'Academic Mafia'

A University of Oklahoma professor says several big American schools make up an "academic Mafia" which gets too big a proportion of federal research money. W.N. Peach named Harvard, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, University of Michigan, University of Chicago, University of California at Berkeley and Stanford University. He told a Senate subcommittee that if a proposed foundation for social sciences is to be really national in scope, these large schools must be included. "It would be difficult to demonstrate statistically that the academic Mafia has greater control over federal research funds than the other Mafia has over gambling and other types of pleasure industries," Peach said. "But it will be very difficult to demonstrate the operation of the Mafia's Government Operations subcommittee is considering a bill to provide \$20 million for the National Foundation, which would encourage work in the social and behavioral sciences.

Flag Day Vote

WASHINGTON (AP) - The vote apparently has been cleared for the House to vote June 14 - Flag Day - on a bill making it a federal crime to desecrate the American flag. The measure, a primary result of anti-Vietnam war protests which feature flag-burning, won approval Tuesday from the House Judiciary Committee. It provides for a fine of up to \$10,000 and a year in prison for violation. All the states have similar laws. Not all the committee members approved the bill. A main argument against it is that it is vague and infringes on the First Amendment's guarantee of free speech.

Area Weather

WINDSOR LOCKS (AP) - Our stagnant weather pattern continues with no change expected says the U.S. Weather Bureau. In fact, the five-day outlook calls for continued warm weather until possibly turning a little cooler Sunday or Monday. No precipitation is expected until possibly over the weekend when there is a chance of some thunderstorm activity developing. Weather systems which are generally weak are all being shifted to the northwest of us into Canada. We are under the effects of high pressure which is remaining relatively stationary and strong enough to prevent the penetration of frontal systems through the area. A slow addition of moisture will take place over the region but at present only haze and some thin upper cloudiness will dim the sun. Sunshine will prevail both day and Thursday with temperatures continuing to rise inland and in the 70s along the shore in coastal waters. Temperatures from Thursday through Monday are expected to average above normal with daily highs in the 80s over interior sections and in the 70s along the coast. Overnight lows will range from the 50s to near 60. Generally warm through Monday. Precipitation may total less than 1/2 inch with scattered showers or thundershowers over the weekend.

9,600 Refugees Are Moved As U.S. Troops Enter DMZ

CAM LO, South Vietnam (AP) - The demilitarized zone has been committed to the Viet Cong or to the government. An administrator said every family should be in a new tented hut, on its own 20-square plot, in two months. The huts were being built. The land is dry around Cam Lo, 10 miles south of the zone. All told, there were 9,600 refugees at the camp, moved there in tin sheds and tents under the 100-degree sun and fanned by a brisk, dry, dusty wind. Children played in a big dirt pile, bounced on their grandmothers' knees, rode on their mothers' hip if they were very young. Their precious cattle wandered about the camp or slouched in the low scrub. Arguments broke out over the buckets of water being handed down on ropes from the top of a 6,000-gallon U.S. Marine tank truck. The camp's wells were not finished yet and there was barely enough water to drink and to cook with, much less to bathe. The families had 10-foot-square sections of the sheds if they did not have a tent of their own. Meager possessions were heaped against the wall. The old people tended cooking fires. They were parents, children, women, and the elderly. Young men were elsewhere.

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Rail Strike Proposal Highballs into Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's proposal to sidetrack a threatened nationwide rail strike steams toward a Senate debate with Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield expressing hope the measure will be in House hands by Thursday.

Mansfield called for a morning debate on the bill and put aside another measure — on congressional redistricting — originally slated to occupy the Senate today.

Mansfield said he felt the Senate had to dispose of the rail plan this week because the Senate is expected to devote most of next week to debating a resolution to censure Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn.

Congress already has voted two extensions of the no-strike no-workout period in the dispute between the American Union and railroads, handling about 85 per cent of the nation's long-haul traffic.

The present extension runs out June 19. The administration contends that with a war on in Vietnam, a nationwide rail tieup would be a disaster.

Johnson's bill would extend the no-strike no-workout period to another 90 days during which intensive mediation efforts would take place under an appointed five-man board he would name.

But if no settlement were reached in this time, the board could make its own determination of fair terms and order return summer after summer to the floor debate.

The unions labeled the plan compulsory arbitration in hearings on the bill and urged Congress to reject it. Administration officials insisted it varied from compulsory arbitration in that the only apparently feasible way to avoid a strike at this time.

Senators who supported the union's position tried unsuccessfully to amend the bill in the Labor Committee and said they expected to renew their efforts in the floor debate.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Ore., led the opposition in a committee on a proposal to add a provision imposing the railroad's liability for any strike at this time.

