Coventry School Board Backs Talk on Pacifism

The board of education has decided a talk on pacifism at Coventry High School, saying "pacifism" should be considered as one of the major problems and issues facing our society. The defense was contained in a letter to William Smith of Woods Lane read last week at the board meeting. The entire text of the letter was not released until now, since the board felt Smith should receive the letter first.

In its letter, dated June 16, the board acknowledged receipt of Smith's letter, and explained that the teaching unit, "The Only Defense Is Peace," was designed to be a part of the social studies course at Coventry High School who from May 31 to June 9, 1967, discussed the implications of war, defense against it, and the alternatives to war.

"It was taught in connection with an extensive unit in CIVIL DISOBEDIENCE and non-violence by Mr. George Coon, the chairman of the social studies department, and Mr. Milton Wilda, principal of Coventry High School."

The letter continues, "In connection with this unit, a number of speakers were invited to address the students on the various aspects of the problem. Their names, together with the subject of their talks, appear on the syllabus for the unit which was prepared by Mr. Raymond DuCharme, principal of the high school social studies department. All of these lectures were attended by members of the high school administration and in some instances by one or more board members."

Pacifism Explained
In his letter to the board, Smith had specifically expressed his concern over the subject of pacifism, which he said was not being taught in his segment. Chuck Mathis of Voluntown appeared to explain the pacifist philosophy, using as his principal example Gandhi and the philosophy of non-violence as Gandhi explained it.

Smith argued that the pacifist philosophy advocates the burning of draft cards, which is punishable by law for five years in jail. Smith felt that direct combat before his and said advocates of this philosophy was "corrupting" and "anti-American." This son, he felt was merely explaining, not pointing out, in 13 years old and not even enrolled in the current problems course but nevertheless exposed to this segment of the unit.

Smith pointed out that his son is in effect, a "captive audience" since he must, by law, attend school until he is 16 years of age.

In his reply to Smith, the board of education says it "feels strongly" the Coventry schools should help prepare students to live in a democratic society. Therefore, it considered it essential that students, and especially those who are about to enter either the world of work or of college, become acquainted with some of the major problems and issues facing our society.

Teachers' Responsibility
"To this end, it employs the services of teachers who, in its judgment, are competent to determine what are some of the crucial issues in our society, which ones ought to be discussed by students and at what grade level. At the same time, it suggests that teachers have

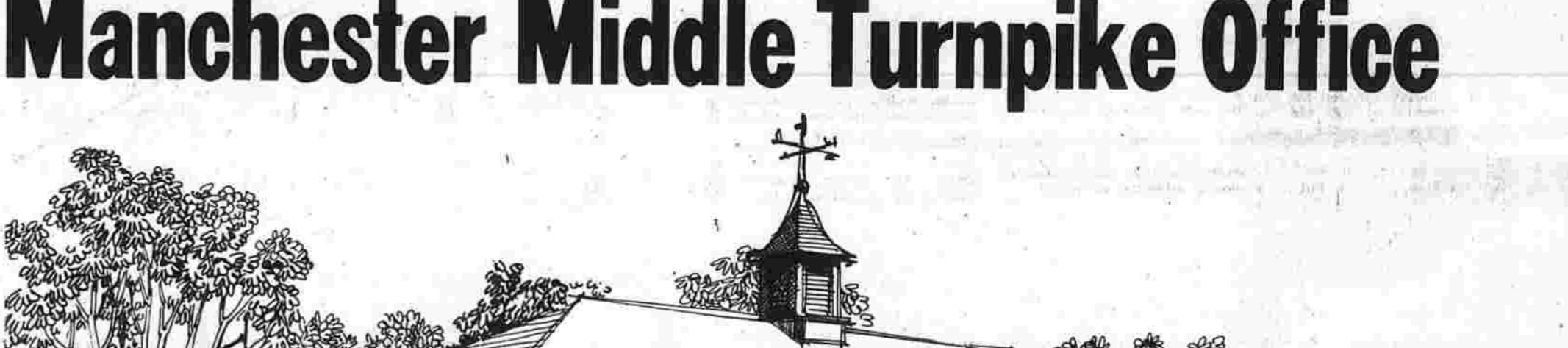

Massive Test Urged On Heart-Food Link

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — Heart specialists urged today that a massive test involving 40,000 to 60,000 men to answer a critical health question.

Would changes from typical American food habits really reduce the nation's leading killer disease?

