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Andover Gill Lauds Water Law

Joseph N. Gill, head of the Connecticut Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources, gave a talk Thursday night at the annual meeting of interested members of the Andover County Democratic Association who gathered for their monthly meeting at the Town Hall.

Gill explained that the "right to pollute no longer exists" and that the "Clean Water Act, Public Act 57, passed in the last legislature provides the necessary authority and funds to make the water in the 1400 miles of streams in the state safe and usable for human use as well as for aquatic life.

A "flow chart" which establishes time table to do the clean up job is already in the works for 66 Connecticut communities. Gill said he further stated that cooperation between these communities and the State Water Commission has been excellent. The cost of the installation of pollution control equipment will be covered by about 20 per cent federal grant, 30 per cent from the state, and about 50 per cent from local funds.

The larger towns which have already started the job will receive retroactive grants. Gill stated that in nearly seven years the water in about all of Connecticut's streams should be "good" water. As the state's population reaches and exceeds the three million mark, he pointed out that good recreation facilities, especially with clean water, will become needed more and more.

Summer Theater, Curtain Drawn
 When it hasn't been clouting up to rain the next day, the night air has been full of fog and mist from the rain just fallen. The result has been right after night when visibility has been close to zero.

One result is that June was almost without moon, and the tragedy of this can be understood the moment one begins trying to rhyme moon with July, which did, finally, last Wednesday night with a happy response.

There was a more special result than the mere lack of a moon in June. It was that most of us missed entirely what had been the sky spectacle of the year, a series of nights just before the middle of June when a young moon, warm, blooming Venus, and a cold, somewhat somber Jupiter were all maneuvering together in the western evening sky. Along about 10 o'clock on the evening of June 13, we believe it must have been, they were all to have been clustered together in one crowning celestial jewel, if they were in the absence of the event itself, which was the moon. It would have been a display of jewels to see if we could have seen it.

The other night, when the skies had finally cleared, Jupiter had finally reached the kind of visibility which is behind the hills before dusk came, and Venus, too, had moved out of its high station as an evening star for some time, and was ready to be seen.

But before it bore out, Venus will be in brilliance for the next few days, climaxing with a light 12 times brighter than that of the brightest star.

We have no idea how many hundreds, thousands or millions of years it may take for some new approximation of what we missed in June—the two planets and the moon all within a few minutes of each other in the sky, to the horizon—but we believe it will happen again, just as we believe it did happen behind those evening clouds, back in the days of the late 19th century, when heavenly bodies, even when one is watching.

The community we are about to report scored conspicuously, not only in the number of those who took of the five gentlemen, four to the House, one to the Senate, it contributed to the 1967 session.

We have already given an appraisal of the delegation to which Rep. Nicholas Lange, Republican Minority Leader in the House, discharged his duties. In a House where the Republicans used to rule from sheer overwhelming numbers, he developed, as it is, of course, the handsome privilege of all members of the House, the right of principle and consistency. When, as is the case here, the majority is not so large, the power and disdained principle and consistency, Lange proved to be a most effective exponent of his art.

Among the Democrats whom Lange thus sermonized almost daily, there were several who were not quite as wicket as others, but who showed a certain intelligence, as well as some reverence for principle, and a certain respect for the function, without steamroller tactics, to their service in the House.

Fess Parker: History as Entertainment

Editor's Note: Fess Parker has made a specialty of playing frontiersmen-heroes in television, first Davy Crockett and now Daniel Boone in NBC's three-year-old series. The program, popular with young viewers, has been criticized for taking liberties with American history just to provide dramatic adventures for its hero. Here Parker defends his plots and the premise.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — When people watch me as Daniel Boone on television and then ask me whether all those adventures actually happened to the real frontier hero, I must reply: "Not all."

Sure, we embroider a little here, stretch history a little there, but no more than we must to make an entertaining hour and to make a point. We're sure of our basic facts because we've researched them till the cows come home. And we're also confident that the point we make is one of which Ol' Dan'l would have approved.

We want to preserve the legend of Daniel Boone. And departures from history, as long as



they don't demean the spirit of this great man, are permissible, we feel.

I think that if we succeed in not presenting Boone detrimentally, we're at least interesting others in finding out what his true accomplishments were.

Within the past year I was invited to the area near London, Ky., for ceremonies that officially changed the name of the state's Cumberland National Forest to Daniel Boone National Forest. I believe, and others in television agree, that young people need the inspiration of frontiersmen whose strength and vision ought to be just as vital today as when those men were heading across the Cumberland Gap into that forest.

Our young people's heroes need not be a Boone, a Davy Crockett, a George Washington or a Paul Revere. But they should be someone who reminds them that their country was founded and built on qualities still valid today—free spirit, fair play, hard work and a determination to conquer whatever frontier lies ahead.

Perhaps the new frontier of

space will provide a new set of heroes to stand alongside the backwoodsmen and the dauntless marshals of the Old West.

I would like to see the hero shelf made wide enough to include the pioneers not only of yesterday but also of today. There's no doubt that they're all around us. They're in science, in industry, in medicine, in gov-
