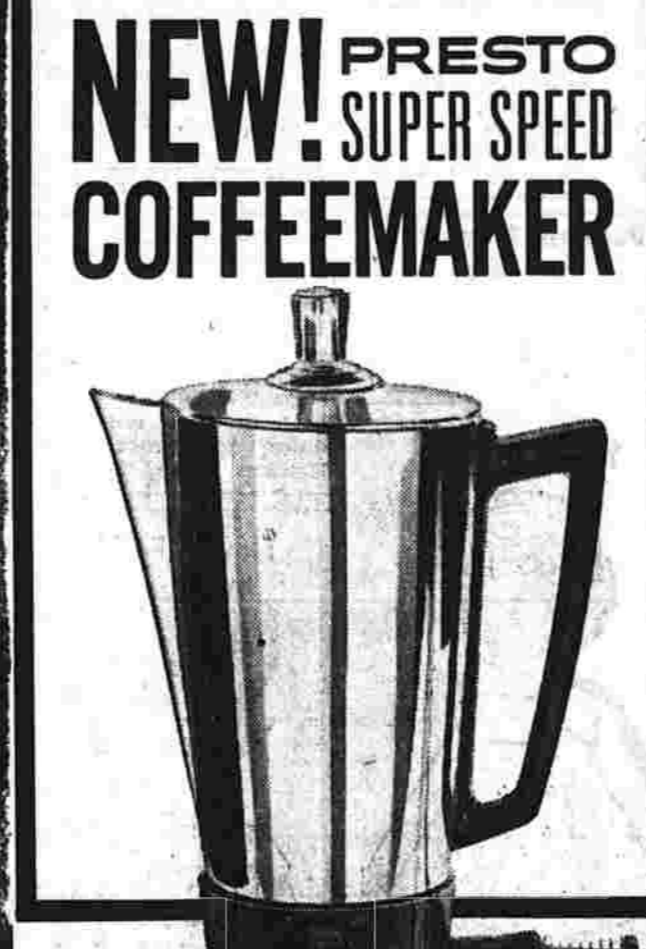

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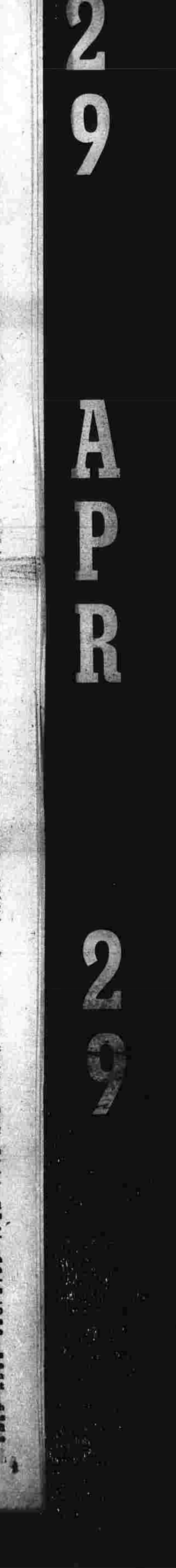

Wall Street Showing Aura of Confidence

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market this week retained its confidence in the Dow Jones industrial average after three weeks of advance.

A new confidence prevailed in Wall Street, not only because of more encouraging news from the economy, but because of the internal strength of the market itself.

On Friday, the Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks reached 800 in early trading. Each time professionals began to take profits and the market bounced away from its peak while still representing a gain at the close.

Analysts said that the market could make more than one attempt to cross such a psychologic barrier as the 800 line. On the other hand, with enough incentive behind it in the way of encouraging news, it could break top that line on the next session.

During the week just ended, the Dow industrials rose 18.87 to 807.63.

The most encouraging news for the stock market was that with an April upsurge sending auto sales above those of the same year, U.S. automakers are increasing production schedules for May and June.

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Independence Movement Shakes Catholic Schools

NEW YORK (AP) — Something like a "Declaration of Independence" in religious teaching is brewing today in Roman Catholic academic circles.

It is challenging traditional controls. It is asserting an autonomy of scholarship with its own bulletin boards.

At the same time, the Catholic University of America, which has been the center of the controversy, is shaking administrative controls, as if it did this week in the controversy over the Rev. Charles E. Curran at the Catholic University of America.

