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Conventry Project ASK Sets Budget Of \$200,000

Wilson Tilley, director of Project ASK (auxiliary services center) has reported that a revised budget of \$200,000 has been submitted to the state and federal agencies, and that final negotiations of this figure are in process.

This represents a cut from the original budget of \$850,000, which had been submitted early in the year and placed in the "hold" category.

In a recent progress report, Tilley also reported that teacher representatives from each school building in the 22 towns in the project have continued to meet as the means of communication between the center and the schools. Staff members of the University of Connecticut have programs in the state of participating school systems on request.

The report continues that diagnostic services are being provided to review available school records to establish a priority of need and a preliminary case load for the operation of the center during the 1967-68 school year.

Tilley also reports that the budget revision has suggested that the personnel in speech, social work, and psychology at the supervisory level will be paid from Title III funds, whereas all direct service employees below the supervisory level will be supported by funds from local school budgets if they choose to contract for these services.

In addition to the staff mentioned above, the center is also planning to establish a cooperative arrangement with the center and the state of Connecticut which will vary a number of graduate students in speech, the work, and psychological examining in the program, under qualified supervision.

The reduced budget also has threatened to eliminate the in-service staff society, planned with the Children's Services and the local mental health clinics. The center has requested these agencies to help finance this part of the proposal which is feasible in any event, the center expects to continue to maintain the close working relationship that has existed in the past.

