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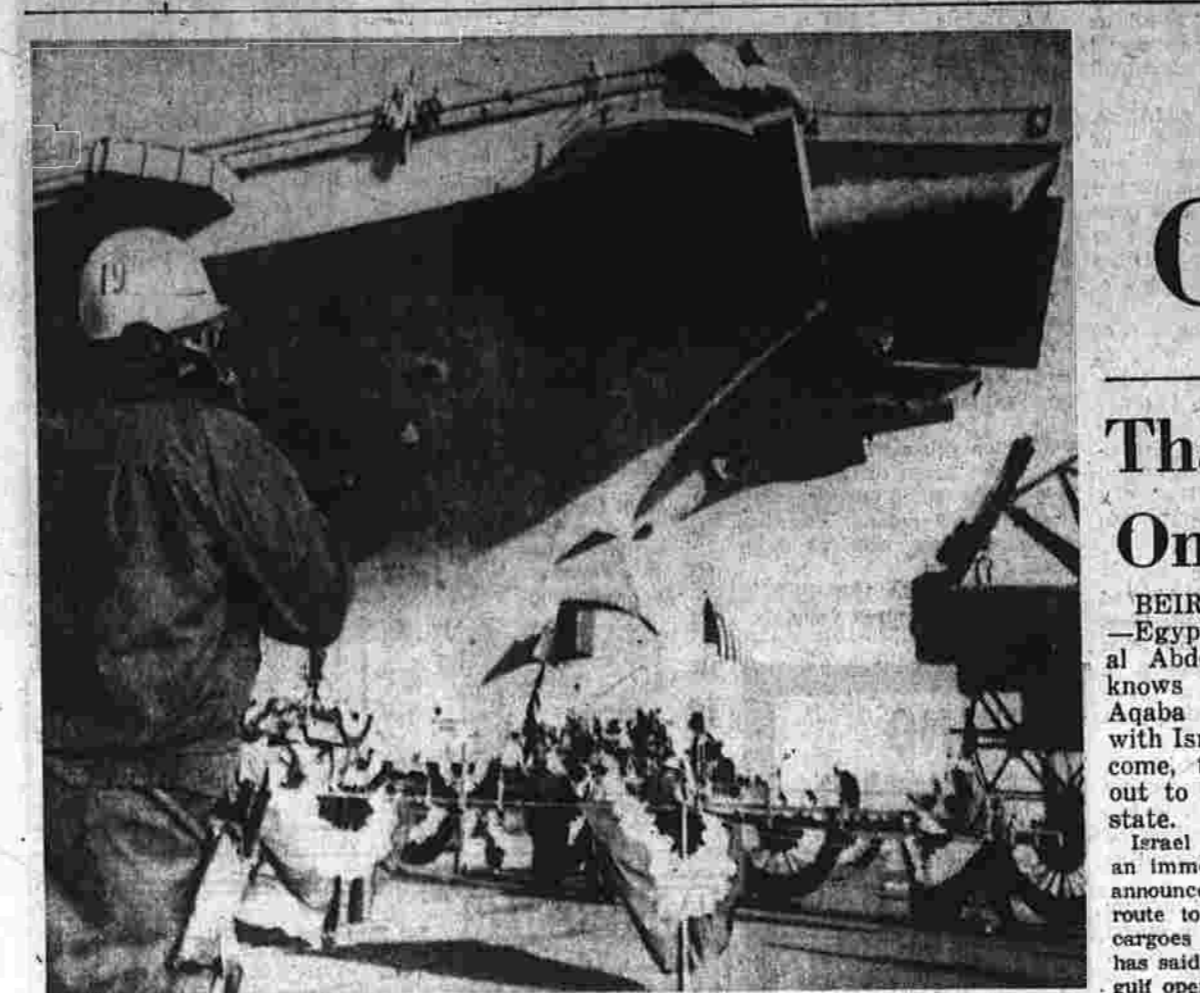

Lawrence Sessler, director of the ACLU's Washington office, said the organization specifically is interested in seeing whether Dodd was accorded due process of law in the probe of his financial affairs.

In making its report to the Senate, the ethics panel said it "took into account as a general guide the practice and procedures of the federal courts" in attempting to insure Dodd has legal rights.

Dodd himself requested the committee's probe after accusations against him by columnist Drew Pearson and Jack Anderson. The senator has a \$2 million libel suit pending against the columnist.

