But let him in the process misspell a name or reverse digits in a figure and he is undone. Readers will leap upon the error with un-

But if he chooses to describe some public figure as, say, to the manner born, he'd best watch his allusion. And now it turns out, mirabile dictu, that the lovers of Latin are almost as

numerous, and only one thing has more fury than a scornful scholar. At any rate, in writing two recent columns from Rome on the intellectual ferment within the Vatican it seemed a pleasant conceit to headline them in atin, the universal language of the Roman church. Unfortunately one of the hastily written headings included the phrase "pro homines" - meaning "for men," as one might say, "for God,

The error was first noticed by a night copy editor in our Cleveland plant, a man of long memory and misspeni youth, who fired off a message to the New York editorial desk. As at Water loo rescue came too late, and the relentless process of grinding out a million papers lumbered on. Next morning the shame was there for all to see. Retribution was swift. A reader in Sloatsburg, New York, dug out his

dusty Latin dictionary and confirmed that the preposition "pro" takes the ablative and not the accusative.