Many experts believe that such changes — especially cutting down on intake of fat and cholesterol — do help prevent coronary attacks.

It is known that the amount of cholesterol in the blood stream can be reduced this way. The outstanding question is whether this step then saves lives.

Getting the answer would call for enlisting a small army of volunteers. Half the men would change their food habits somewhat and stick with it for five years. The other half would, for comparison, go on eating as they do now.

In five years later, men who changed their food habits would have fewer heart attacks than those who didn't change it.

It would be clear proof that most Americans have been eating their way toward heart attacks. As should not and need not.

But would many thousands of men, and their wives, agree to give up some old habits for new and stay with it?

The answer to that is yes, the executive committee of diet and heart disease, told the American Medical Association today.

It reported results of a two-year feasibility study preparing the way for the huge experiment.

Some 1,000 middle-aged men took part, some changing food habits and others not, and only 10 per cent dropped out of the study.

The blood cholesterol of those who ate special diets came down by an overall average of 11 per cent. Cholesterol is a body material involved in the narrowing and blocking of heart arteries.

The committee decided that the longer and larger scale study should be planned and started as soon as possible in view of the current epidemic of heart attacks.

It would cost perhaps 50 million to 60 million dollars, but the answer would be cheap at twice the price," said Dr. E. Bruce Astor, of Baltimore, presiding results of the diet-heart study.

The committee report will be given to the National Heart Institute, the financing agency, with the recommendation that the larger study be undertaken, setting it to would take at least two years.

The feasibility study did not involve enough men or continue long enough, to determine whether men on special diets really fared better in escaping heart attacks, committee members said.

Other influences besides diet are believed involved in promoting susceptibility to heart attacks, including cigarette smoking, high blood pressure, diabetes, and perhaps stress and state reformatories, according to the Encyclopedia Britannica.

The feasibility study, costing about \$3,000,000, involved men

living their normal lives in Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Minneapolis, St. Paul, and Oakland, Calif., and from institutional patients at the Parthout, Minn., state school for the blind.

The study supplied several different kinds of diets, two of them containing specially prepared meals, ice cream, pasta, cheese spreads and other foods that were altered in fat content. The men or their wives bought the special foods from special food centers, and neither the investigators nor the men consuming the foods knew which kind of food they were on.

The two experimental diets reduced the usual intake of saturated or hard fat, which come mainly from meat and dairy products, and reduced intake of cholesterol while increasing the amount of polyunsaturated fats. All the diets looked alike and tasted the same.

The report said there was no problem obtaining volunteers and that the food industry cooperated fully in preparing the special fat-modified foods.

The principal investigators in this study were Drs. Benjamin M. Baker, the Johns-Hopkins University School of Medicine, Baltimore; Frederick J. Stare, Harvard University School of Public Health, Boston; Mass.; Ansel Keys, University of Minnesota, and Irvine H. Page, Cleveland Clinic Foundation, chairman.

Dempsy Signs 115 Bills Testimonial Dinner Ban Among Host of Measures

HARTFORD (AP)—Gov. John Dempsy signed into law 115 bills Tuesday, including a measure strengthening Connecticut's campaign reporting requirements and banning political testimonials aimed for profit.

Other bills of major interest signed into law call for an increase in the state's share of local welfare costs from 50 per cent to 75 per cent; an additional 10 men for the state police department; a ban on the use of professional strike-breakers and the establishment of 30-hour procedures for arresting individuals.

The campaign financing bill will take effect Jan. 1, 1968. Its requirements include: —Limiting testimonial dinners (for fund-raising purposes only) to the period from Jan. 1 of an election year to three months after the election. —Reporting of full names and addresses of contributors whose aggregate contribution totals \$15 or more. —The filing of financial reports within 30 days after an election, plus subsequent reports at 90-day intervals until the books are balanced. —Requiring that records be kept on file with the secretary of state for the duration of the office being sought.

Guerrillas Winning War In Downtown Rio Streets

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — Guerrilla warfare is raging in the streets of downtown Rio, and the guerrillas are winning.

The guerrillas are Rio's ubiquitous street peddlers, known as caixos. For months they have successfully resisted the com-

pressed onslaughts of police and press campaigns.

Selling everything from imported contraband stainless steel razor blades and cigarettes to cheap plastic combs and mirrors with pump-tire backing, they clog downtown streets and force pedestrians into the gutter and the jaws of traffic.

