The Course of Empire... American regret over the British decision to drive in the one-line railroad and travel powers of British imperialism...

He is indeed handsome... Every handsome who had an impulse to do something about him and didn't will be pleased to know that some 8,000 Americans, mostly housewives of varying ages, did write a letter to the new star who appeared on television during the month of June.

He was, as our lady readers have already begun to guess and remember, the good and handsome Elton R. Tubor, permanent representative to the United Nations from the nation of Denmark, and president of the Security Council during the month of June.

Being president of the Council during the month of June gave him a grand total of some 51 hours of exposure on American television, and although he almost never exposed his full six feet three inches of impressive height to his audience, he seemed to grow a bigger man day by day of November.

Although the women of the country pretended they liked him mostly because he was so handsome, or so tactful, or so strong, or so gentle, and although many of them wrote him in that vein, the main appeal he offered was probably something a shade deeper and more mysterious.

He was, with his capacity for maintaining order and keeping debate in the midst of war on a civilized footing, a symbol of something better, a word together, a father symbol rather than a husband or a lover symbol. It was a wonderful discovery to find, at the very heart of crisis such a very considerate man, with such wonderful human qualities.

Interviews with Delegate Tubor in his own city and in the quiet privacy of the interest shown in him, and that he isn't letting it go to his head. In fact, his modest comment is that his few small instances have deeply interested women have become in the affairs of their world.

Such modesty becomes him too. We don't want to distort his modesty, but he has a good start, at the world itself lives long enough, toward becoming an unbeatable candidate for president of the world.

Now the news of impending withdrawal of British withdrawals from the famous old outposts of British imperialism, to means, to Washington, an increased demand upon United States power for such policing and sphere of influence expansion as will guarantee that the areas being vacated by Britain do not fall like neglected fruit into somebody else's hand.

So there is some bitter feeling at Washington that Britain is shirking its world duty, that the burden being placed on this country for it to carry almost alone in the world is almost too great for even as to afford.

We wish we could prove it that Britain, instead of being merely tired and poor, was also being ignorantly wise, and, instead of trying to leave us in the lurch, trying to lead the way and educate us toward the kind of world this ought to be and has to be in the future. And there seems little doubt that there is in Britain's decision some degree of a realization that the age of imperialism, and that of power politics, has to pass, if the world is to find itself a system for life.

Britain's unwavering dedication and ability to United Nations concepts and purposes, if it comes to an end, without undue deference to or fear of any other great power, would be a far greater contribution to future world stability and peace than any maintenance or expansion of the outworn trappings of imperialism could ever prove.

Unfortunately, Britain hasn't taken to preaching openly and clearly, what it may be practicing.

Unfortunately, the United States now finds itself, power-wise, especially-wise, at a point in history similar to that of all the other great empires which have controlled the affairs of man for their allotted time and space. Unfortunately, the United States has its own natural tendency to pick up an empire by inheritance, by accident, by abasement, all these being some of the gentler ways Britain acquired its empire in the United States. It is, in almost the impossible, that it is the first potential empire to announce its program even while it is young and vigorous and powerful and wealthy instead of waiting until it has become old and tired and weak and poorer. We are being asked, by a higher brand of historic necessity than the world has ever experienced before, to give up the empire game before we have even begun to play it through.

But nobody is asking us very clearly. We ourselves are not facing the decision very directly. We are going ahead, blundering into new pieces of empire, picking up other people's discarded, trying to do a little good here, say a little kindness there, without ever telling ourselves very forcefully that, whatever our motivations, the present day name of the game has to be smaller. We are being asked, by a higher brand of historic necessity than the world has ever experienced before, to give up the empire game before we have even begun to play it through.

