What does seem likely to make it possible for Republican hawks and doves and owls all to agree to stand on it is the fact that it takes a convenient political position which does not hamper individual Republicans. If they want to lend nobly sorrowful support to the President as he tries to get us out of the mess they say he got us into, or if they prefer to challenge the present

In such a political document, the raising of valid points often inspires questioning as to the right of the party in question to make such points. The Senate policy paper, for instance,

"Republicans—for two decades—have elieved the United States must not become involved in a land war on the Asian continent. We are so involved to-

We think the record would reveal that some Republicans, like the late John Foster Dulles, and the perennial Richard Nixon, wanted us to get into the war in Vietnam as early as 1954, although they probably considered that use of our air and sea power would be enough to be decisive.

The Senate policy statement also says "Republicans have believed that no American military intervention should be unilateral. Our commitment today in

Vietnam is primarily unilateral." We do not remember any Republican protests when President Dwight Eisenhower sent our Marines into Lebanon, with the United States acting quite alone, and contrary to the advice of the Secretary General of the United Na-

It is easy to concede the validity of this document's charge that the war in Vietnam "means enormous discretionary powers assumed by the President, with Congress asked to approve his actions after the fact." But candor, again, compels recognition of the fact that Republican leaders in Congress were bulwarks for President Johnson as he undertook each new escalation in Vietnam, and that these Republican leaders even delighted in the fact that it was some of the Democrats who were daring openly to question their President's

Some of the other sad conclusions of this Republican document can be accepted without so much questioning of the right of Republicans to say them. They are in the public domain. It is true that "this war, unlike all others in American history, is more and more justified as much on geopolitical grounds as on the defense of one small

It is true that this war "means our relative isolation as the world's police-

It is true that this is "a war where, in the eyes of many Asiatics, we are fighting against Indigenous Asiatic nationalism, much as France did in the

But this remains a political document, in which Republican strategists have chosen a safe position for maximum criticism of the Democratic President combined with minimum risk of being called unpatriotic themselves. This is not to say that, within the

context of the game of politics, the Republicans do not have some right to play this way, nor to say that they may not deserve victory in 1968, no matter how unsatisfactory and inconsistent their own stand may be. The possibility is that President Johnson has, albeit with much Republican help, got himself and his country into such a tragic mess that his political defeat has itself become a

#### Saving Parks "As Possible"

A remark made about Bushnell Park in Hartford the other day should be noted-not as a criticism of any particular individual involved, for the individual was, as far as we know, a capable and talented public servant-but as an index to the nature and assumption of the time in which we live.

The individual was Deputy State Highway Commissioner Ralph L. Hager, and he was disclosing the fact that he has now received three engineering schemes for the best way to take the eventual connector between Routes 91 and 84 through Bushnell Park. All three plans recommended use of a tunnel for part of the journey.

All three plans, he said, were specifically designed, for one thing, "to preserve as much of Bushnell Park as pos-The key words in this statement

which, one can be sure, dropped most innocently from the deputy commissioner's lip or typewriter and entered as innocently and easily into the approving assumption of the public, were the words "as possible."

When our forefathers gave or created parks they did not, in their touching innocence and public spirit, ever consider that future generations would ever be weighing questions of how "possible" it might be to retain how much of the parks they were creating for pos-

And if they had ever visualized any future conflict between the parks they were giving or creating and roads, parking lots, or buildings people might want to be putting some place, they would never have placed the "as possible" or "if possible" on the side of saving the park. Saving the park would not be the option, but the necessity. It would be the road, the parking lot, or the building which would have second claim, which would have to find its way and existence as best it could, without even daring to dream of invading a

Once it became "possible" to invade a park, then the invasion inevitably escalates, until sometimes it is barely possible to distinguish where the park used

It is now considered a noble and idealistic objective to save as much of Bushnell Park "as possible." There should never have been an original possibility of giving one inch of it to any non-park

> The Fossils May Be Right The most important evidence Dr. J.

Tuzo Wilson, geophysicist, has for his theory that New England was once part of Europe concerns the Cambrian fossils of eastern Connecticut and Massachusetts. These remains from life 590 million years ago are, when they are dug up east of us, of the European rather than the American variety. This is very important evidence that New England is, in reality, merely a

displaced piece of old Europe; separated by some process of upheaval and drift at some indetermined moment in the deep, dark past. If we may speak for New Englanders, this scientific postulate merely con-

firms somewhat more pervasive if less geophysical evidences which we have all, for some time, been noticing in our daily living.

Bagpipes, sauna, ravioli, wurst, skis, sill, sloyd, pasta, vodka, beret, borsch, mayonnaise, Scotch, sandwich, blarney, and Italian movies all parts of New England life that do not have to be dug for, suggest a kinship and common heritage closer than our actual geography. The more we think it over, the more we think there may be something to that old fossil bit.

> Dodd Censure A select committee of his peers has

unanimously recommended that the Senate censure Senator Thomas J. Dodd for conduct "contrary to accepted morals" that tended to bring the Senate "into dishonor and disrepute." This recommendation must have been painful to the members of the committee. They would not lightly take such action. The evidence gave them no choice.

Defenders of Senator Dodd can point out that he was not alone among lawmakers, in the actions for which he was condemned. Certainly they are justified in suggesting that the Powell case, the Baker case and other incidents not followed to a conclusion call for a formal code of ethics for legislators. If there was such a code no one could be excused for not following it. The gray areas are indeed too large.

Despite this, Senator Dodd-seems to have been an extremist in laxity in record keeping and in mixing his political and personal funds. He accepted favors from industrialists far beyond those which removed Sherman Adams from At least one out of state paper has

expressed the opinion that Senator Dodd should be deprived of his seniority. Another called for his immediate resignation. It is inappropriate that he should be Chairman of a Committee studying juvenile delinquency. It was also suggested that the Senator has outlived his usefulness as a representative of the people of Connecticut and that he should retire from public life. Senator Dodd says that the people of Connecticut will be able to make that decision in 1970. The delay is unwarranted. Senator Dodd gan save considerable embarrassment by offering to retire at the end of this session of Congress. This will allow the people of Connecticut to decide whether they want him as a senator at the election in the fall of 1968. He would, if re-elected, be


