**Economic Rise Slow**  
WASHINGTON (AP) — Housing starts, usually an accurate barometer of the nation's economy, are edging upward. But the pace is slow.

The Commerce Department said Tuesday that construction of new houses started in June at an annual rate of 1,302,000 units. However, that was only a 1.5 percent increase over the 1,280,000 units started in May.

Construction of new homes slumped last October to a post-World War II low of 848,000 units at an annual rate. Over the year was one of the housing industry's worst since 1945.

But except for February, housing starts have jumped every month since. The department said balance of building permits indicates that more impressive rates of growth likely are immediately ahead.

A sizeable jump in July would tend to back up administration forecasts of a new economic surge in the second half of the year, following six months of comparatively sluggish economic activity.

These forecasts, with the prospect of inflationary pressures they portend, are partly behind President Johnson's request for a six per cent surcharge in individual and corporate income taxes.

### Astronauts Confident

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Apollo spacecraft fire that killed three astronauts last January hasn't hurt the confidence of other Apollo astronauts, according to two of them.

Joe Henry Engle, 34, and Alfred Merrill Worden, 35, told a Tuesday news conference that changes resulting from the tragedy at Cape Kennedy, Fla., have made the space race more hopeful to ride to the moon after than ever.

Both Air Force majors, Engle and Worden were named astronauts in April 1967.

### Training Criticized

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon has revealed amid mounting congressional criticism that the United States is providing military training to officers of four Arab nations that severed or partially broke diplomatic relations with this country in the Middle East crisis.

The trainees have access to U.S. military manuals on communications, aircraft and tanks as they attend schools at bases around the country.

Currently undergoing training are 12 officers from Sudan, 8 from Iraq and 1 from Syria. Nations which broke diplomatic relations with the United States — and 6 from Lebanon, which ordered the U.S. ambassador out but allowed a U.S. delegation to remain.

Rep. Lester L. Wolff, D-N.Y., called the training of such officers "a flagrant violation of our national security" and said he has demanded a House Armed Services Committee probe.

### 2 Dead, 33 Hurt In Bus Accident

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) — A bus carrying 33 elderly Maryland residents on its cross-country tour careened off the twisting highway on the slopes of 14,116-foot Pikes Peak Tuesday.

Mrs. Lester Banks, 65, and Miss Elizabeth Gangler, 63, both of Baltimore, died at the scene. The other 31 passengers and driver Meri Woods, 36, of Denver, were taken to three Colorado Springs hospitals.

### Reagan Moves To Head Off Racial Riots

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Gov. Ronald Reagan intensified today efforts to cool California racial hot spots before they can flash into racial rioting.

The governor planned to meet privately with about a dozen Negro leaders in his office today as part of a program to "stimulate grassroots actions aimed at eliminating the basic and real causes of racial tension."

Reagan also made it clear he was prepared to move swiftly against any riot and to put down riot or insurrection wherever and whenever the situation requires.

Reagan said the state and local governments have established anti-riot plans which can be put into effect immediately.

"But let me emphasize again we are doing all we can to avoid trouble and will continue to do so" by trying to solve Negroes' problems, Reagan said.

Part of his program is a state-wide seminar between Negro leaders and state officials on problems facing minority groups. No date has been set for it.

Reagan said he was announcing his plans publicly "because there has been a great concern on the part of many Californians about racial unrest and rioting in other parts of the nation."

Reagan said Robert Keyes, his human affairs secretary, has met with community leaders in some of California's potential trouble spots, including East Los Angeles and Watts, scene of rioting two summers ago, and Hunters Point in San Francisco, scene of a disturbance last fall.

Keyes, a Negro, is a former professional football player and teacher.

### Bolton Swim Classes This Summer Facing a Hazard—Blue Lips

Mothers bring their own umbrellas to their children's swimming lessons at Sperry's Glen this cool and drizzly summer, but the children, undaunted and only a bit more blue-lipped than usual, carry on. Mrs. Mary Beth Gorke, swimming program head, said that since classes began June 26 she has canceled lessons only three times, in addition to two days for the fourth of July holiday. When the air is definitely too cold Mrs. Gorke and her staff give safety talks to all the classes, and even the beginners learn mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Besides being plagued by poor weather, the program and the operators of Sperry's Glen have been harassed by vandals this summer, with riffs being cut adrift or dragged up shore, storage areas entered and equipment destroyed. Milton Jensen and Norven Nichols have been added to the staff as volunteers and are helping in some classes and teaching beginners. ### Explosions Rip Two Homes In Baton Rouge