Along some blocks the caixos are lined up next to each other from corner to corner, hawk- ing their wares. Some set up trays of merchandise on upended crates while others have only a few items to offer, waving their hands to attract passers-by.

Police have staged several campaigns against them, but the caixos have organized their own defense and early warning systems. Lookouts are posted, and when the police arrive, the guerrilla force melts into the crowd. When the coast is clear, they filter back.

When the police launched "Operation Blue," the caixos countered with "Operation Viet Cong," sneaking away into the narrow streets and alleys that crisscross downtown Rio.

Taken together, the caixos are a veritable department store. They offer sweaters and socks, housewares, lemons and shoepeppers are furious at the caixos for taking up space in

front of their window displays, and pedestrians resent being pushed aside by the caixos. Newspaper carriers are clamoring for action, and the police are trying, but without success.

Most are men, but there are some women and even children. Like all modern businessmen, they believe in advertising, but instead of newspapers or radio which has avoided the battle thus far. But the caixos aren't worried. In fact they are offered.

Bolton Community Specialist Urges An Overhaul of Town Plan

The planning commission study committee for historic sections of town.

Population Estimate: He noted that in 1940 Bolton had 277 dwelling units; in 1955, 387, a 122 per cent increase, and that the plan needs a complete overhauling in the form of comprehensive review by a consultant.

Andrew B. Schilling of the community development division of the Connecticut Development Commission met with the planning commission Thursday night. He described what should be done under the federal "G.I. Bill" program to bring the town up to date in its overall planning and zoning.

Schilling said that the complete review by a consulting firm would cost about \$10,000. The federal government is paying two-thirds, and the town, the remainder. He suggested interviewing three to five consulting firms.

The planning commission has apparently been of the opinion that a less comprehensive updating would suffice, but Schilling said after the meeting that "you need to have a strong foundation" and that the present town plan, finished in 1958 and known as the "pilot plan" is not sufficient. It contains 13 pages, less than any other town in the state, Schilling said.

Some of the items deemed necessary by Schilling in his outline of needs are available, but not incorporated in the town plan. Some of his suggestions are ideas that pop up now and then in various meetings as something that should be done sometime.

North-South Road: One of these is another north-south road, and the possibility of continuing Toomey Lane through to Rt. 6 has been mentioned from time to time.

Equipped with a chart describing the proposed planning program, Schilling showed those present at the meeting what would be needed—such as maps, population, and what would be the result. The result would be a new comprehensive plan of development, with revised subdivision and zoning regulations to correspond with it.

More specialized studies should concentrate on a plan for the town center and neighborhood analyses (most notably in the Bolton Lake area, where "some blight is present," he said).

Schilling also called for standards for parks, streets and school areas, which are not covered in the pilot plan and for a review of commercial development along Rt. 6.

He said that the town should have an open-space plan correlated with the Capital Region open-space plan, unaware that this is being worked on by the conservation commission.

Vernon Committee Asked to Conduct Town Buildings Use Study

A disagreement over duties of the public building committee was resolved at Monday night's meeting of the Board of Representatives.

New Insanity Rule Applied, Stabbing Suspect Acquitted

HARTFORD (AP) — Connecticut's newly-adopted definition of legal insanity was applied for the first time Tuesday, resulting in the acquittal of Richard E. Roy, 27, on a charge of manslaughter.

After a 47-minute trial, Assistant State Attorney George D. Stoughton asked Judge Raymond J. Devlin to enter a finding of not guilty, yielding to Roy's contention that he was insane when he fatally stabbed his wife, Nancy, 15 times on Oct. 28, 1963.

The verdict came largely as the result of testimony by two psychiatrists, Dr. Robert C. Doherty of Hartford and Dr. Harold A. Bancroft of Farmington. Both testified that the defendant was legally insane according to the standard established by the legislature June 15.

The new test specifies that a person is not criminally responsible for his conduct if, at the time a crime was committed, he was suffering from a mental disease or defect which rendered him incapable either to appreciate the wrongfulness of his conduct or to conform his conduct to the requirements of law.

This standard replaces the century-old "McNaughton rule" which holds that a man is insane if he does not know "the nature or quality" of his act or if he does not know that his act is wrong.

The psychiatric witnesses testified that Roy would be legally insane under either of these tests.

A fellow employee of Roy had testified that the defendant had suffered hallucinations for days prior to the slaying. William R. Tuttle of Hartford said he had seen Roy in get treatment at the medical department of the East Hartford Fruit & Winery Plant where they both worked.

