Actress Jayne Mansfield, 2 Others Die in Accident

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Beautiful Jayne Mansfield and two men were killed early today when their car rammed the rear of a truck, slowed by a cloud of mosquito fog around the highway. It happened on a U.S. 90 curve near the Rigolets, the waterway connection between Lake Pontchartrain and the Gulf of Mexico, in New Orleans. It was about 2:30 a.m. Killed with the voluptuous Hollywood actress, 34, were Samuel S. Brady, who was her lawyer and companion, and the chauffeur, Ronnie Harrison, 20, of Mississippi City. Police said three of Miss Mansfield's children, asleep in the back seat of the big gray car, were injured. Physicians said they were in fair condition. They are Marie, 3, Mickey Jr., 8, and Zoltan, 6, her children by musician Mickey Hargitay. Two of Miss Mansfield's four Chihuahua dogs also died in the shredded auto, which jammed under the back of truck-trailer. It was the most dreadful thing I've ever seen," said George Carmichael, head of the New Orleans mosquito control unit, who was called to the scene by the driver of the insecticide fogging truck. Miss Mansfield, who had been doing a show at the Gus Stevens Restaurant and Supper Club in Biloxi, Miss, was headed for New Orleans for a television appearance at noon. WASHINGTON (AP) — A Navy court affirmed the right to be where it refused to speculate on whether Israeli jets and PT boats knew they were attacking a U.S. vessel when they rocketed, machine-gunned and torpedoed the communications ship Liberty during the Middle East war. A summary of the court's proceedings, released by the Pentagon late Wednesday, also made no mention of reports the ship was engaged in electronic spying on Israeli and Egyptian communications when she was hit June 8 some 18 miles north of the Sinai Peninsula. The summary, prepared from a secret report, said witnesses before the Navy court identified the "aggravated surveillance of the Liberty on three occasions" (Israel) waters, "properly marked as to her identity and nationality, and in calm, clear weather when she suffered an unprovoked attack." UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The UN General Assembly today heard a mounting chorus of attacks on Israel for its annexation of the Old City of Jerusalem. Foreign Minister Omar Sakhar of Saudi Arabia told the emergency session of the assembly that it "will come a holy war, first by Christians then by aroused Moslems whose anger the world understands." Raja Azzam, head of the Malaysian delegation, said he would vote against the Israeli move. In Vietnam Red Forces Fade Away In Jungle

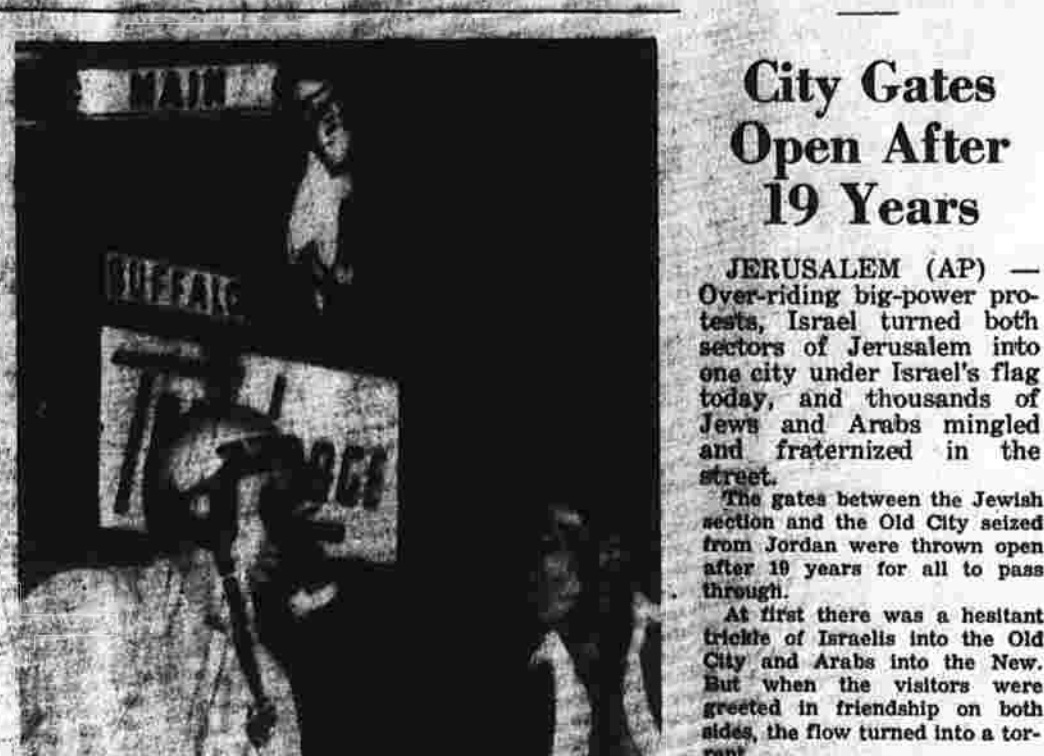
SAIGON (AP) — A crack battalion of some 100 hard-core Communist guerrillas faded away into the jungles today after a running two-day battle in which it badly bloodied a South Vietnamese rifle battalion and evaded a searching force of more than 2,000 allied troops. Associated Press correspondent George Espey reported from the battle area that U.S. officers believe the Viet Cong unit perished after more than 21 hours of heavy fighting east of the previous day. The running battle took place northeast of Saigon, in the pattern of hit-and-run engagements that have sent U.S. casualties up sharply in recent days. The weekly casualty report released today said 18 Americans were killed and 100 wounded. The death toll was almost double that of the week before. The American dead were also more than double the number of Vietnamese figures of 110 for the week before. (See Page Twelve)

