Lack of Sites Noted For Small Industries

"Manchester stands a great threat of losing some of its home-grown industry because of the apparent unavailability of small parcels at competitive prices," Town Manager Robert Weiss warned yesterday.

Weiss spoke at a Dutch-treat luncheon at Willet's Steak House, sponsored by the Town and Development Commission (TDC) and attended by 30 persons. Town officials, local developers, owners of potential industrial land, and representatives of banking and utility companies.

TDC chairman Alfred Werber, who served as chairman of the meeting, said the purpose of the meeting was "for airing the mutual problems which exist in the industrial field."

Mayor Nathan Agostinelli said that the town is not looking for the large plants, but that it is seeking "several small, diversified plants to insure a broader tax base."

Weiss said, "We must solve our local problems before we go out for new industry."

"About a half dozen local manufacturers (about 100,000 square feet) are having growing pains and we must help them in various ways," Weiss threw out the possibility of the town, as a landowner, going into the industrial development business in competition with private developers — by putting in utilities and then selling or leasing the land.

Agostinelli said that he is opposed to the town going into business. The consensus of the meeting was that it would be unfair to the private developer for the town to compete.

Werber said that the town has two alternatives. "Either we sit back complacently as a bedroom town or we broaden the tax base by inviting business," he insisted.

"It is land suitable for industry and it requires zoning, we should do all we can to see that it is zoned industrial. The land now zoned industrial is available for the 50-acre plant but is not available for the three to five acre plant," he said.

Town Planner Joseph Tammsky said that the town needs a more restrictive industrial zone plan. "Zoning more industrial land into a drive local land prices down," he said.

Offers of small parcels of industrial land were made by Mrs. Daniel Pantaleo and by a representative of Green Manor.

The luncheon-meeting closed with a plea by Werber for all owners of suitable local industrial land to contact the manager's office.

Bayonets Restore Cincinnati Peace

CINCINNATI (AP) — Police-backed by National Guardsmen carrying bayoneted rifles—restored an uneasy order in Cincinnati Negro neighborhoods today after a riot during the hour there were scattered.

Other than the two fires, rioting reported a relatively quiet morning. The riots were confined to the area around the University of Cincinnati campus and the downtown area.

Through the early morning hours there were scattered reports of fires, fighting and looting, but they dwindled after midnight when rioters were dispersed.

Earlier police feared the situation would get out of hand. Guardsmen moved into the riot areas after midnight on orders of Gen. James A. Rhodes.

Major Walter Bachrach said the situation was under control. He said his 800 men were unable to cope with the rioting. He said his 800 men were unable to cope with the rioting.

City officials were unable to pinpoint the cause of the rioting.

Shifty before order was restored, Police Chief Jacob Scheidt said "huge bands of marauders" were hitting in almost every direction in predominantly Negro areas.

Mayor Walter Bachrach said a respite returned to riot areas early today.

Damages to stores, autos and anything rioters could destroy will not be totaled for weeks, police said.

As Guardsmen blocked off the area, fire destroyed the block-long Modern Laundry and Cleaning Co. building in the Walnut Hills section. Police said the rioting started there.

Fire also demolished the Seybold Paper Co. warehouse. Firemen responded to about 100 fires during the night, and at most of them the firefighters were pelted with stones.

Guardians kept spectators and others at a distance to give firemen a free hand in fighting the laundry blaze.

It's Curtains For 3 Area Junkyards!

WETHERSFIELD (AP) — A dozen more junkyards and a town dump, not very pleasant on the eye, are slated to vanish at least from view—along Connecticut highways this summer.

The State Highway Department announced today that the curtains will go down on the junkyards and the dump. The "curtains" will be in the form of screening by planting, fencing or other means.

Area junkyards to be hidden from the public eye are in Hebron, Andover and Columbia. Others are in Brooklyn, Litchfield, Windham, Madison, Norfolk, Plymouth, Stoughton and two in New Milford. The dump and a deep river.

Plans and specifications will be prepared for the 13 screening projects so that they can be advertised within the next few months, the department said.

Cost of the projects will total \$200,000, of which the government will pay 75 per cent under the Federal Highway Beautification Act of 1960.

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'Have I Ever Lied?' Dodd Asks Senators

WASHINGTON (AP) — In an impassioned appeal to his fellow senators, Thomas J. Dodd asked today if any of them knew of any time he had lied, or cheated or broken his word to them.

The 60-year-old Connecticut Democrat, defending himself against charges of financial misconduct, pounded one fist against his other hand and cried:

"What has happened to the United States Senate if I can't look you in the eye and say this is a fact."

Dodd spoke to his own defense in the second day of debate on the Senate ethics committee's recommendation that he be censured for conduct that "tends to bring the Senate into disonor and discredit."

After a 14-month investigation, the bipartisan committee unanimously reported that Dodd had converted \$16,088 in political funds to his own use and had double-billed for travel expenses.

Dodd said he had nothing to do with billing the government for travel expenses also paid by private organizations, and declared that if his colleagues judged him a thief, they should expel him.

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Captured Slayer Says Escape to Prove Innocence

HARTFORD (AP) — Francis C. Smith, serving a life term for the 1949 slaying of a night watchman, says he fled from prison May 18 in an attempt to prove his innocence.

Smith said Tuesday in an interview with the Hartford Courant at the Barnstable House of Correction on Cape Cod.

Smith escaped from the minimum security prison in Eastford and was hunted until May 20, when police caught him in an apartment in Westbury, Mass.

He was then charged with the slaying of a finance company at Hyannis on Cape Cod that took place four days before he was captured.

A hearing on the armed robbery charge will be held Wednesday.

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Soviet Presses for U.N. To Order Israeli Retreat

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The Soviet Union pressed today for an emergency session of the U.N. General Assembly to take action against Israel amid speculation that Premier Alexei N. Kosygin might attend.

The feeling was widespread among Arab delegations that the Russians were promoting the assembly session primarily to divert attention from their failure to help the Arabs in the war. In line with this, Saudi Arabia delegate Jamil M. Baroudi commented that the Arabs, the result of an assembly session would be zero.