Judge Devlin ordered that Roy be sent to Meriden State Hospital pending a court hearing on his present mental condition. The stabbing occurred on the Roy's mobile home in Henry's Trailer Park, East Windsor.

Army Mutiny Threat To Arabian Freedom

LONDON (AP) — The British government's plans to leave Aden and the South Arabian Federation in January were threatened today by a mutiny in the South Arabian army and the Aden police which resulted in the death of 18 Britons and an undetermined number of Arabs. Twenty-three Britons also were wounded before calm was reported Tuesday night to the Aden area in the southwest corner of the Arabian Peninsula. A curfew was in force in the Little Aden section today, with British families ordered to remain in their homes and schools closed. The protestor was reported generally quiet, but a general strike was under way and there was considerable tension. The belief was widespread in London that British government would have to take a new look at its plans, announced Monday, to give independence about Jan. 9 to the federation made up of Aden State and 16 Sultanates and sheikhdoms strung along the southwest coast of Arabia.

HRC Adopts Guides for Youth Work

A statement of purpose to guide youth problems, was adopted by the Human Relations Commission (HRC) last night.

The statement basically calls for HRC concentration on creative rather than corrective objectives.

"Affirming our continuing interest in Manchester youth, our concern for their welfare and our support of their positive contributions as citizens in Manchester and in the wider human community, now and in the future, the primary objective of the commission is to concentrate not merely in the area of delinquency and crime, but rather to emphasize the creative possibilities in the area of recreation in community life, its involvement in the changing concerns of the modern world, and growth toward mature and responsible adulthood."

The statement of purpose was proposed by the Rev. Felix Davis, chairman of the HRC, and seconded by Rev. Robert Dugan.

The HRC already has endorsed the creation of a Youth Jury and last night approved a recommendation to the Town Council, formed by students of Manchester's three high schools—Manchester, East Catholic and Cheney Tech.

The HRC listed two other recommendations pending more complete evaluation.

The first, recommended by Robert Dugan, supported by the Rev. Mr. Davis, would be on the issue of the summer heat, the heat wave and the over-all discomfort by the heat. He said that the "heat wave" has not been discussed.

The other recommendation was for HRC backing of a Manchester Music Festival, to be held in August, with the sponsorship of the town recreation department and the Dept. of Culture. The latter is a project of Second Congregational Church.

The Music Festival would be a summer edition of the Newport Music Festival and would feature folk music and rock and roll.

Competitions would be held for bands from within and outside the community, and prizes would be awarded.

The HRC will hear a complete report on these projects at its next meeting, July 18.

The HRC's Youth Committee called the members to consider one other recommendation, for a date further in the future, the creation of a Juvenile Division in the Police Department.

The item was not discussed last night.

U.S. Believes 50 Red MIGs Have Been Sent to Egypt

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. intelligence information indicates that 50 Red MIG fighter jets have been sent to Egypt as a kind of loan to provide security for the country, virtually stripped of its air force in the recent Middle East war.

American sources also said replacement of Egyptian tanks has been relatively slight so far.

They disputed claims of Israeli military sources here that the Soviet Union and other Communist countries have been pouring in equipment and sup-

ply flow was considerably less than pictured by the Israeli check of the reported shipment of tanks resulted in the conclusion there were only five of the armored vehicles delivered by the Algerian vessel to Egypt.

Town Fathers Act to Press Collection of Overdue Taxes

The measure is being introduced on a rigorous program of back tax collection, according to actions taken at Monday night's meeting of the Board of Representatives.

A motion calling for the "tax collector to become active in the issuing of back tax warrants and selling of property for taxes where necessary" was unanimously passed by the board.

The motion was introduced by Rep. John Daigle.

Spelman said he would make personal use of the telephone in contacting delinquent taxpayers.

"We don't have to wait 10 years before we can sell delinquent property for tax money," he said.

Spelman read off a series of figures, including back taxes from the former city and fire district, some of which date back to 1951. The delinquents include both residential and commercial property owners, he noted.

Daigle said there shouldn't be delinquencies dating back to 1951 on the books.

Spelman cited the distributions of firing some of the property owners, one of which has been in Danbury for several years.

He pointed to two properties against which the town has put liens. One is a tax-litigated parcel at Church Hill and North Park Streets. Another is a house on Linden St. which has been on the books as being on the wrong lot.

