





If we were to take a guess at the cause of violence in the North End of Hartford, we would theorize that some of the younger and more irresponsible elements among the Negroes there have been hitting at something they probably might call "North End establishment" Negro leadership which has been cooperating with outside authority to help preserve order and bring progress to the North End. They found their opportunity when the Hartford police came in, on the complaint of a member of the "establishment" faction, to handle a case of alleged breach of the peace, in which a young Negro was accused of having used impolite language to a lady. The police seem to have made an unusual and perhaps totally unnecessary public display of their operation in apprehending the young Negro and taking him to the scene of his alleged offense, for what purpose has not been made clear-perhaps identification, perhaps peaceful settlement of the com-

In any case, the sight of the young Negro in police hands touched off the violence, and the North End of Hartford finally joined the other big city ghettoes in their demonstration of how ugly segregation can become. At this point, just as the moderates

have been mournfully admitting, the rest of society begins to react as it might not otherwise. There are emergency meetings

community leaders, including leaders in religion and the field of politics. For the moment, almost anything even remotely within reason can be obtained -an additional hour open for swimming pools-some new survey for employment opportunities-increased efforts to let the people of the North End know what opportunities for alleviation of their lot are already open to them. There will, one can be sure, be a general intensification and stepping up of various efforts which the community of Hartford has already, to its great credit, but never, sadly, in real proportion to the great need, put into opera-Yet none of this will be enough.