Gromyko's letter said that despite the Security Council's private resolutions, Israel had "seized further territories" from Egypt, Jordan and Syria.

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Sex Education, TB Tests Recommended for Schools

Institution of a coordinated program of sex education in the public schools and tuberculosis testing as a requirement for entrance into the schools were among a list of 12 policy recommendations presented to the Board of Education Monday night by Dr. Sylvia Heitrick.

Dr. Heitrick has served as school physician on an interim basis since last summer, but she recently submitted her resignation effective at the end of the school year, citing as her reason an inadequate amount of time to spend with her family.

She recently volunteered to draw up the list of health recommendations. After her presentation last night, the board directed School Superintendent William Curtis to prepare a policy statement for their implementation for action at its June 26 session.

A broad program of sex education should be started with kindergarten, and coordinated throughout the grades, to include specific concepts of sex and reproduction beginning at the upper elementary and junior high levels, Dr. Heitrick said.

She said the concepts should be taught to all students, not just those taking biology courses, and that beginning with junior high levels teachers giving such instruction should be specially trained.

In her contacts with pupils, she has been "appalled by their misconceptions and ignorance" of sex, the school physician noted, adding that there is "no doubt that the rates of pregnancy and venereal disease go down" when school programs of sex education are instituted.

Assistant Superintendent Ronald Scott agreed such a program should be built into the regular curriculum. Supervising the school curriculum is one of his major duties.

Scott said he will select three persons from the school system to receive training in sex education procedures that will be offered by the Hartford Community Council. "With an eye toward building a program into the curriculum."

The persons, whom he did not identify, will be chosen to represent the primary, intermediate and secondary school divisions, Scott said.

Dr. Heitrick's second recommendation—to require tuberculosis testing—is a continuation of a voluntary program she recently proposed and started for children in kindergarten and grade 7.

Through the testing this spring was voluntary, she told the board testing within the previous two years should be a requirement.

required, as recommended by the U.S. Surgeon General, tuberculosis testing should be mandatory for all personnel employed by the Board of Education. Accident policies should also be more specifically outlined, the board said.

Other recommendations included those for a coordinated program of thorough athletic physical exams, for discussion of the policy that allows tumbler students to help of physical education students, which she called "one of the disorders most and periodic physicals as recommended by the Board of Education."

At the conclusion of her presentation, Dr. Heitrick was praised by School Superintendent William Curtis for her "outstanding contribution" to the school system during her year of service.


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Long Defense of Sen. Dodd Upsets Censure Timetable

WASHINGTON (AP) — When Sen. Russell L. Long is presiding over the defense of Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, the Connecticut Democrat accused of financial misconduct, a timetable can go out the window.

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Long was on his feet much of the day, boasting he'll help win at least 60 senators to Dodd's side, claiming 12 are committed against censure now, challenging the charges lodged by the Senate ethics committee, counseling Dodd on his public relations.

Before he was done, the Louisiana Democrat had scrapped the schedule worked out by Senate leaders and offered the advice that led Dodd to make public a speech he never got to deliver the first day.

The speech was Dodd's 17-page reply to the ethics committee recommendation that he be censured. He delivers it to the Senate today.

Long said he had persuaded Dodd to release the speech for immediate publication. The senate had agreed unanimously to hear the Connecticut senator after two members of the ethics committee delivered their censure statements.

It didn't work that way. Long took the floor time and again to challenge ethics committee statements. He protested that other senators were taking too much time, delaying the moment when Dodd would speak his defense.

He defended Dodd's use of testimonial-produced funds for a limousine trip to Charles Town Race Track in West Virginia, with his son and some aides. Long said that came under the heading of employment relations.

Dodd's payment of federal income taxes with money from the same source was a valid political expense, Long said. "You can't run for the U.S. Senate with the tax collector on your back," he declared.

An aide peeked the blue cover of a tall cardboard chart, and Long used it to contend Dodd is \$8,500 in the red because of the expense of being a senator.

He lapsed in some praise for the ethics committee. "I would be willing to have my life tried with these men as a jury." Then he said they had fallen into error.

Finally, late in the day, Dodd got the floor. Seventy senators were on hand, and Long said that was not enough of an audience. "We are sitting here as a jury," he said.

Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield snapped back that he had missed one roll call himself because "I had to go out because I had to do something that ordinary mortals have to do on occasion."

But Mansfield put the audience issue to Dodd, who said he would just as soon postpone his defense speech until today.

"I'm tired," Dodd said. "I suppose everyone is. I am anxious to have everyone hear what I have to say."

"That took care of the timetable, but not the debate."

Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., was on his feet, angrily protesting Long's assertion that anyone who does not hear the entire debate—which may go on into next week—should not vote on censure.

"It'll be the judge of where my duties require me to be," said Morse.

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

Battered Ship in Malta Liberty Had Been Ordered To Move 80 Miles Offshore

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy ordered the USS Liberty to pull back to 80 miles off the Egyptian coast shortly before the communications vessel was attacked by Israeli jets and torpedoes, report Pentagon sources.

Senior officer indicated the order was issued to lessen the chances of attack. They said it was not clear whether the Liberty's captain, Cmdr. William McMonagle, had received the order or had begun to comply when the Israelis launched their assault last Thursday.

Israel has apologized for the attack, which it described as a mistake. Thirty-three U.S. sailors were killed in the raid and 175 were injured.

The United States has accepted the apology but rejected the explanation. The ship would be stationed 15 miles off the Gaza Strip, only three miles outside territorial waters.

Israeli sources also pointed out the attack took place in an area from which Egyptian warships had previously shelled Israeli troops in the Gaza Strip and in Arab.

Tuesday night the Israeli Embassy in Washington announced its government set up a board of inquiry to investigate the incident. A similar study now is being conducted by the U.S. Navy.

VALLETTA, Malta (AP) — The torpedoed U.S. Navy ship Liberty, an American victim of the Arab-Israeli war, crept into Malta's harbor today with orange cannon marks on her gray paint matching the colors of the dawn.

