REVEALING RED HELPS DECLARER
By ALFRED SHEINWOLD
Experts sometimes use an overall of two notrumps to show two aces in each of the minor suits. Used at the right time, this helps your side get to a good sacrifice or a sound contract in a minor suit. Used at the wrong time, such a bid reveals your distribution to the enemy.

Declarer played the ten of spades from dummy at the first trick. East shrewdly played low and South discarded a club. South led a trump to the king and held his breath as he returned a trump. West's queen appeared and South could resume breathing.

Declarer continued with the ace of spades, discarding another low club, and then with the queen of spades. East covered with the king and South ruffed. The ace of clubs was then trumped to the jack and discarded.

Area Weather
WINDSOR LOCKS (AP) — The U.S. Weather Bureau predicts that weather will continue over southern New England today. Strong northwesterly winds continue to bring Atlantic moisture and cold air inland. Very heavy rain fell during the night. In the northeast, snow fell on the hillsides. Rain will continue this morning and gradually taper off with clearing from the west today.

Five Day Forecast
Temperatures from Saturday through Wednesday are expected to average near normal, daily highs averaging in the mid-70s and overnight lows in the 50s.

Wind through the weekend and cooler early in the week but warmer again by mid-week. Precipitation may total less than 1/4 inch about Saturday night or Sunday.

son company was hit while searching the jungle for two Red regiments. The company commander was cut down in the first volley of coordinated sniper and mortar fire.

The Communists attacked a few hours after daybreak in an area where the six division men have fought six stiff fights in the past eight days. The battlefield was just over three miles from the Cambodian border on the western border of Pleiku Province.

One assault was made by about 30 North Vietnamese wearing camouflaged uniforms and red berets. Wheeler, who was with the company that was hit, said the Reds were beaten off by defenses hastily organized by the company's mechanics when most of the officers were shot down.

The thick double-canopy jungle made it difficult initially to bring in accurate supporting air and artillery fire. The Communist snipers were lashed high in the dense foliage and their fire caused many of the American casualties.

During the battle, one platoon from a nearby company managed to fight its way through to join the embattled company.

Holding their ground determinedly, the Americans formed a perimeter and found what cover they could against the raking fire of Red mortars and the quick-firing AK-47 sub-machine guns carried by the North Vietnamese troops.

Each time the North Vietnamese tried a stand-up charge through the jungle, they were thrown back.

Fighting broke off when artillery, fighter-bombers and helicopter gunships laid a blanket of fire to pin down the North Vietnamese while the Americans pulled back.

A Journey To Pearson

President Johnson, on television yesterday, didn't look like a President who had suddenly decided to go up to Canada just to visit Expo 67, fine a fair as that is universally reported to be.

He looked, the American President, as if he had suddenly become filled with a great desire to sit down with Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson.

Mr. Pearson is the gentleman who, in the capacity of foreign minister for Canada 11 years ago, provided the key to the Ivy League and formula by which the United Nations, wholeheartedly supported, then by the United States, brought the State out of 1956.

His efforts were so remarkable he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for them.

It might be, therefore, a good man to understand why the Ivy League colleges are doing this. They want to broaden their own image, and include a wider and more diverse assessment of Americans in their product.

What especially interested the Ivy League prep schools was the fact that they themselves had already begun doing just this, so that, now, the colleges offer the Ivy League colleges a prospectively made it quite clear that, if the American President came seeking consultation, wisdom and help on one of the other crises, that in Vietnam, too.

Prime Minister Pearson, during the past two years, has been just as anxious to try to help make peace in Vietnam as he was, 11 years ago, to make it in the Near East. But he has not had, until now, the same cooperation from the United States he had 11 years ago.

What went on between the United States and Canada yesterday? Did the President want seeking help? Did the Near East recent finding himself called upon to talk about Vietnam too?

By this time, there should not be very much doubt in Washington circles that the nature of the crisis in the Near East—that it takes the shape of a loaded gun put on the world table by Soviet Russia as a lever to the continued escalation of the war in Vietnam. In that case, its military message would be that the United States must ease off its pressure in Vietnam if it wishes to have Russia keep the cork on the bottle of trouble in the Near East.

But if this is the plot of Russia, an essay, the irony is that one half of the proposition—that we ease off in Vietnam and stop pretending we can seek and find total victory there—is also the desire of Canada and most of our other friends and allies in the world.

It is not impossible, then, that President Johnson, going to Canada for help from Prime Minister Pearson on the Near East, should find Pearson urging him to do in Vietnam essentially what the new Russian gun on the world table is trying to frighten him into doing.

What if, at this point, President Johnson should suddenly be willing to listen to Canada on Vietnam? Obviously, any change of American policy in Vietnam would have to be accomplished smoothly and without loss of face, without the open ignominy of yielding to a Russian threat. Perhaps, then, one possibility would be to enlist and employ Prime Minister Pearson to be a broker for peace once again, with our cooperation once again, and the hope that he can find a formula which would ease what is really the one world crisis with two faces saving for all.