Proposed Ordinances
Representatives read into the record two proposed ordinances prepared by Owen Oswald Skelton, Esq. Both are based on former city ordinances.

A public hearing will be held July 17 at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building on both proposals.

The first would require all property owners with delinquent taxes to clear them all at once and pay within eight hours of a storm. A fine of not more than \$50 would be levied for each day of the delinquency, which would be enforced by the police. The ordinance would take effect in Danbury for several years.

The second ordinance placed an assessment of one-half the cost of installing sidewalks, curbs and gutters against the property owner in proportion to the percentage of abutting property.

The assessment would be included in the next tax bill to the property owner after completion of the sidewalk.

Ordinances which would be introduced by the Board of Representatives. The director of public works would then call a hearing, notice of which would be given abutting homeowners not less than five days before the hearing.

The notice of assessment would be made by registered mail. The director of public works would prepare a list of each taxpayer and his assessment and forward it to the tax collector.

Quick Movie Harks Back To Old Days

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — It seems like an innovation in movie production, yet it harkens back to Hollywood's earlier years.

Producer-director Blake Edwards has stirred the film community with his movie about the "Party." The script consists of 60 pages about half the usual length for major production. Most of the movie will be made on a stage set at Goldwyn Studios.

"I'll bring the picture in on a schedule of 45 days," promises Edwards, youthful-looking at 44. "The normal time for a film of this scope would be 70 to 80 days."

"The Party" will cost \$2.5 million — actually \$1.8 million if you subtract the salaries of myself and Peter Sellers. That's pretty cheap for an affluent-looking production such as this. Ordinarily it would cost \$4 million.

How does he manage? For one thing, most action takes place during a single evening at a movie mogul's dinner party to which Sellers, a hammy East Indian actor, is mistakenly invited.

Edwards saves by borrowing a device from Jerry Lewis; a television lens mounted over the movie camera.

"As a time-saving device it is terrible," said the director. "Literally hours can be wasted in filming unnecessary scenes because you don't know until the next day's rushes whether they will work."

"But with a TV monitor you can have an instant replay. I wouldn't use it for a drama, but it is perfect for comedy. You can see immediately whether the gags work."

By filming with only half a normal-sized script, Edwards appeared to be borrowing a technique from Fellini, Antonioni and other European directors who improvise films. Showman production costs are much lower abroad they can afford to handle the time on domestic scenes.

"It's true that we can't afford to shoot that way in Hollywood," said Edwards. "Unfortunately time is the most commodity in the studios. And time is what you need to get the most out of a scene."

"That's why I have done everything to avoid expense — so I can spend time improvising. That is important with Peter, a creative performer who comes up with inspired bits on the set. He is a genius as an ad libber."

"Even though we have only 60-odd pages, it is a completed script. There is very little dialogue, and much of the film will be in pantomime. You'll hear the usual party noises, but the camera will pull back and catch the action only."

Edwards' system sounded like the way directors like George Stevens and Leo McCarey made films with Laurel and Hardy. They began with a skeletal script, then improvised as flights of comic fancy struck them.

A third-generation movie-maker, Edwards admitted the similarity: "Except that we don't have the advantage of gag men on the set, as they did in the old days."

280 Hungarians Defect in '67

VIENNA, AUSTRIA (AP) — For this year, 280 Hungarians have asked for political asylum in this neutral country. Most were defectors from official tourist trips.

Such defections started with the first, large-scale Hungarian travels to the West several years ago. But Hungarian authorities have not stopped travel as a result of the defections. They apparently decided the number of defectors was tolerable.

Several thousand Hungarians are given passports for Western trips every year.

An official of the Austrian Interior Ministry said sometimes a dozen or more Hungarians stay behind when their travel groups return home.

During the first week of June, for instance, Austrian authorities reported 12 Hungarians missing from travel groups as they returned to Hungary.

At an Austrian border checkpoint an officer was asked if there is any fear among Hungarians going back to Hungary that they might be blamed for the disappearance of their fellow-travelers.

"No," he replied. "Most of the time the tours are led by the same travel agents, and we know them by sight. Even if some of their group had stayed behind in Austria, the travel agents will come through here again next week, or the week thereafter with another group, as if nothing had happened."

Hungarians who want to stay in Austria usually are taken to a refugee camp in Traiskirchen, south of Vienna, where they are screened and later given work permits. Some join relatives overseas.
