A few hundred years ago one of the conquistadors burned his boats behind him to eliminate all thought of retreat. Such boldness may work well in conquest, but it seldom pays at the bridge table.

Opening lead—five of spades. South won the first trick with the ace of spades, cashed the ace of clubs and tried a club finesse. East won with the queen of clubs and brought through over.

It was possible that West had led the five of spades from K-T-A, but if South had only one spade stopper why had he won the first trick? Even more important, how could South have a jump to two notrump without the king of spades?

These ruminations led East to the correct conclusion: South still had the king of spades. If so East could never get to his partner for declarer: Two spades, two hearts and five clubs.

The only chance was to shift to hearts in the hope that South could be separated from his king of spades. And so it turned out. South could take eight tricks; but could South have a hand for the king of spades. The defenders eventually got enough heart tricks to defeat the contract.

Missing Spouse Is Located in New York City
WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A young wife reported missing since Monday turned up in New York City Thursday night, her husband said.

John Ackert, a personnel executive for the Radio Corporation of America, said his 26-year-old wife, Mabelle, told him by telephone she would return home today.

Ackert said she told him her return to West Palm Beach had been delayed by an "airline strike" in Europe.

Ackert had sent telegrams to police chiefs in Rome, Paris and Marseilles asking their help, and had obtained promise of aid from the U.S. State Department in trying to locate his wife who "popped out of sight while on a European tour."

Tour of Old Buildings Set for Sunday

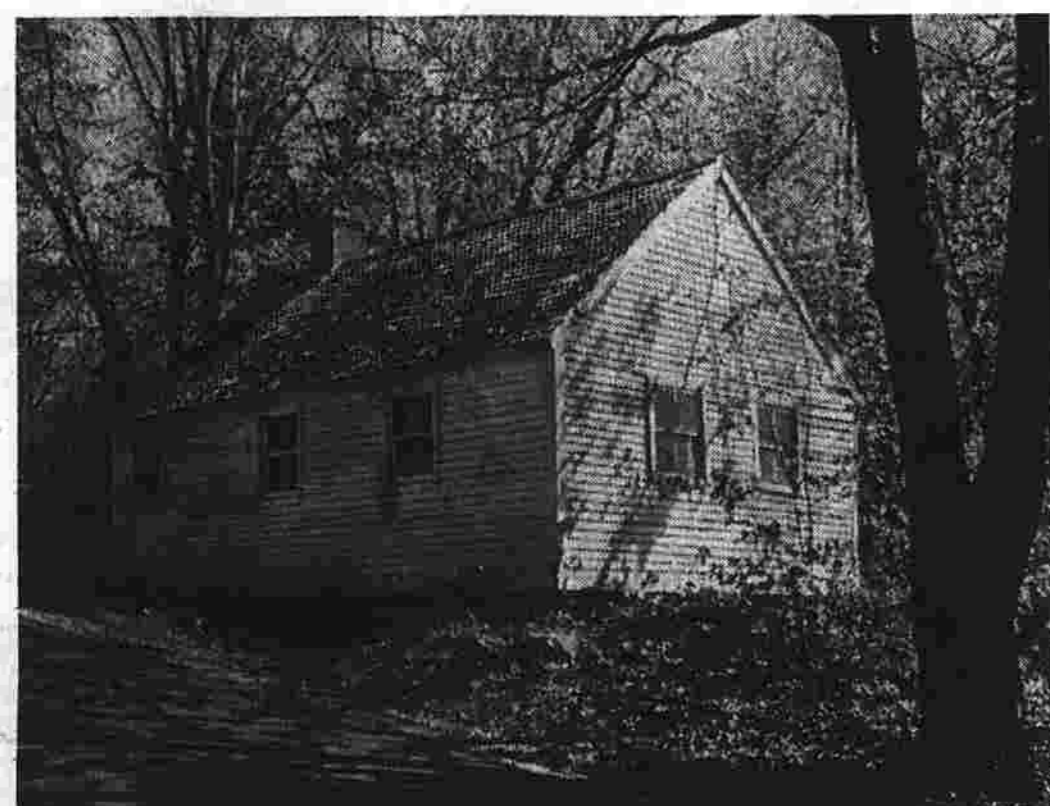
The Hebron Historical Society will hold a house tour on Sunday from 10 a. m. to 2 p. m. The cost will be \$2 per person with no charge for society members. In the event of rain the tour will be canceled.

