High Court Upholds Darwin Conviction

The State Supreme Court today upheld Roy F. Darwin's second degree murder conviction in the 1963 strangling of a 17-year-old girl from Bolton.

By the court's decision, it rejected the claim that the defendant man had not confessed to the crime voluntarily.

The court ruled further that by not completely re-narrating the crime for state police, Darwin had not committed the crime.

Darwin, now 50, led state police partly through a re-narration of the crime.

This was the second written confession Darwin had given to police during the weekend in their custody, while his lawyers tried many times to successfully, to get in touch with him.

The Supreme Court noted that Darwin's weekend in custody under a coroner's warrant occurred before the U.S. Supreme Court's Escobedo decision, which held that a suspect must be allowed access to the second written statement and search without any search.

"It is important," said the state court, "to bear in mind that the question before us is the efficiency or adequacy of the state police practices in 1963 in handling attempts by attorneys to communicate with their clients."

He contended Darwin understood "preconditioning" by talking to the police, "truth serum" injections, and other contact with the state police that together led to a "breaking of the will."

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS The Suez Canal remained closed to shipping today, as the economies of Arab nations, beset in war by Israel were tottering and the Soviet Union was seeking a special session of the U.N. General Assembly to try to force Israel from the territory it gained by conquest.

Diplomats in Cairo said the canal, a vital international waterway and a mainstay of Egypt's economy, is blocked by about 10 ships. Shipping experts estimated it would take two to six months to clear them out.

Egypt had said Saturday that ships sunk by Israeli planes were blocking the 19-mile passage between the Mediterranean and Asia. Diplomats and shipping sources in Cairo said it was virtually impossible for at least some of the sinkings to have resulted from an attack.

Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser ordered the canal closed when the Arab-Israeli war broke out June 5. Foreign news men have not been permitted to inspect the damaged canal.

Nasser had hoped to obtain \$20 million in badly needed foreign exchange from canal tolls this year. For a country already deep in debt, loss of even a part of this revenue could be a serious blow.

Egypt owes money to every nation it traded with before the war began. With a \$46-million foreign trade deficit, it has been forced to dip into its gold reserves to meet international obligations.

Much of its indebtedness is with the Communist world for weapons and military equipment not now being required or used.

As a hot sun rose over the smoking ruins of a National Guardsmen battled rioting Negroes through a second night of marauding in Tampa's sprawling slums, then pulled back today to rest up for expected violence resumed tonight.

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Stennis Charges Open Dodd Probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. John Stennis accused Sen. Thomas J. Dodd of collecting money "under all the banners and trappings of campaign contributions" and then spending it indiscriminately for his own purposes.

Dodd listened intently as Stennis, the Mississippi Democrat who heads the Senate ethics committee, opened the debate today on an executive session next Monday night.

Stennis said his panel was not condemning testimonial dinners, and was not accusing Dodd of violating the law or evading income taxes.

But he said Dodd's use of testimonial funds was "wrong on its face" and therefore tended to bring dishonor upon the Senate itself.

Stennis said testimonial receipts were improperly used to pay for the three rail lines leading north from Hanoi, knowing up a string of loaded tank cars on one siding and shooting up two locomotives and about 40 cars.

Racial Violence Erupts On 3 Scattered Fronts

The 8 white-men-mobs burned and looted for 11 hours Monday night, starting their rampage in the bright light of mid-afternoon and continuing until after 2 a.m.

Roving bands looted Motely cocktails into buildings and at passing autos and snipers took pot shots at police officers.

The outbreaks were numerous and widespread as opposed to Sunday's trouble which was confined mainly to the Central-Village area, a huge, festering ghetto, blocks from the city.

Gov. Claude Kirk supervised 100 National Guardsmen and 350 police and 150 armed deputies. They sealed off the main urban area but were generally unable to keep up with the guerrilla-like squads of rioters who resorted to cutting telephone lines and burning and pillaging as they went.

Firemen had extinguished at least 18 fires. For the second night they were shot at by rioters. One Negro was stabbed in the hand by a Guardsman and another was shot in the arm. A third, reportedly a boy of about 15, caught a buckshot blast from a policeman's rifle gun.

Police repeatedly were pinned east of the city, near the site of a school. At 2 a.m. that it was being sniped fire from two gunners in the woods.

Kirk, riding with Hillsborough Sheriff Malcolm Beard in a patrol car, faced the rioters. He said he missed most of the action.

The governor later met with about 200 Negroes at Mitchell School. Among those present were Martin Luther King, Jr., and other leaders of the civil rights movement.

His death touched off a rioting. White motorists were dragged from their cars and burned before the area was sealed off.

Fifteen persons were injured, including a Negro youth who was shot.