City Gates Open After 19 Years

JERUSALEM (AP) — Over-riding big-power protests today, the United Nations Security Council voted to allow Israel to annex the Old City of Jerusalem. The gates between the Jewish section and the Old City, closed for 19 years for all to pass through. At first there was a hesitant trickle of Israelis into the Old City and Arabs into the New. But when the visitors were greeted in friendship on both sides, the flow turned into a torrent. An Arab on his first visit to the Jewish section broke open a bottle of wine and invited passers-by to "drink to peace." Several Jews joined him in the toast. A young Israeli gave two Arabs a lift in his car and was invited to their village for coffee. In both quarters of the city shops did a thriving business as Jews and Arabs bought food, candy and souvenirs. Interior Minister Moshe Shapira issued a proclamation renouncing the sectors of the 3,000-year-old City of David for the first time since Jordan seized the Old City and Israel occupied the New City in the 1949-49 Palestine war. Promising to protect the holy places of Moslems and Christians, Shapira said: "Let us see if that peace and mutual understanding shall prevail among all the city's residents." Israel acted in the face of warnings from the United States, the Soviet Union, Britain, France and the Vatican and despite mounting pressure in the United Nations. The United States does not recognize Israel's annexation of Jerusalem and its shrines of Christianity, Mohammedanism and Judaism. "The hasty administrative action taken today cannot be regarded as determining the future of the holy places of the city of Jerusalem in relation to them," the State Department said. Earlier Wednesday, the White House made a public appeal to Israel to avoid any quick annexation of the old section of Jerusalem. King Hussein of Jordan called the Israeli action "unacceptable and intolerable." Christian relief workers said they were shocked. (See Page Six)

A spokesman for the municipal government in New Jerusalem stressed that Israel would provide free access to all parts of Jerusalem "and in both directions." This indicated that Israel can go freely into the Old City while Arabs can visit the New City.

A police spokesman said the Israeli army was turning over control of the Arab sector of the city to civilian authorities. The night curfew imposed when the Old City was captured was lifted.

Shapiro gave New Jerusalem's Mayor Teddy Kollek an administrative order setting the city limits of "Israeli Jerusalem" to include all of Jerusalem.

"Jerusalem was never divided, not even in the days of the Israelites," Shapiro declared.

Discussions have begun on how to combine the municipal councils — the Israeli body of 21 members elected as well as representatives of political parties, and the 12-member council in the Jordanian sector chosen to represent the various ethnic and religious interests.

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Chicago NAACP Chapter Quits King's Movement

CHICAGO (AP)—The Chicago NAACP chapter has quietly withdrawn from the Chicago Freedom Movement led by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

The action, which local NAACP leaders said was made necessary by an organizational overhaul removed from the Chicago Freedom Movement its largest member and one of its four founders. The decision surprised many civil rights leaders.

McClellan said the action was taken after the Chicago chapter, with a reported membership of more than 45,000, was divided into three semi-independent branches — one each for the west, north and south sides to provide multiple approaches to problems of jobs, housing, education and political participation.

Other council leaders said they had not heard of the letter or of the NAACP's decision.

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India's CBI also reports that Communist countries provided campaign funds in India, to the parties of the extreme left, even more substantial than our contributions to the parties of the extreme right.

The election, it may be remembered, turned out as if this alleged American and Communist campaign spending had had some effect. The political extremes grew stronger in the February results; the governing center grew weaker. For a time, the election there was in doubt, in fact, whether the government of the Congress party and Mrs. Gandhi could continue.

In reality, then, the way our expenditure worked out—assuming we did actually make it—was to make a sort of collaboration with the Communist expenditure—if the Communists actually spent it. For us, of course, the political center in India is a little too far to the left, just as, for the Communists, it is too far to the right.

But which one of us it may be asked, the United States, or the Communist bloc, stands to gain the most from any weakening of the political center in India? Which one of us seems to have more natural talent for thriving on chaos? Which one of us would most like to see India incapable of governing itself? Perhaps, some day we will put our brains where our money is?

And among the very good reasons the League offers for its crusade is the fact that the atomic bomb even bothers animals. "Can cause panic and stampede among the large animals" and "cause milk to kill their offspring."

The Citizens League Against the Sonic Boom is just for people, and for animals, with no distinctions in mind, no special interests lurking in the background, no ulterior motives of any kind.

