and dropping off 200 youngsters daily. This situation would be dangerous, as well as inconvenient, he said.
It was pointed out at the public hearing that many children would be leaving the elementary school building during the day, either because of a lack of a second car or access to the parents.
Boys' Troops of the Boy Scouts and the Boy League are working to provide a car pool, or through apathy of the parents.
The board agreed to continue negotiations for kindergarten space without committing itself to a signing date, at its Feb. 29 meeting.
Kindergarten Bid Approved
On March 23 approximately 100 town residents, many of them 16-18 year olds, met at the day to attend a public hearing. The hearing was held in the room of the Christian Education Building. The proposed education budget includes an appropriation of \$89,875 for the installation of a kindergarten program, including transportation. This amount would be partially reimbursed by state grants, based on average daily attendance, just like the other grades. The grants would be received at the end of the school year, for inclusion in the following year's budget, according to school officials.
The kindergarten costs, excluding transportation, amount to \$44,875, or about two thirds of the total transportation cost. This grant would also be received from the state in June, after the budget meeting and about the time of the start of the new fiscal year, according to school authorities.
The state grant for kindergartens actually reimburses the town of a higher rate than can

Milk Industry, Government At Odds Over Price Hike

WASHINGTON (AP) — The milk industry and the government are at odds over whether a federally ordered increase in producer prices of milk should be followed by a corresponding increase in consumer costs.

The increases, announced this week by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman, range from a half-cent to 1 1/2 cents a quart for fluid or bottling milk. Affected are 70 urban milk marketing areas throughout the country.

Freeman told newsmen the increases would not justify higher retail prices.

But the Milk Industry Foundation, an association of milk processors and distributors, said, "No fluid milk distributor that we are aware of is in a position to absorb these increased milk costs."

Robert H. North, foundation executive vice president, said in a statement, "They must be passed along to the consumer with other added cost increases. The comments of the secretary of agriculture concerning milk prices probably were misleading to newsmen and to consumers."

Freeman made the increases under terms of federal milk marketing orders. He said the increases were made because of rising costs of production, labor shortages and other economic factors.

North said processors do not object to paying adequate prices to dairy farmers for a constant supply of milk. He pointed out that processors did not oppose price hikes proposed at Agriculture Department hearings earlier this month.

"This technique of stating that consumer prices will not respond to price actions has been used by the Department of Agriculture on several occasions during the last year when the secretary has given several emergency price increases in many of the federal orders," he said.

Under the Freeman action, minimum producer prices for fluid or bottling milk will go up anywhere from 20 cents to 65 cents.

