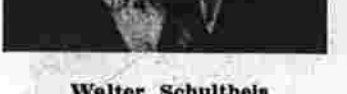

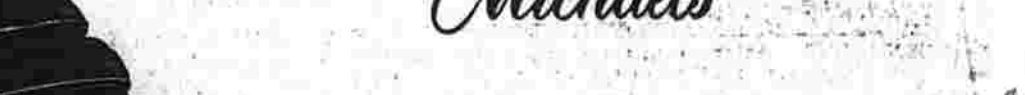

Manchester Book Sale Below Expectations

NEW YORK (AP) — Many book dealers across the country reported Tuesday that sales of William Manchester's "The Death of a President" have fallen far short of expectations.

The controversial account of John F. Kennedy's assassination landed on retail shelves early last month in a blaze of sensational publicity. Trade sources thought the book might become the runaway best-seller of the 20th century.

But a national survey indicated things haven't worked out that way. The publisher, Harper & Row, said the initial printing of 800,000 copies was sold out by retailers but acknowledged that thousands of the books have been returned by dealers. Firm plans for a second printing have yet to be made.

"We'll have to print more, but as yet we don't know how many or how soon," said Frank Spolito, Harper & Row's sales manager.

Many book retailers complained that discount stores had skimmed off the cream by cutting the price of the Manchester book to as low as 50 cents.

Henry Leth, manager of Brentano's in Washington, said on the other hand, "We're quite satisfied with the way the book is selling. There is no real way of knowing how many more we could have sold but there had been no discounting."

Comments from stores in Massachusetts, President Kennedy's home state, ranged from "The book didn't sell very well" to "We didn't do what we expected with it."

A store in Hyannis Port, where the Kennedy family has a summer home, reported, "We're selling it but not as well as we hoped. Perhaps the series."

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U.S. Army Major Defects to Cuba

HAVANA, Cuba (AP) — The Cuban government announced today it has granted asylum to U.S. Army Maj. Richard Barwood Pearce, a Vietnam war hero.

The Communist party paper Osuna published a note over Pearce's signature that said he left the United States "for reasons of conscience."

Pearce, 36, a senior aide to Lt. Gen. Thomas W. Dorn, 41 Army commander at Ft. Sam Houston, San Antonio, Tex., became the object of an air search after he took off from Key West, Fla., Sunday.

The Cuban government said Pearce had been granted asylum. He said the international cause of the Cuban revolution.

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Nasser Pressing Blockade; World Chiefs Urge Restraint

BRIDGEPORT (AP) — Governor John Dempsey was criticized today by the Rev. Charles T. Gordon, president of the Bridgeport-Stratford branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, for not including any Negro in his nominations for 23 judgeships in the Superior, Common Pleas and Circuit Courts.

Mr. Gordon, pastor of the Walden Methodist A.M.E. Church here, said he sent a letter to the governor.

"It seems inconceivable to me," he wrote, that with such a large number of appointments to be made, not one Negro attorney was selected by you for elevation.

"The glaring omission tends to make the Negro residents of this state feel that we are seriously considered only when our votes are needed and are being sought."

"I was a delegate to your Conference on Human Rights and Opportunities in Hartford (May 20-21)," he said. "There we heard much about responsibilities for providing adequate opportunities for Negroes and other minority groups to be involved and included in the mainstream of the life of our state and nation."

"You had the power to demonstrate in a tangible way your sincerity and good intent, at least one Negro judicial appointment out of several. This would have helped correct the rather distorted image of the Negro in Connecticut," the NAACP leader wrote.

Soviet Union, U.S. at Odds Over U.N. Middle East Role

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The Soviet Union and the United States are at odds over the question of a U.N. Security Council debate on the threat of war between Israel and the Arab states.

The United States fired back with a charge the council would have "no bony its hand in the sand" not to consider the tense situation in the Middle East.

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Middle East Crisis Faces U.N. Council

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — France and Britain—Israel's allies in the 1956 Suez war—called today for international efforts to cool off the Middle East crisis as Egypt was reported moving on land, sea and in the air to block Israeli shipping in the Gulf of Aqaba.

At the same time, Moscow radio reported that Arab states had been declared in a state of general mobilization for possible war with Israel.

The French government suggested joint action by the four big powers with "a particular responsibility in the safeguarding of peace" — France, the United States, Britain and the Soviet Union. A Cabinet spokesman in Paris said details of such action had not been worked out.

In Britain, Prime Minister Harold Wilson told a labor union meeting his government was seeking a solution through the United Nations and was ready to join any other countries in keeping the Gulf of Aqaba open.

British warships in the Mediterranean were put on a standby alert.

Israel has said an Egyptian blockade of the gulf, its only shipping route to the Red Sea and Indian Ocean, would mean a fight.

In Cairo, U.N. Secretary-General U Thant began his mediation mission by conferring with Egyptian Foreign Minister Mahmoud Riad. Thant was expected to see President Gamal Abdel Nasser tonight.

Israel's foreign minister, Abba Eban, flew toward New York, where the U.N. Security Council was called into urgent session. Israeli sources said Eban would seek U.S. officials to clarify American intentions in the crisis and would remind Eban of previous U.S. assurances of support for Israel against Arab attack.

President Johnson said Tuesday the Gulf of Aqaba should be open to ships of all nations and declare Egypt's threatened blockade illegal.

About the same time, the Soviet government warned that it would back Arab nations in the event of aggression in the Middle East.

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. planes moving south as usual on North Vietnam's roads.

During previous holiday truces of two to four days, the U.S. command charged the Hanoi eastward to the Red River. Vietnamese with marked increases in the volume of war supplies they moved southward.