Nasser Loses 'Destiny' War Egypt on Brink of Starvation

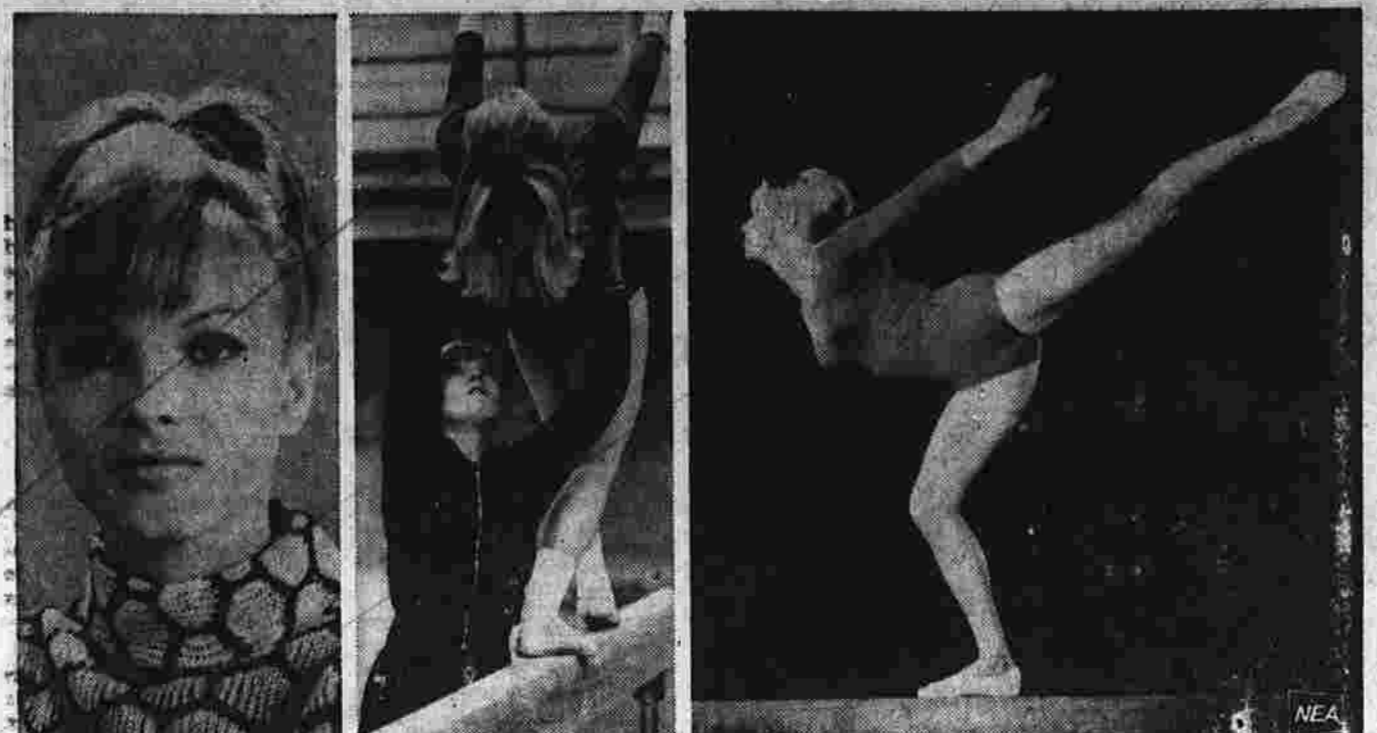

Lack of Sites Noted For Small Industries

"Manchester stands a great threat of losing some of its home-grown industry because of the apparent inavailability of small parcels at competitive prices," Town Manager Robert Weiss warned yesterday.

Weiss spoke at a Dutch-treat luncheon at Willet's Steak House, sponsored by the Town Development Commission (TDC) and attended by 30 persons.

TDC chairman Alfred Werber, who served as chairman of the meeting, said the purpose of the meeting was "to bring the mutual problems which exist in the industrial field."

Mayor Nathan Agostinelli said that the town is not looking for the large plants, but that it is seeking "several small, diversified plants to insure a broader tax base."

The decision we make for the development of the town and our children will have to live with for many years to come. We must realize that they're not making any more of it (land)."

Weiss said, "We must solve our local problems before we go out for new industry."

"About a half dozen local manufacturing areas are being developed (over 200 square feet) are being added and we must help growing plants and we must help in utilities and then selling or leasing the land."

Weiss threw out the possibility of the town, as a landowner, going into the industrial development business in competition with private developers — by putting in utilities and then selling or leasing the land."

Agostinelli said that he is opposed to the town going into business. The consensus of the meeting was that it would be unwise for the town to get into the private developer for the town to compete.

Werber said that the town has two alternatives. "Either we sit back complacently as a bedroom town or we broaden the tax base by inviting business," he insisted.

"It is land is suitable for industry and it requires rezoning, we should do all we can to see that it is zoned industrial. The land now zoned industrial is available for the 50-acre plant but is not available for the three to five acre plant," he said.

