Although the Army group which seized power in Athens on April 21 stated that it did so to save Greece from the intrigues of those it considered leftists, it instantly began a series of actions almost indistinguishable from those which invariably follow a Communist takeover. Nor is this all. In its efforts to dictate the thoughts and actions of the Greek people, the new Army - dominated government again bears a striking resemblance to the Marxist regimes to which it stands so

strongly opposed.

Hardly had the dust settled on its coup than the Army had its opponents arrested, clamped censorship on the press, announced that it would henceorth appoint town and city mayors and thus crippled electoral democracy. One does not need to underline how, stepmeal, all this imitates Communist