But the U.S. spokesman said the 24-hour lull in the bombing "did not provide the time frame in which to move large quantities of material."

The U.S. and South Vietnamese commands charged the Communist forces with redeployed violations of the truce in South Vietnam.

The U.S. command reported 75 "incidents" during the ceasefire period with 12 Americans killed and 87 wounded. The South Vietnamese command reported an additional 19 incidents with four civilians and soldiers wounded.

A GENIUS; A MEMORY

Even without Christopher Spencer's inventive genius, the Union Army would undoubtedly have defeated the Confederates in the Civil War, but with Spencer's repeating rifle the victory was almost certainly hastened through the rifle's superiority in key battles. Yet Spencer, like his native town of Manchester, is generally overlooked.

The approach of Memorial Day seems an appropriate time both to examine the career of a man whose invention impressed Civil War leaders and to quote a personal reminiscence of Memorial Day observance in times past.

Early Gun Work

Christopher, one of the eight children born to Ophim Spencer and Asenath Hollister Spencer, went to work, at age eleven, on the S. M. S. farm owned by his grandfather Josiah Hollister. There he did his first work on a gun—the flintlock which Josiah Hollister had carried in service during the Revolutionary War. Christopher, fourteen, sawed off the barrel with an old case knife, which he had converted into a saw by hacking it on the edge of an axe.

Learning His Trade

In the summer of 1847, Christopher worked for the Cheney brothers at their first mill, the M. N. S. Manufacturing Co., built on Hop Brook to make sewing silk. In 1850, he was employed there as a Sharpe's Rifle Co. in Hartford, journeyman machinist after a period, in the interval, at an apprentice in the Samuel Loomis machine shop at Manchester Cross.

Three years later, he put in two years getting experience elsewhere: At Rochester, N.Y., where he spent six months in machine tool manufacturing and six as a locomotive repair shop; at the Ames Works in Chicago, Mass.; and at Colt's Army in Hartford, where he probably got his motivation for making the repeating rifle, which he went to patent in 1855. In 1855, he returned to Cheney Bros. as superintendent of a rapidly expanding company.

First Patent

Spencer's first patent was granted for a silk-winding machine, conceived by Frank Cheney. As Spencer wrote for his children, "The spooling was done on machines manufactured by girls, one to each machine. The thread was dexterously shifted by hand to traverse one hook and loom to buy the various courses adapted to the level of the spools. Mr. Cheney thought this labor might be largely dispensed with and suggested that I use your invention in that direction. We put our heads together and I did the work to convert one of the hand machines into an automatic. I think that within a month's time we were operating successfully the automatic machine, which was adopted at once. An order was given for twenty of them and one girl could operate three machines."

A similar machine was perfected by Spencer and another inventor, Hensleigh Conner, who was employed at the Willimantic Loom Co. This machine was adopted for the entire system of thread-winding there. It was the first machine built by the Pratt and Whitney Co. Mr. Spencer said:

Making the Rifle

Spencer's interest in the possibility of making a repeating rifle was encouraged by Frank Cheney, who allowed him the use of tools and machinery after his regular eleven-hour day in the silk mills. Further help came from Richard Lawrence, an employee of the Sharpe's Rifle Co. in Hartford, who provided some parts for the first working model. When the patent was granted Spencer in March 1860, the threat of war gave impetus to producing the rifle to replace the muzzle-loader then used by the army.

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — Police today set the toll of a big department store fire at 38 dead, 64 injured and 222 missing, but store officials said they listed 200 missing.

Most of those missing were supposed caught in the building during a rush hour when the department store was being cleared out in a big sale.

A fresh flareup of flames from the still smoldering ruins was quickly put out but it delayed firemen in removing more bodies they had located.

Dempsey Signs Bill Three States Agree On Police Compact

MANCHESTER (AP) — The provisions of the New England Police Compact have been put into effect in three states as a result of Gov. John Dempsey's signature Tuesday.

The agreement, now in effect in Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut, calls for closer cooperation in fighting organized crime in New England and authorizes the state police of one state to aid those of another in the event of a riot or other emergency.

The terms of the compact specify that it would go into operation when three New England states approved it.

Favorable action from the three states is expected.

The governor will also examine other bills passed by the House that would:

- Create a "central collection division" in the Department of Finance and Control to take over from the Welfare Department collection support payments for the blind, child welfare cases.
- Require contractors doing business with the state to promise to furnish the State Commission on Civil Rights with requested information relative to charges of racial or religious discrimination.
- Provide for the transfer of delinquent persons awaiting disposition of their cases to state mental institutions if they appear to be mentally ill. Present law requires that such persons be held in a hospital until a hearing when a person has already been sentenced.
- Amend the State Police Act to require that the State Police be organized as a police force.
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The bill specifies that "no person shall intercept a telecommunication or telegraph communication, or shall employ any device for overhearing or recording communications passing through a telephone or telegraph line without the consent of each party to such communication."

It sets a maximum penalty of one year's imprisonment and \$5,000 fine.

GOOD SAMARITANS

HARTFORD (AP) — Gov. John Dempsey is expected to sign a bill that would protect registered nurses who act as "good Samaritans" from negligence suits.

The bill passed by the House Tuesday provides immunity from acts of "ordinary negligence only. Acts which constitute gross, willful or wanton negligence would still be subject to suits.

The 1968 General Assembly gave such immunity to physicians who provide emergency assistance to "persons in need thereof."

ELDERLY HOUSING

HARTFORD (AP) — Legislators in the House have reported heavy demands for vacancies in existing housing projects for the elderly and have sent a bill to the Senate authorizing the \$13 million in bonds to authorize construction of additional housing units to help relieve the situation.

Rep. William J. Lavery, D-Bridgewater, told the House Tuesday that 26 new units are being built in that city and already 1,300 applications are on file.

