Tollard School Board Will Return \$31,000 to General Fund

The Board of Education Wednesday night agreed to turn back to the general fund of the town an estimated \$31,000. The money represents the balance on hand from the 1966-67 fiscal year. The sum is equal to about 1 1/2 mills. Previous estimates had placed the amount to be turned back at about \$25,000.

The board agreed not to spend \$3,000 to renovate a barn used for storage. The balance of the funds left over the \$25,000 come from various budgeted items.

Gravel Operation Okayed
The Planning and Zoning Commission approved plans for a gravel bank operation on property belonging to Atty. Robert D. King. The plans were approved by the town's consulting engineer Richard Congrove.

King agreed to post a \$5,000 bond to cover the restoring and regrading of the land after the gravel is stripped.

The ZPC has been concerned over some operations along the Williams River, where the land has not been restored to useable condition. The strip was visible from the highway because of darkness.

Probate Judges Plan Challenge of Reform Law
HARTFORD (AP)—The new probate reform law is going to be challenged in court, Supreme Court Justice John P. Costello said Thursday.

John S. Murtha, a Hartford lawyer, told Costello and the new probate court administrator Judge Jay E. Rubinow, that the law would be fought on the grounds that it violates both the state and federal constitutions.

In a letter to the two judges, Murtha said he had been retained as counsel to a group of probate judges. He did not say how many judges were in the group.

The Connecticut Probate Assembly, which includes all 12 probate judges, met last week and decided not to challenge the reform law.

It was made clear, however, that individual probate judges might do so, although the assembly itself would not.

The Probate Act, which was signed by Gov. John D. DeLoach on June 27, is being given the power to suspend probate judges from their "powers"—although not from their offices.

Rubinow has been the chief judge of the state's Circuit Court system. The new law is so complex that court action on both federal and state levels will not be possible until August, Murtha said Thursday.

Murtha said "certain sections" of the law will be challenged, but he did not indicate which.

Coventry GOP Panel Nominates Town Slate

The Republican Nominating Committee presented a slate of candidates to its town committee last night, in the first step toward final approval for the upcoming town elections Oct. 2.

The town committee is recommending William Sheppard and J. Richard Nook to the July 10 caucus for the office of first selectman and selectman, respectively.

Also approved by the town committee were, town clerk and town treasurer Mrs. Ruth Smith; Raymond Fowler, and tax collector, Mrs. P. Fowler Latta, who currently holds that post.

For the board of finance, the two incumbents, Richard Coughlin and John Allen, were recommended, while candidates for the board of education are Mrs. Sumner Braunard and Peter O'Rourke.

Incumbent Joseph Starabino will seek re-election for the board of tax assessors. Donald DeLoach and Herbert Couch are the candidates for the zoning board of appeals. Mrs. DeLoach currently serves as an alternate on that board. Candidates for alternate to the zoning board of appeals is Frederick White.

For the planning and zoning commission, incumbent Donald C. Smith and Charles Funk were approved. Candidates for commission will be A. Harry Dineen Jr., Delmar Potter, George Seavey and Zachariah Leone.

Alice Williams was chosen for the board of welfare, and incumbent Herman Allard will be re-elected. Allard will be re-elected. Mrs. Janet Aronson and Mrs. Dolly Fernald for the board of health.

There will be one write-in ballot on the record of welfare.

The Republican Party has gone on record "favoring the fundamental concept of the charter" with the following recommendations:

CREDIT ITALIANS AND BLAME MURRAY

One reason the Italians won the world championship a few weeks ago is that they never let up. Today's hand shows how they virtually forced the North American team to make a miracle.

Opening lead—queen of diamonds.

Benito Garozzo would not have made four spades against good defense. He didn't have to try, however, because Toronto expert Eric Murray could not afford to let the opponents play the hand at a vulnerable game contract when he knew that a non-vulnerable sacrifice at five clubs would not be costly.

Having forced Murray to take this "phantom" sacrifice, the Italians collected the maximum penalty. It was not made. Then the king and queen of diamonds, covered by the king and queen of hearts.

Giorgio Belladonna (East) cashed the queen of spades, took the jack of diamonds and then led a trump. The contract was already down one, but Garozzo was sure to take another trick with his ten of clubs.

If declarer ruffed low, Garozzo would have ruffed immediately; if South ruffed high, as he did, West's ten of clubs would eventually become the master trump.