The tour is restricted to the southern portion of Hebron. The society plans to make several other house tours in future years that will encompass the many old homes in town.

The tour will start at St. Peter's Episcopal Church on Rt. 8, north of Hebron Center. It is requested that no spike heels be worn by visitors since they can cause irreparable damage to the old flooring.

The first building to be toured will be the church, which was constructed in 1826 although the original parish was formed in 1724 when the Rev. Bliss and about 20 local families left the Congregational Church and formed a Church of England parish. In 1760, the Rev. Samuel A. Peters, author of the "Five Leaves of Connecticut" was rector of the church.

The Governor John S. Peters house presently owned by Mrs. John B. Horton will be the second building on the tour. It is located next to the Episcopal church. It was constructed in 1806 by Peters of brick made locally on Middle Street Rd. Peters served Hebron as town assessor.



Also on the tour, Burrows Hill School built in the 1700s.

4th Antiques Fair Is June 10 At Hale Homestead Grounds

The fourth annual Antiques Fair of the Coventry Historical Society will be June 10, from 10 a. m. to 6 p. m. on the grounds of the Nathan Hale Antiques Fair and Drums, was founded in 1965 and as the result of a meeting called by the historical society.

Many historical society members were among those who worked to make the authentic uniforms and otherwise make sure that everything was true to the period of Nathan Hale. The fair and drums performed by the Nathan Hale Antiques Fair and Drums.

In addition to the Nathan Hale Homestead, visitors will be admitted to the small farmhouse next door, which is being restored by the Historical Society and which is used for its headquarters.

The Society's house will be furnished on the day of the fair with antique articles from the homes of members.

Coventry women and some men will assist the regular hostesses at the Homestead and welcome anyone who comes to the Society's headquarters. There will be ample parking and a food bar will be open all day.

In the "home field" of the Hale Homestead, enclosed by a 13-foot stone wall and with a 15-star flag flying overhead, there will be booths of more than 20 dealers in antiques and Massachusetts. Last year, 700 people visited the fair. The Homestead itself, remembered by many people as being built, received a new coat of paint a few years ago. It is now a deep red, probably the original color when it was built during the period from 1768 to 1778.

The fair concludes closely with the birthday of Nathan Hale, who was born June 6, 1755.

The fair is an example of cooperation between three organizations, each dedicated to keeping alive those traditions of the past that consider man worth passing on to future generations.

First, the Antiquarian and Landmarks Society of Connecticut, founded in 1935, is a statewide foundation whose object is "to preserve for the people of Connecticut... real and personal property having architectural, historical... or other cultural interests... and also to stimulate and encourage cooperation among all groups working toward these ends." The society owns several historic houses in various parts of the state, including the Nathan Hale Homestead.

Second, the Coventry Historical Society, founded in 1962, just after the 250th anniversary of the founding of the town, has as one of its immediate inter-

OTAWA (AP)—Canada's Liberal government has announced a 1967-68 budget with a \$740 million deficit—the second largest in peacetime—and tax reductions expected to save Canadians more than \$22 million a year on the cost of drug finance.

Minister Mitchell Sharp told the House of Commons Thursday night the deficit is needed as a moderate sustaining force while the economy levels off to a steady rate of growth after a rapid expansion period. He estimated government income at \$5.8 billion and spending at \$7 billion.

The only tax changes are to repeal immediately, instead of next April 1, the 8 per cent sales tax on production machinery and removal of the 12 per cent sales tax on drugs and Sept. 1. The attack on drug costs also includes reduction in tariffs generally from 20 to 15 per cent. Most drug imports are from the United States.

The deficit is the 11th in a row. Last fiscal year's shortfall was \$428 million and the largest in peacetime was \$781 million in 1961-62, when the Conservatives were in office.

Selectmen Agree to Set Up A Permanent Police Panel

The board of selectmen agreed unanimously last night to set up a permanent police panel to study the police force and to recommend a permanent police commission to be established for the town of Coventry. The committee report was also announced.

In its report, the study group said it felt that a police commission and a police department should grow together, and it added that in the towns it visited, police were not a factor in the workings of the police commission. The report also said that the committee felt that the police force should be reorganized to relieve the board of selectmen of a burdensome responsibility.

