B52s Resume Raids Inside Viet's DMZ



Heavy Gun Positions Are Main Targets

SAIGON (AP) — Waves of B52 bombers pounded North Vietnamese positions inside the demilitarized zone today for the first time in two months.

The giant bombers, each carrying 50,000 pounds of incendiary bombs, made three raids during the day on the northern half of the six-mile-wide zone between North and South Vietnam.

Their targets were the fortified areas and military positions from which the North Vietnamese have been inflicting a heavy toll on U.S. Marines and South Vietnamese units just below the zone.

The toll was reflected in weekly casualty figures announced today which showed 282 American killed last week, the third highest death count for a seven-day period this year.

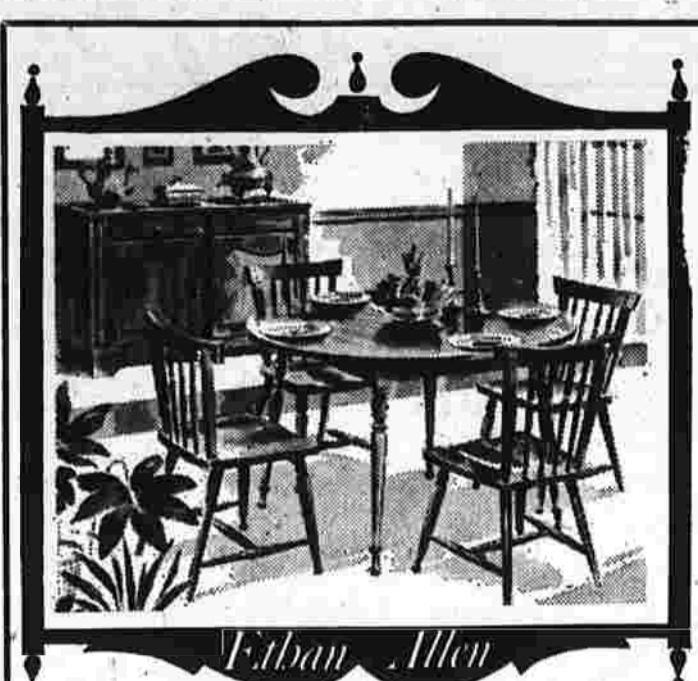

CRC Okays Minor Changes, Complex Items Lie Ahead

The Charter Revision Commission last night reviewed a list of 23 suggested changes, through federal or state grants.

The added sentence would charter, and the right of the town manager to combine or consolidate departments.