Town Planner Joseph Tamsky said that the town needs a more restrictive industrial zone plan. "Zoning more industrial land into a drive local land prices down," he said.

Offers of small parcels of industrial land were made by Mrs. Daniel Pantaleo and by a representative of Green Manor.

It's Curtains For 3 Area Junkyards!

WETHERSFIELD (AP) — A dozen more junkyards and a town dump, not very pleasant on the eye, are slated to vanish at least from view along Connecticut highways this summer.

The State Highway Department announced today that the curtains will go down on the junkyards and the dump. The "curtains" will be in the form of screening by planting, fencing or other means.

Area junkyards to be hidden from the public eye are in Hebron, Andover and Columbia. Others are in Brooklyn, Litchfield, Windham, Madison, Norfolk, Plymouth, Stratford and two in New Milford. The dump is in Deep River.

Plans and specifications will be prepared for the 13 screening projects so that they can be advertised within the next few months, the department said.

Cost of the projects will total \$20,000, of which the government will pay 75 per cent under the Federal Highway Beautification Act of 1960.

The act specifies that effective July 1, 1967, all junkyards in the State must be screened.

Cong Terror Raid Claims 80 Victims

SAIGON (AP) — Communist guerrillas swarmed through a small Mekong Delta hamlet on dawn today, killing 80 wounding perhaps 80 Vietnamese civilians and militiamen.

The attack was one of several deep in the delta near Can Tho during the night. They occurred near the Cambodian border in an area where the Viet Cong control vast areas of the countryside by night.

Ground action was light outside the delta, the U.S. Command reported. In the air war against North Vietnam, U.S. pilots reported six more MIGs probably destroyed and four ground in the sixth attack on the Kep air base north of Hanoi.

The heavy Viet Cong attack in the delta led to an adjoining hamlet 118 miles southwest of Saigon. While one was being made by mortar fire, perhaps as a diversion, guerrillas smashed into the other.

A company of about 120 militiamen defended the second village.

'Have I Ever Lied?' Dodd Asks Senators

WASHINGTON (AP) — In an impassioned appeal to his fellow senators, Thomas J. Dodd asked today if any of them knew of any time he had lied, or cheated or broken his word to them.

The 60-year-old Connecticut Democrat, defending himself against charges of financial misconduct, pounded one fist against his other hand and cried:

"What has happened to the United States Senate if I can't look you in the eye and say this is a fact."

Dodd spoke to his own defense in the second day of debate on the Senate ethics committee's recommendation that he be censured for conduct that "tends to bring the Senate into dishonor and disrepute."

After a 14-month investigation, the bipartisan committee unanimously reported that Dodd had converted \$11,083 in political funds to his own use and had double-billed for travel expenses.

Dodd said he had nothing to do with billing the government for travel expenses also paid by private organizations, and declared that if his colleagues judged him a thief, they should expel him.

Board Will Review Policy On School Milk Contract

The Board of Education agreed last night to reconsider its policy of awarding the school milk contract on the basis of bids, after it was addressed by George Dart, owner of Dart's Dairy, its present supplier.

The head of the E. Center St. milk firm termed the existing policy of awarding the contract to the low bidder "unrealistic" and suggested the board return to its policy of several years ago.

Under former policy, the supplier and the school business manager worked out a "negotiated" price, based on milk prices paid in the surrounding area.

Because the price of milk for several years has been set by the Federal Milk Market Administrator to fluctuate upwards and downwards four times each year, it has been "like picking a figure out of a hat" to bid for contracts, Dart said.

Dart, who had for many years supplied milk to the schools, bid unsuccessfully last June for the contract, which went to Belcher Dairy of Staffordville.

But early in March, he agreed to supply the schools for the remainder of the year by Belcher — served by a written bid and a contract that was dropped the contract with two days notice.

The board thanked Dart for stepping into the breach and agreed to reconsider the bid procedure at its June 26 meeting.

School Superintendent William Curtis, in answer to a query from the board, said he thought competitive bids would not be required under the Town Charter because school cafeterias are a self-sustaining operation. However, he was directed to get a ruling from the town council.

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — America's Mariner 5 spacecraft raced a heavier Soviet probe toward Venus today to penetrate with electronic fingers the planet's mysterious veil of clouds and help scientists deduce whether Venus can support life.

During a brief 26-minute encounter Oct. 19 when Mariner 5 is to pass within 2,800 miles of Venus, electronic fingers of the probe will probe the planet's mysterious veil of clouds and help scientists deduce whether Venus can support life.

The 540-pound Mariner 5, less than one-quarter the weight of the Soviet Union's Venus 4 craft launched two days earlier, took off from Cape Kennedy at 7:02 a.m. EDT today on the first U.S. venture to Venus since 1962.