Selectman J. Richard Nicola moved that the committee be recommended for its devotion to the project, and this, too, was carried unanimously. Members of the study committee are Charles Nyack, who serves as chairman, and Donald Averill, Jesse A. Bismarck, Gene Boyington, Zachariah Leone, Louis Haddad and Mrs. Eugene Rychno.

State Warned Against Delay In Air Control

Charles Yaffe, chief of control agency development program for the National Center for Air Pollution Control, joined Coventry in urging swift action on air pollution regulations.

"It is not necessary for Connecticut to know the extent of the air pollution before setting up regulations," Yaffe told Judge. "The proposed task force, Yaffe said, would be useful in reviewing the program, he said, 'but I hope it will not delay positive action in the meantime.'"

Debate In Israel Too

Perhaps one of the most unfortunate happenings into which the American debate over the war in Vietnam has fallen is that in which everybody is treated as a kind of some kind of offender. Today, as a division of mood and opinion manifests itself in the nation of Israel, it is neither necessary nor appropriate to start trying to divide that nation into two camps, one called hawk, the other dove.

That would be no more fair and accurate for Israel than it has been for the United States. In Israel, as in the United States, there are sincere divisions among good Israelis, as there are among good Americans, when they face up to the question of resort to war as an instrument of policy. In Israel, in some parallel to what has now become labeled the hawk-dove division in the United States, there are those who are for the hard, quick, decisive, victory-seeking military blow, which will prove who is really the best fighter in the Near East, which will create a deadly warning to everybody not to trifle with such military might and such national resolve.

And in Israel, as in the United States, there are those who think they know, by the better reading of history, that there is a limit to the kind of peace and security that can be obtained by military strength alone. And there are those in both countries who are not so different to questions of national honor, know war as always a greater slaughterer of innocent people than the loser of those who order and decree it, and hang back from the dread and fortnight decisions which loom it upon not only themselves but many other nations.

Such divisions in Israel are visible today, as the political-military news from the country tells of the new inclusion of Major General Moshe Dayan, the hero of Israel's attack on Egypt in 1956, as Defense Minister in the Israeli Cabinet.

General Dayan is described as a political affiliate of former Premier David Ben-Gurion, whose coming out of retirement just prior to the 1956 action proved the actual signal for the resort to arms against Egypt. The two men together make an interesting symbol for those who believe in striking hard, and first if necessary, and striking to win. They are men such as should, likewise, the American scene would like to have in complete charge of our policy in the world.

One can imagine that, had these two actually been holding power in Israel these past two weeks, Nasser would already have the shooting war he has, in effect, started Israel to begin. Ben-Gurion is not Premier. Levi Eshkol holds that office. Premier Eshkol is not a lion, but a human being who has an instinct to try to settle differences short of violence. Premier Eshkol has a right hand man Foreign Minister Abba Eban, to many observers the finest leadership figure on the Israeli national scene, but, for real or woe, also a believer in policies of moderation and restraint so long as there is any possible margin of hope in such policies.

Time and again, they have proposed "making the desert bloom" for the mutual benefit of Jews and Arabs in peaceful cooperation. And with their advanced economy and technology, they have sheltered from receivers of foreign aid to give of assistance in various parts of Africa. That is not aggression, and Moscow and the Arabs share counting all know it. Every African nation that has had the help of an Israeli technical mission ought to be shouting at the Kennedys and the Pyramids, too, right now. But one of the curious truths of the times is that the simplest truths are obscured. — SPRINGFIELD UNION

A Faster Ph.D. Assembly Line?

No sooner do we succeed in prolonging the American educational process so that people who used just to finish high school are now being pressed into at least two years of college, and so that the same number of people who used to go to four years of college now go to seven years of college and graduate school — no sooner do we attain this progressive state of affairs than you guessed it — we set about the process of trying to undo it all.

Unmindful of the fact that only two things, war or longer school careers, have ever been able to help deal with the problem of unemployment, oblivious to the emergency creeping up on mankind in the form of the shorter work week and its unwelcome mandate to people to try to find something besides work to live for, untimid and oblivious, some very well-intentioned and possibly very well-meaning and serious people are now busy studying the possible ways of shortening the educational process which has just been lengthened.