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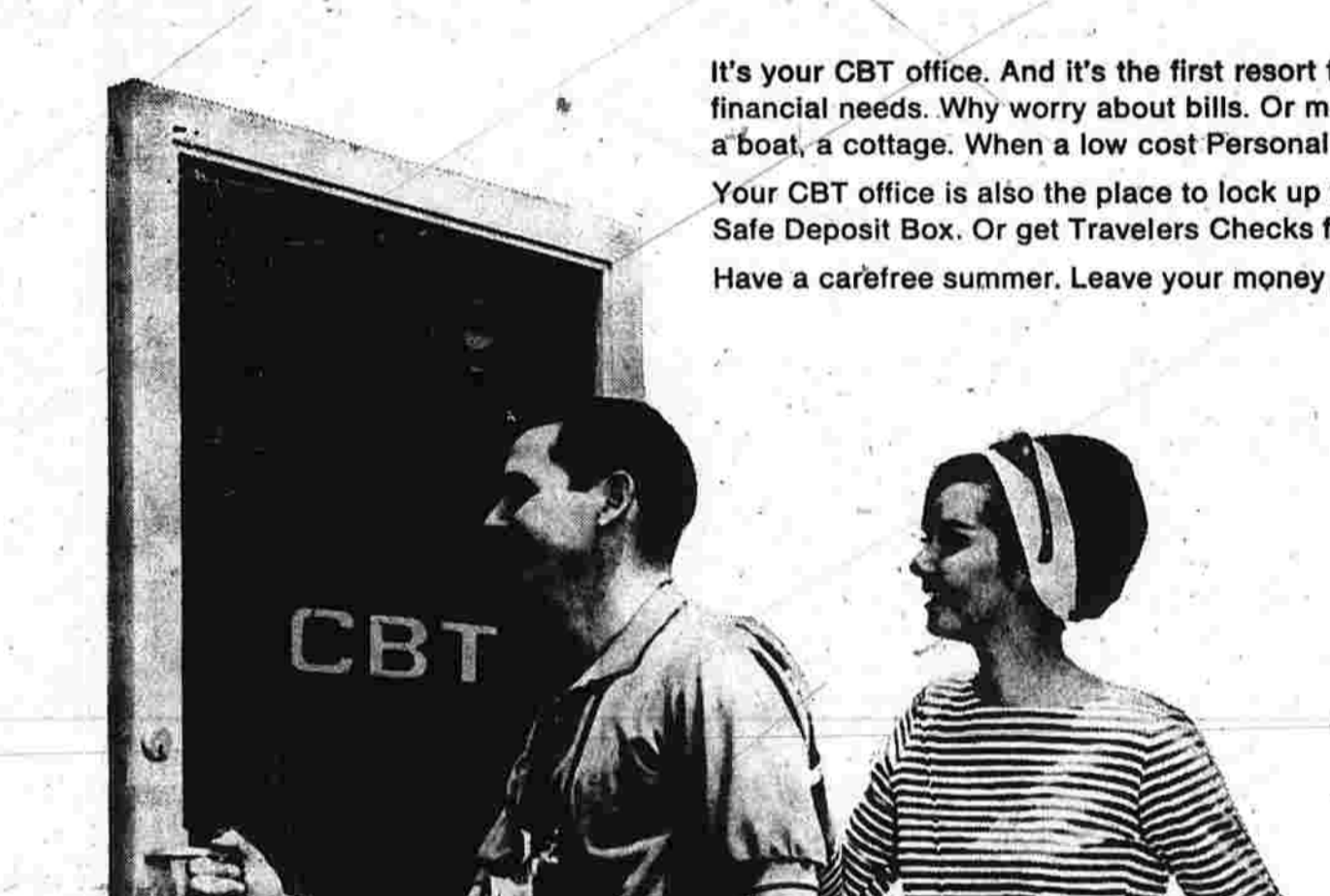
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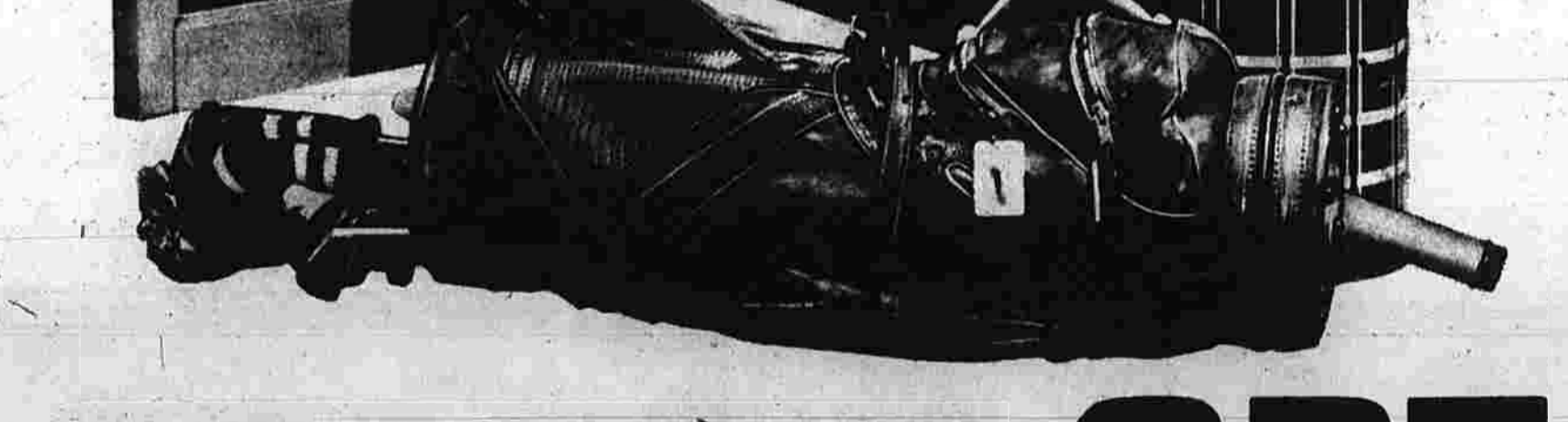

**The Criticism Escalates**  
There is now a rather steady, full-blown evidence of a new surge of feeling of despair about and opinion against the war in Vietnam.  
It discusses the war in Vietnam, from various points of view.  
But the one main conclusion it seems to dictate is this: that President Johnson is further than ever from winning his war, and that it is now the nation's political structure and its people that we have been doing and are doing the best we can with the problem of Vietnam.  
The revision against the war—and specifically against that conduct of the war which has kept escalating the military side of it—is growing stronger—and more "respectable"—at the present moment when if the President's powers of persuasion were being effective, he would be acceptance of the war and of the manner in which it is being conducted which would be in the ascendancy.

Part of the reason for this may be found, perhaps, in reports of day and possibly sweeping the thoughts and feelings of the Johnson Administration itself, as if it were now beginning to discover and experience the realities which critics called the only inevitable result of the stepped up involvement which began in February of 1965, with the orders to begin bombing North Vietnam.  
And the inner pessimism reported in the administration itself would seem to be rooted in the actual course of the war. This is that it is going longer, and more costly, both in lives and dollars, as it goes along, and that, despite this, it seems to fly as far from any conclusion as ever.