Thsombe was brought to court by two policemen in civilian clothes. He did not look at those in the courtroom, but stared straight ahead at the members of the court. Negro volunteers continued to tour the trouble zone urging calm. Mitt Campbell, a 1958 Olympic champion from Plainfield, flew back to walk the streets talking peace. Mayor Sheshan urged the Negroes to "give us a couple of weeks. We've only been in office eight weeks." She said the discussion "resulted from problems that are very real." In both Plainfield and Newark, outside agitation was new again. Campbell told newsmen, "I believe this thing was agitated from the outside. These people had no organization whatsoever of their own." "This thing happened too damned quick for these people to have organized it." Newark Mayor Hugh Addonizio said long-standing problems of housing, education and jobs were pressed to riot proportions by "a rash of wild and extremist statements." He contended the statements came from outside agitators who were "conspicuously absent" once the trouble started. In Paterson, seven persons were jailed for Monday's outbreak of brick and bottle throwing and one man got a year in jail for handling a fire bomb, while police chased a few fresh incidents.

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# Private Anti-Poverty Plans Vying with Federal Effort

WASHINGTON (AP) — Private organizations are using the federal government's anti-poverty program as a springboard to launch their own efforts. The government would like nothing better than seeing an official upsurge stimulate a region where officials say 1.8 million people—one of every three residents—still live in poverty despite long-time concentration and heavy government outlays.

In Appalachia, mountains and valleys have proved virtually impervious to every sort of anti-poverty attack.

"We're trying to get the private sector to mount some complementary programs," said Samuel C. Sharp, director of the Center for Economic Opportunity at Ohio University, Athens, Ohio. "We think the government could use a little competition."

Sharp's center has a \$58,000 Office of Economic Opportunity grant. Other groups in Appalachia also have received grants to chart ways to put the government's money to work.

"It's all perfectly legal. In fact, these competitive programs have the blessing of Congress. In approving the anti-poverty legislation in 1964, the legislators declared it is the sense of the Congress that it is highly desirable to employ the resources of the private sector of the economy to help the federal States in all such efforts to further the policy of this act."

From the university campus just into the 475-county area of 12 states designated as the Appalachian region, Sharp's center is encouraging businessmen to develop their own programs to help Appalachia's poor.

The former clergyman, 46, cites as an example a garage

owner who trained several unemployed men as mechanics—without government financing. Sharp is collecting names of members of the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce—youth business and professional men, in setting up similar human development programs. The project is dubbed Operation Alternative, to be operated on the local level by Jaycee chapters.

In other areas of Appalachia, economic planning is advanced as the key to solving the area's problems.

"Building a strong local economy is the answer—and this will force the federal government right out of its job," said Philip C. Gross of Big Stone Gap, Va. Gross is a planner for Lenox, an organization which is trying, with the help of a \$35,000 government grant, to develop a self-sustaining economy in the three counties and one city it represents.

Gross said in an interview that some poverty programs are "job-ism" in where we come from. It's a work program, not a relief project known as the "Happy Pappy" program.

In this program, unemployed fathers are paid up to \$250 a month for such work as patching roads and cutting brush from "phantom" employes, some of whom are on the welfare program to a permanent job. Much of Appalachia's hard-core poverty is centered in the western tip of Virginia, where Big Stone Gap is located, and in southwestern West Virginia, eastern Kentucky and eastern Tennessee.

# 'Le General' Expected In St. Pierre Tomorrow

# Forgery Charge Upheld Against Union Stewards

HARTFORD (AP) — The State Supreme Court has upheld the forgery and conspiracy convictions of union stewards Archie Costa and Joseph Costa of Torrington despite efforts to clear him by his brother Alexander, also a union steward.

Both men were charged with four counts of forgery and one count of conspiracy in connection with the casting of payroll checks.

Archie Costa was steward for the union for employes of I.T. Kellogg Company, supervising general contractor on a road-building project in New York, Connecticut and Massachusetts.

Alexander was steward for the employes of the Bartlett Tree Expert Company, a subcontractor on the job.

Folios said the brothers falsified records and cashed checks issued to "phantom" employes of both companies.

Both men pleaded innocent, but during the trial Alexander testified that some of the forged signatures on checks might appear to be Archie's handwriting because Alexander had traced them from a list of employes which Archie had written down.