Yarborough said he was trying to find a way to "balance the books" and not put all the pressure on the unions under the bill.

The unions contended that, under the President's proposal, they would lose the right to make a government-decreed settlement of terms and unworkable.

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Tolland Planning Panel May Review Town's Comprehensive Plan

The Planning and Zoning Commission discussed the preliminary investigation for a 702 plan of the town and continued investigation of general regional activities and continued work at its meeting Monday night.

The commission will write the State Development Commission for an outline of the specific planning function of the commission. PZC member Samuel Elustein suggested the commission begin to review the present comprehensive plan and investigate a possible capital improvements program for the town. The suggestion is included in the town's Comprehensive Plan adopted in 1964.

PZC Chairman Walter Beaudin noted the town is reaching the point where it should enter the 702 planning phase, which is a five-year review of the Comprehensive Plan. The review includes the adjusting of statistics and recommendations to bring them in line with the present situation in the town and to project the adjusted plan for another five-year period. Work on the original plan was begun in 1962, when the town began its large population increase.

The population projections of the plan have been noted as being conservative and are now lower than the actual estimated population.

The PZC discussed the Capital Region Planning Agency's proposed Transportation Plan for the 26 member towns with its representative.

Marrow Rd. Proposal CRPA representative Mrs. Edmund Quinlan noted changes will be recommended by the local representatives for Rt. 102 (Marrow Rd) in the plan. The road has been assigned extra traffic burdens in the coming years but is not slated for any improvements or widening according to the plan, although it is given a poor traffic flow rating.

CRPA officials have recommended routing the Rt. 102 and UConn traffic down Rt. 135 to the Wilbur Cross Highway at the intersection in Tolland instead of widening and improving Rt. 44.

A proposed highway to provide access to Bradley Field by the year 2000 would end in an interchange to be constructed at the junction of Mt. Spring and Reed Rds. with the Wilbur Cross Highway. The proposed highway would shorten the travel time to Bradley from 30 minutes to about 15 to 20 minutes for local residents.

The plan shows the widening of the present Wilbur Cross Highway to eight lanes through the entire length of the town. Gravel Removal Operations Plans for a gravel removal operation to be operated on property owned by State Rep. Robert King off Dimmock Rd., were presented by engineer Al Behringer. The removal operation would be confined to about 12 acres of King's 212-acre property near the country line.

The plans are the first received by the PZC for gravel removal operations and call for the returning of four inches of topsoil after the gravel has been stripped.

The board noted it will need an application and filing fee before approval and will investigate the requirements for a bond to cover the cost of reclamation of the area.

The commission is presently investigating several gravel stripping operations, primarily in the vicinity of the Williamstic River.

PZC member Gerald Lajman noted the state regulations regarding junked cars can be enforced by sending out an inspector from the State Motor Vehicle Department. Acting on a written complaint the inspector will investigate the situation and if necessary will issue a writ calling for court appearance.

The commission agreed to investigate this possibility further, as part of their long running study of junked cars.

The commission will meet June 13 to discuss multiple family dwellings.

Bolton Church Members Discuss Formation of 'Fish' Panel

About 40 persons from four Bolton churches attended a meeting Sunday night to discuss the formation of an inter-church "Fish" committee to help their neighbors, and a seminar on "Preparation for Marriage" for the youth of Bolton and possibly beyond.

Later the groups recombined and announced their results. Help in Emergency The "Fish" group is planning to ask the Rev. Robert W. Howell, pastor of the Church of the Good Shepherd in West Springfield, or one of his parishioners, to come speak in Bolton, hopefully "some weekday night before the end of June."

The "Fish" got its start in this country having been imported from a church in Oxford, England, at the West Springfield church. It is now a going concern in many communities. Basically, it provides services on an emergency basis to those who ask for them.

In West Springfield, an answering service gets in touch with a member of the Fish group on call that day and that person in turn gets in touch with someone else, if necessary, or provides the service himself. No committee has yet been formed for the Bolton "Fish" but it is expected that the service could get under way in the fall. In the meantime, needs and geographic limitations will be established.

5-4 Stock Split

The Connecticut Bank and Trust Co.'s board of directors has recommended a five-for-four stock split to the bank's shareholders.

The proposed split would increase the number of shares outstanding by 25 per cent, from 1,771,407 to 2,464,259. Par value, which is now \$12.50, would become \$10. In announcing the action, bank chairman Fomeroy Day noted that it would benefit shareholders by broadening the market for the bank's stock.