All this is perhaps fantasy. But it has been true for a long time that it is going to take something fantastic to extricate the world from the dead end in which it has been ever since February, 1965. It is something, at least, that the President went to the Prime Minister. There have been times during the past two years when Mr. Pearson and his ideas have not seemed particularly welcome in Washington.

Bombing Closer

Barely it is an elegant footnote that, now in the third year of the massive American military presence in Vietnam, the giant B-52 bombers, now presumed to be operating out of Thailand instead of from Guam, were called upon Wednesday to deliver a load of their

bombs to a point 12 miles west of Saigon.

Saigon is the seat of South Vietnam's government, the headquarters from which the activity of our 450,000 troops in Vietnam is managed and directed.

But with nearly half a million of our own men there, plus at least 600,000 South Vietnamese, in uniform, after more than two years of intensive military operation, we have still not managed to conquer and pacify a piece of territory only 12 miles outside Saigon.

This, we believe, the closest we have yet come to our own headquarters. It is the perverse kind of progress the cynical have come to regard as typical, and perhaps inevitable, in this particular conflict. It is only in recent years that we have bombed closer to Hanoi, the enemy city.

What Ivy League?

When it comes to the Ivy League, does society's left hand know what its right hand is doing?

Down in New York the other day, Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz announced, with a great flourish of accomplishment, that one of the city's largest employment agencies had agreed to drop the phrase "Ivy League Types" from its help wanted ads.

The reason the New York Attorney General is operating against the use of such a phrase is that he assumes that it is discriminatory in intimation, and wider and more diverse assessment of Americans in their product.

WASHINGTON — Richard Nixon is showing surprising strength in the polls—and now he has a Washington headquarters that looks like the executive suite of a public Madison Avenue emporium—but these assets cannot conceal a growing liability to his Presidential quest.

In short, Nixon's basic strategy is built on his strength in the South, and it is precisely there in the South that events are conspiring against him. With some 310 delegates to the Republican Presidential convention next year, the South has always been Nixon's richest political vein. Now, however, the former Vice President faces the loss of about one-third of those Southern delegates because of the favorite-son candidacies of Senator John Tower of Texas and Governor Claude Kirk of Florida.

In Texas, behind-the-scenes but potentially bitter squabbling is already detectable among GOP leaders. State chairman Peter O'Donnell, a Nixon-for-President man, wants to limit Tower's control of the 36-vote Texas delegation to taken one ballot. But Tower's men are plotting to bind the delegation to Tower as the 1968 delegate was bound to Barry Goldwater.

In Florida, newly-elected Governor Claude Kirk (to whom Nixon paid a secret visit in late April) is likewise plotting to bring the door to Nixon's Southern agents. Both Kirk and Tower, with a combination delegate strength of 90 votes, want to

Caroline Kennedy, 12, needed an eight-inch pedestal on the bunting-draped launching platform to reach the hulling gray bow of the \$1,490,000 USS John F. Kennedy with traditional ship christening audience.

President Johnson, Chief Justice Earl Warren, Richard Cardinal Cushing, former ambassador John H. Glenn, Jr., 33 Kennedy family members, ministers, and several other officials were among the 1,000 expected for the noon ceremony at the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Co.

The Kennedy family had a special service from New York, Washington and Boston to come here. President Johnson's 78-year-old mother, Rose Kennedy, to grandchildren — 12 in all — and to her 80-year-old husband, Joseph P. Kennedy, to salute the \$18,500,000 carrier that will honor the memory of the nation's 38th president. Only one other president, Franklin D. Roosevelt, had a similar honor.

Kennedy would have observed his 50th birthday this Monday. A Holy Spirit in Florence when the monastery took him in as a young boy, he had studied theology on campus in his hometown of Michelangelo, Italy.

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Israel Avoids Early Test Of Egyptian Gulf Blockade

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser says he knows his blockade of the Gulf is not a test of Israel's resolve to fight with Nasser.

Israel was reported avoiding an immediate challenge to the announced blockade of its direct routes to transit oil and other cargoes from the East. But it was said it will fight to keep the gulf open.

U.N. Secretary-General U Thant, who talked with Nasser Wednesday, reports today to the U.N. Security Council on his peace mission. The United States hopes his report can boost diplomatic efforts to prevent Arab-Israeli fighting over the gulf.

President Johnson met with Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban on the crisis Friday night, but neither would comment on their discussions today.

A test of Egyptian counter-measures over the Strait of Tiran, at the entrance to the Gulf of Aden, was possible today, but not by an Israeli ship.

A Danish freighter, identified as the company's ship, was at the Jordanian port of Agaba, two miles from Israel's gulf.