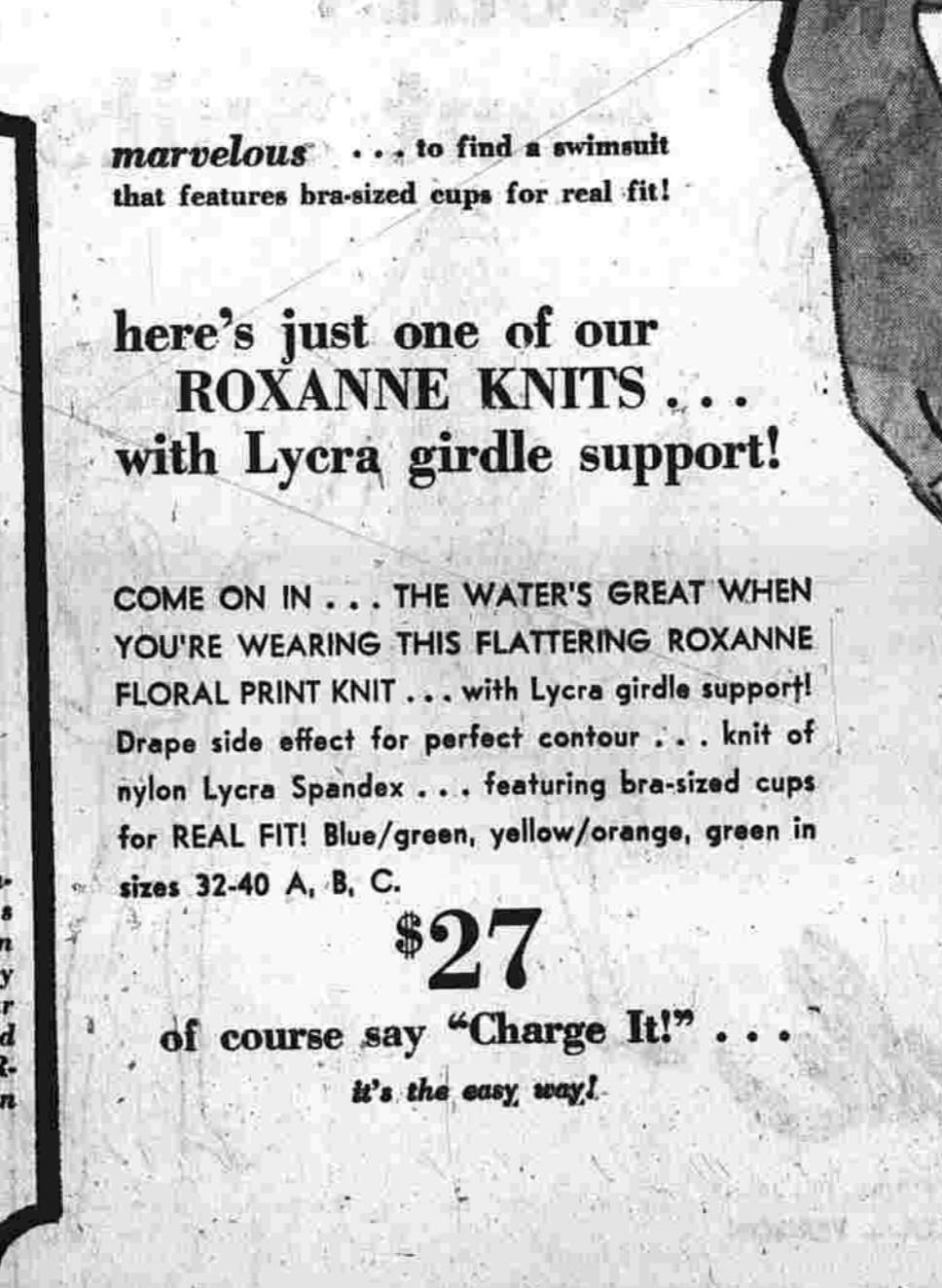

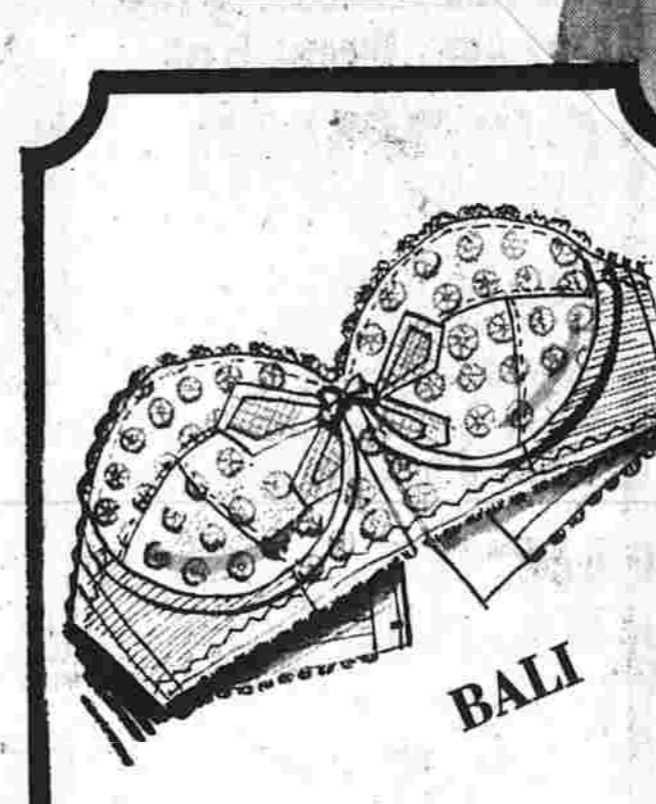

Ellis made his announcement 36 hours after the appearance in court in Dumont, a town of 9,000 persons three miles away, of William McAffer, 30, a local bookie, who was charged with violation of the Official Secrets Act. He was ordered held without bail for eight days. The prosecutor said he had tried to get secret information affecting British and American security from a U.S. sailor.

Tuesday night a German seaman, Peter Dorschel, 26, was charged at Manchester, in the north of England, with inciting McAffer to obtain information contrary to the interests of the state. Dorschel was arrested last week and will appear in court Friday.

Dorschel came to Britain two years ago to live with the family of Christine Wych, a 22-year-old girl he had met in England when he was a cook on a German cargo ship. They were married Jan. 23 in Lubeck, West Germany, and spent their honeymoon aboard his ship during a voyage to the United States.