"Alexander thereby incriminated himself on the forgery counts but purported to explain the state's evidence against his brother and thus exonerate him," the upper court found.

The state's appeal was based on the grounds that both he and his brother should not have been represented by the same lawyer.

The appeal was handled by criminal lawyer F. Lee Bailey, who argued that under no circumstances can one attorney represent two defendants who must stand trial together, one of whom is innocent and the other guilty.

The State Supreme Court said however, that Archie Costa had chosen his lawyer—Richard R. Stewart—with full knowledge that the same attorney also represented his brother Alexander.

The court also ruled that Stewart's competence as a lawyer was "unquestioned" and that Bailey even disclaimed any purpose to "impugn" the "able defense counsel."

Bailey had argued that the jury might have misunderstood the motives for Alexander's attempt to "hang himself for Archie's benefit."

# Moscow Seen Cool To Arab War Plea

The assembly reconvenes Thursday after a three-day recess and may wind up the special session before the end of the week.

In the letter to Council President Endakachew Makonnen of Ethiopia, Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko charged Israel with bombing Egyptian towns and inhabitants in the Suez Canal area. He also said continued occupation of Arab land in Egypt, Jordan and Syria violated U.N. principles and infringed on Arab territorial sovereignty.

The Israelis announced they were returning Government House in Jerusalem to the United Nations. The building, on a hill just south of Jerusalem, had been the headquarters of the U.N. Truce Supervisory Organization since the 1948 Arab-Israeli war. During the six-day war last month, Jordanian forces seized it from the United Nations and the Israelis subsequently threw the Jordanians out.

# Vivien Leigh's Death Recalls GWTW Ailment

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The death of Vivien Leigh came as MGM was preparing for the sixth release of her greatest triumph, "Gone with the Wind."

The film company had asked the English actress to attend the festive opening of the Civil War epic in Atlanta, Ga., this fall, as she had done at the premiere in 1939 and the war centennial release in 1961. Now it appears that Olivia de Havilland will have the sad duty of representing the film troupe that made "Gone with the Wind" America's favorite movie.

Most of the other major figures connected with "Gone with the Wind" are dead: Miss Leigh, Clark Gable, Leslie Howard, producer David O. Selznick, director Victor Fleming, scenarist Sidney Howard, Thomas Mitchell, Hattie McDaniel, Ward Bond, Laura Hope Crews, Harry Davenport.

Miss Leigh died at 53 last Saturday in London hospital. She had suffered a return of the tuberculosis that afflicted her for the years following the filming of "Gone with the Wind."

"I am convinced that Vivien contracted it as a result of her run-down condition after the picture," Miss de Havilland said recently. "I've never seen any one work as hard as she did on 'Gone with the Wind.' By the time the picture was over, she was a shadow of her former self."

Vivien Leigh always gave understudy of her energies as an actress but never more than in her role as Scarlett O'Hara. She realized that she had to prove herself since there was widespread criticism that a virtually unknown British actress would be given the role of the fiery Southern belle.

She worked hard at softening her English accent to Southern tones, then labored five long months at 18 hours a day that scene when the studios worked six days a week, not five. She was invariably every sequence in the film and many involved her physical action.

Toward the end of the production, Selznick wanted a retake of a scene that took place at the beginning. But he took a look at the film and told her: "You look too old and too ill for the scene." Four North Korean soldiers were wounded, the army said. Two of the attacks were made by a South Korean infantry division on the west-central front about 40 miles north of Seoul and just east of the U.S. 2nd Infantry Division's sector.

The third attack was made on another South Korean unit on the central front about 60 miles northeast of Seoul.

A spokesman said in each attack the Communists crossed the demilitarized zone, threw grenades and fired automatic weapons. He said quick counterattacks by sentinels drove off the intruders and the South Koreans found two North Korean bodies in a search.

Eight border clashes have been reported since Sunday, including an attack early Sunday which killed three Americans and wounded a South Korean. At least nine North Koreans have been killed.

The Korean armistice line has been uneasy since last September due to what the U.N. Command rates as "sharply increased" North Korean hostile actions.

A record number of North Korean agents have been killed or captured in frequent gun battles far below the armistice line during the period.

South Korean President Chung Hee Park warned over the weekend that North Korea was creating tension as it did before the outbreak of the Korean War in 1950.

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### South Windsor School Panel Alters Some Regulations

The board of education made some changes in the rules and regulations at last night's special meeting.

A revision to the rules and regulations adopted last night noted that "the board shall consult with broad questions of educational policy and leave administrative details to delegated subordinates." The regulation previously read that the board would not concern itself with administrative details.

