

The Justices Ride Again A 15 year old boy in Arizona, already

under probation for purse snatching, was apprehended for a lewd telephone call, and, under the processes of the local Juvenile Court, sent to an institution to stay there until he was 21, which meant confinement for six years duration. If the same boy had been 18 years old, and had been tried in open court, and been found guilty of the particular crime, the maximum punishment for him would have been a fine of \$50, or imprisonment in jail for two months. This is the case which the Supreme

Court has now used as the basis for sweeping decrees about the conduct of juvenile court business all over the To cure this example of legal severity, Juvenile Courts everywhere are now going to have to accord their clients the same safeguards of counsel and right to defense which theoretically obtain in

the nation's criminal courts. The first thing that will occur to most Connecticut watchers of the Juvenile Court scene is that no such instance of unusual severity of punishment would be likely to be discovered here in this

And we are afraid that there may be some sentiment in Connecticut, and throughout the nation, to the effect that our Juvenile Courts, instead of erring on the side of severity, have been all too fatherly and kindly and tolerant in their efforts to deal with young offend-

Even Justice Fortas, writing the Court which force the conclusion that our Juvenile Courts are not making much progress in their war against youthful erime. The President's Commission on Crime in the District of Columbia reported that "in fiscal 1966 approximately 66 per cent of the 16 and 17-year-old juveniles referred to the court by the Youth Aid Division had been before the court previously. In 1965, 56 per cent of those in the receiving home were repeaters. The S.R.I. study revealed that 61 per cent of the sample juvenile court referrals in 1965 had been previously referred at least once and that 42 per cent had been referred at least twice before." In other words, as every community knows from its own experience, a large proportion of its crime is committed by a relatively small number of habitual

An elemental, perhaps thoughtless response to such statistical evidence would be to say, would it not, that it might be a good idea, then, to keep such youngsters out of circulation for as much as six years at a time, instead of the two months they might have to serve under adult prosecution for the specific offense?

This argument, however, the Supreme Court glides over, in order to follow its own trail of legal logic. It would like to think its interpretation of the law comes out to a helpful social result, but it usually reaches for the law first and lets society itself reckon with the consequences. In the present instance, after citing the record of repeater offenders among the juveniles, the Fortas opinion uses these statistics to prove that the alleged present functioning of the juvenile courts "free of constitutional inhibitions" has not produced the eradication of juvenile crime, wherefore the juvenile court process might as well, then, be "domesticated" and tied down to the same constitutional principles which obtain in other courts, hampering them, perhaps, but extending to the individual his greatest possible protection. Merely to be a boy, the Fortas opinion concludes, is no reason for being de-

prived of legal rights.

If Not On Company Time, When?

We came across, the other day, a quotation from Esquire Magazine's "New Esquire Etiquette," and one phase of its advice to any gentleman who wants to get ahead fast in business has had us puzzled ever since. "Maintain," said the Esquire master-

mind on conduct for rising young employes, "an impersonal attitude, You don't ask for a raise just because you have a new baby; you don't miss a deadline just because you have a hangover; you don't pinch fannies on company time; you don't trade on off-hours friendships or make business use of private information. Or, perhaps more exactly, if you do those things you don't

When, if not on company time, should one engage in the particular pastime that Esquire writes about? It is pleasant, of course, to notice that Esquire levels no indictment of morality, delicacy, or discretion against the practice it cites. Obviously, quite to the contrary, it regards it as one of the higher and friendlier forms of social communication, otherwise it would have resorted to more general strictures. But as most practitioners and devotees have discovered, this friendly and

endearing custom happens to be one which is done on somebody's company time, or not at all. Attempted in any other milieu, such as a street scene, or a train aisle, or a football crowd, the practice in question

would create a riot. At home it would be ignored. The proper delivery of the gesture in question, as well as the proper reception thereof, requires a degree of preoccupation of mood and casualness of relation which, to tell the truth, can be found only on company

#### The New Brinkmanship

Brinkmanship as John Foster Dulles practiced it was a peacetime policy which involved calculating to a nicety how close the United States could come to a war without actually getting in. It was a policy fraught with some peril and open to criticism, much of which came from Mr. Dulles' Democratic opponents.

however, with a Democrati Administration in control, the nation is practicing a new "brinkmanship," this time under wartime conditions and in the face of peril far greater than that which prevailed under the Eisenhower-Dulles regime. What was then the cold war has become a hot war and threatens to get hotter.

At issue are opposing views of how the war should be fought. There are those who would use full military force of men and material to achieve a military victory in the earliest possivle time. There are others who would have the United States pull out of Vietnam as promptly as possible.

Between these extremes are two others: Those who would escalate the war whatever degree appears necessary, and those who would not escalate, but would maintain a holding action, protesting South Vietnam, while probing all avenues for peace.

The escalationists appear to be in the ascent. The tempo of the war has been stepped up. American bombing raids have struck new targets in North Vietnam; there have been new attacks by land and sea. And what has been the response? No sign of victory, no weakening of the North Vietnamese position, but rather a bolstering of their will to resist. And, what is more serious, a strengthening of the means to resist.


In response to United States escalation, the Soviet Union has sent MIGs into North Vietnam; they have accounted for American deaths. More recently Soviet-made rockets fired on an American air base have killed and wounded a umber of Americans. Escalation by one side leads to more

escalation on the other, an exercise in the new "brinkmanship" which can result only in disaster. Already the U.S. military policy has helped to close, if not to heal, the idealogical breach between the Soviet Union and Red China. Continuing escalation will find the United States in a head-on confrontation with these two Communist powers, confrontation far more serious than he showdown between the U.S. and the J.S.S.R. over Cuba

Clearly, escalation of the war as a means of achieving U.S. objectives has been discredited. In the words of Thant, secretary-general of the United Nations, "we are already witnessing the initial phases of World War III." Now is the time for all sober, responsible, patriotic Americans to make their nfluence felt upon their government so as to avert calamity. There is no room for draft card burners, flag burners, or other assorted kooks; neither is there any place for irresponsible hell-forleather super-patriots who have no sense of responsibility. The American people must not be misled by any extremists; they need to see clearly and act firmly and decisively to prevent a nolocaust which no one wants, but


stumble into through blind folly or misguided pride. The new "brinkmanship" has gone too far already. Now is the time for all sides to stop and reconsider, for there is everything to be lost and nothing to be gained by expanding the war.

Said the leading Labor party dissident, 82-year-old Emanuel Shinwell: "We might have to change our national anthem to God save De Gaulle!" The most optimistic note for British entry came from the liberal Guardian:

"The fact that General d Gaulle brought forward so many negatives Tuesday without actually saying 'No' might mean that he is less confiden than usual of correctly predicting the course of history and there is no need yet for Britain to despair."

prison if convicted by the courtmartial panel of 10 field grade officers, including four who fought in Vietnam-Defense cross-examination during the first week of the court-martial was intended to show that Special Forces medics are essentially combat troopers, and are also used for political "pacification" of Vietnam peasants who come to them for medical treatment.