HARTFORD (AP)—Democrat Rep. John P. Paparone, D-Meriden, told the House today a resolution calling for annual sessions of the legislature is headed for the House for debate and vote.

ATHENS—Believing the surface calm here one month after the Greek coup d'etat, Greece is starting down a difficult road that could make it one of the world's trouble spots again.

Far from being over, the Greek crisis is just beginning. The problem is one more familiar to Latin America than to Europe: Once a military dictatorship is established, how can it be dismantled peacefully?

But this is not Latin America where military regimes linger harmlessly for years. This is the sensitive British Mediterranean, where Western and Communist worlds meet and changes in the status quo are dangerous.

One set of reports comes in a document from the President's Interdepartmental Committee for Atmospheric Sciences. Here it is certified that by means of a heavy seeding of silver iodide into electrical storms, a 32 per cent reduction in the amount of lightning between cloud and ground has been achieved.

It is also reported that constant experimentation has showed it possible to increase the amount of precipitation in the atmosphere by 20 to 25 per cent, which often could, of course, be the difference between drought and fertility.

And it seems realistic to look forward to an ability to prevent the development of hurricanes.

These findings add up to more of a realistic assault, by man, on the man-tooth processes of the weather than has usually been granted, by the public fancy, to the "weather-makers."

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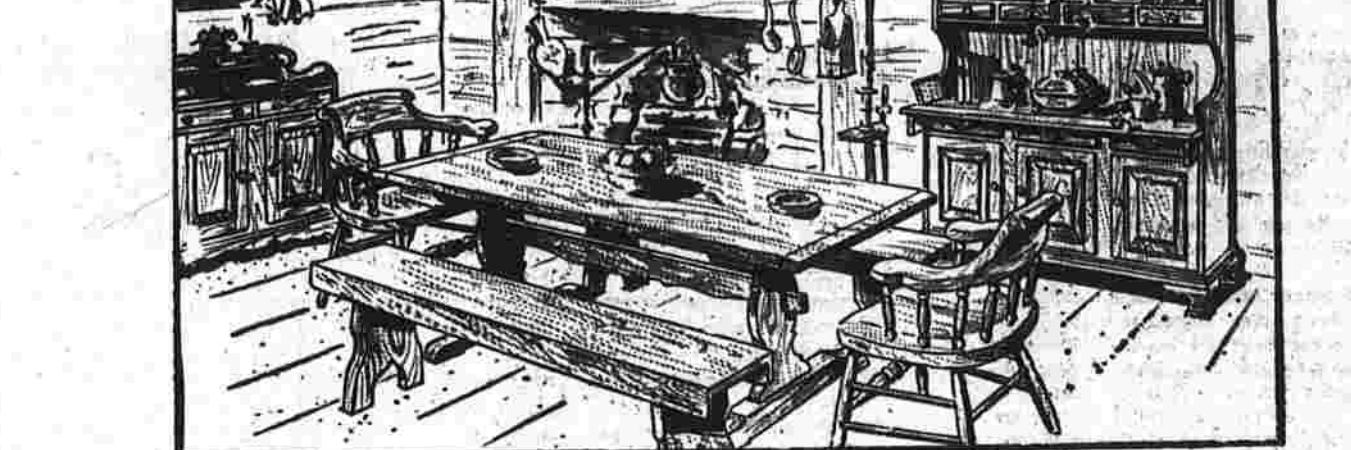

'People Sniffers' Used Body Odor May Be Fatal For VC Jungle Soldiers

DI AN, Vietnam (AP) — The device used by American troops to detect body odor is normally associated with the social scene, but in the increasingly technological Vietnam war a man can get killed if he sweats too much. The device is an experimental American device nicknamed the "People Sniffer."

It picks up the odors of men digging foxholes under a jungle canopy, or camping beside a river, and shows the intensity of the smell on a meter.