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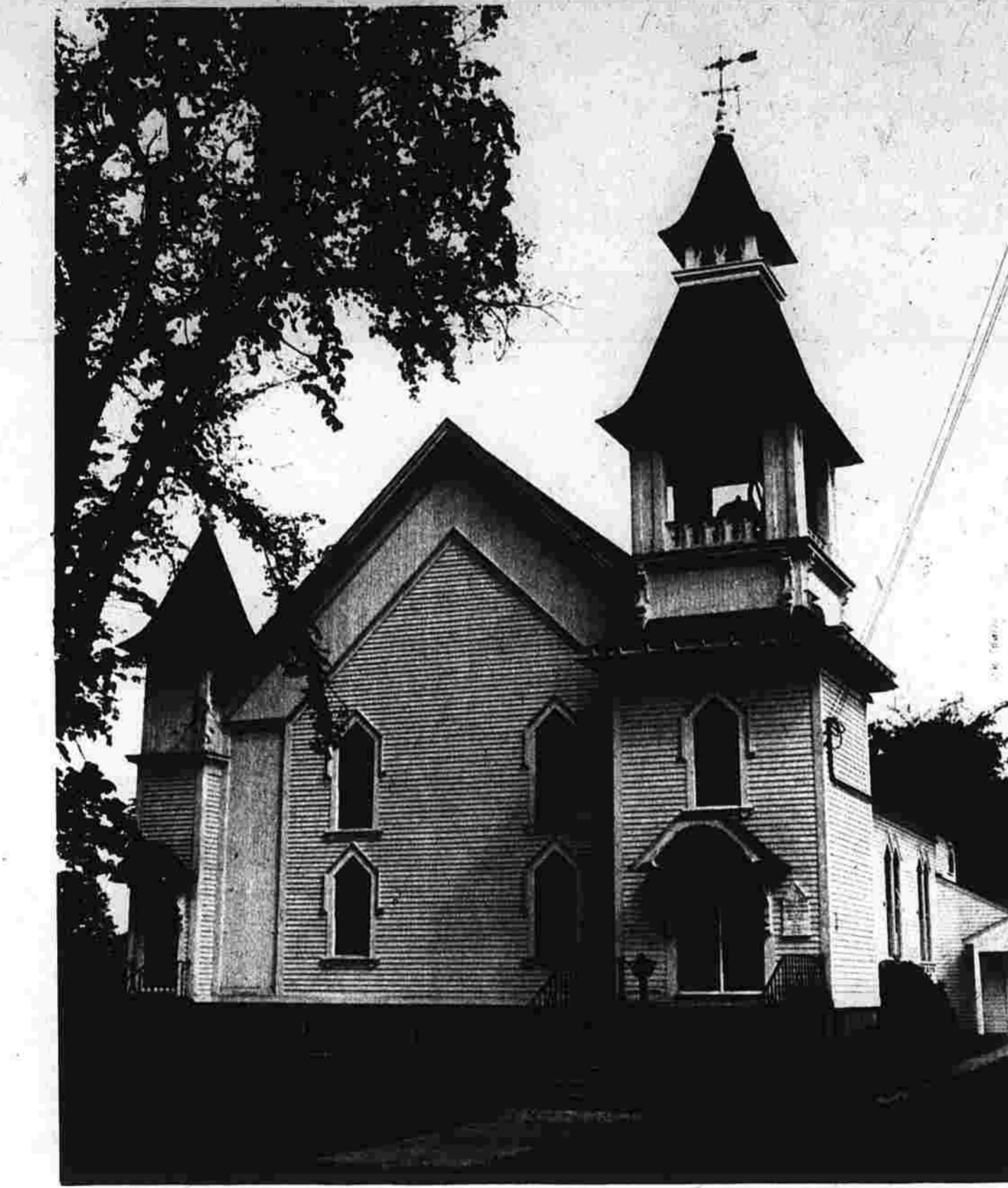

Audain Resigning MEXICO CITY (AP) — Haiti's ambassador to Mexico, Jules Audain, says he is resigning his post because of the "separatist" views now prevailing in his country.

Audain, the dean of the diplomatic corps in Mexico, said he still considers himself a friend of Haiti's President Francois Duvalier but plans to stay in Mexico, writing his memoirs and following his former profession as a civil engineer.

The popular diplomat said Donald's dictatorship was on "such a psychosis of fear that nobody dares contradict him." He said he had often advised Duvalier to relax his rule but to no avail.

"I truly can't see any possible solution to the problems now facing my country," Audain said.

Publisher to Sue JERICO (AP) — An attorney for publisher Heli Fernandes, banished for a bitter editorial attack on the late former President Joao Goulart, says he is asking the Brazilian supreme court for a writ of habeas corpus.

Fernandes was banished Thursday to the desolate island of Fernando de Noronha, 225 miles off Brazil's northeast coast. A front-page editorial in his paper after Castello Branco was killed in a plane collision Tuesday said the president was calculating and merciless and humiliated not only his death.