At any rate against such a background we have such developments as the following:  
Eight respected Republican Congressmen join in a special statement urging a phased retreat at joint de-escalation and negotiation.  
Senate Majority Leader Mansfield delivers the most forthright and pessimistic speech he has yet made on the war, noting that Defense Secretary McNamara has been given reports of "progress" in Vietnam, and then charging that "the fact is that reports of progress are shown, like burned out tanks, all along the road which has led this nation ever more deeply into Vietnam and Southeast Asia during the past decade and a half."  
Senator Mansfield's major worry is a simple one: World War III may be starting in Vietnam.  
Michigan's Governor Romney, whose presidential candidacy has been believed to be in trouble, suddenly revises his Hartford speech stand on Vietnam, in which he at last backed the Johnson administration's basic commitment in Vietnam, toward a sharper criticism.  
"The Administration," Governor Romney now says, "has been guilty of 'over-reaction' in military terms with an accompanying and unfortunate growth of feeling against the Administration among a large portion of the people that is purely military solution in Vietnam is possible. If continuation of our policy of escalation triggers a wider war with major Soviet and Communist Chinese participation, then the Administration must be held accountable."  
Romney now asks de-escalation of our bombing, and an increase in proof that the troops of South Vietnam are carrying more of their share of the fighting.

Such varied movements of dissent from those concepts of the war the President's oratory has now been trying to establish over a period of two and a half years may be fitting parallels, for all we know, within the ranks of the administration. It may be possible that Defense Secretary McNamara returns from his ninth assessment of conditions in Vietnam in some mood of disaffection himself.

But what one really wonders, as one watches the nation and the administration coming to those realizations which some commentators predicted back in 1965, is whether any slight sense of being wrong, of having played too high stakes with too little real knowledge and qualifications, has begun to permeate to those academic power politician theorists who were primarily

responsible for our big military commitment in Vietnam. Their special vision of the American destiny in Asia, not the professional zeal of the generals, must be given main credit for forming policy coalition with the Texas heritage of President Johnson. Now are the great influential academic hawks of the Vietnam policy—the McGeorge Bundys and the Walt Rostows, taking the present stage of that commitment? Are they, perhaps, just a shade sorer they had so much influence?

**Black On Diplomacy And Business**

Eugene R. Black, the highly respected former president of the World Bank, can perhaps be accused of having become so much a citizen of the world that he himself has grown out of some of his native Americanisms, and has begun to mix a certain sophistication with his own basic instincts as a businessman.  
In recent public discussions, notably at Wellesley College in June, Mr. Black has displayed his instincts as a businessman and recommending that we take more of our business of foreign aid out of the hands of the diplomats, out of the present historical spin which, he concludes, has the weakness of putting too much politics into our efforts to do good abroad, and turn it over to the hands of business.

It is not recommending that we do the thing that we let business, and hard-headed business principles, take over more of our doing-good abroad, that would mean more of the political result we are seeking than our present political methods.  
But while Mr. Black thus seeks to take away from the politicians and the diplomats some of the functioning he thinks might better be done by business talents by business standards, he also has some advice for the diplomats which sounds almost counter-American.  
"What we need," said Mr. Black as he described our diplomatic effort in the world, "is a little less enthusiasm, a little less activism. We should cultivate diplomacy more as a profession, and less as a business."  
Today the diplomat at home and abroad spends more time being a manager and an administrator than he spends nourishing the knowledge and skills necessary to be a good political analyst and adviser, a good advocate of our interests.

"Because our diplomacy has come to embrace so much official business, we are too often surprised by the conduct of the world which should not surprise us. We are too often forced to take action in haste."  
Mr. Black's ideas, on such examination, prove not to be very revolutionary after all. He is merely recommending that businessmen be businessmen and diplomats try to be diplomats. But even he must realize that, when he advises an American diplomat to learn to manifest "a little less activism," a little less activism, is perhaps a little ahead of the present stage of development of the typical American character. A diplomat who has succeeded in suppressing entirely his entrepreneurism and his activism would have to carry the flag with him to convince people of his nationality.

In South Vietnam, however, a Navy plane reported one SAM missile fired at them went wild and hit a village 12 miles southwest of Halphong. They said the village went up in flames. Viet Cong guerrillas overran a coastal hamlet 343 miles northwest of Saigon today, inflicting heavy casualties on the 28 militiamen defending the village, wounding six Vietnamese civilians and kidnapping 11. Vietnamese spokesman reported, 800 of the raiders were killed in the attack on Gian Co, on the South China Sea.