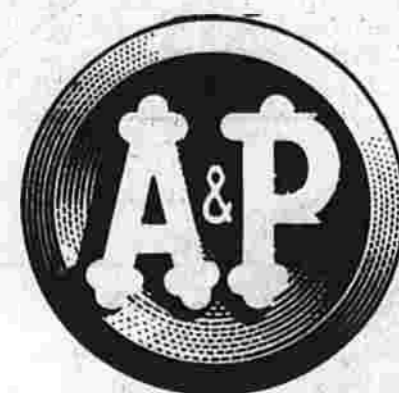
A special meeting of shareholders has been called for Aug. 1 to consider the proposal. The split will also be subject to approval by the Connecticut State Bank Commissioner.

At its meeting, the bank's board also declared a regular quarterly cash dividend of 60 cents per share on the present shares, payable July 17, 1967, to shareholders of record on June 30. This is equivalent to 48 cents per share on the shares to be outstanding after the split is approved, the board intends subject to business conditions prevailing at the time to declare a quarterly dividend of 2 1/2 cents per share payable Oct. 15 on the increased number of shares. This would represent a 9 1/4 per cent increase over the present rate.

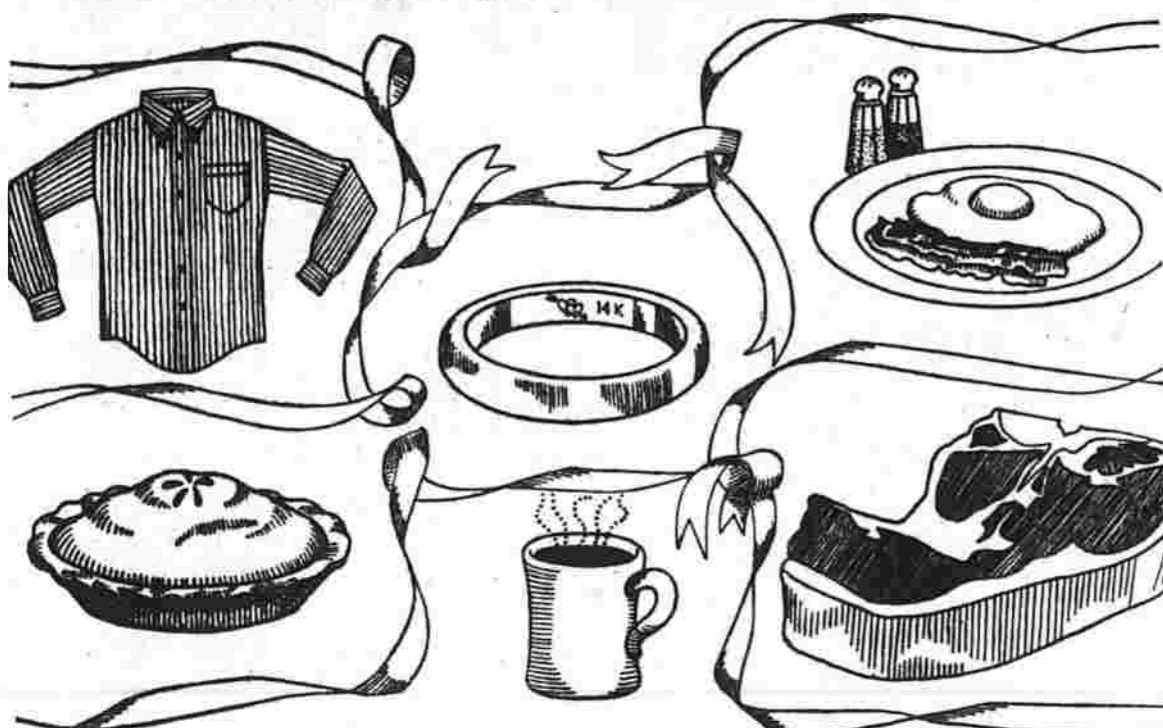

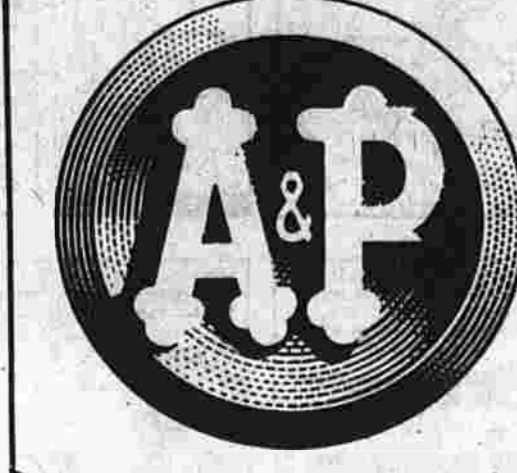