The 1,100-ton Liberty, victim of an Israeli air and sea attack in the eastern Mediterranean Thursday, was named in under her own power.

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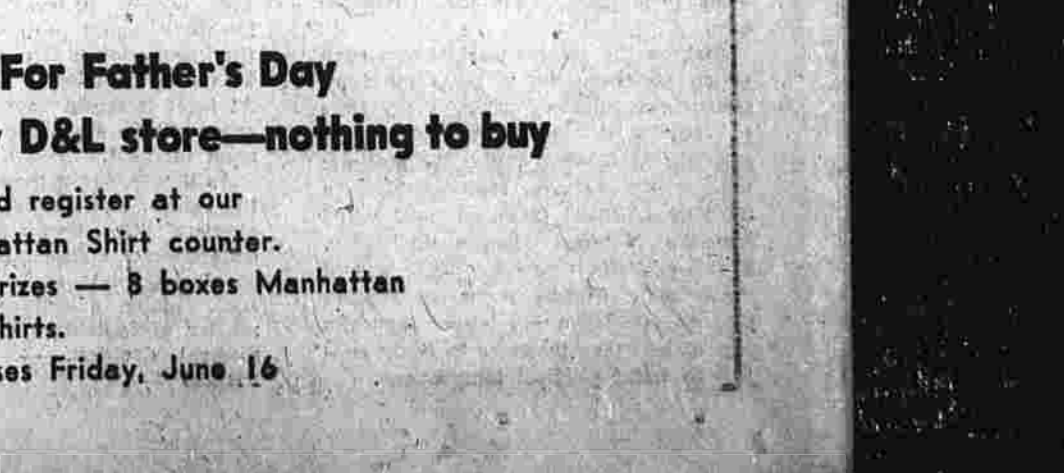

But it should not be forgotten that other nations and other peoples are never without certain potentialities of their own. It is not impossible, for instance, that the John Birch Society has, in these far United States of ours, more actual influence on the political scene, and a higher percentage of voters at its disposal than its possible National Democratic soulmate over in West Germany.

More We Have, More We Borrow

The Wall Street Journal the other day presented some hitherto unpublished statistics compiled by a Commerce Department economist, and the story these statistics tell is, first of all, the story of how weak and human we mortals be.

The statistics present the average American family income, at various stages between 1949 and 1966, and alongside these dollar figures, the dollar amount spent by the average American family for payment of interest and principal on debt, and, in a third tabulation, the percentage of the family income represented by the payment required to keep up with its debt.

From 1949 to 1966 the average family income more than doubled, from \$3,860 to \$8,300.

In the same period, the amount of money required to service the family's debt more than quadrupled, rising from \$441 to \$1,833.

And, in percentages, the amount of family income devoted to debt service has just about doubled, from 11.4 per cent to 22 per cent.

Most of us can read ourselves in these statistics. The more money we make, the more we live beyond it. The more cash we have coming in, the more we depend upon borrowing. Instead of using prosperity as an opportunity to show our debts and put ourselves on a cash basis, we interpret additional income as an increase in our sound borrowing power.

The more choice we have to get out of hock, the deeper into debt we take ourselves.

This is the human side of the story. It is the way human beings behave, in their individual living. It is the way they tend to run their industries and businesses too.

The same statistics do more than show us our own human nature. They are also alarming statistics. Inward which, in the words of the Rev. Martin Luther King, his appointment does honor our American society—toward the day when it will be truly "color-blind."

We are not yet at that state. We are still color-conscious. But, today the thrilling part of being color-conscious is that one can look at this latest Presidential appointment, know it does create history by placing a Negro on the Supreme Court of the United States for the first time, and know that we have, for all our tortures and resistance and trouble, come this historic long way in somewhat less than two decades.

Today happens to be June 14. Take another look at this latest Presidential appointment, and see if they are not waving, today, with something of a special extra flourish of freedom and promise, as if over a land more worthy of them than ever before.

Watching The Germans

State elections have now been held in another West German state, Lower Saxony this time, and again much is being made of the fact that the right-wing National Democratic Party has scored a certain percentage of the vote.

In Lower Saxony, the National Democrats got 7 per cent of the vote, as compared to 7.9 in Hesse, 7.4 in Bavaria, 5.5 in Schleswig-Holstein, and 6.9 per cent in the Rheinland-Palatinate.

In the West German system of voting, these percentages are enough to elect some members of the state parliaments. The National Democrats won 10 seats with their 7 per cent of the vote in Lower Saxony.

The reason the outside world pays so much excited attention to such relatively small percentages lies right on the surface of world history. It was with this kind of a party mouthing its kind of nationalistic sentiments, that Hitler accomplished his rise to power.

So the world keeps questioning the stability of this post-war Germany, and keeps asking itself whether it, too, will some day turn to the fanatic right and thus become, once again, a menace to civilization.

And, as the outside world keeps such watch on Germany, it gives itself an anxious, constant assurance every time it sees statistics about right-wing strength in Germany, like the statistic that, in the last five state elections, a total of 1,200,000 Germans have voted for the National Democratic Party.

Such ostentatious nervousness is part of the outside world's smug assumption that the Germans are worse than the rest of us, when it comes to being subject to weird political temptations.

The Abortion Bill Defeat

The House has now defeated a measure to liberalize the state's abortion laws. While the vote was quite close—a change of 7 votes would have affected the outcome—it is still unfortunate that a mother who has been raped or subjected to incest should be forced to bear the child against her wishes.

Perhaps that was the trouble with the proposed law as it went to a vote. It was a model law designed to return to physicians the practice of medicine in the respect. Thus it would have allowed abortions not only in cases of rape or incest, but also in those cases where there was a danger to the physical or mental health of the mother or where the child would be born with grave physical or mental defects.

While we believe the bill should have passed as it stood, a simpler bill providing only for those cases where the physical or mental health of the mother or where the child would be born with grave physical or mental defects, might have stood a better chance. It was widely believed that Governor Dempsey would have vetoed the abortion legislation if it passed both houses.

This may be true or may not be true. At least it would have forced the governor to take a position—an accomplishment in itself.