A skilled operator, flying alone in a helicopter, can see at a glance the area of a troop concentration and bring air and artillery fire to bear on invisible targets.

The device is the latest in a line of technological gadgetry that has taken on a new urgency in Vietnam's normally humid 90 degree to 100 degree heat. The carbon particles come from campfires.

The sniffer has obvious defects. One of its most embarrassing features, says Sgt. Pern G. Wilson, Jacksonville, Ala., says, "It's sorta like a scout dog. You've got to know your machine, know it can make mistakes, know it can make mistakes."

Wilson handled one of two machines attached to a helicopter that circumscribed War Zone C northwest of Saigon for three hours Wednesday. At several locations the meter flashed to the maximum reading. These were compared with infrared photographs taken by light flying planes. They show that large elements of possibly the Viet Cong 9th Division have moved back into the zone.

The device could not specify how many of the enemy were underneath, whether they were men or women, or if they were friendly or unfriendly.

That degree of exactitude would be welcome, but is not really necessary considering the way the Vietnam war is fought today.

War Zone C and large areas of Vietnam have been designated "free bombing zones."

Anything that moves there is regarded as fair game.

The device cannot be used in populated areas because of the high concentration of carbon and ammonia in the air. It is useless anywhere near where American troops are operating.

American artillery and infantry units have already expressed keen interest in the device and dozens are being ordered.

The helicopter pilot on Wednesday's mission, Capt. Martin Ledy, Oakland, Calif., commented there is no room for error down there, and one shot could bring you down. But that gadget is really something. It's worth the risk.

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — In leukemia contagion? A small concrete block home, located near Douglas, Ga., may help find the answer.

Since 1967, the structure has been occupied at different times by three families. Three persons — one from each family have developed leukemia.

Two persons, a 4-year-old boy and a 28-year-old woman, are dead. The third is in a hospital.

The strange case, termed "the exception rather than the rule" by doctors, is one of three now being studied at the Communicable Disease Center in Atlanta.

Wounded Treated Fast SAIGON — Most wounded in Vietnam get to a hospital in less than an auto-accident victim in the United States.

Health officials have indicated virus research may prove very important in developing a cure for the dread disease.

Health reported, "However, we are not ruling out anything—including a virus."

The following is an essay on lonely flags remain behind—Memorial Day read during ceremony and a memorial service at Center Park yesterday.

As each name is intoned, one of the center flags is dipped and then is planted in the ground. When the roll has been completed, Round Table sings a prayer.

"Next the Gettysburg Address is spoken by a student; simply without theatrics. A trumpet standing on the field plays 'Ode to the Unknown Soldier.' The trumpet notes echo from another trumpet to the east and then are repeated a final time from the west.

"Another prayer is sung, and a number of students slowly walk back into the school. The future."

NEW HAVEN (AP) — Connecticut counted 15 persons dead today as a result of accidents in the state during the long Memorial Day holiday week.

Motor vehicle accidents took seven lives. An engineer and three of his children perished in a fire. One man drowned, another was killed by logs that rolled from a truck he was unloading. A woman died in a plane crash. A man was killed in a stock car race.

The death toll covered the period from 8 p.m. Friday through midnight Tuesday.

The fire in Berlin Saturday was the weekend's most serious accident. Thomas Leonard, 23, his daughters Cynthia Ann, 3, and Mary Alice, 1, and his one-month-old Anthony Albert, died today as a result of an accident in the state during the long Memorial Day holiday week.

long life is better than a brief moment of fellow love, we are forced to change the universal fact that no matter how grateful we are to our remembered dead, we must change the conditions under which they were forced to seek their highest good.

We must demand of our sons and neighbors and ourselves, he said, that the task which requires greater courage, bravery, strength, and dedication, is the task of "creating a world in which the most exalted form of brotherly love resides in waging peace."

