# House Zips Along, Approves 98 Bills

HARTFORD (AP) — Warming up for a marathon budget session, the House today enacted 98 bills in four hours Monday, keeping debate to a minimum and skipping bills that appeared controversial or troublesome.

Among the bills given formal approval and sent to the Governor for signing were measures that would:

- Require day care centers to be licensed by the State Health Department.
- Boost the state's share of local welfare costs from 50 percent to 75 percent (a measure for which \$2.76 million was provided in the "baby budget").
- Have Connecticut's neighboring York and New Jersey in the 26-Atlantic States Air Pollution Control Compact.
- Set up a uniform fee schedule for physicians who treat welfare recipients under the federal medicare program.
- Allow town clerks to register voters in addition to registrars.
- Provide for membership on the 7½-State Transportation Committee of the chief executive of a municipality from Connecticut within the tri-state region.
- Add 15 more troopers to the state police force at a cost of \$1.8 million.
- Have bills passed by the House that were sent to the Senate included measures that would:
- Repeal a portion of the consumer goods "a truth in packaging" bill.
- Pass state grants for community mental health services.
- Require all municipalities to hold their local elections biennially in the odd-numbered years on one of two dates—either the first Monday in May or the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November.
- Provide for the transfer of abandoned state lands to the municipalities where they are located.
- Make it easier for the public and the news media to find out when meetings of government agencies are going to take place on voice votes.

# Bolton Long Agenda For Board

The architects for the new elementary school told the public building commission (PBC) last night that they want to "push" just as fast as they can to get plans for the school Community Hall. Officers will be elected and Mrs. Agnes Kreywig will show slides of pictures in the art museum in East Berlin, which she visited last year.

Kindergartens Visit  
Visitation of incoming kindergarten children will take place June 7 and 8 at both kindergartens. Parents were notified at the time of registration.

The hours for visiting at the session located in the education building of St. George's Episcopal Church on Rt. 44A are 9 to 11:30 a.m.

At the elementary school there are two sessions at 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 to 3 p.m. Parents are requested to transport children to any one of the sessions and to return for the child at the close of the session.

The PBC and the architects had been considering two kindergarten rooms (120 and 121 normal classrooms) in stage one, with the third to be built with additional classrooms in stage two.

Room Seen Needed  
The board of education said it felt the third kindergarten room might be necessary before stage two is built. Cheney said the board also said it favored classroom space over an enclosed play area drawn by architects at the corner of the school.

The third kindergarten will probably be included in the preliminary plans by using some of the enclosed play area space to increase the size of a corner classroom.

The architects felt that they could make these and other changes in the preliminary plans and have them ready for PBC and board of education approval by next Wednesday. Cheney will contact the board of education chairman to see when a joint meeting can be arranged.

# House OK's Probate Bill At Early Morning Session

HARTFORD (AP) — "We felt that if a Superior Court judge were seated with the probate judge, the probate judge would be able to handle the probate cases more efficiently," Healey said.

He said, in reply to a question from legislators, that the court administrator could suspend a probate judge from his duties, but not from his constitutional post. "There is provision in every other court for suspension of the powers of a judge," he said.

Healey's presentation of the bill drew the praise, and when Healey finished, most of the House applauded him vigorously.

What the bill does is assign a Superior Court judge to act as administrator of the Probate Court system; eliminate the mandatory use of appraisers, who are no longer needed in most cases; establish a uniform schedule of fees; and set up a pension system for the 126 probate judges.

The Probate Court was the only court in the state that escaped the major reform that went into effect in 1960. The jumble of municipal courts and police courts yielded to an integrated system of Circuit, Common Pleas, and Superior courts, but the probate judges continued to be elected within their districts and to run their courts according to their own rules.

"I would point out to this House," Rep. James T. Healey, D-Waterbury, said shortly before midnight Monday, "that up until this time there has been no provision for audit of the expenses and disbursements of the probate courts."