Justice Minister Luiz da Gama e Silva said the editorial was a threat to order and asserted the banishment was not an arrest. "Just a residence order."

Last year Castello Branco stripped the 44-year-old publisher of his citizenship and government, of his political rights.

LSD User Sentenced AUCKLAND, New Zealand (AP) — The first man found guilty of LSD possession after being outlawed in New Zealand was sentenced to six weeks in prison today.

Police told an Auckland magistrate that Mark Houghton Cavite, 28, a freelance writer, was found with 22 pieces of LSD, increased blotting paper on July 11, the day after legislation placed the drug under the narcotics act.

South Windsor Post Office Questionnaire Asks Mail Delivery Choice

Postal official Donald P. Steele, regional director for the post office department, has requested residents of Wapping to indicate through a questionnaire their preference on mail delivery by mail boxes or door-to-door service.

In a cover letter, Steele noted that for approximately three years, up to October of last year, budgetary limitations required that mail deliveries to all newly developed areas be to mail boxes located at curbsides.

"As a result, hundreds of thousands of postal patrons, who are not in some instances, have been inconvenienced by the former residences, found themselves forced to locate their mail boxes at their new homes at the curbside," he said.

Steele commented that this was evidence although the characteristics of the neighborhoods involved were similar to those of the old neighborhoods of the people involved.

Noting that the files in the Boston headquarters of the New England region contain "thousands of patrons' objections to curbside delivery," Steele said, "Wapping is well represented in these files."

Other comments approving the new system have been heard in town but not to the extent of a special application to institute door delivery to those families previously denied curbside service.

The general comment seems to be "if other towns get the service of door delivery on their mail for the same amount we pay for federal taxes and thereby depriving us of the service and convenience."

Typical of the people requesting door delivery were mothers of young children and babies who did not wish to leave the children out of sight and the elderly and infirm as well as many people who merely dislike the inconvenience caused by going after their mail at curbside boxes during inclement weather.

Inconveniences Noted Steele continued that "we recognize the fact that mail carriers prefer delivery to curbside boxes. We encourage curbside delivery because it is economical," Steele said.

4 Women Weld Crowbars Again In Salvage Work

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Three four barelegged women welding crowbars are at it again.

W. J. Cooper describes his all-girl welding team as "a real equal rights, daddy."

The girls live in apartments with the men of their own choice. They are all members of the same church and are all members of the same union. That's the only power we've got."

They are Ann Pearson, mother of three; her daughter Sheila Ann; Sue Brown, another mother of three; and Estelene Cushing, mother of five.

Saving their housework for evening, the women rip away at partitions, wreck brick walls and load salvage aboard trucks during the day.

"This isn't just a man's world, you know," Mrs. Pearson said. "There are a few disadvantages. I've used to have nice hands, but Mrs. Pearson, who also drives a truck for Cooper. "My husband won't hold them anymore."

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — From black nationalists to the organization difficult in Negro communities.

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River Warfare Schools Trains Sailors for Viet

FAIRFIELD, Conn. (AP) — The men are being trained for the most intense, Viet Cong, jungle that took a bloody toll earlier in the week longer war.

Why do widows outnumber widowers? To the traditional team of work and worry, long branded the quality pair, weight has been so strongly linked by science that dieting, once a woman's pastime, has become a most preoccupied one.

And now comes evidence that it isn't just the paunch, but the sagging, drooping abdomen that gives the girl's figure may also be extending their life.

The idea that control under shorts, tightening the abdominal muscles and expanding the chest, improve not merely appearance but health isn't exactly a new one. Long before modern drugs came on the market, doctors prescribed abdominal belts for men with heart ailments.

But new research, reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association, seemed to show that the new drugs may be no more effective than the old-fashioned corsets.

Illustration of the belt prevented the abnormal postures increase in the amplitude of the A-wave of the electrocardiogram, just as popularly prescribed gynecological trisuits.

How do control shorts help the heart? One famed medical writer, Dr. F. J. Stetson, writes that it helps the circulation of the blood and "thereby takes an unnecessary load off the heart. And when you multiply this by the heartbeats which add up to a few billion in the normal lifetime, one can understand how a simple device can be so important to the health of the heart."

With a few conspicuous exceptions, whites were excluded from what had originally been billed as a public meeting in the Mt. Zion AME church.
