966 might, after all, be the year for Reagan to try his big move.

It might have been another moment for the California Governor to specialize in reassuring, comforting gestures about some of his own positions.

Yet, in the midst of this new national acclaim, Governor Reagan put himself on record with a statement certain to make the American people just as uneasy about him as they once were about Goldwater's even less positive discussion about the possible use of nuclear defoliation techniques in Vietnam.

This is what Governor Reagan gave as his statement when Newsweek asked him what, as a Republican presidential possibility, he thought could be done about Vietnam:

"I am not a candidate for the Presidency, but speaking as a private citizen, I have insisted for a long time that our goal should be to win and I think you win as swiftly as possible, that attrition over the long period of time will cost more in lives than a sudden strike for victory.

"Evidently," the Reagan statement continued, "we are not hurting them. I don't think anyone would cheerfully want to use atomic weapons. But the last person in the world that should know we wouldn't use them is the enemy. He should go to bed every night being afraid that we might.

"I haven't declared war on Vietnam here in the State of California, although if the President asked us to, I'd be very happy to comply. I don't have a foreign policy; the state doesn't. But if I were there (Washington) and someone had suggested that possibly this would be the means of winning an election in '68, I think I'd step up the war and get it over with before '68.

"I think you have to call this a fullscale war. I think the way to win a war is to win it.

"If we ask American boys to fight and die for their country then we should do all in our power to aid them to win a victory as quickly as possible. I'd like to see the end in 24 hours if it could be

The first worry is where it belongs, and that is in th minds and hearts of ordinary Americans We Americans are the ones who should have the capacity and the responsibility to worry nights about whether we are going to drop nuclear weapons in Asia. We are the ones who ought to have the true and terrible fear of any such pos-

There is such a thing as going so far right, or so far left, for that matter, that one forgets what it is and what it takes to be human.

There is a strong suspicion that Middletown Democrats would like to stay with the even-numbered years but, alas, they have been overruled by the will of the House and the Senate, both now controlled by Democrats. Moreover, it seems that the bill making the change has the backing of the Secretary of State's office which probably looks on the bill as a housekeeping measure. A section of that office has the duty of keeping tabs on elections and in truth, it was not always an easy task with towns holding them in the even-and odd-numbere years, in March, in April, May, October

There is this too, that can be said of the new law: It makes a good deal of sense to have the local election campaigns in a year apart from state and national campaigns, the combination of which can be a bit too much for the average voter for too long a period. Moreover, local issues may attract more attention, induce wider discussion, and haps inspire greater interest and etter voting turnout. On the face of it, the new law would seem to be a break Republicans but obviously the democrats in the General Assembly don't see it that way or it wouldn't be a law today. It probably won't make that much difference.—MIDDLETOWN