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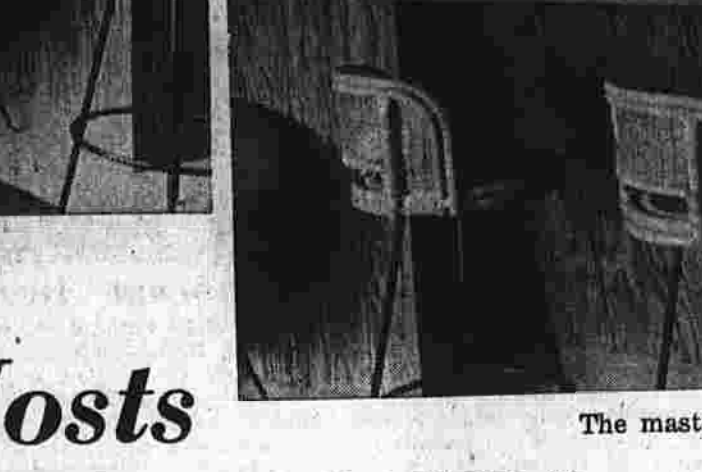
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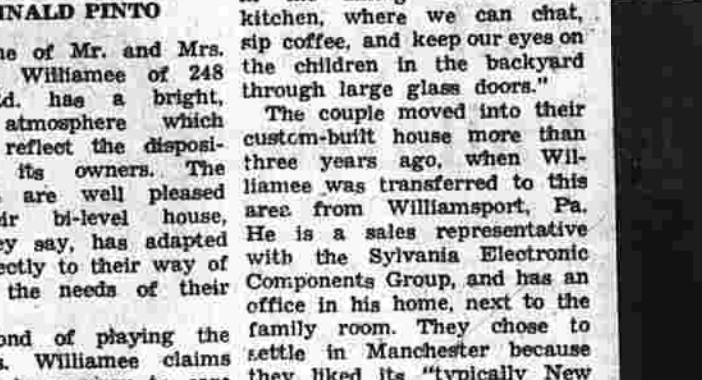
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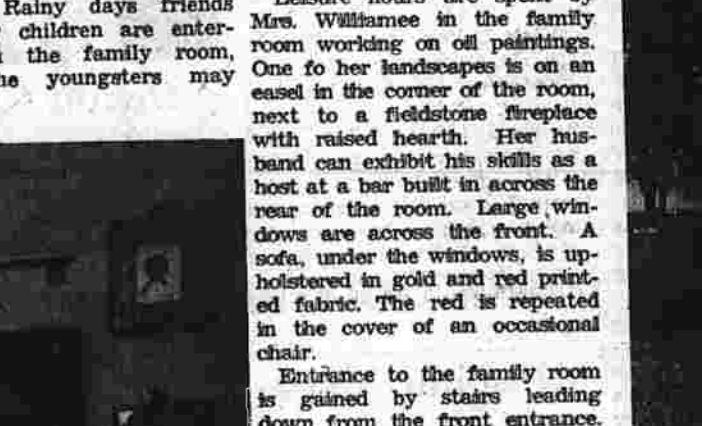

The bill would create a lottery commission and authorize the sale of tickets for a variety of games, including a state-wide raffle, a daily numbers game, and a weekly lottery. The bill also provides for the distribution of proceeds to education and other public purposes.

# Should a Movie Be Interrupted?

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A judge says a television broadcaster has the right to interrupt motion pictures with commercials. But so far as movie director George Stevens is concerned, the controversy has not ended.

"The television viewer is entitled to the full benefit of the skills of the picture-maker. The TV watcher should not be a second-class citizen, relegated to watching a second-class product," Stevens said after Tuesday's decision.

He said he would appeal and looked "forward to the appellate court's recognition that television may not cut and butcher films as, unhappily, has been the practice in the past."

Stevens had asked \$2 million in damages from the National Broadcasting Co. and Paramount Pictures Corp. on charges that his film "A Place in the Sun" was distorted and emasculated by nine interruptions totaling 18 minutes for 33 commercials during a TV showing March 12, 1966, by NBC.

Superior Court Judge Ben Koenig rejected the plea for damages and refused to grant Stevens' petition for an injunction against further TV releases of the film, a 1952 Academy Award winner that starred Elizabeth Taylor and Montgomery Clift.

The ruling specified that although commercials are permissible, television broadcasters may not alter the dramatic quality of pictures.