As it was, the responsibility rested on the House. The questions raised by the abortion bill subject themselves to a difference of opinion. But the obvious fact is that the National Democratic Party, such ostentatious nervousness is part of the outside world's smug assumption that the Germans are worse than the rest of us, when it comes to being subject to weird political temptations.

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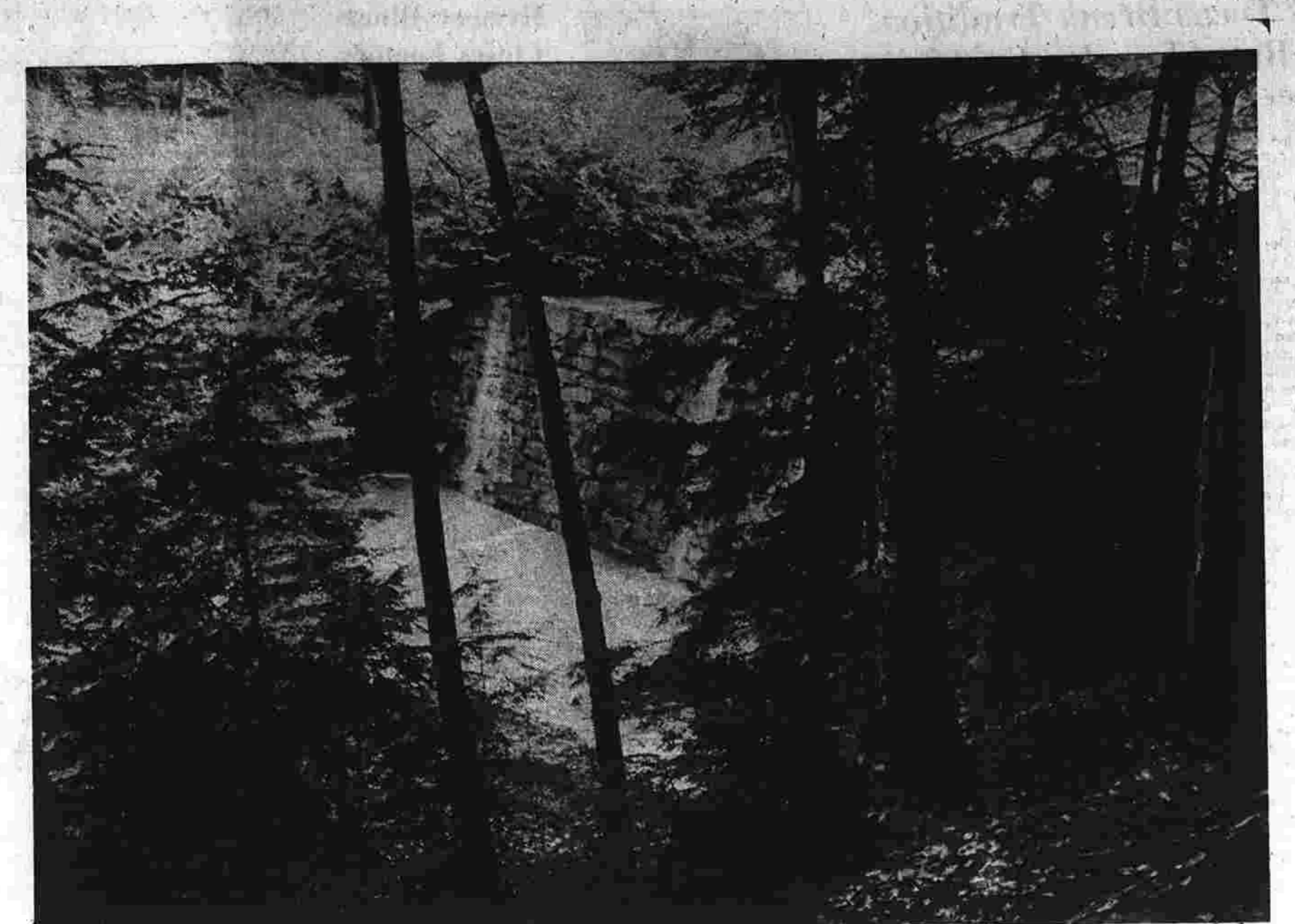

BEGRAD—What began in 1955 as strictly an economic reform is ending out of control in the direction of a peaceful political revolution to democratize Yugoslavia communism.

This is precisely the aim of industrial Communist liberals, currently battling entrenched bureaucrats in the state and party apparatus. "We are aiming ultimately for an open, democratic society," a leader of the party's liberal wing told us.

It should be stressed that these Communist liberals have no connection with or sympathy for the famed and persecuted critics of the Tito regime: Forman Vice President Milovan Djilas (recently released from prison) and Mihajlo Mihajlov (recently sentenced to prison).

Yet, to the mind the liberals privately criticize Tito for ordering Mihajlov's prosecution.

"The real enemy," says one liberal, "is not Mihajlov. It's the military and the bureaucrats." Indeed, even with Rankovic gone, these apparatchiks still dominate the party, attempting to frustrate reform.

Furthermore, the economic reform that spawned the political revolution is threatened by heavy unemployment it caused in its initial stages. If the reform fails, a reaction against political liberalism would be inevitable.

"The real enemy," says one liberal, "is not Mihajlov. It's the military and the bureaucrats." Indeed, even with Rankovic gone, these apparatchiks still dominate the party, attempting to frustrate reform.

With the issue very much in doubt, then, the U.S. ought to be doing all it can for the reform. The fact that it is not is a curious story worth telling in a future column.

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South Windsor Added Revenue for Town Seen from New Legislation

State aid to education, new construction for school buildings and public health under the new water pollution legislation will add additional revenue to the town as a result of the new legislative actions in the recent session of the state General Assembly.

Rep. Edwin A. Lassman, representative of South and East Windsor, said today that although state aid to the towns and municipalities was not as extensive as desired, the two towns are going to receive some additional help as a result of legislation passed by the recently adjourned general assembly.