They want to telescope the time period for a Ph.D. degree from seven or eight years to something like four around-the-calendar school years.

No matter, to these zealous ones, that the individual turned out at the end of this four year grind may not be as good a human being. No regret, apparently, for the fact that the best thing about continuing one's education indefinitely is the wonderful experience of having a summer vacation which doesn't have to look forward to anything more onerous than going back to school and getting ready for another vacation. No recognition, on their part, of the fact that the greatest direct contribution education makes to solving the problem of our society is that, at a time when science is making people live longer and longer, it can keep the younger entrants in the general rat race satisfied for a few more years.

When we have ever, in this era, decided anything on the basis of whether it would be a good thing to have? We never have, and we never really care. All we want to know is whether we can do it.

In this instance, the Ford Foundation is spending \$41.5 million and 10 universities are trying to find out how to do it. Suppose they prove it can be done. Will they then venture a few good reasons why it should be?

It more or less had to be, in keeping with the zany distortion of both purpose and language which has been coming from the war in Vietnam almost from its start, that the worst and bloodiest fighting of the world would eventually turn up in a lecture officially designated as the Demilitarized Zone.

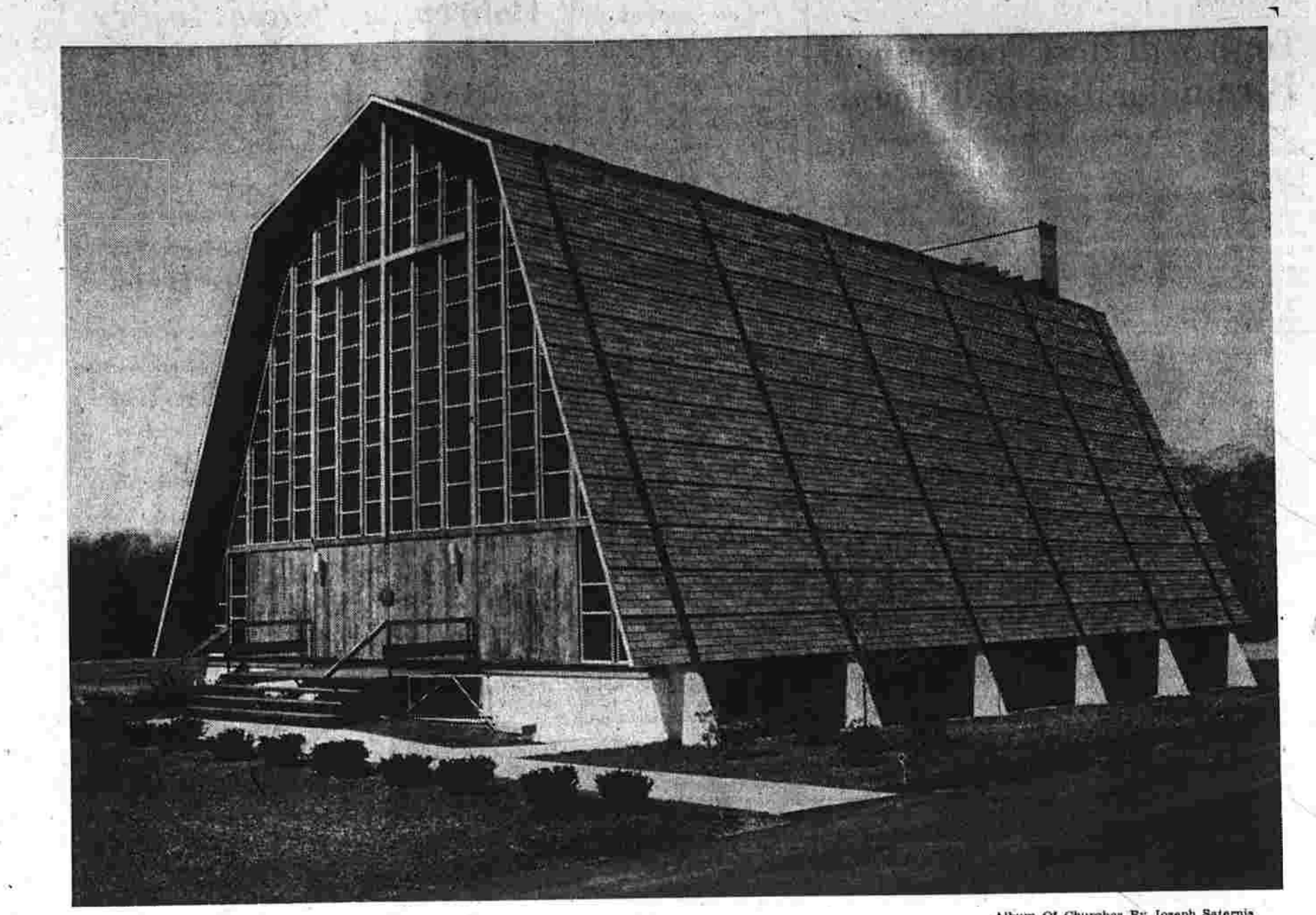

South Windsor Condition Of Roads In Town Is Hit