It is also stirring academic friction elsewhere against old-style ecclesiastical paternalism, and producing a tony mood among theological faculties about their prerogatives.

It's a new spirit, entirely, with both dangers and validity, says the Rt. Rev. Mggr. John Tracy Ellis, renowned church historian of Brown University.

Chicago historian Philip Gleason, of the University of Notre Dame, said: "Academic freedom has become almost overnight a subject of the most pressing concern to Catholic educators, and attitudes toward it have changed drastically and rapidly."

This week's student-faculty boycott in Washington, D.C., precipitated a new wave of local bishop or provincial into the university discipline of theology. One threat is for the local mayor or governor to intrude into the field of political science.

Many Catholic scholars take a modified approach to the issue, wisely observing that the emergence of a new "religion" is not a matter of opinion, but of fact. It is, they say, a matter of fact that the university discipline of theology is being challenged by a new generation of scholars.

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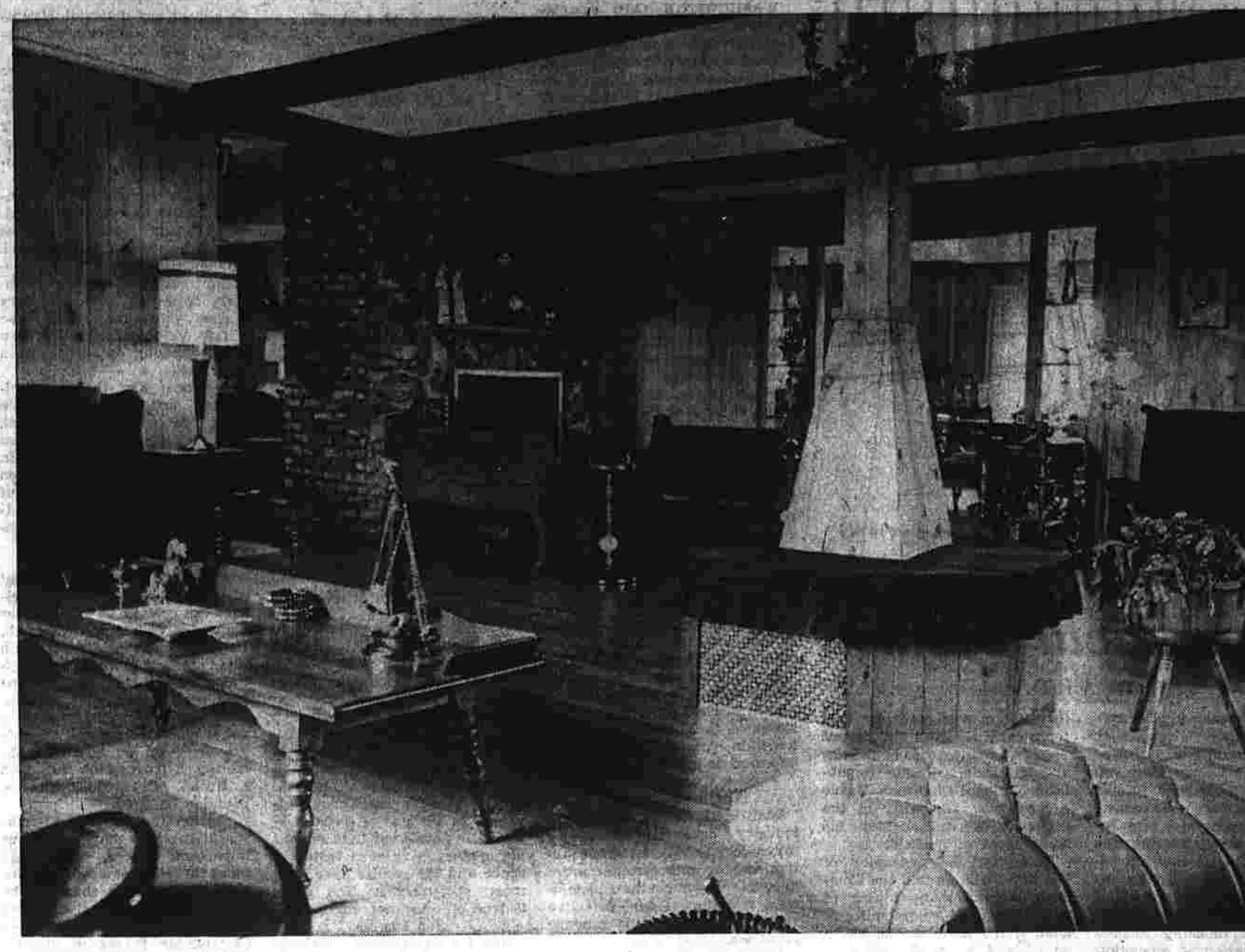