In education, the increased grants to the towns are considerable. The legislature adopted a new formula for grants based on \$160 for the first 300 pupils and \$150 for each pupil thereafter based on average daily admission figures.

The additional grants, based on rapid growth within the past 10 years, remain with this new formula. The increased grant to South Windsor will amount to approximately \$125,000 per year based on an enrollment figure of 4,657 students.

In addition, a new construction grant formula, established by the General Assembly, increased the state aid from \$700 per pupil to \$800 per pupil, from \$1,100 to \$1,400 per pupil for secondary schools and from \$1,200 to \$1,500 per pupil for elementary schools and from \$1,300 to \$1,600 per pupil for high schools.

Not only will this apply to current construction, but there is a retroactive feature to the bill that will provide an additional \$20,000 per year for past construction. Rep. Lassman stated.

"There were many other educational bills that would provide aid to towns that entered certain programs for physically handicapped and disadvantaged children," Rep. Lassman noted.

In public health, the new water pollution bill provides a 30 per cent increase in state funds toward the cost of sewer treatment plant and mains.

The immediate benefit to South Windsor will provide for an open house June 19 from 9 to 11:30 a.m.

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Free Ammo Plan OK'd In Capital

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House has okayed for another year the program under which the military gives free ammunition to the National Rifle Association—strapped of the groups trying to influence gun-control legislation.

A defense appropriations bill approved by the House Tuesday included \$1.9 million to cover the cost of ammunition given by the Army's Division of Civilian Marksmanship—DCM—to 5,800 shooting clubs around the country.

These clubs all are affiliated with the NRA. An Army regulation permits only NRA members to get the ammunition.

NRA affiliates also are the only groups eligible for another DCM program under which military weapons are lent to civilian shooting clubs for practice and familiarization.

Because of its strong opposition to some gun control bills, the NRA is often accused of being the dominant force in a powerful national gun lobby.

The free ammunition and the lending of the guns are all part of long-standing Army policy. Men who learn about guns as civilians, the theory goes, make good marksmen when they go into uniform.

"These weapons and ammunition are used only for prescribed military courses of fire," NRA's public affairs director, John Rose, said. Every bullet fired is accounted for by NRA, he said.

The advisory body that guides the DCM program, the National Board for Promotion of Rifle Practice, also has a strong NRA flavor. Its members include the long-standing Army policy.

But the emphasis is being loosened. An attempt is being made by Secretary of the Army Stanley E. Resor to get a broader range of viewpoints on the board.

Directors Turn Down Additional Rec Funds

A request by Rec Director William Boyle for an additional appropriation of about \$15,000 for the rec department for 1967-68 was turned down last night by the board of directors, at least for the time being.

Boyle contended that the \$55,017 appropriated was based on incomplete estimates of what was spent during the current year.

Since 1964, the rec department had been combined with the park department, with one budget. Boyle claims that the estimates for 1966-67 rec department spending are not true figures. They had been estimated at \$51,475.

Boyle, in late February, had asked for \$116,848 for the 1967-68 year. He later cut the request to \$113,475. Weis had recommended \$104,501 for the department and the directors had cut it to the \$50,017 figure.

Mayor Nathan Agostinelli, at last night's informal meeting of the board, questioned Boyle at length and carried the brunt of the opposition to any new allocation.

He questioned Boyle, step by step, item by item, and then said, "I am not opposed to a good recreation program for Manchester but I am satisfied that with the proper programming and with the proper supervision, the \$50,000 is sufficient."

Agostinelli said that he was very disturbed at the rumors spread about town to the effect that the rec program will suffer unless more funds are allocated to the department.

He implied that "a scare campaign" is being circulated deliberately.

Boyle replied that rumors always spread where funds are concerned. Agostinelli countered that the rumors were spread even before the budget was adopted.

Agostinelli, still on the subject of a "scare campaign," asked Boyle why he had invited several people to last night's meeting.

Democratic Director William Fitzgerald repeated his charge that the GOP board had hurt town programs and employee morale by cutting Weis' recommended budget.

GOP Director William Schaller jumped to the defense of the board saying, "If we are only a rubber stamp we might as well resign the board."

Democrat Anthony Pietranolito, thinking out loud, said "I wonder now whether the department heads don't cushion their budget requests, knowing they will be cut and hoping for the best."

Schaller agreed, calling the process "a numbers game."

Boyle, with the backing of Weis, kept insisting that the 1967-68 estimate of rec department costs was a false figure, thus effecting the 1967-68 appropriation. He claimed that more than the \$51,475 estimated was spent on recreation in 1966-67 and that several sums reflected in park department expenditures rightfully belonged to the rec department.

Neither he nor Weis were able to come up with an audited figure, after almost 2 1/2 hours of probing.

Finally, Weis was instructed to produce a detailed and complete analysis of the same spent in the current fiscal year for rec activities and for park activities.

Agostinelli concluded the discussion by saying, "On the basis of our present information, I believe the budget is adequate, provided the department has good supervision and good direction."

"However," he added, "if the new report proves that the rec department needs more money, I will go along with a future allocation."

Board to Vote July 5 On Town Worker Pay

The Board of Directors will vote July 5 on approval or rejection of a wage agreement with Local 991, State, County and Municipal Employees, as negotiated by Town Manager Robert Weis.

The union has a four-year contract to Jan. 1, 1969, with a provision for yearly negotiation of wages.

Under state statutes, wage negotiations are conducted by the manager, with board approval of the agreement required.

The Local, originally, had asked for a 20-cent-an-hour increase. Following negotiations, an agreement had been reached with Weis for a 15-cent-per-hour raise.

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Board Delays Meeting Over Housing Site

It was the consensus of the board of directors last night that a request of the MIBAC Corp. for a joint meeting with the board, the Manchester Redevelopment Agency and the Manchester Housing Authority be postponed.

MIBAC Corp. had asked for the meeting to explore the subject of apartment housing in the North End Renewal Area.

The MIBAC has approved a parcel at the northwest corner of the relocated N. Main and N. School Sts. for the construction of about 75 units of housing for the elderly.