Through peace means as non-violence, campaigns and the Peace Corps, today's generation may look forward to the time when we can celebrate Memorial Days that join the honor we pay these noble dead with a new kind of honor paid to those living nobly in perfect love of all mankind," he said.

Dr. Lowe pointed out that no distinctions or discriminations exist in the grave and that he described a "madman-gunner" who he served during the concluding days of the division campaign for Okinawa.

"I can remember the strongest sensations of impersonal love for a filthy, bearded, smaggle-toothed, pot-bellied, avery, four-mouthed, ignorant machine gunner, called Pop."

"I don't know if it was that or later that I understood that this sensation was what was referred to in the Bible by the phrase love thy neighbor, but it was a completely unselfish feeling. I assure you I wouldn't have thought twice about dying for him, it was incredible."

Lowe said that although he had nothing in common with the man, "I am convinced I experienced the greatest exaltation possible in my life."

The other experience, was a former Marine recalled, was the experience of impressions of dedication and devotion of medical auxiliary personnel.

"The battlefield comrade was in tears as he provided first aid to one of a horrifying series of casualties he had been faced with in one short day."

"The tired and sweaty field hospital nurse was tough but gentle during duty shifts that often stretched beyond 24 hours a day."

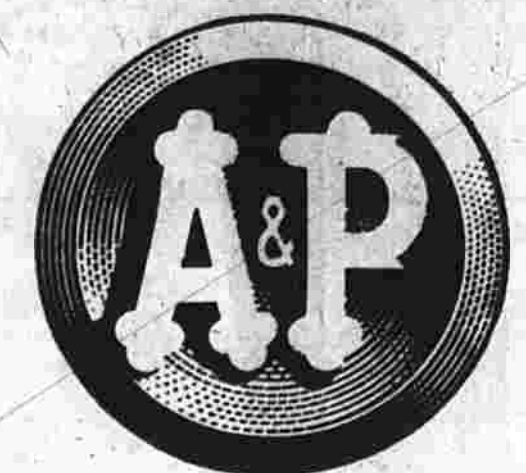

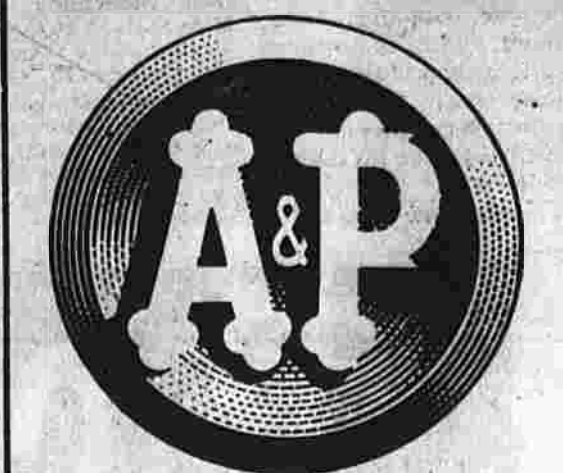

Fluoridation Repeal Dies In Assembly

HARTFORD (AP) — By an overwhelming margin, the House has killed a bill that would repeal Connecticut's compulsory fluoridation law.

Opponents of mandatory fluoridation questioned whether the state had the right to force people to use fluorides or anything else if they did not want it.

But Rep. William R. Ratchford, D-Danbury, who opposed repeal of fluoridation, said anti-fluoridation groups in Connecticut failed to appeal their constitutional question in the courts.

Ratchford said he recalled that one group did send a petition direct to the U.S. Supreme Court. But he said Spigel was good enough lawyer to know that the high court could not act on such an extraordinary document.

For one, would welcome a court test, Ratchford said. Rep. Melville A. Burrows, R-Fairfield, said there are other ways to take fluorides—such as in tablet form—and that putting fluorides into public water supplies is both wasteful and unconstitutional.

Burrows also objected to the mailing of letters from the State Health Commissioner's office early this month asking dentists and other professionals in health care to try to counteract the campaign by anti-fluoridationists.