There are 10 applicants for every opening in New Haven, according to Democratic Rep. Robert G. Oliver.

Some 1,500 additional units could be financed by the bond authorization, reported Rep. James P. Loughlin, D-Bridgewater.

The House amended a Senate bill forbidding wire-tapping and sent it to the legislative commission for clearance before final action on it.

The House amendment would exempt police who are investigating kidnappings and obscenity, indecent or harassing telephone calls.

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Lupton Opposition Fails Mandatory Kindergartens OK'd by State Senators

HARTFORD (AP) — The Senate has taken final legislative action on a bill to make kindergartens mandatory in public school systems.

The mandatory kindergarten bill, passed by the upper chamber Tuesday night and sent to the governor, is aimed at 30 Connecticut's 169 communities which currently have no kindergartens. It gives communities until July 1, 1969 to comply.

Sen. John M. Lupton, R-Weston, in an unsuccessful attempt to amend the bill, said the General Assembly should not tell the towns specifically that they must have kindergartens, but merely allow them to lower the school age.

Sen. Gloria Schaffer, D-Woodbridge, who reported the measure, said the amendment would defeat the purpose of the bill. "In terms of kindergartens, we mean exactly what we say, and we mean every child," she said.

In other action, the Senate sent to the House a bill that would allow the University of Connecticut, joining a law in Connecticut to take over McCook Hospital from the city of Hartford. The bill carries an appropriation of \$800,000. The hospital would be operated in conjunction with the UConn Medical-Dental school being built in Farmington.

Earlier Hoffa said he made no attempt to capitalize on his father's name but that he would not dissociate himself from his father, either. His father was in a federal prison on a jury tampering conviction.

Young Hoffa is a University of Michigan Law School graduate and a former legislative aide in the Michigan Senate.

Bus Drivers Strike Again in Hong Kong

HONG KONG (AP) — Bus drivers struck again today as the homework rush hour as Chinese Communist leaders kept up their labor harassment of the British colony after 11 days of riots, and demonstrations.

Officials said roving Communist agitators intimidated operators and conductors into abandoning half of Hong Kong Island's 150 buses. Two hundred gas company workers also struck but service was continued by supervisors and 150 employees who refused to walk out.

Reports persisted that the Communist, who touched off the series of riotous incidents after police broke up a student demonstration, would disrupt water and electric services.

The government said the reports were being "maliciously circulated" by Communist agents.

It reportedly broadcast assurances that its Essential Services Corps would maintain public utility services if there were strikes.

There were no reports of violence up to midnight. The government, gambling that rioting would have blunted the local Communist Party's momentum, announced that it would stir up a bigger percentage of Hong Kong's four million Chinese.

During the 11 days of riots new emergency laws providing for up to 10 years in prison and \$5,775 fines for broadcasting harbor, it is estimated that not more than 1,000 hard-core Reds took part. The remaining 5,000 to 7,000 were said to be rebellious teenagers and hoodlums. Peking has protested to Britain against "provocative" in Hong Kong but the British rejected the protest.