Healey, whose father at one time headed the Probate Assembly, made the presentation of the reform bill, which had been drafted by the General Assembly's Judiciary Committee.

In response to leading questions by minority leader Nicholas A. Lenze, who is also very familiar with the workings of the probate courts, Healey explained that it would be the job of the administrator to "develop uniform rules, forms, and procedures" in the probate courts.

Healey said that when the Probate Assembly was created by the General Assembly 20 years ago, it was charged with the task, but was never able to accomplish it.

# Senate Adds Amendment To Wiretapping Measure

HARTFORD (AP) — Law enforcement agencies would be able to listen to phone conversations with the written consent of one of the persons talking if the House accepts a Senate amendment to a bill which would ban wiretapping.

In action Monday night, the Senate added the provision to a bill which originally would have banned wiretapping in all cases except in apprehending kidnapers or persons making obscene telephone calls.

Sen. John Newman, U.S. senator from Connecticut, had urged Gov. John Dempsey earlier to reject the bill unless it was amended.

Newman said it is vitally important that law enforcement officials be able to eavesdrop on telephone calls concerning crimes if one person in the conversation wants to cooperate with police.

The Senate passed and sent bills to the governor that would:

- Allow veterans of the Viet Nam War to participate in the soldiers, sailors and marines fund.
- Cut down a person's jail sentence by the number of days he was imprisoned if he was unable to raise bail or if he was denied bail.
- Revoke the state bail procedure for arrested persons.
- Eliminate attachments in the bed or invasion of privacy suits.
- Allow for direct appeal to the Connecticut Supreme Court in matters involving the public interest.
- Raise the age of eligibility for assistance under the aid-to-dependent-children program from 18 to 21 if the young person is attending school.
- Prohibit the installation of noise-amplifying devices on motorcycles and the removal of a muffler or any part of a muffler.
- Allow radio and television stations to broadcast meetings of legislative or executive groups.

- Establish a commission to study the feasibility of an assigned risk insurance plan for Connecticut.
- Authorize the establishment of state community colleges in the greater New Haven area.

### Hebron Vote on Budget Due on June 16

The Board of Finance has requested the Board of Selectmen to vote on a budget for Hebron for 1969. The board met in a special emergency meeting Wednesday evening to determine the course of action to be taken as a result of the June 2 budget meeting. The board also approved the 1969-70 fiscal year budget.

Prior to review of the budget, the Board of Education, Recreation and Conservation Commissions, and the Recreation Council discussed the alternatives available for the construction of recreational facilities for Hebron.

The primary concern is for the Little and Pony Leagues. A plan to develop land at Glenside Hill School and the possibility of repairing the field at the Hebron Elementary School were discussed.

It was pointed out that \$400,000 in Capital and Non-Capital funds are earmarked for future recreation.

### Business Service Ordered from Penn Central

The state's Public Service Commission has ordered the Penn Central Railroad to purchase business service from its own state commuter lines or face court action.

Thursday's sharply critical order followed a series of public hearings on the quality of Penn Central commuter service on the Harlem and Hudson divisions. Almost 40,000 commuters ride between Manhattan and Westchester, Putnam and Dutchess counties.

The commission adopted, unanimously, recommendations made by Commissioner John T. Ryan who presided at the hearing.

Ryan's opinion took into consideration a petition signed by 6,000 Westchester commuters complaining filed by 112 commuters listing 22 alleged deficiencies in service, and state agencies ordering more than a dozen specific steps they said must be taken by the railroad. If the improvements are not made, the PSC said, it is prepared to take court action against the Penn Central.

Under state law, courts can fine the railroad up to \$5,000 for each violation of the commission's orders. The PSC already has complaints on file in the road calling for \$40,000 in penalties for alleged understaffing and service on the Buffalo runs.