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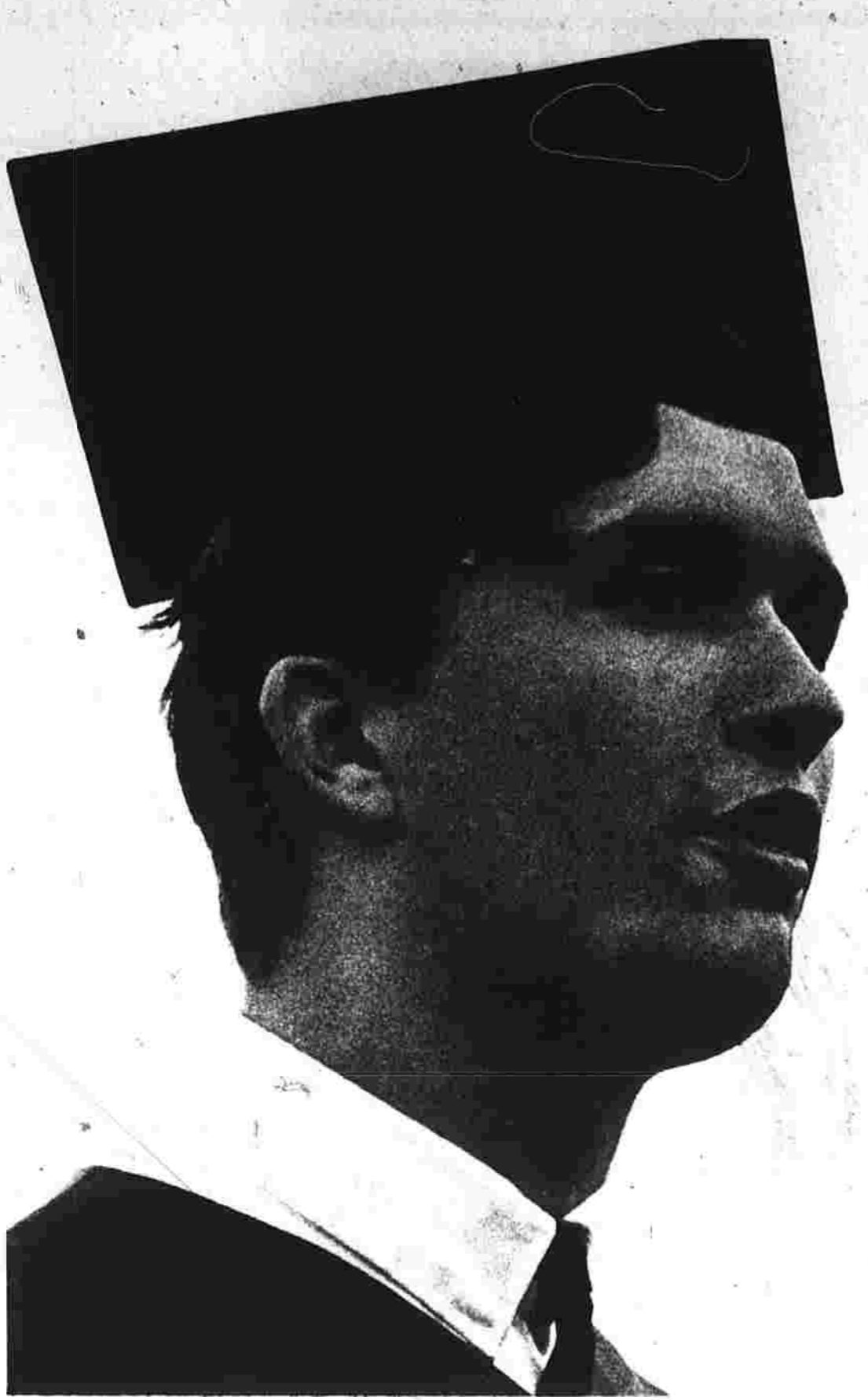

Living Costs Still Climb, Wages Down

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government reports the cost of living is still climbing with no indications the spiral is near its peak.

In addition, real spendable income as of May was \$77.38 a week for a family of four, the lowest it has been in three years. This is the money left after taxes and after adjustment for changes in prices since the base period of 1957-59.

The Labor Department said Wednesday the cost of living jumped three-tenths of one percent in May, putting it 2.7 percent higher than a year before. The rise is two-tenths of one percent more than the government predicted for the entire year.

The May figures put the consumer price index at 116.6, which means it costs \$116.6 to buy items worth \$10 in 1957-59. Wholesale prices jumped one-half of one percent in May with indications of another one-half of one percent hike this month.

And because wholesale prices have a bearing on retail prices, prospects are that retail prices won't be dropping soon.

One of the biggest rises was in hospital care prices, up 2.5 percent over a year ago, and over all medical care rose .63 percent.

The Labor Department also reported that the gross average weekly earnings of production or nonproduction workers reached a new high record of \$100.06, but the buying power was only \$88.36 in terms of the 1957-59 base period.

Hourly earnings also were at a record high of \$2.66 but the benefits were smaller because of price hikes and a sharp reduction in the average work week.