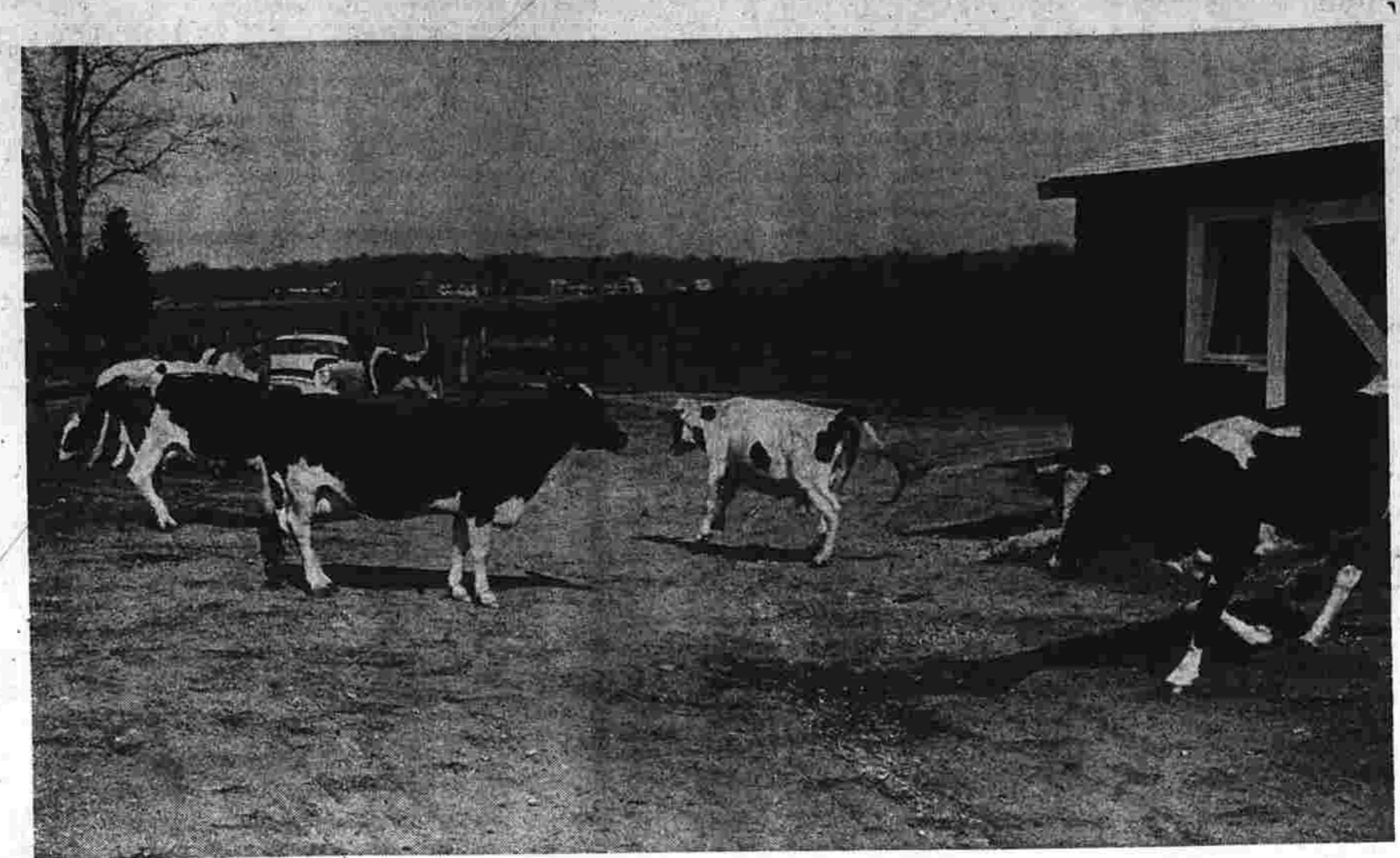

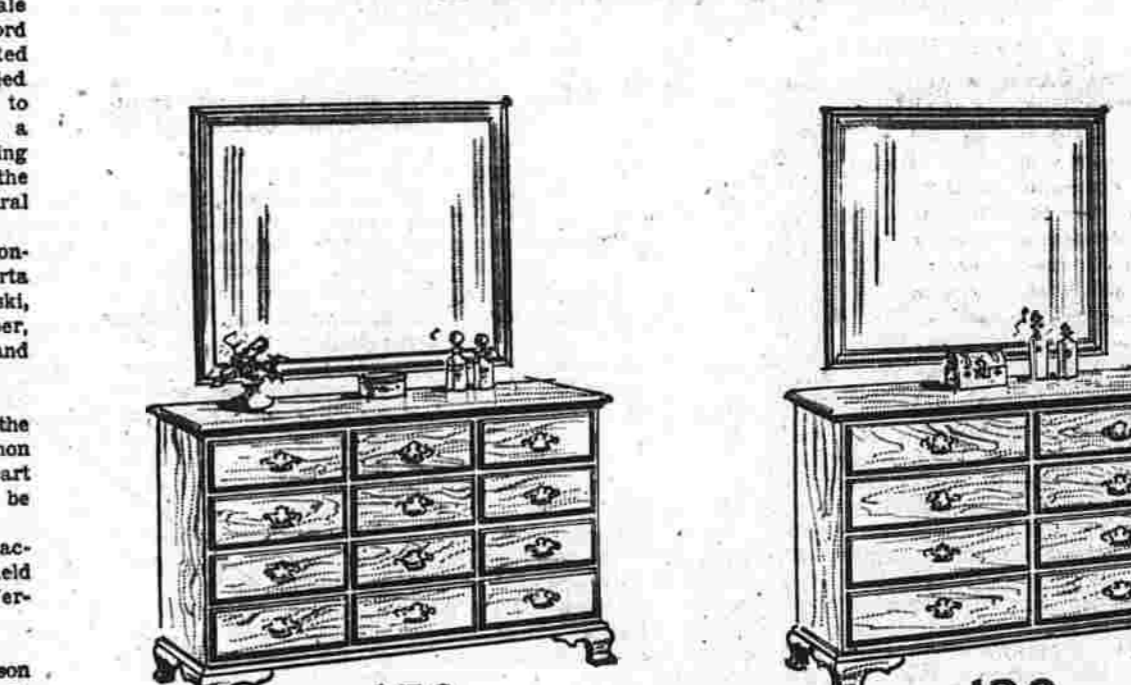

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Legal Snag Delays Teacher Pay Accord

The complex, months-old salary dispute between the Board of Education and Manchester teachers remained unresolved today despite two days of concerted efforts to adopt a salary schedule for next year—and the affair took a new legal twist.

This morning the board disavowed that it took Monday and again yesterday to adopt a schedule for both in- and out-of-town teachers by mutual agreement. The board failed to muster the required six votes (two-thirds majority) of its 12 members.

The discovery was made only hours before teachers were slated to vote on a new proposal agreed upon yesterday by negotiators for both sides and adopted by the board.

Some \$13,000 more than the schedule adopted Monday and now rescinded, the new, compromise schedule was still being viewed against the \$294,000 proposal it supported during winter negotiations.

In yesterday's 4-2 vote, Rottner, who had been identified as the author of the plan, was in favor, with the two negative votes cast by Helen and Atty. Thomas Bailey.

Members absent from the meeting were Dr. William J. Schard, Belden Schaffer (who Monday had sided with the teachers) and the Rev. Kenneth (Mervin) Grogan (Mervin's brother-in-law).

The M.E.A. team said it would recommend the teachers accept the proposed schedule.

Impact of School Bill Rider On Desegregation in Doubt

WASHINGTON (AP) — One by one, Northern liberals who had first castigated the amendment as a weakening of the present civil rights enforcement practices being held in it as a new and potent weapon. The amendment reached its climax in the following exchange:

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.): "Would this amendment be applicable to de facto desegregation in the North?"

Sen. Frank Thompson Jr. (D-N.J.): "That is my opinion."

The debate was a routine preliminary to a showdown vote scheduled for late today on a Republican-backed program to fund the present federal program to education program into one run largely by the states.

For several hours Tuesday the House tattered on the edge of total confusion as it dealt with the amendment which would require enforcement in all 50 states of any school desegregation plan.