Hard to blame Murray for his sacrifice bid against a game contract. He had to bid. Then what about the American pair which held the East-West cards in the first round of the match? Edgar Kaplan, of New York, and Norman Kay, of Philadelphia, bid up to three spades of the East-West cards, and this was all they could make. The Italian pair at that table, Mimmo D'Aliso and Camillo Pabliston-Harman, went on to five clubs. Can you blame Kaplan or Kay for accepting a small profit when they had already bid their own maximum?

Apparently everybody was right, but the Italians were rightest.

Farmer opens with 1-NT (18 to 19 points), and the next play is spades. You hold: Spades, 10-5-3; Hearts, 6; Diamonds, 10-9; Clubs, A-K-J-4-2.

Answer: Bid three notrump. If partner can't make two fast tricks in his own hand and your own suit, there is the danger of losing the first five tricks as a contract of five clubs.

NEW YORK (AP) — The men who dream up the games people play at supermarkets and gas stations for \$100 million a year in cash and prizes say they are here to stay. But many of the sponsors of these games, which are seen as a necessary nightmare, say they will not last.

"Almost every oil company up at the supermarket are good winners. It didn't get in on the big cards passed out at the service station and vice versa. Winners can get either merchandise or cash prizes ranging from \$1 to \$1,000."

Although slightly more sophisticated, "Double Sweepstakes" is a close relative of other game or sweepstakes promotions staged periodically on either the local or national level by Esso Standard Oil Co. has a "Tigerino" for example, Shell has "The Americana" and Pacific Tea Co. has "Bonus Dinero Dollars." Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co. has "Bonus Dinero" and Tidewater Oil Co. has "Flying Aces."

South Windsor Mayor Won't Run Again

Mayor James H. Throwe will not seek re-election to the town council in the fall election. Mayor Throwe said "after much deliberation with my family and my law partners, I have decided not to seek re-election to the council this fall."

Commenting that his reasons are purely personal, the mayor said he had put his family second and to town business for four years during his two terms on the council and had taken time he can no longer afford from his law practice.

"I have considered the alternatives and wishes of other voters and have urged me to continue. I have also considered the sense of accomplishment in public service to the town and this makes the choice a difficult one," Mayor Throwe said.

Noting his appreciation for the spirit of cooperation that has prevailed during his terms in office, the mayor said he does not intend to retire from politics and expects to assist in the election and "to give what I can of myself to the town government when possible."

Commenting on recent accomplishments, Mayor Throwe mentioned the new town hall, sewer, new schools and the establishment of a refuse district and a capital improvement

Water Service Break Disrupts Water Supply

Water service was disrupted in the Woodland Park area yesterday by a break in a water main on Bealshob Rd. approximately a half-mile from Binghamton Rd.

Water company crews were able to bypass the break with a system of valves and restore a flow in the Woodland Park area to temporarily restore service. The well is not regularly used by the company since the water supply is not sufficient for the entire area.

The well formerly was owned by the Woodland Park Assn. Water services and pressure was restored in about two hours with the exception of some homes at higher elevations where air had to be blown out of lines.

Stratford Police, Firemen Protest For Higher Pay

STRATFORD (AP) — Nearly 100 off-duty firemen and policemen — including some from Bridgeport — conducted a demonstration Thursday for better wages and working conditions for policemen and firemen.

The pickets paraded around Stratford's Town Hall. Most of them were members of Local 988 of the International Association of Fire Fighters, AFL-CIO, and Local 41, Association of Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO.

The demonstrators distributed a statement saying they sought "higher wages and to be able to negotiate a pension plan with the town, for an unbiased personnel appeals board and for honest negotiations with the town council."

Patrolman Joseph Berke, a spokesman for the policemen's union, said "a way has been found" to grant pay boosts to policemen.

The town council appropriated funds to pay policemen for court time, he said, but that the 1967 Connecticut Legislature passed a bill to reimburse local communities for the expense of proceedings.

The legislative action, said Berke, leaves a surplus in the town budget which should be used to increase police wages.

The most recent contract expires March 31.

Tolland Court Compromise Reached Between PZC, Developers

A compromise agreement between the planning and zoning commission and developers of the Wayne Manor subdivision has been reached after one day of testimony in Tolland County Superior Court.

Superior Court Judge Joseph Klau did not issue a writ of mandamus against the PZC as requested by Arthur Gottier and Werner Kunz, developers of the subdivision. The writ would have required automatic approval of the subdivision.

No copy of the agreement is on file at the county clerk's office. PZC chairman Walter Beaton explained last night the agreement calls for revoking the 40-home subdivision on its original merits, as presented to the commission last August.