Penn Central, under the PSC's orders, must:

- Immediately take steps to buy or lease at least 20 new cars and 20 new engines to replace outmoded equipment over the next two years.
- Run trains on schedule at least 80 per cent of the time each month. A train is considered on time if it arrives no more than five minutes behind schedule at its final destination.
- Dispatch within two years a suburban stations to inform commuters of schedule deviations.
- Provide enough telephone lines and employees to man them so that anyone wanting to check on train schedules can "receive in person" responses.
- Equip each locomotive-drawn commuter train with a two-way radio for immediate help after emergencies or equipment failures.
- Promptly clean up debris on tracks "to avoid delays to trains and (avoid) fires such as have occurred in the past."
- Speed up track resurfacing—which generally assures a smoother ride—to cover 100 miles of track a year on each line, over the next three years, instead of the current 60 miles annually.

### Suspect Changes Plea to Guilty

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — A second suspect in an alleged conspiracy to kill a "beastie" dealer and his girl friend was charged Friday with guilty to Superior Court.

Michael Ruff, 26, of North Haven entered his plea Thursday. He is currently free on a \$100,000 bond.

Ruff is charged by police with attempted murder and two counts of conspiracy to commit murder.

Ruff was allegedly paid \$10,000 in 1966 by Mrs. Dorothy Voloshin, wife of Marvin Voloshin, Ann Rodriguez of Branford, Conn. Rodriguez lost a leg and suffered facial injuries when a bomb exploded in his ear April 4. That case is still unresolved.

Mrs. Rodriguez also suffered minor injuries in a car accident when her brakes failed. Police discovered later that the bomb exploded in the trunk of the vehicle had been used.

Ruff admitted that Mrs. Voloshin had paid him to kill Mrs. Rodriguez and that the two also planned to kill her in 1966.

Other testimony at the hearing into Community National's affairs dealt with how A. I. C. Corp., an investment company incorporated in Florida and based in New York, had purchased an investment of \$2 million paid up Community National policies with a cash value of \$2.4 million.

Besides the suit brought by Tintair, Community National faces a stockholder suit which alleges, among other things, that the holding company would pay the premiums on the annuities. The insurance company records showed the policies were fully paid.

Panagoulis Escapes Prison, Would-Be Greek Assassin

MANCHESTER (AP)—Alexander Panagoulis, convicted of trying to assassinate Greek Prime Minister George Papandreu, escaped from his military prison, the government announced today.

The 30-year-old security prisoner, arrested last August when he tried to blow up the premier's car on a street road, made his getaway Thursday night. He was sentenced to death Nov. 17, for attempting the violent overthrow of the regime and for desertion. The military tribunal gave him 18 years in prison for his assassination attempt.

Science Head Sees No Sign That Marijuana Is Peril

WASHINGTON (AP)—The head of the National Institute of Mental Health says there is no scientific evidence that smoking marijuana is harmful to health.

In fact, says Dr. Philip Han- dler, the information available indicates the opposite may be true.

"It is our opinion that there is no scientific evidence which says we should not, at the moment," Han- dler told a House subcommittee in testimony released today.

Handler said it still remains a scientific problem to decide whether marijuana is dangerous to society. He likened it to alcohol and said a similar study would have to be done.

Similar statements touched off a controversy in 1967 when they came from a top health official in the Johnson administration.

Dr. James L. Goddard, then commissioner of the Food and Drug Administration, said then that as a physician he was not satisfied that medical data extracted from the federal law.

He went further than Handler, however, and condemned laws against the use of marijuana as too severe and medically unjustified.

Release of Handler's testimony comes at a time when the government is in the midst of a nationwide campaign against marijuana and narcotics.

Dr. Han- dler said the use of marijuana is not a problem which requires very clear and insightful investigation of the facts," he said.

"The evidence that marijuana is addictive is not conclusive at all," he said. "Quite the opposite is far as I can make out."

Dr. Handler said the use of the hallucinogenic LSD has dropped off sharply among young people since it was established that the drug can cause chromosome damage.