The amendment was adopted by voice vote, subject to a later roll call vote.

As author, Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore., said it would force the Office of Education to apply the civil rights law as Congress intended it. It now is concentrating only on the South, she said.

Everyone agreed that was a good idea, but then they wanted to know what effect it would have on school desegregation.

Rep. John Conyer, D-Mich., who at one point said the amendment would prevent desegregation in the North.

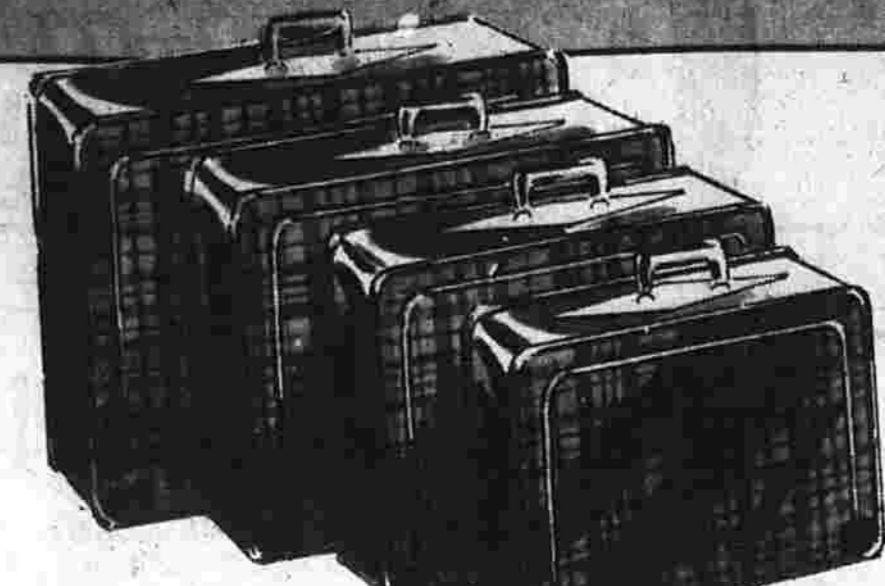

Computers Help Bar Duplication of MVD Licenses

WATERBURYFIELD (AP) - Computers will be put to work to prevent motorists facing license suspension from obtaining duplicate licenses, the Department of Motor Vehicles said today.

"Since Connecticut began suspending licenses for speeding," said Commissioner John J. Flynn, "the duplicate license problem has been increasing steadily."

"It works this way - a driver, after getting a speeding ticket, goes to one of our offices and asks for a duplicate license to replace the one he says he lost."

"The officer, not knowing about the ticket, issues a duplicate. Then, if the speeder is convicted in court, he has one license to surrender and another to drive around with."

"To put a stop to the practice, the department's branch offices are being linked by a communications network to two computers in Hartford. Detailed information on drivers will be available from the computers' memory in seconds."

The system "also should prove a benefit to the driving public as far as speeding and speeding up the registering of vehicles and the issuing of licenses," Flynn said.

Nude Films Get 'Nuder' Even in U.S.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - Movies are nuder than ever, and no one knows exactly where the trend will end.

Until five years ago, the major film companies did not even allow nudes to be seen on the screen; herein cameras were decorously supplied with rhinestones.

All that has been changed. The new film era of exposed skin was heralded a decade ago by Brigitte Bardot, whose caressing in and out of towels attracted the interest of audiences everywhere.

European film makers, notably the uninhibited Swedes saw the value of exposing their stars. American producers, still wedded to the puritan tradition, said the line. The production code decreed: "Complete nudity, in fact or in silhouette, is never permitted. Nor shall there be any licentious notices by characters in the film of suggested nudity."

Three years ago this usage began facing a strong challenge. The cause celebre was "The Pawnbroker," which was certainly not a girls film. Bare-breasted women were shown as evidence of the depravity of a Nazi concentration camp.

The sponsors of "The Pawnbroker" would not remove the nude scenes, and the film received a condemned rating from the Catholic Legion of Decency, which has now been superseded by the National Catholic Office for Motion Pictures.

"The Pawnbroker" was at first denied, then granted a production code seal after certain revisions were made. The nudity remained. Such have been the changes in the code administration since then that "The Pawnbroker" would doubtless be passed without question today.

The advent of Jack Valenti as president of the Motion Picture Association brought a much less specific code which eliminated the prohibition against nudity. American companies are now releasing many films that display female breasts and back-sides of both sexes.

The makers of "Hawaii" were permitted to depict Polynesian maidens in the topless fashion they enjoyed before the missionaries came to the islands. John Huston was allowed certain liberties in portraying Adam and Eve from the Bible. Most of the time the parents of us all were filmed from the rear or face-on from the waist up, with Eve's long tresses covering most of her bosom.

"We have no jurisdiction on how we will deal with nudity," Valenti told me recently. "We can't say to the film makers, 'You are allowed to show one breast, or half a backside.' We will simply have to take up each case as it is presented and judge the scene on its merits and dramatic merit."

Valenti's office did draw the line on "Blow-Up," Michelangelo Antonioni's first English-language film. Valenti explained that the objection was raised in front of David Hemmings. The offending passage was a romp in a photographic studio with Hemmings and two nude teenagers.

The denial of a code seal did not hurt the picture. It has been doing good business as the release of an MGM subsidiary. Major companies can use this device when denied approval of a film by their own self-censoring agency.

More nudity is coming. The latest issue is a bath scene by Hayley Mills in "The Family Way." Yes, the young Hayley Mills who once played Polyan.