The purpose of the GOP figures was to show that the 15-cent-per-hour provision in the 1967-68 General Fund budget was a more favorable increase than any in the last 10 years.

Whatever agreement is approved by the board will be retroactive to July 1 of this year, whenever it is approved.

If no approval is given on July 5, the agreement will be renegotiated. In that event, the members of Local 991 will be paid on the terms of the 1966-67 agreement until approval is given for a new scale.

Although the Republican directors did not commit themselves last night, their questions and their attitudes hinted at possible approval of the 20-cent agreement on July 5.

St. Bridget Church may give the town about two acres of land which borders the south end of Union Pond at N. School St., according to the Rev. John Delaney, pastor.

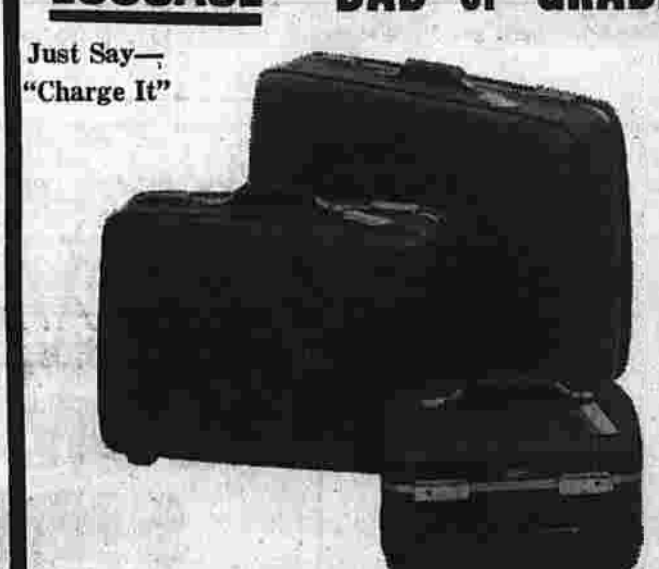

First Negro Nomination Marshall Seen Certain To Get Confirmation

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's appointment of Solicitor General Thurgood Marshall to the Supreme Court is the first Negro to be named to a post of national importance.

Johnson's announcement Tuesday that he is nominating Marshall, 58, to succeed retiring Associate Justice Tom C. Clark surprised neither the clerk general's critics nor his supporters.

A senator who maintains close relations with the President said he felt certain Clark's successor would be either a Negro or a woman.

"That man is going to be first in everything he can," the senator said of the President. "It'd be willing to bet that if there is another vacancy, we'll have a woman member of the court."

White House officials indicated they were uncertain about the reaction the nomination would receive in the Senate and were prepared for any opposition from long-time segregationists and, perhaps, from some others who may have been disturbed by the so-called black power movement.

However, they said Johnson looked upon Marshall as a symbol of Negro progress through full implementation of legal processes, as contrasted with violence.

Johnson, they said, had been thinking about Marshall as a potential Supreme Court justice for a long time and has been mulling that the emergence of the black power stalwarts might work against his choice.

But Johnson said he could not stand aside and lose the momentum they said he has gained through persistent espousal of the Negro cause.

"President Johnson is to be greatly commended for not bowing to the weighted forces of racism in the nation and making this appointment on the basis of merit and not race," said King.

Whitney Young Jr., executive director of the National Urban League, termed the appointment "the most significant event in our generation."

Referred to as "the NAACP's chief legal officer for the past 30 years," Young is executive director of the National Urban League and has been in charge of the NAACP.

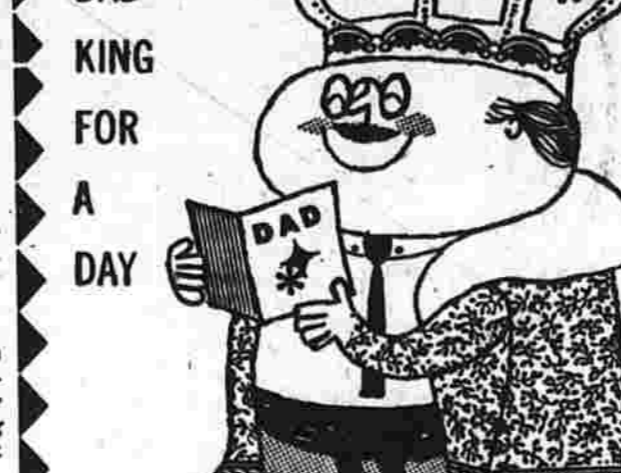

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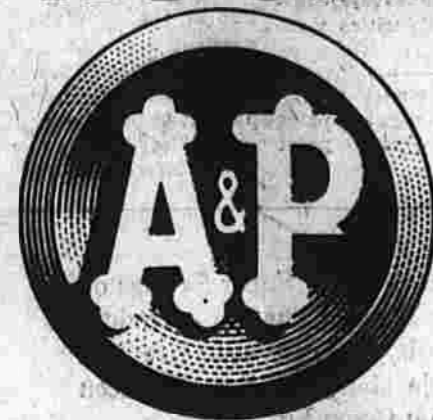
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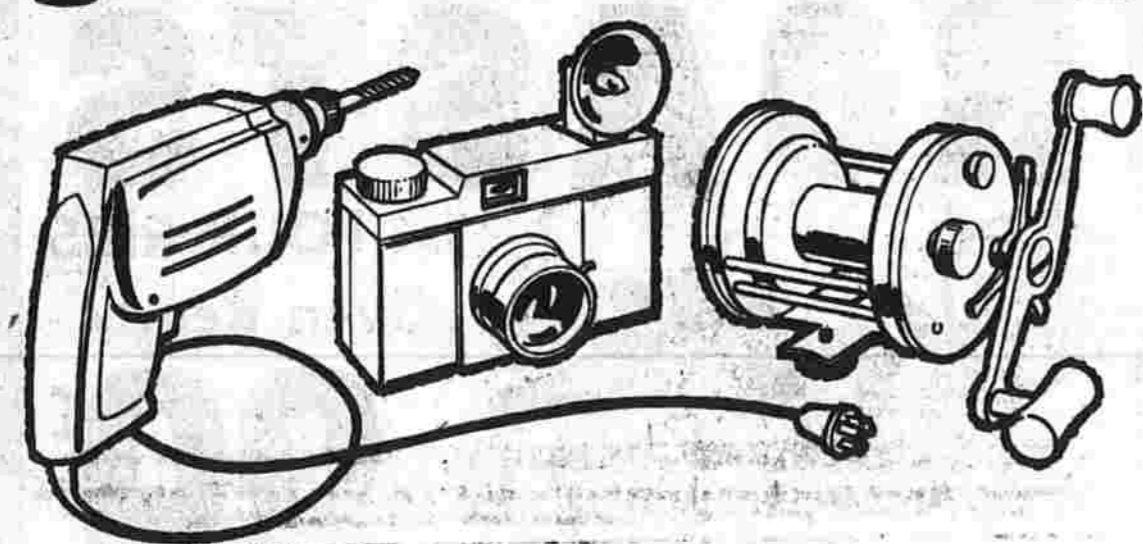