Church Converted into Home

Many enterprising home owners in this area convert barns into attractive dwellings, but Mr. and Mrs. Leo R. Cloutier of Washington St., Vernon, believe there are few families who can, as they do, boast that their home was once a house of worship.

The building was erected in 1896 and was, until a new church was dedicated in 1960 on Rt. 30, Vernon, Sacred Heart Church, a missionary church originally served by the clergy of St. Bernard's Church in Rockville.

As the population increased in the area the facilities of the church became inadequate and the larger church was planned for Rt. 30.

The Cloutiers moved into their home about four years ago after the remodeling had progressed enough to make the building livable. A carpenter by trade, Cloutier, with the able assistance of his wife, planned and did all the work.

Some of the church furnishings have been adopted to a more utilitarian use by the couple, who recognize their sentimental value. Two oak pews were shortened and refinished by Mrs. Cloutier and stand on either side of the living room fireplace.

Amber glass pavers, formerly in one of the church windows, have been set across the bottom of a large front window in the same room and a bench he made in the dining room window was once part of an altar rail.

While not a part of the ecclesiastical life of the building, but still a memento of the past, burlap from some bags found in the church basement has been washed and restored and are now a mat for two figures in a large frame on the family room fireplace wall.

Mrs. Cloutier believes the bags might have been used for sack races at church picnics.

The exterior of the house still retains some of the physical aspects of its former purpose, and the Cloutiers want to keep it this way. They purposely left a portion of the church spire on the roof as a reminder of the past.

Workership came into the church after ascending either two staircases at the front of the building which lead to a landing outside the front door. This entrance is not used by the Cloutiers and they plan to erect a canopy across the front and use it as an open patio.

The main access to the house is now through a door on a back porch, adjacent to a large parking area.

The door opens into a family room at the rear of the center portion of the house. A huge central chimney divides the room from the living room and it has a fireplace on each side. Brick facing is on the family room side, and fieldstone is on the other.

A large master bedroom and slightly smaller guest room are to the right of the family room. A third bedroom and spacious bathroom are on the other side of the house.

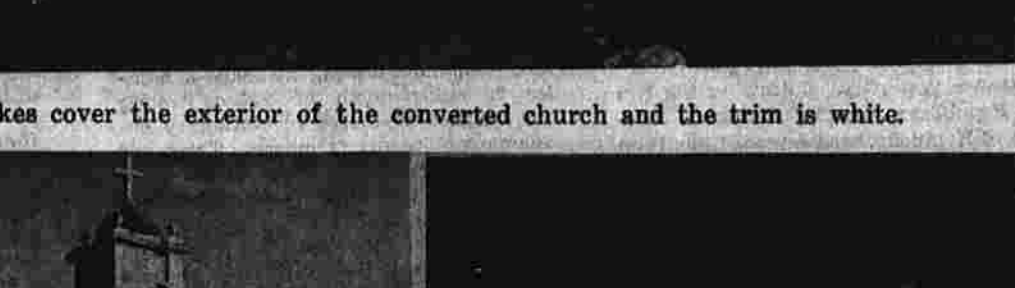
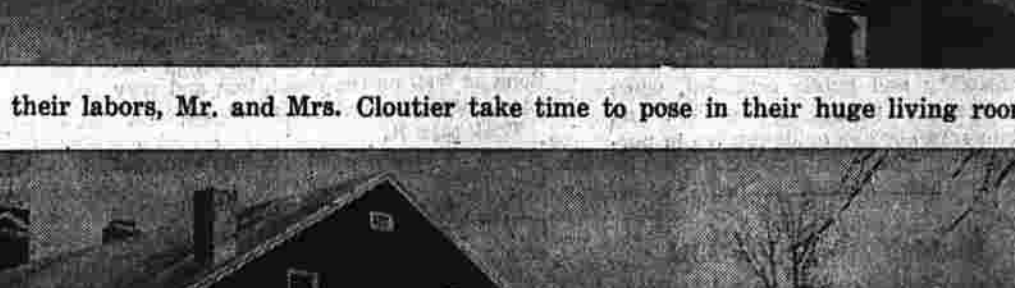
Entertaining is one of the chief joys of the Cloutiers and they are able to do this on a large scale in their present quarters. The combined area of the living room, dining room and adjacent kitchen is larger than most social halls and, according to