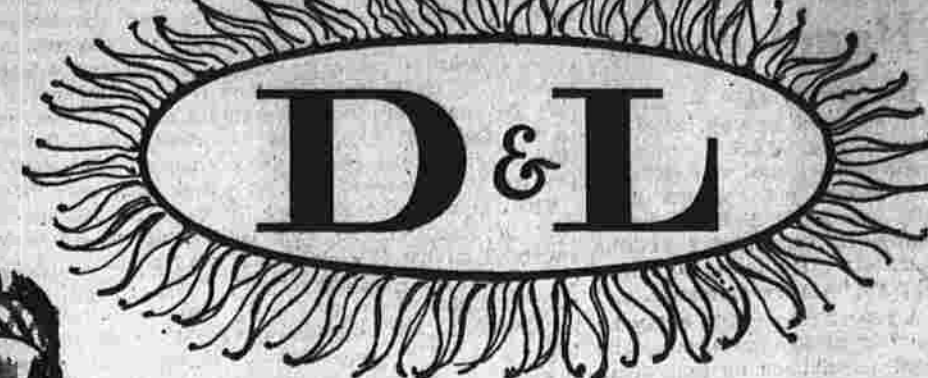
Truce with Rome Declared, Nuns, Animals Live Quietly

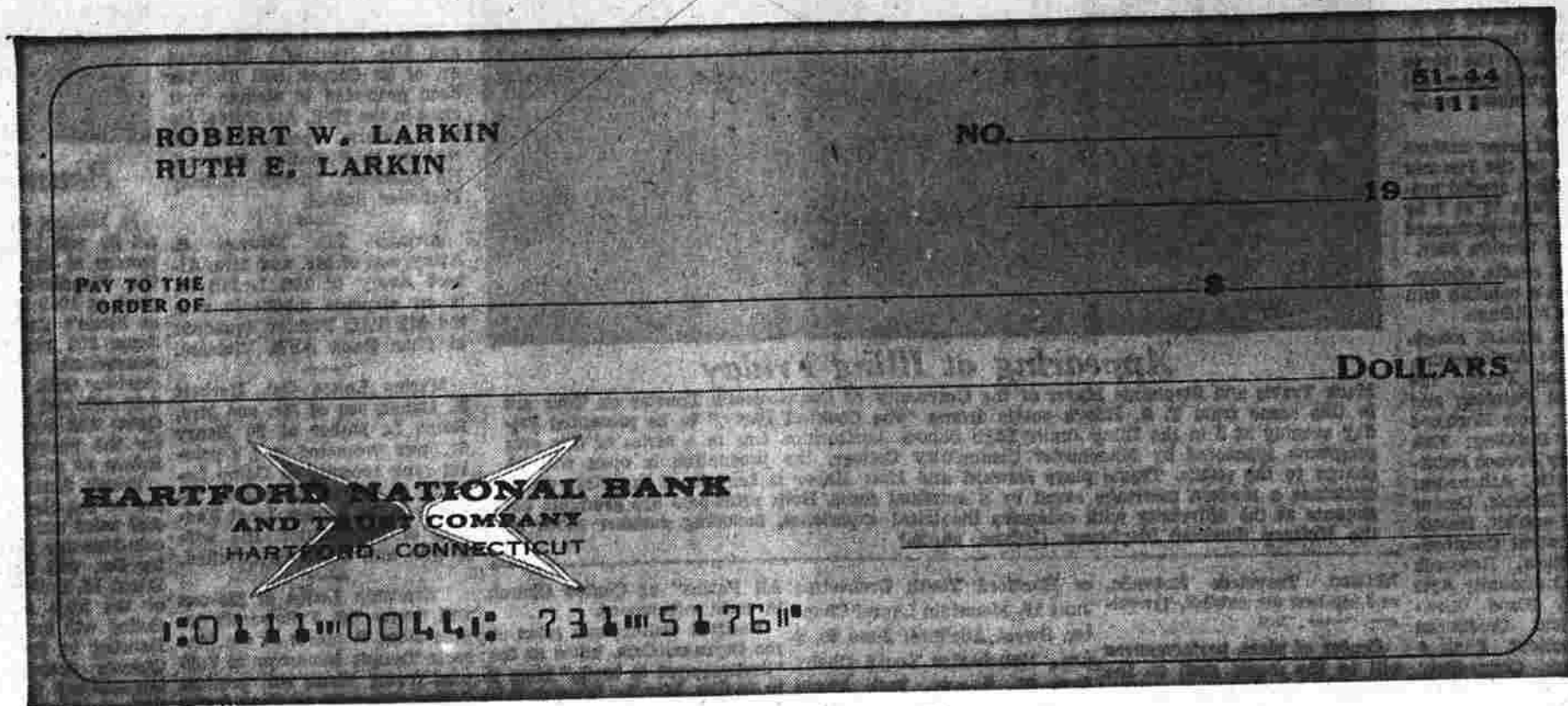

No-Tax Vow Has Dempsey In Pressure Cooker: King

Governor John Dempsey, at the Capitol in speculation on finding himself in a "pressure cooker" as the result of his hard-nosed position on no tax increase, particularly regarding the proposed increase of 1967 state aid to education. State Rep. Robert D. King, R-Tolland, said yesterday.

The answer most often heard King noted, pessimistically, is that with freshmen legislators that there is as yet no indication in unprecedented number in that the Governor will back down from his position. "If he has made a hard bed, he expects it to be in it," King added.

Last week, Hartford teachers sent telegrams in relays to the Governor, and a delegation of state senators called at his office Friday to urge an increase in the administration's proposed ADM (average daily attendance) grants.

"All indications are that they want their time and money," King declared. "The only concession the Governor made was to promise an increase in school construction grants."

The Governor ran on a no-increase-in-tax promise, as King predicted, and did many successful and unsuccessful candidates for the House and Senate in his party.

