United States and Communist China, made without previous classification of one or the other as hero or villain, would find that it was really the United States, rather than Communist China, which had achieved the "villainous and hardened" stance of the historical moment, with Mr. Rusk's own magnificent unaccompanied language a big part of the posture.

There was a time, not very long ago, when we would have flinched from saying that we expected to be the victor of other continents, and other nations, for anything more than the very shortest time possible.

Have we the American people really changed? Not yet, perhaps, but we will, unless we somehow take hold of our own destiny and make it clear we do not wish to be the whole world's one nation policeman. Have we ever decided to be the new Britain, the new Rome? No, but we got used to it.

All those dreary columns by Mr. Drew Pearson about General Khrushchev and the West German government and silverware and carpets and Persian rugs and whatnot were apparently investigated and found to be as phony as the rainings of the village gossip, whence they had after all emanated.

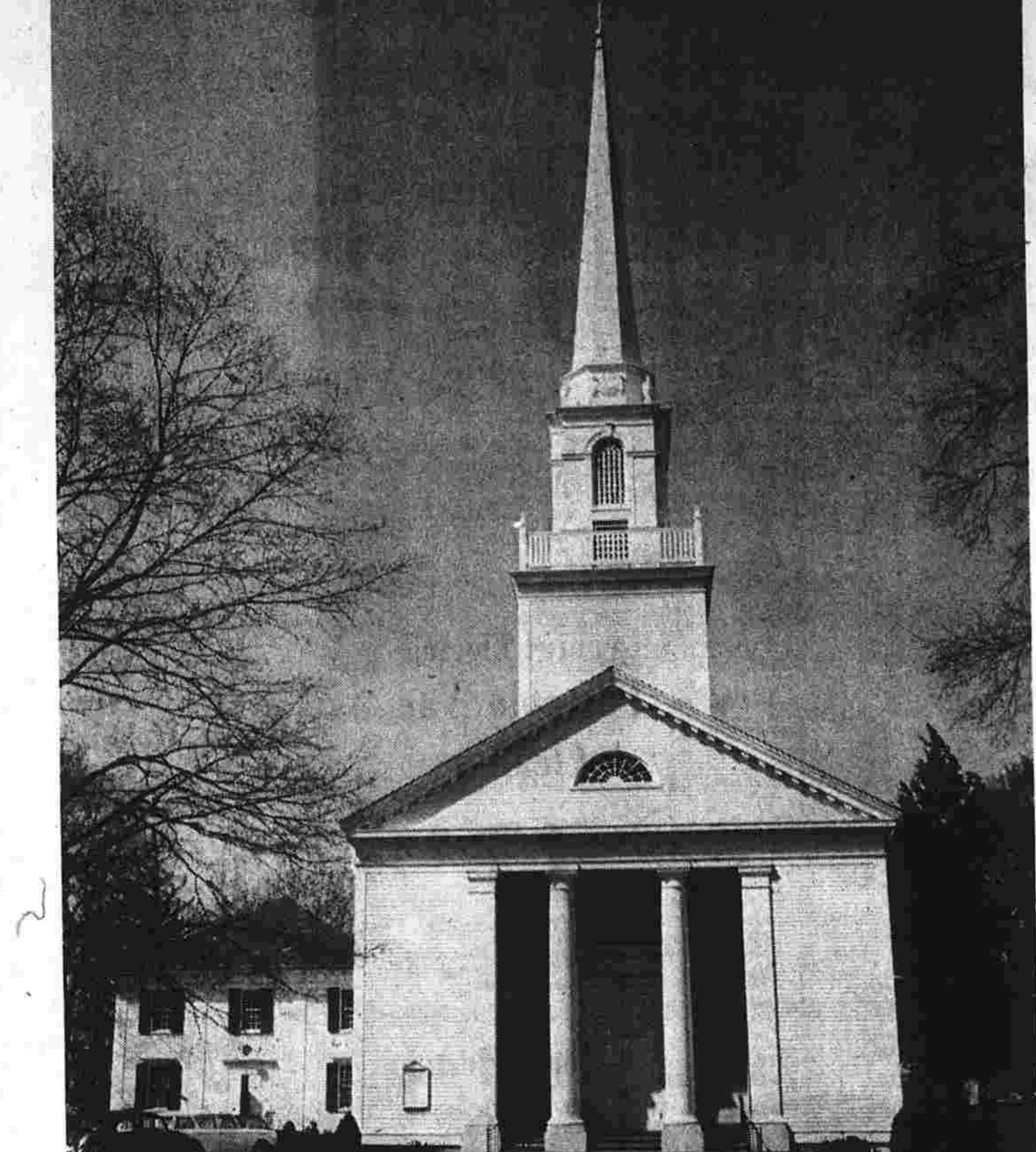

Totally Free Hand To Recruit Stars

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR'S DREAM

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)— What Max Rafferty proposes is an athletic director's dream: Give the universities and colleges a totally free hand in recruiting athletes.