the couple, has been the scene of many festive occasions.

Furnishing a home with such large rooms could be a problem but Cloutier solved most of this by putting his carpentry skills to work. He made all the furniture for two bedrooms, a buffet-server with built-in silver set and corner cabinets for the dining room, plus many other things in the house.

One guest room is furnished in antique hand-hewn Connecticut chestnut. Mrs. Cloutier says this room is a favorite of young guests as, she says, it reminds them of the old veranda and her nephews call it the "Hopalong Cassidy" room. Many other antiques are in the room including odd quilting squares, a navy curtain, rare china and a Bible box.

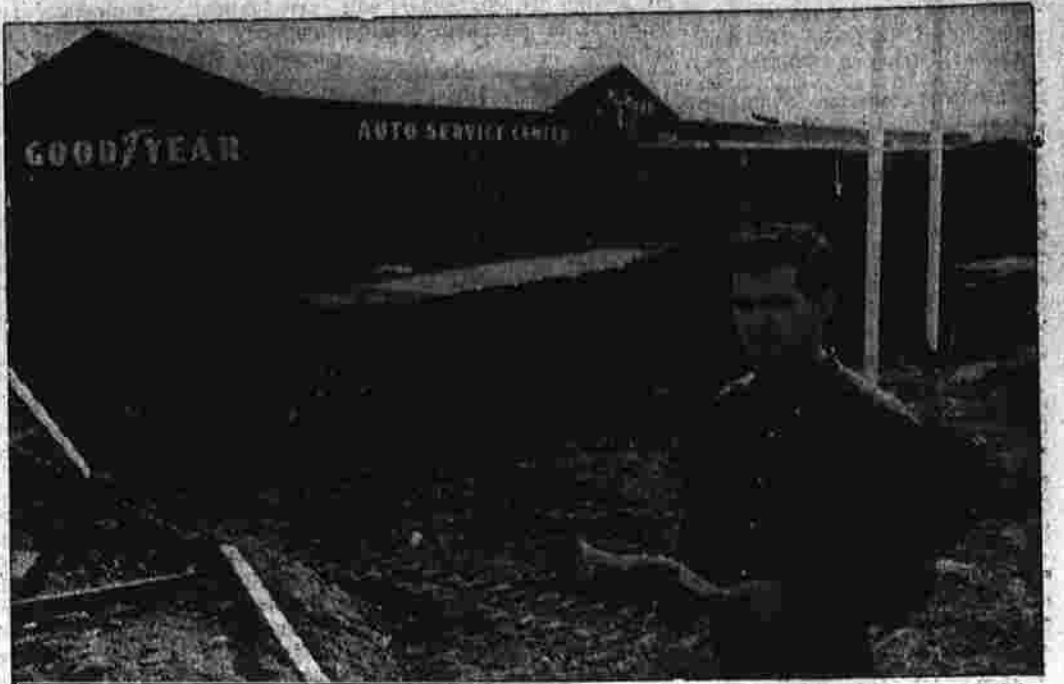

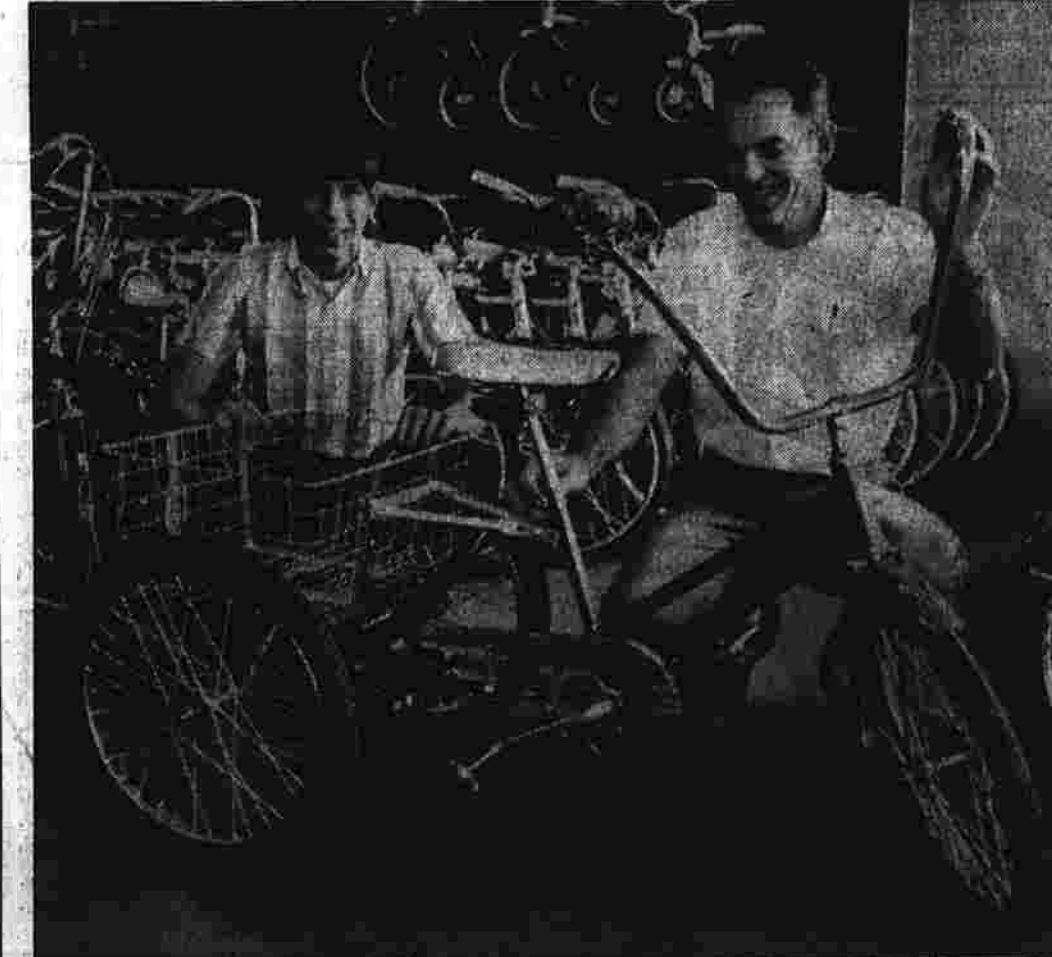

A Change Of Pace For Scott

NEW YORK —Two things about George C. Scott's meaty role in the upcoming special "The Crucible" on the CBS Television Network. Firstly, it's a change of pace from the "villains" he's portrayed in the past. Secondly, he balks when anybody tells him it's a "hero" role.

Scott stars as John Proctor in the two-and-a-quarter hour special "The Crucible," Arthur Miller's powerful drama about the Salem, Mass., witchcraft trials of 1692. The special will be broadcast in color Thursday 9:00-11:15 p.m. on CBS.

As Proctor, Scott plays a strong-minded Salem farmer who tries to stand aside from the hysteria that sweeps the town. Then, when his wife is accused of being a witch and is arrested, Proctor goes to her defense and winds up being one of the accused himself.

"It's a beautiful role," said Scott, "the kind that comes an actor's way only once in a very great while. Mind you, he's no goody-two-shoes, but he's a man of integrity—his own particular, individual kind of integrity, and you've got to respect him."

"I suppose some people might call him a 'hero,' Scott continued, "but I don't think of him that way. Proctor's just a man, with all the strengths and weaknesses of a man. Nothing more and certainly nothing less."

Referring to the many parts he's played as a "villain," Scott conceded that he wasn't thrilled at the prospect of being typed as a "heavy."