The town is hiring the Buck and Buck engineering firm to complete a sanitary engineering report on soil and drainage conditions on each of the lots. The PZC was granted a 60-day extension in which to carry out the inspection, according to Beaton.

The case is one of several pending against the PZC as a result of its decision to increase the minimum house lot

Tug-of-War Developing Over Actress' Funeral

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP) — The one-beautiful body of Burt Reynolds' wife, actress Jayne Mansfield, victim of a violent highway collision, lay today in the white-tiled morgue here as a quiet tug-of-war over her funeral developed.

Matt Cimber, estranged third husband of the 34-year-old actress, rushed here after her death Thursday and said he would plan the funeral.

Husband No. 2, movie musician Mickey Hargitay, also flew here. He went first to the bedside of their three children — injured when the car carrying Miss Mansfield rammed the rear of a big truck east of the city.

Hargitay said his former wife's mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. Harry L. Peers of Dallas, Tex., also had come here about Miss Mansfield's funeral.

He said it would be private but declined to elaborate. One funeral home said: "We're waiting further word from the mother."

Dr. Nicholas Csetka, Orleans Parish coroner, ordered his staff not to release Miss Mansfield's body without his approval.

Alo killed in the 2:25 a.m. wreck 34 miles from the heart of New Orleans were Miss Mansfield's latest love interest, attorney Samuel S. Brody, 48, of Los Angeles, and the chauffeur of the car, Ronald Harrison, 20, of Mississippi City, Miss.

Mickey Hargitay, Jr., 8, was told by his father that his mother "had a date with God."

"He is a smart boy," said Hargitay, his eyes flooded with tears and his voice choked with emotion. "He understood."

Miss Mansfield was coming here for a scheduled appearance on New Orleans television station WDSU-TV at noon Thursday after finishing her second show at the Gus Stevens restaurant and supper club in Biloxi, Miss.

She was to return to Biloxi later Thursday and was to entertain Senabes today at the Navy mobile construction battalion training center at Gulfport, Miss.

State News Board Urges All School to Desegregate

HARTFORD (AP) — A new State Board of Education policy urges local school boards to "take prompt action to prepare and implement plans to correct" racial imbalance.

The new policy statement, though tougher than previous statements, falls short of an NAACP request to declare that racial segregation is wrong and to order local boards of education to desegregate.

The new statement was drawn up Thursday after the state board read an informal opinion by F. Michael Aherm, assistant state general, who said the state board has no authority to order or direct desegregation.

According to Aherm, any board policy statement which falls below the mandate set on the part of local boards would be inadequate to alleviate the state's racial problems.

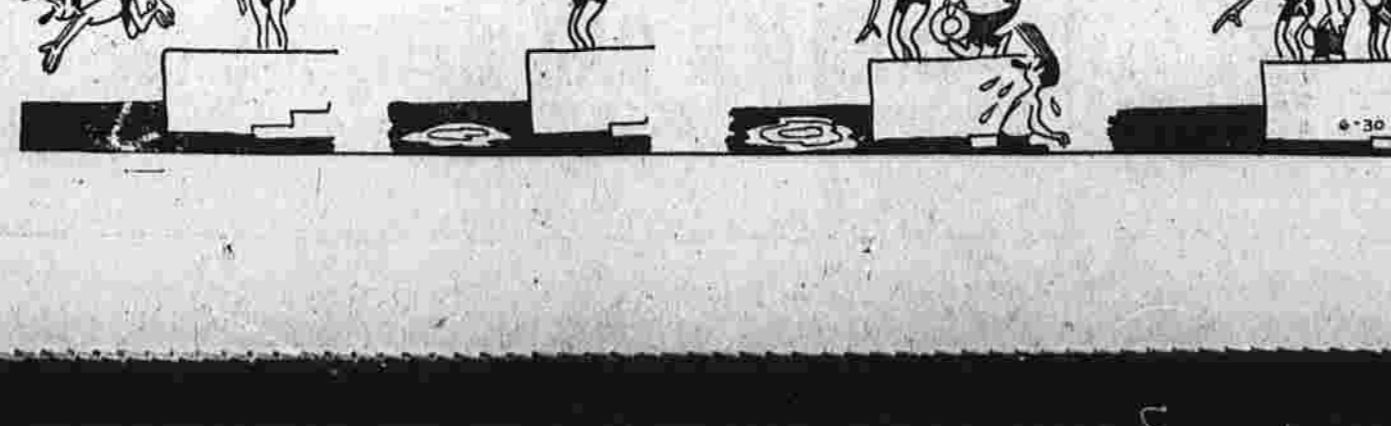