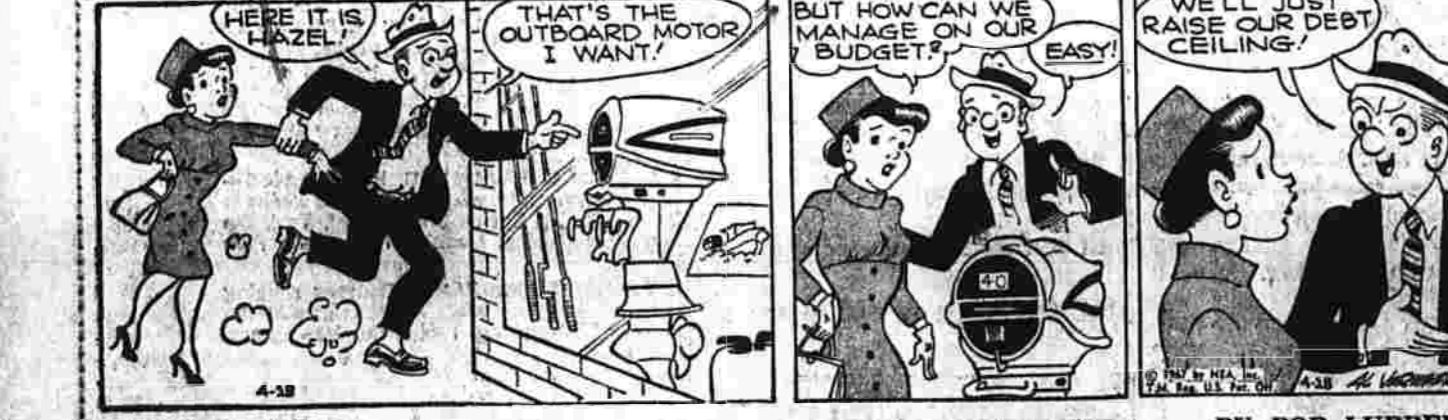

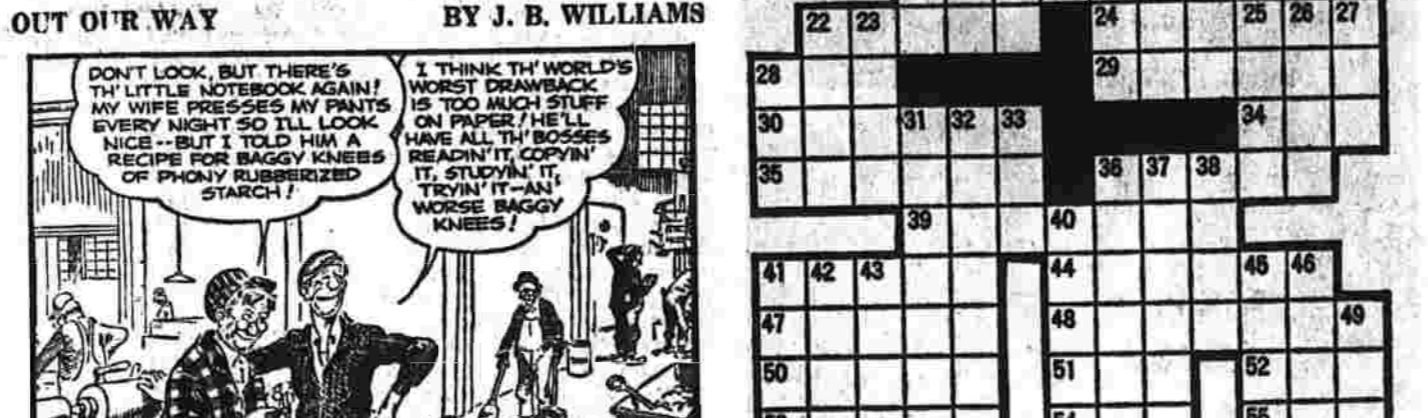

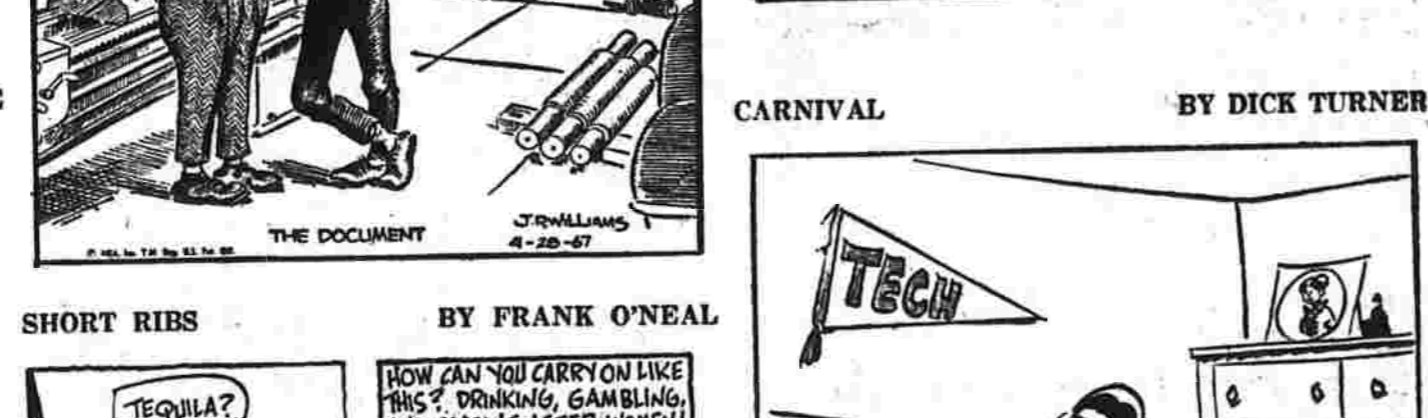