Mrs. Jane Romeyn moved that a sentence be added to a provision dealing with the formulating and approval of general policies. The addition states that all major policy revisions shall be on the agenda at least one meeting before the meeting where it is to be adopted.

Mrs. Romeyn noted that this would give the public more opportunity to react to any changes.

Standing committees consisting of board members may be appointed from year to year rather than the former policy statement of "from time to time."

Board member Harry Anderson added that a section concerning executive sessions of the board be added to the regulations. It was approved.

The new item states that "executive sessions shall be reserved for matters pertaining to personnel where public discussion could be detrimental to the best interest of the school system and/or the individual."

Other changes included a change in the duties of the superintendent of schools on attending local, regional, state and national educational meetings. Previously the section read that the superintendent would be expected to participate in such activities. The board moved to change the wording to read "encouraged to participate" instead of expected to participate.

Superintendent of schools Charles Warner said the payroll dates for the school year 1967-68 has been established for all school personnel.

Employees that work 12 months of the year will receive 26 paychecks and teachers will receive 22 paychecks.

Related school personnel other than teachers who work a ten month period will receive 20 checks during the school year from September to June.

A financial report dated June 30, presented by Warner, showed a balance of \$22,622 from the 1966-67 school board budget. A total of \$21,473 was appropriated and total expenditures of \$2,617,407.38 is shown.

**Burned Camp Was Scheduled For Phase Out**

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A state prison camp where 37 convicts died in a fire was a known fire hazard that was scheduled to be phased out of operation, Florida's cabinet learned Tuesday.

Doyle Comer, state agriculture commissioner and chairman of the cabinet's subcommittee on corrections, said state agents "knew" the World War II type wooden barracks at Road Camp 12, near Jay, were hazardous because of their flammable nature. Comer said the Jay camp was made of wooden barracks that the state has been removing from the prison system.

"We've been phasing out two to three each year," he said. "Obviously this should be accelerated and many of us regret we did not do it sooner."

In Milton, a coroner's jury ruled the Sunday night fire was a "criminal act of arson." It was started by three prisoners—Thomas E. Ard, 28, of Pensacola; Earl F. Hoffman, 41, of Tallahassee; and Joseph Earl Wynder, 21, of Marianna. All died in the flames.

The jury indicated it did not attempt to determine why the prisoners set the fire, but a guard testified he believed the fire was intended as retribution for his confiscation of a pornographic book from Ard.

In Tallahassee, State Fire Marshal Howard Williams said Ard's records listed him as a "suspected arsonist."

There were 51 prisoners in Camp 12 when the fire broke out. In addition to those killed, six were burned, one slightly. Eight escaped unharmed.

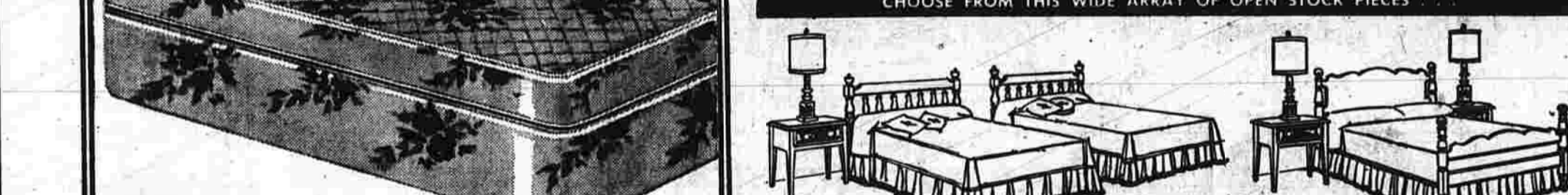

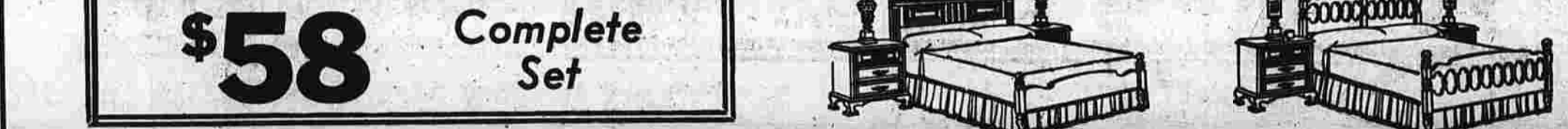