Stevens expressed pleasure at this portion of the ruling.

"This should reinforce the Directors Guild of America's complaints against the commercial butchering of films.

"We have protested this prac-

tice for several years with, unfortunately, little success. I believe the guild will be able to go forward along this line with added vigor as a result of this decision."

In the recent trial of the case Judge Koenig viewed the picture three times — as a theater audience would see it, as TV viewers might see it without commercials and as viewers saw it in March last year.

He decided the interruptions did not substantially damage the picture. But he warned that future showings might subject broadcasters to other demands for damages if the dramatic quality and artistic worth were materially altered.

Stevens was awarded a \$1 to on judgment because 10.5 seconds of his film had been cut in the editing for television.

Stevens' 1946 contract with Liberty Films, which sold the picture to NBC and Paramount, gave him sole rights to the cutting, editing and scoring of the film, based on Theodore Dreiser's novel, "An American Tragedy."

# The Saint's A Dropout

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "The Saint," a British mystery-adventure summer series, bowed in Sunday on NBC with a preposterous but tolerable tale called "The Death Game." This week the star was in Hollywood to get reacquainted.

Roger Moore is a onetime school dropout who grew up to co-star in movies with Lana Turner and Elizabeth Taylor. But he says candidly of those MGM days: "MGM was very happy with my later pictures — because I made them for Warner Brothers."

London-born, he is rock-jawed and stolidly handsome with what used to be called collar-ad features. Six feet two — "early in the morning; by late afternoon I'm 5 feet 3" — he weighs 175 but looks thinner in person than the bulk he carried in the opening sequence.

This, he said, showing the slackness under his belt, may be due to a recent spot of dieting. "When I didn't sit down for two weeks."

Moore quit school in London at 15, became a film extra and was told by a director he should try an acting career. He studied at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art, worked in the Cambridge Arts Theatre and at 18 joined the British army, assigned principally to staging shows.

# Mother's Being Eliminated

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — What ever happened to mother on the home screen?

"She has been ruled out by Nielsen," suggests writer-producer Edmund Hartman, referring to the audience-rating service.

He appears to be right. Take a look at the major television series and you'll find a scarcity of mothers. Why?

"I'm not certain," adds Hartman. "But, whether it's a 'Bonanza' or 'The Monroes,' it seems that a show is more dra-

matic to eliminate the character of the mother."

"Motherless shows apparently are funnier, too. Nobody is more convinced of that than Hartman, who happens to be producer of the 7-year-old "My Three Sons" and this season's success, "Family Affair." Both concern males—Fred MacMurray, Brian Keith—faced with the awesome task of rearing children without female help.

Neither show has exactly been embraced by the critics. This, of course, rankles Hartman, a movie veteran who supervises

and contributes to the writing of both series.

"I think the critics have underestimated 'My Three Sons,'" Hartman insists. "A show that is going into its eighth year must have something. The thing that I think intrigues viewers is how a man copes with a growing family without a woman's touch. From that simple premise, we are able to say things about the human situation that strikes a response."

"Many of the critics said that 'Family Affair' was a carbon copy of 'My Three Sons.' It

isn't. In 'Family Affair,' Brian Keith plays an amateur parent; he has the option of dropping the kids at any moment. Here we have the mystery ingredient of Keith, a rugged type, in a domestic situation. We also have Sebastian Cabot, who is the most unlikely of persons to be faced with rearing children. His reluctance and disdain are eloquent."

Whether an original or a carbon copy, "Family Affair" was one of the rare new shows to survive the 1966-67 season. It is filmed, like its predecessor, by the unique process invented by executive producer Don Fedderson.

In order to lure film star MacMurray to a television series, Fedderson devised a plan by which the actor could perform

### Minerals Set Record

WASHINGTON — Total value of the nation's mineral production last year was a record-smashing \$22.8 billion, 6.5 per cent above 1965. The gain was the largest in a decade. The biggest single factor was a \$1 billion (7.3 per cent) increase in the value of mineral fuels, such as oil, gas and coal.

### Portugal Pay Lowest

LIOBON — Portugal's wages are the lowest on the Continent. Purchasing agents earn about \$130 a month, secretaries, \$60, typists \$52. Daily wages for carpenters, masons, toolmakers and engravers average \$1.75. Unskilled laborers are paid 80 cents to \$1.75 a day.

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
