





A Status For Jerusalem

The perhaps impossible objective that should be sought in trying to create a status for the city of Jerusalem is that of a status in which nobody any longer has any live instinct or inherited urge to seek the conquest and possession of the city.

It may be impossible, but that is, we should say, the ideal. That would be, if it could be attained, one of the things helping toward a stable peace in Pales-

How can such a status be achieved? How can the political and religious situation of the city be set up in such a way that no party, no nation, no religion need feel an urge to aspire and plan and plot toward some change which will guarantee dignity and freedom in its own relationship to the city? What status can there be in which all

three great faiths to which the city is holy can love and cherish the city for what it means to each of them? What seems to us the only valid answer has never appealed to those who have been, in turn, the city's conquer-

The Christians and the Moslems fought over and conquered the city in order to obtain political rule over terrain sacred to each. And today, in the wake of the latest conquest, Israel, like the Crusaders and the Arabs in their time, wants the satisfaction of being master there, and has the additional claim of having been master there, cen-

turies ago, before either of its rivals. As such conquerors, full of the natural love and passion of Jews for their own city, the Israeli have now, against the advice and wish of even their best friends, proceeded with formal steps for political rule.

Perhaps much of the present protest is based on dislike and distaste for the process of annexation by conquest, in defiance of what poor brand of law this world has in the shape of the United Nations Charter and previous United Nations decisions with regard to Pales-

But the long range apprehension, which should somehow make itself apparent even to the victors of the moment, is that such treatment of Jerusalem sets it up as a prize which, if it can be taken by force and the claim of one tradition today, is open to the conquest of some other traditional claim whenever the backers of such a claim learn to fight well enough to conquer the city for themselves.

That ideal status for the city, which we tried to visualize at the beginning of this piece, would leave no people, no faction, no nation, no religion whispering to itself under its own breath: "Wait until it is our turn, wait until we get our chance."



kinds of happenings, mass parties, mass concerts, some planned, some impromptu, some commercially sponsored, some financed by private donation. The Park itself has been turned into a kind of turbulent circus; some of the companies which sponsor mass events there find it costs them almost as much to clean up the crowd litter afterward as it does to hire the talent for their pro-

For all who carried around with them an image of a public park as a nice, quiet place reserved for governesses and handsomely dressed children, genteel lovers, and strolls under parasols, the new life that has come into Central Park and into other New York City parks under the administration of mayor Lindsay is something to be deplored and cringed at.

But one argument is clinching the case for all those who believe that park ought to be for lots of people to have lots of different kinds of fun in. Since all this zany public use of Central Park began, there have been no murders there. And the incidence of lesser disturbances has gone way down. Putting the park to real public use, giving it a function of really belonging to lots of different kinds of people, has apparently done more to alter the atmosphere than the continual patrol of thousands of additional policemen

Sen. Dodd's effectiveness as a U.S.

Senator has now been forfeited. No amount of compassion for the man can allter the result. It is impossible to see how Sen. Dodd could pick up the routines of office or function again on an equal basis in a chamber which has dallied so with his fate and which has shown more parlia-

mentary than personal concern in weighing his case. Friday's censure vote was the shat ering climax to an ordeal both for Sen Dodd and for the members of the Senate. But the accused has had his day, has had ample time to defend himself, and still has been found guilty. The Senate's censure was based upon Dodd's alleged misuse of funds collected

Both are the kind of issues which invite a web of pro and con argument. No amount of explanation, however, can quite justify the activities involved as being right, proper, or beyond question -and this is the snare in which the sentor was trapped.

For behind these open issues loom the larger, graver questions which the Senate Ethics Committee left unexplored by the convenient procedure of referring many of the documents purloined by the senator's former employes to the Department of Justice. These unacted-or claims of influence-peddling, together with Sen. Dodd's past reputation, in Connecticut and in Washington, for another personal weakness leave in the background a larger unsettled area than that which was resolved by the censure
