UN With Income Of Its Own?

Another proposal toward solution of what is probably the most important financial problem in the history of man -the problem of how to get for the United Nations a non-national source of income which would enable it to conduct its necessary operations without being subject to financial veto by any of its members has now been put on the public stage.

The World Peace Through Law Conerence at Geneva adopted a number of resolutions all seeking eventual implenentation of its theory that only a world of law can be a world of peace and security for anybody. And it reelected Charles S. Rhyne, the former president of the American Bar Association who now devotes much of his time and energy to this concept, as President of the World Peace Through Law And in addition to these things, it

adopted a resolution urging the General Assembly of the United Nations to step right forward, please, and proclaim tself to be assuming "jurisdiction and control" over all the vast mineral resources of the high seas and the ocean eds beneath them.

The beautiful logic of such a proposal is that, although there is indeed untold wealth in and beneath the seas for future technological exploitation, there is no national government anywhere which lays claim to ownership of or sovereignty over anything greater than mues from the own shores

Nobody owns it now. Why not, thereore, have the United Nations take title to it all? At the moment, this would nean almost nothing, income wise. But, as our technological reach into the sea continues and it will necessarily accelerate as man continues to deplete other resources—the United Nations would eventually have enough income from royalties to finance all its necessary activities, its peace patrols, and the activities of what will one day, one must hope, be its own world police force, the only armed force, one hopes, of its size in the world.

- It is impossible to escape the rudimentary and very unidealistic idea that the conscience of the world might be able to operate a little more readily and afficiently through the United Nations if it knew where the money was comng from to pay for keeping the peace that ought to be kept.

A Few Months And It's A Cycle It seems to us that we are now emerging from some five or six years of rather extreme drought, for which the weathermen never really had any great cosmic explanation, and that we have now had just a few months of wet and cold, which might presumably wait another month or two for fundamental pronouncements.

But our presumption is in error. The climatologists are already out in the open, proclaiming that the whole earth is now apparently well into a cooling trend. In fact, it is now being admitted that the average world-wide temperature has gone down by a whole half degree since 1940, and that this is enough to produce the cold, wet trend we have been noticing the past few months. Why didn't it produce cold wet weather in 1966 or 1965? We must not be impertinent while we are being informed. Let us continue being informed. The cooling trend, now that we have noticed it, may last for 20 years.

Why is it a cooling trend? Here the experts are generous, and offer us a choice. If you are one of ose people who believe that there is never really anything new under the sun, you can have a classical scientific theory, to the effect that the sun itself is on a normal cycle of lower energy output, a cycle that should reverse

itself about 1987. If, on the other hand, you prefer to think that there must be some kind of villain behind everything that happens, and you enjoy berating the sins and follies of modern man even more than you enjoy talking about the weather. the scientists offer a most enjoyable heory. This is the theory that our intrial and traffic wastes, derkening and griming the air, are gradually hickening into an atmospheric layer which, as time goes on, will reflect more and more solar heat away, from the

theory, we will all subside into a car bon-coated deep freeze, for some future explorers from outer space to uncover and thew out.

We find the second theory the more enticing, especially since it offers the only known solution to the present problems in which our world has engulfed itself. But we fear that, in reality, it will be the cyclical explanation which will stand up, and that this poor old world is fated to continue its mundane existence for some eons to come, with nothing really ever new under that monotonous sun of ours.

A Blissful Breed Did you know, last weekend, a railroad strike was in the offing? Did you know, anytime Sunday evening or early Monday morning, that trains had aiready stopped running? Wouldn't you imagine, in any case

that if you were a commuter, scheduled to use a train to go to work on Monday morning, you would somehow have maintained at least some degree of exposure to news about whether a strike These questions are in order, because

what actually happened at many railroad stations was that many Monday morning customers appeared as usual. kissed their wives goodbye, and then turned toward the railroad tracks to discover there was nothing running on The emergence of such a blissfu

breed inspires envy over the kind of life they must lead. These are, obviously, the people who obey implicitly the Biblical injunction to give no thought to the morrow. Their life is apparently so full of fascinating pastimes and high concerns that to worry about some mundane, plebeian thing like getting to work on a Monday morning is far beneath them. The grubbers of the world may worry about catching trains; the loftier spirits take it for granted that the train will be waiting for them. In their special world, there is no rea-

son why they should read a newspaper

or listen to the radio, or watch the

news on television. Why clutter up

their superior minds with trivia from the world of ordinary people? Somehow, this seems likely to become our chief memory of the 1967 great national railroad strike—the poised, sophisticated character who arrives es the railroad station as usual, kisses his wife as usual, turns to the station as usual, and then, really without losing very much of his poise and assurance and higher worldliness even after he discovers the rude facts of the situa-

But somehow the results haven't quite worked out as promised. You would certainly be hard put to prove that there is less juvenile delinquency or adult orime, or that the morality or intelligence of people is higher, than in the days when the education span was shorter and higher education was reserved for those who really wanted to

This disillusionment with the magical powers of education hardly challenges the worth of education as a social good. It has, however, already begun to make thoughtful men within the educational field wonder about some of the assumptions underlying our educational system. It is even being suggested in hushed tones that education, like other medicines, can be over-dosed and possibly have adverse side effects.

One of the assumptions underlying our thinking, for example is that everyody-well, just about everybodywants more education and will be eager to take it if offered. The few who do not are supposedly suffering from either poor motivation or poor preparation, both of which should be susceptible to correction by more and better educa-

This assumption has been particularly strong at the college level, since almost every college is inundated with applicants, suggesting a ravenous appetite for education. Moved by this and by dissatisfaction with the old idea of college as a disciplined, structured place for young people, several colleges have tried very permissive approach to their freshment, abolishing grades, attendance requirements and a fixed curriculum. ently president James Dixon of