"That's one reason why I've played such a variety of roles in recent years—to break down that image," he said. "But there's always some guy some place who takes one look at my mug and decides, 'This guy is perfect for the killer.'"

In motion pictures, Scott was the loathsome cowboy in "The Hanging Tree," the icy prosecuting attorney in "Anatomy of a Murder" and the devilish promoter in "The Hustler." In stage productions, both off and on Broadway, he was the psychopath in "Comes a Day," the evil adjutant-general in "The Andersonville Trial," the satanic Lord Wainwright in "Children of Darkness" and the most famous of all stage villains, Shakespeare's "Richard III."

"I guess I'll continue to play 'heavies' from time to time," Scott conceded. "But when I do, I always try to give the character some redemptive quality. I don't believe in 'either-or,' either all good or all bad. I think most of us, including the villains of this world, live most of our lives in varying shades of gray."

NEW YORK (AP) —"If you close your eyes during the first act," said Basil Rathbone with a wry smile, "you may very well miss me. But when it is no longer a matter of being a romantic star, an actor can play what he wants to play. And I wanted to play the Duke of York."

Rathbone was understating the importance of his role in last Thursday's NBC production of an original drama, "Soldier in Love." But he was being precise about his interest in the role of a royal Stuart in a story about the influence of John and Sarah Churchill on Britain's 18th century Queen Anne.

Rathbone, with 50 years in the theater behind him, most of them as a star, has aged like a good wine. For him, the play is the thing.

"I like history and find more

pleasure in the unpleasantnesses of the past," he said. "Somehow I fail to find the equivalent, as an actor, in the unpleasantnesses of the present. In this case, there was also in me a certain facial resemblance to those long, thin Stuarts."

He has appeared in over 100 motion pictures but is best known for 14 Sherlock Holmes films which identified him so completely with the fiction detective that at one time he found himself a prisoner of the role.

"Not a single producer would touch me," he recalled. "One had a great role but said that the moment I walked out everyone in the audience would think one thing: Sherlock Holmes."

He said that television, with such roles as the evil inquisitor in "The Lark" and "Victoria Regina's" Disraeli had helped his public image to a point where "there is no prejudice anymore."

The Ingrid Voice

NEW YORK—It was exactly 9:25 p.m. when word came that her car had arrived. The 10th day of rehearsal that had begun at 12:30 was over. Ingrid Bergman put on her raincoat over the blouse and skirt, changed from the worn, flowered scuffs to low-heeled strap pumps, said her good nights, and went down the long flight of stairs of the Oval Rehearsal Rooms on Brixton Road in southwest London.

As she came through the door, she looked up at the early night sky and took a deep happy breath. "The only time I see the sky these days is going from that door to the car." About 20 feet away, the chauffeur waited to drive her to the hotel.

Relaxed and chatting freely as the car crawled through the heavy inner London-bound traffic, she spoke of the responsibility and strange loneliness of her present role—a woman no longer young undergoing the cruel surgery, via telephone, of final parting from her lover—

in the "ABC Stage 67" color presentation of Jean Cocteau's one-character drama, "The Human Voice," to be telecast Thursday, May 4 10-11 p.m.

"I've been fascinated with the role since I first saw it played 15 years ago. My former husband (Roberto Rossellini) did it as a film with Anna Magnani. How I envied her that role. Also, in a way, I think I owe this performance to Jean Cocteau. I knew him and always admired him and his work. He was always amusing and cheerful. Anyway, some two years before his death, he wrote to me and said I must play the woman in a work of his called 'Thomas, the Imposter.' I never did it, so I was glad when this chance came to play in another of his works.

"If I had done this part 15 years ago, I'm sure it would have been different than it will be now. When you're younger you'll attempt any role. When you get more experience, when you get older, you approach roles differently. Actually, you get a little more cautious as you get older." If the years had brought caution, they had brought few visible signs of their passing.

"You know, I'd like to see three productions of 'The Human Voice' by three different actresses. As a matter of fact, I'd like to do it again, sometime. It would be wonderful if an actress—like a concert musician—could re-study a role after 10 years, say, and do it with the new knowledge and understanding she has acquired."