Calling for a complete investigation into the public works department, the Democrats for Governor have charged that town roads are in poor condition as a result of using inferior materials for highway maintenance.

Clarence Nicholson, chairman of the group, laid the blame for the condition of the town roads at the feet of the Democratic-controlled town council over the past several years.

Nicholson said the town has been spending an exorbitant amount of money to maintain the town streets "but their condition is worse than they were in the 1940's."

Noting that the "DBG had been asked by several taxpayers to find out where their excessive amount of money is going and to inform them of their findings," Nicholson questioned "where the Democratic-controlled town council drives their vehicles."

Nothing the poor condition of the town roads, he said, that "many of the town streets are impassable such as Sand Hill Rd. which is supposedly in the 100's of being rebuilt."

Nicholson charged that "holes in the roads in town have been left unfilled for months, which have caused many motorists to have blowouts and other accidents when the steering wheel is thrown out of control by the driver's hands when the wheels hit these ruts."

In areas where drainage ditches have been installed, "not one protective barrier has been installed to warn drivers of the sheer drop at the edge of the road."

"What is the highway department waiting for, a fatality to occur before some protective action is taken to put the roads in a safe condition?" Nicholson said.

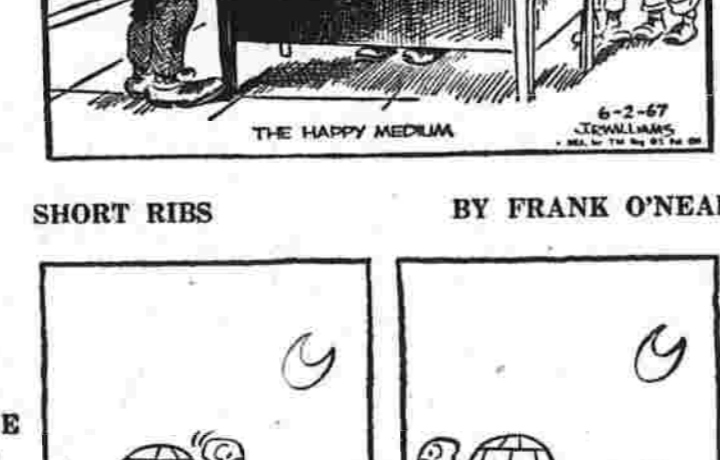

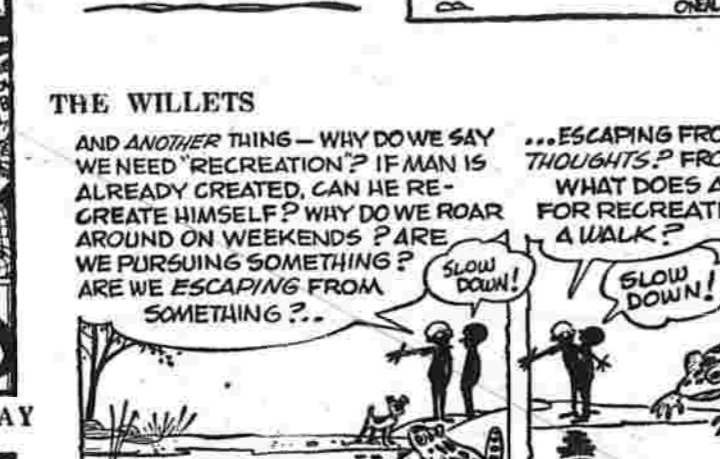