"Barring an emergency that could not have been foreseen when the party platform was put together, he intends to stick to it."

"Many of the successful candidates, who have to face the voters at home, are taking a second look at what now seems to them a silly promise in the first place," King said.

Local Taxes Rising
"No tax increases, indeed!" King declared. "Big cities and small towns alike have pushed the real property tax to the breaking point to meet fast-rising educational costs."

Shorter Hours Approved for Package Stores
 HARTFORD (AP) — A bill that would reduce the number of evening hours a package store could operate has been overwhelmingly passed by the House and sent to the Senate. Approval came on the plan to close package stores at 7 p.m. Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Saturdays and not later than 8 p.m. on Thursdays and Fridays. Present closing hours are at 9 p.m. Drug stores and grocery stores, currently closing at 9 p.m., would also be required to cut off sales at the same hours. Package store owners have been very active in support of the measure, as many backers of the bill indicated in their remarks in the House. There is no doubt in my mind that the package store owners in my area favor this bill, John T. Turner, R-Greenwich. Rep. Albert Provenzano, D-Branford, House Chairman of the Legislature's Liquor Control Committee, said attendance at the public hearing on the bill was the largest of any hearing held by the committee. "Once legislators make for it than for any other bill before us," Provenzano said. Other supporters of the bill argued that liquor stores are "secondary" vulnerable to armed robbery after dark; that proprietors deserve a shorter week; and that although they are now closed sooner than 9 p.m. of their wish, it would be economically disastrous for them as long as a nearby competitor elected to stay open. An opponent, Rep. Robert G. Oliver, D-New Haven called the bill "special legislation of the worst sort." He said people should have the right to buy liquor at least until 9 o'clock at night.

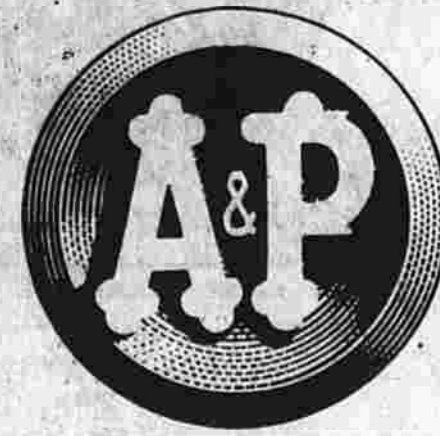

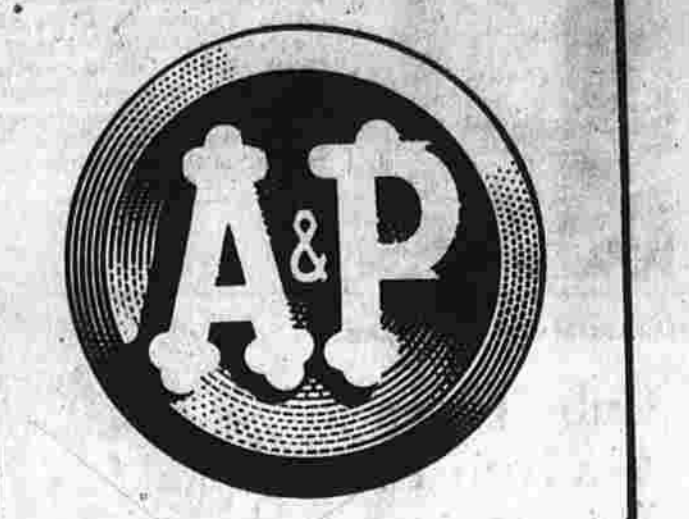

Cuba Gives Asylum to U.S. Major

The United States does not have diplomatic relations with Cuba and the Swiss Embassy in Havana handles American affairs there.

A spokesman at FBI headquarters in Washington said that agency is not conducting its own investigation of Pearce's activities but "is following with the Army to see what they turn up."

Pearce, who won decorations for valor in Vietnam, had been on a 13-day leave from his Army post since May 12.

Airport officials in Key West said Pearce was to be escorted to the airport by a one-hour signposting flight.

The possibility of a defection to the Communists was first reported by the Coast Guard Monday morning.

The U.S. State Department had asked the Swiss Embassy in Havana to check the reports but the Swiss said Havana did not acknowledge Pearce's presence.

The Coast Guard, which launched a massive air search for the Pearce plane, said, "We have no comment. The search will continue until we are ordered to stop."

The government-controlled radio announced the official communication: "The revolutionary government decided to concede asylum to the major of the United States Army, Richard Howard Pearce, on the facilities appropriate to go to another country, according to his request."

"Pearce accompanied by his son arrived at Liberty Airport close to Havana last Sunday at noon piloting a Cessna plane, N-8546 J."

The broadcast commented that the United States had asked the Cuban authorities to aid in searching for Pearce.

Tuesday in Houston, Pearce's former wife, now Sandra Mitchell, said Pearce picked up Richard Jr. last Friday.

"He told me they were going on vacation. They were to be back in a week," Mrs. Mitchell said. "He didn't say where they were going or anything."

"I know nothing about their disappearance. I only know I want my child back," Mrs. Mitchell said.

When efforts were made today to interview Mrs. Mitchell in Houston, an unidentified woman, speaking for her said the officer's former wife would have no comment immediately on the Havana report.