On the other side, Rep. Morris D. Oliver, D-New Haven, said anti-fluoridationists "are very effective — they wage a scare campaign."

Oliver said Connecticut's program of requiring water companies to add fluorides to their supply "does not infringe on anyone's civil rights."

He is a recipient of the Leish Trophy, presented by the Reformed Jewish Synagogues of America for outstanding contributions to Judaism by a non-Jew. The Rev. Mr. Hutcheon is married and has three children.

Senate OKs Testimonial Funds Curb

HARTFORD (AP)—With bipartisan blessing, the Senate has approved an amendment to a corrupt campaign practices bill. The amendment would prohibit political candidates from making personal use of testimonial dinner funds. There was no debate Monday night on the amendment which was cosponsored by the Democratic majority and Republican minority leaders. The personal use ban was the major provision of the tightly amended bill which now heads for the legislative committee's office for re-printing and their return to the Senate floor. The bill had been proposed earlier in the session. Spelled out in the amendment are the ways a candidate can spend money for his campaign from testimonial dinner proceeds. The bill has added significance as a result of a U.S. Senate Ethics Committee recommendation that Connecticut Sen. Thomas J. Dodd be censured for personal use of money from testimonial dinners. U.S. Senate action on the measure recommendation is slated for June 13. Under the amended bill, testimonials would be allowed only in the nine months preceding an election and in the nine months following. The amendment removes a restriction in the original bill on the number of testimonials a candidate may have in that period. One feature of the original bill permitted campaign reports to be filed with the state 100 days after an election. The amendment restores the current 30-day requirement. It also stipulates that if a candidate holds a post-election testimonial to clean up campaign deficits, a special report must be filed immediately following the dinner. A candidate ending a campaign with a deficit also would have to submit a report every 90 days until the deficit is wiped out. Surplus money from a campaign would go to the state central committee or to the town committee of the candidate's party. Candidates would be prohibited from serving as their own campaign treasurer. The revised bill retains the stipulation that the bill name and address of each campaign contributor, if the donation is over \$10, and persons paid for any work, be listed in the campaign reporting. All campaign reports would have to be retained for the term of office which was being sought.

Nasser Gambling U.S. Cold To New Viet in Middle East

CAIRO (AP) — President Nasser appears to have become involved in another Vietnam in the Middle East.

Nasser has said he chose the time for his challenge to Israel. It has become evident that the timing depended not only on Egypt's state of military readiness but also on the situation of the United States.

Nasser's excuse for moving 60,000 troops into the Sinai Peninsula and Gaza was an alleged Israeli plan to invade Syria. But he could have found some such excuse any time.

The belief in Cairo is that Nasser gave the order to advance when U. S. commitments in Vietnam had swollen and the Johnson administration's policy of appeasement at home and around the world was weakened by criticism of its Southeast Asian policy.

Though not expressed publicly, Arab reasoning appears to be that Johnson cannot afford the political burden of another military intervention.

Nasser has made plain he is well aware of the risk he is taking. He expresses respect for U. S. military power, as he has said in this part of the world since carrying Marine landing units to the States to keep out — to stay neutral.

In effect, he has said that the United States keeps its hands off, he will confuse any war to a straight fight between the Arabs and the Israelis. On the other hand, he has made much of Soviet professions of friendship for the Arabs.

If any other country intervenes, says Nasser, the conflict will become wider, meaning an American-Soviet confrontation of them to heighten tension. Nasser has made big gains so more or even trigger war.

Being Understood Is Easy For Thailand Tourists

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — You, too, can speak Thai. You may not win friends and influence people in this happy go-lucky land, but it's easy to make yourself understood.

Just follow the translations in an English-Thai phrase book that is being made available to tourists.

For example, the tourist arrives at his hotel and refers to his "Quick and Easy Thai Speaking."

"I am not pleased with my room," he says. "I want one lower down. If you can't give me something better I shall go away."
