# "THE WAY I HEARD IT"

There are a number of events away if you want to attend in the near or not too distant future which you may not know about, but which definitely merit your consideration. Some are more closely tied to the Hartford scene than others, but all are worthy of comment and will draw at least a few Manchester residents, so I present them here.

The most immediate event is the presentation of "Cinderella" by the Junior Modern Dance Theater at the Whiting Lane School in West Hartford at 2 p.m. Saturday. The event is primarily for children, of course, but I'm sure that the adults who accompany them will find the ballet enjoyable.

The Junior Modern Dance Theater is under the wing of the Hartford Ballet Co. which Joseph Albano has started here with very considerable success and impact on the community. The production will be staged and choreographed by students with an eye to the fact that the young people are closer to the feeling of fairy tales than even Mr. Albano would be, and he's not too old either.

Accordingly, since the imagination of children is much more active than in the case with adults, containing (for example) the Juliet and Romeo, the year-old can imagine things as New York Chamber Soloists he always had imagined them when hearing the tale and not Aris Strinz Quartet, and Daniel Barenboim, pianist, denied of his mental image.

July 12 will bring the Schubert Fifth Symphony (which sounds so like Mozart) Vaughan Williams' "Serenade for Orchestra and Chorus," and Walton's "Facade." The last two are British works, not too commonly heard. The Williams composition will feature a debut by the Berkshire Chorus, a new organization to be associated with the famous Tanglewood series.

July 19 will bring Beethoven's First Symphony, to be followed by "Histoire du Soldat," a work originally scored for seven instruments, but subsequently enlarged. I assume it is the enlarged version we shall hear, although I'd like to try the small one for kicks.

July 28 brings the season to a close with Boyce's Symphony No. 1 (by an English baroque composer) Harter's "Knowville, Summer 1915," and an aria from Strauss's opera "Arabella auf Naxos." Altogether a very interesting series of programs.

**PARAPLEGIC IN HIRE**

## South Windsor Court Appeal Filed After ZBA Ruling

An appeal to the Court of Common Pleas in Hartford has been filed following a zoning board of appeals ruling not to revoke a building permit issued for the erection of two television antennas on the property of Alfred P. Yacovone, 177 Clinton Dr., Wallingford.

Property owners in the vicinity of Yacovone's property protested the issuance of a permit by building inspector Donald McLaughlin on the grounds that the zoning ordinance of the town does not allow such a use in an AA-30 zone. They also argued that the zoning board of appeals "acted illegally, arbitrarily and in abuse of the discretion invested in it."

Two suits were filed by Edward T. and Marlene Geddes, 28 Broadleaf Dr., and Donald R. and Betty Joyce, 200 E. 187 Clinton Dr.

In one against Yacovone and building inspector Donald McLaughlin, the plaintiffs seek a restraining order prohibiting Yacovone from construction of the antennas, an order of the court directing McLaughlin to revoke the permit and seeking \$7,000 damages from Yacovone. The other suit is against the zoning board of appeals and McLaughlin charging that in refusing to order the permit be revoked certain members of the board refused to disqualify themselves from hearing the application, although they were required to do so under the state statute.

In this suit, the plaintiffs ask a restraining order requiring Yacovone from construction of the antennas, an order of the court directing McLaughlin to revoke the permit and seeking \$7,000 damages from Yacovone. The other suit is against the zoning board of appeals and McLaughlin charging that in refusing to order the permit be revoked certain members of the board refused to disqualify themselves from hearing the application, although they were required to do so under the state statute.