Anyone who wants to pay an athlete's way through school should be allowed to, says Rafferty, California's outspoken state superintendent of public instruction and a former high school coach.

The present cloak-and-dagger, James Bond style of finding and luring athletes—with results such as the recent punishment of the University of Illinois coaches—is childish, Rafferty said in an interview.

"If a football scholarship will permit a youngster who could otherwise afford four years at UCLA or USC to go there, what's wrong with that?" Rafferty asked.

Rafferty who oversees elementary and high schools, believes university administrators would accept his proposal if they analyzed the plan with real logic.

Rafferty would abolish all the "hypocritical recruiting restrictions" and substitute these four rules:

1. Any individual or organization who wants to seek out muscular young men and pay their way through college is welcome to do so.

2. The muscular young man must pass the same entrance exams and meet the same scholastic requirements as their less muscular classmates.

3. The athlete's course of study must be of comparable status and difficulty with that of the nonathlete.

4. Nobody gets any special consideration in testing or grading and final-cut rules apply to everyone equally.

Every athlete would have to be a member of a varsity sport, just as any other student.

"No exception should be made for or against him," declared Rafferty.

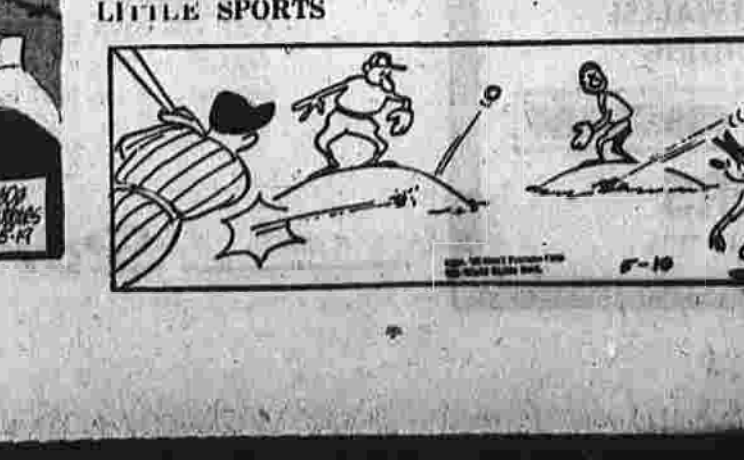
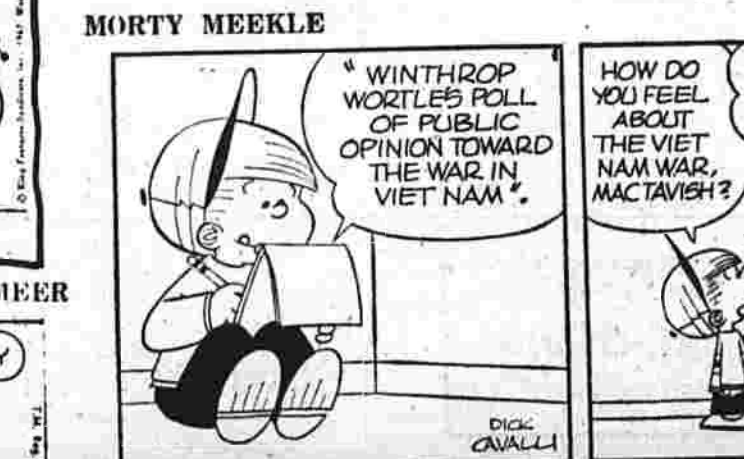
