The Worship Of Force The professional experts of the United States were "surprised" by two things about the Chinese hydrogen bomb explosion last Saturday. They were surprised by its size, which had an explosive force equal to several

million tons of TNT. And they were surprised by the speed with which Communist China got itself ready to set off its first hydrogen bomb. The Chinese did it at least six months shead of the schedule our experts had calculated, from their knowledge and appraisal of Chinese science and technology.

Where our professional experts in such matters were "surprised" by the development over in China, the Chinese explosion has other results. It energizes the believers in a United States antimissile defense system into a new urgency of demand for immediate action. It dismays the plain civilian, perhaps, with its picture of a world speedily approaching a state of nuclear anarchy.

Such a surprise, such sense of emergency, such a sense of dismay, all come upon us as if they were the children of one particular explosion over in China.

Yet there were those to whom this kind of future possibility was no surprise, but an inevitability, way back 21 years ago. There were those who felt the presence of a world-course deciding emergency then. There were those who experienced then all the dismay possible over the kind of future the world would have under the reign of the bomb.

It was then, 21 years ago, that the Fruman administration at Washington was deciding, without very much apparent anguish or trouble, or power prophecy, not to try to leave the atomic bomb in its Hiroshima and Nagasaki compartment, but to take it out and begin new tests and demonstrations out in the Pacific. That decision-for us to continue testing and improving the bomb while we still thought it to be our own monopoly-was the decision, and the choice of the world way of life, which decreed that the day would come when some feared and perhaps undisciplined giant on the other side of the world would be playing with the destructive power of the weapon we had

It is doubtful that we had any real choice, back in 1946. Trying to put the atomic bomb back in the box, and trying to keep it there, would probably have been a futile endeavor. We could not, then, rid ourselves of our conviction that force was the last and ultimate resort for the policy of men and

We have not yet rid ourselves of that concept, that foundation stone for na tional behavior and policy. The other day, with the nightmare of immediate world war started in the Near East just lifted from our minds, with the gathering of the world clans at the United Na tions a possible opening for diplomacy. the United States showed where its ultimate reliance had been placed by unleashing the most powerful and massive air attacks of the entire war on North

In our action, in our policy, then, we believe in force, ahead of and above all other elements of policy. If we ever have to choose just one element of policy alone, the choice is always force. That is why, in 1946, we placed new bomb tests ahead of any real effort to put the bomb back in its box, and why, in 1967, our idea of how to exbloit a possibility for peace in Vietnam

It never occurs to us that this is actually the greatest no-win policy in history. It never occurs to us that we ourselves help make the kind of world we face. It never occurs to us that we, back in 1946, made inevitable the world of nuclear anarchy which is now mushrooming around us. We never dream that those who choose to live by force are thereby also choosing the manner of life for others, and the manner of death

As for our own place in this chain of linked inevitabilities, we are neither worse nor better than others. We are merely, for the moment, more powerful.

In many ways this new mood is as much emotional as rational. Hardly more than a week ago everybody was terrified that the Middle East crisis would really explode, and that in addition to the other continuing wars, one hot and one cold, the country-and the world-would be faced with a general conflagration over Israel.

Now fears have been dispelled, thanks to the humbling of the Egyptians and have been added, but so swift was the Israeli victory that the danger of a world blow-up has been removed.

Not surprisingly, the resulting relief amounts almost to euphoria, and it is at least understandable if some of it has spilled over to lighten the mood about the other trouble spots. If nothing else, we've all had a dramatic demonstration of how quickly the most despairing sit-

A psychologist, then, would have no difficulty explaining the new mood about Vietnam and our relations with the Soviets. Men's spirits always revive once snatched from the immediate But if this new mood of optimism is

mainly an emotional reaction, it is not The new optimism about negotiating settlement in Vietnam is certainly harder to justify. Yet the reasoning is

interesting and the world is so crazy that anything might happen. The argument here is that it is Russia, not China, which is the arsenal for North Vietnam; that without Russian arms Hanoi could not sustain the war and that the Soviets would like to find a way to get disentangled. The reasoning behind this last proposition follows an analogy with the Middle Bast. Tha s, just as the Russians wanted to liquidate their position there once they say their side would not win, so now in Vietnam where it is at last plain their side

All this may be spinning daydreams but it is plausible enough for the State Department to be taking a serious look at a plan submitted by two knowledgeable outsiders, one of them a retired general with long experience in dealing with world politics.