Cairo Places Top Priority On Military

CAIRO (AP) - Egypt today placed top priority on rebuilding its armed forces as evacuated soldiers arrived home from the Sinai front after grueling marches across the desert. "The new organization of the armed forces takes first place in importance among the tasks confronting us," declared Al Gumburria, official publication editor of the Arab Socialist Union, Egypt's only political party. "We have lost the battle but our potential and determination can assure us victory in the coming battles." The director of the Egyptian Military Academy, in a new conference, launched an urgent call for new officer students. There were also reports that some staff officers, technical specialists who had been sent home only a few days ago, were being recalled for military duty. Returning soldiers charged that Israeli napalm bombs and strafing provided the initial shock to the lightning victory over Egypt. Egyptian authorities maintained strict silence about the country's casualties and materiel losses. "It was hell on earth," one of the soldiers was quoted as saying in a letter to his family home near here. "There were planes coming from all sides and there was this jolly fire all over."

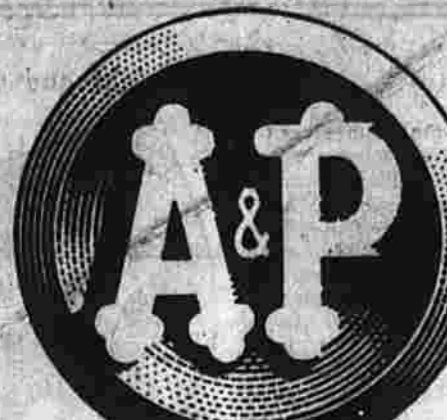

DUC PHO, Vietnam (AP) - From 20 feet away, the Communist guerrilla took aim with his automatic rifle on an American squad leader. Sgt. David Tygret, 25, Sunnyvale, Calif., saw the guerrilla raise his weapon. He dropped to one knee for better cover. The bullet hit a hand grenade Tygret was carrying in a belt pouch. It set the explosive on fire but missed the fuse which contained the blasting cap. The grenade did not go off. In an instant, the bullet ricocheted off an nearby rock and slammed back into Tygret's right leg. Tygret grabbed the flaming grenade, tossed it as far away as he could, and ran to a prone position. He fired with his M16 rifle at the guerrilla who had wounded him. Tygret saw the guerrilla jerk back away from his gun, indicating he was hit. His other guerrillas apparently carried him away for his body was not far from the area. Only his weapon was left there. It turned out to be a U.S. made Browning automatic rifle. Tygret crawled back 80 feet to an American defensive position on Hill 500, defended by 60 men. The rest of Tygret's squad pushed ahead. At the top of the hill, two men grabbed Tygret underneath the armpits and took him to the command post. A medic dressed his wounds as he told the company commander, Jim Joiner, 30, Tampa, Fla., what was happening up ahead. Joiner had his radio operator call for a helicopter to remove Tygret. Asked how his leg felt, the sergeant said: "It smarted just a little. Then he had another close shave. American artillery was supporting the paratroopers; some shells fell near the command post. A piece of shrapnel smashed the front of Tygret's helmet, chipping off part of the helmet liner. Tygret escaped with only a scratch on the forehead. Thirty minutes after the call for a helicopter for Tygret, it arrived and hovered 70 feet above an open spot in the trees. Crewmen tossed a jacket with straps which criss-crossed the shoulders and legs. This was placed on Tygret and the straps were secured to the ring. A winch pulled Tygret into the helicopter. He had it made.

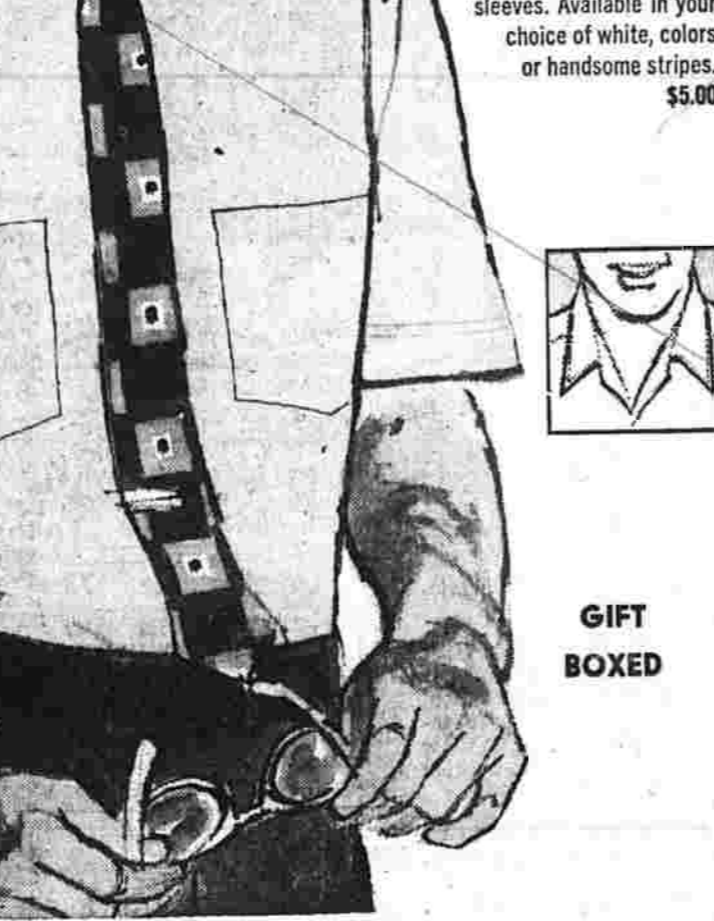

Hal Boyle TV 'Nazi' Fled Before Hitlerism

NEW YORK (AP) — Life is an adventure in irony, and this is particularly true in the case of Werner Klemperer, the actor. Werner, son of Otto Klemperer, the famed symphony conductor, and his family fled their native Germany in 1933 because of the rise of Hitlerism.