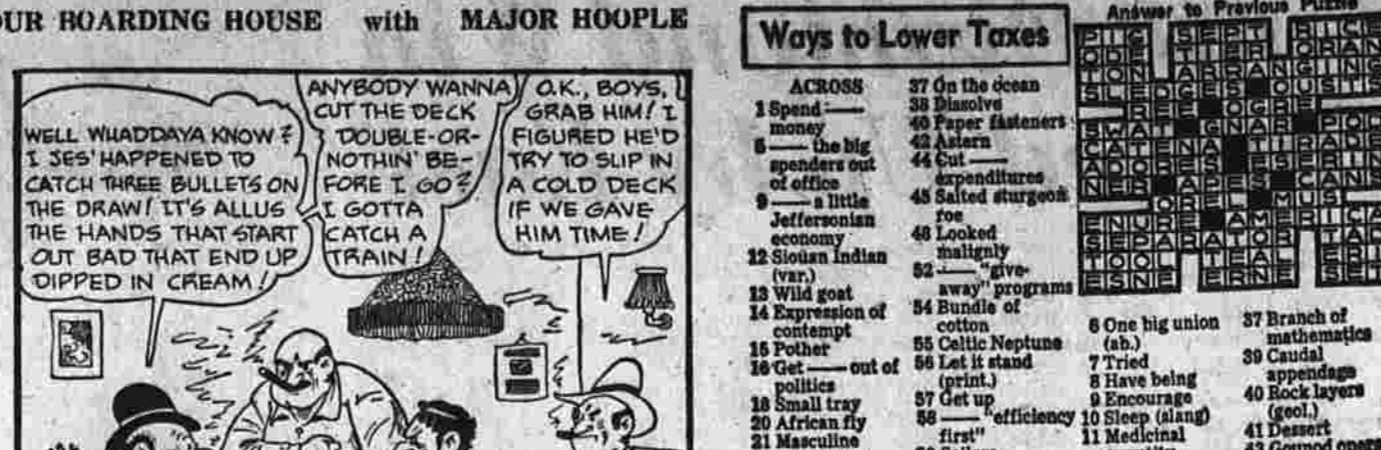

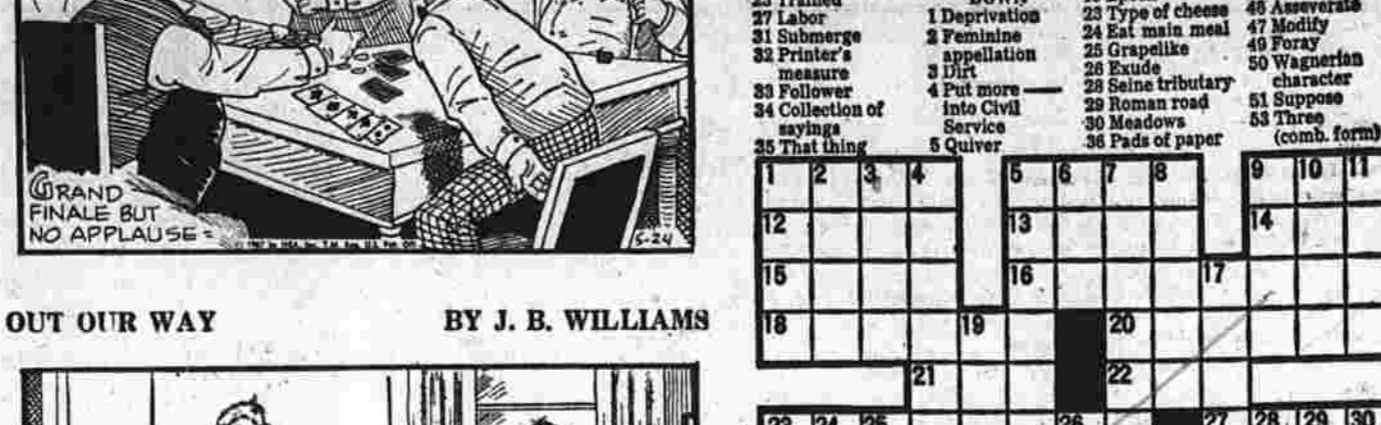

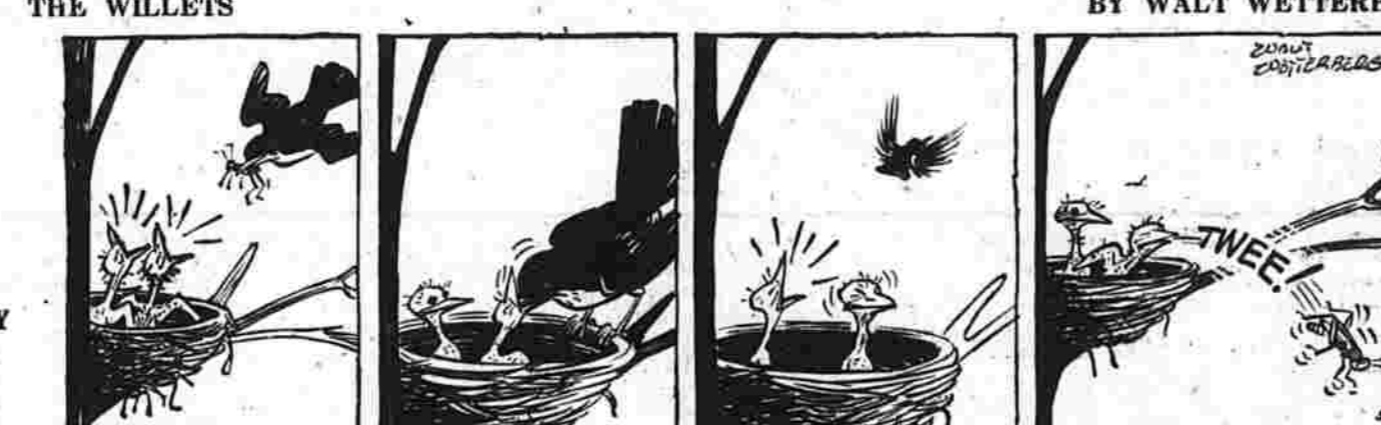