Now Werner, who later served three years as a corporal in the American Army, makes a tidy dollar playing a bumbling Nazi officer, Col. Wilhelm Klink, on the CBS television comedy program, "Hogan's Heroes."

Although he has had a lifelong hatred of war and violence, nobody since the late Eric von Stroheim has come along who can play a foreign military villain with quite the best-clicking authenticity of Klemperer.

Werner finds it hard to define just why he can do this so well. "Acting is largely a matter of accurate observation," he said. "I suppose, I must have seen many German officers when I was a boy in Berlin, but" — he added wryly — "I don't remember ever shaking hands with one."

"I don't find it a particular psychological hurdle, to play Nazi officers, so long as I can be very sure that I can give them the kind of dimension I feel they deserve."

"But I don't want ever to play a good Nazi, and I don't want to act in Germany. No, not now."

Something of a specialist in unympathetic roles, Werner has also played Bulgarian villains, Dutch villains and Russian villains, but his big desire is to play an Oriental villain.

"With my bald head and a little makeup I think I'd be very interesting," he said.

After fleeing Germany, the Klemperers spent two years in Switzerland, then came to California where the father became conductor of the Los Angeles Symphony.

Werner, then 13, learned enough English in the process to enter high school. He appeared headed for a career as a pianist, but gave it up.

"I didn't have the desire," he said. "Desire and talent usually go hand in hand. If the desire isn't there, chances are that the talent isn't there either."

Werner chose the theater after wartime work with an Army Special Service unit led by actor Maurice Evans.

Klemperer earned a meager living here as an usher, waiter and art gallery guide before landing Broadway roles with Tallulah Bankhead, Charles Laughton and Jose Ferrer. He has also appeared in 15 films and scores of television plays.

By and large, he is now one of the most solvent villains and character actors in show business.

Urbane and sophisticated, Werner at 45 feels he has carved himself a comfortable niche and says he has no desire to be either rich or famous.

Press Freedom Broadened By Newest Court Decision

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court has broadened the freedom of the press to report the activities of public figures involved in newsworthy public events.

The court took this significant step Monday as it threw out a \$200,000 libel judgment won by former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker against The Associated Press in a Texas court.

In the main opinion, Justice John M. Harlan said there was no evidence of personal malice, incompetency or malice in the way AP reported Walker's activities at the University of Mississippi campus at Oxford in 1962.

At the same time the court upheld by a 4-3 vote a \$400,000 libel judgment won by Wallace Butts, former athletic director and football coach at the University of Georgia, against the Curtis Publishing Co.

Harlan wrote "the evidence is ample to support a finding of highly unreasonable conduct constituting an extreme departure from the standards of investigation and reporting ordinarily adhered to by responsible publishers."

In the Walker case, five justices, led by Chief Justice Earl Warren, combined to extend the principle of qualified libel immunity, first announced in 1964 in the case of public officials, to accounts about prominent persons who "often play an influential role in ordering society."

"Our citizenry," said Warren, "has a legitimate and substantial interest in the conduct of such persons and freedom of the press to engage in uninhibited debate about their involvement in public issues and events is as crucial as it is in the case of public officials."

This view was supported by Associate Justice Hugo L. Black, William O. Douglas, William J. Brennan Jr. and Byron R. White.

Black and Douglas said the court should have gone further and adopted a rule that "the First Amendment was intended to leave the press free from the harassment of libel judgments."

However, Black said, he and Douglas marshaled behind Warren's opinion to form a majority and decide the Walker case under the doctrine laid down by the court in 1964.

Georgia's plays to Paul "Bear" Bryant, Alabama football public official cannot recover damages for a libelous statement relating to his official duties unless he can prove actual malice. This means he has to prove the statement was made with knowledge that it was false or with reckless disregard of whether it was true or false.

"To me," Warren wrote, "discrimination between 'public figures' and public officials' and adoption of separate standards of proof for each has no basis in law, logic, or first amendment policy."

The damage judgment was based on two AP dispatches. Butts swept the campus the night of Sept. 30, generated by the admission of a Negro, James Ray, into the university. The AP reported Oct. 2 and 3 that Walker "assumed command of the crowd" and "led a charge of students against federal marshals."

The marshals were at the campus to see that an order by the U.S. Circuit Court in New Orleans that Meridian be admitted was carried out.

All five justices agreed the judgment won by Walker in a state court in Fort Worth in 1964 should not stand. This strongly indicates none of the 14 other actions instituted by the former general against AP in various newspapers would be upheld by the high court — if they ever reach it.

"The damages sought by Walker aggregated \$33,250,000," Harlan, joined by Associate Justices Tom C. Clark, Potter Stewart and Abe Fortas, said in the AP's account of Walker's activities "was news which required immediate dissemination."

"The Associated Press," he said, "received the information from a correspondent who was present at the scene of the event and gave Walker's indication of being trustworthy and competent."

Further, Harlan said, reporter Gan Savell's dispatches "would not have seemed unreasonable to one familiar with General Walker's prior publicized statements on the underlying controversy."

House Panel O.K.'s Lower Debt Ceiling

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Ways and Means Committee proposed today a 22-bill debt ceiling will drop automatically to \$38 billion, some \$42 billion below the actual debt.
