

U.S., Viet Troopers Hack Red Regulars

SARIGON (AP) — The South Vietnamese army patrolling the southern half of the demilitarized zone killed 25 North Vietnamese regulars Sunday about a mile inside the once-neutral area, a South Vietnamese spokesman said today.

Elsewhere, U.S. 4th Division infantry with massive artillery support wiped out a North Vietnamese company in the central highlands near Pleiku, killing 124 of an estimated 150 enemy soldiers.

American pilots attacking North Vietnam struck north of Hanoi at the vital rail links with Red China. They reported no meetings with enemy MIGs and no losses to ground fire.

U.S. Marines and South Vietnamese troops first invaded the demilitarized zone in mid-May for a massive sweep of positions the Communists had in the southern half of the zone. After a running series of battles, the Americans and South Vietnamese withdrew.

Since then, American troops have been back only once, but the South Vietnamese have made several patrols in and out of the zone, their headquarters disclosed today. The spokesman implied this was a regular thing and further patrolling in the zone could be expected.

The U.S. Command said 22 Americans were killed and 39 wounded in the action west of Pleiku and that eight enemy prisoners were taken. Most of the American losses occurred in a heavy enemy mortar and rocket barrage at the start of the four-hour engagement in the steaming jungle.

As an infantry patrol came into heavy initial contact, 4th Division artillerymen began a rain of 3,320 shells on the North Vietnamese.

Dozens of battles, many inconclusive, have been fought in the area of jagged, mist-shrouded peaks along the frontier which is one of the chief infiltration routes for the North Vietnamese.

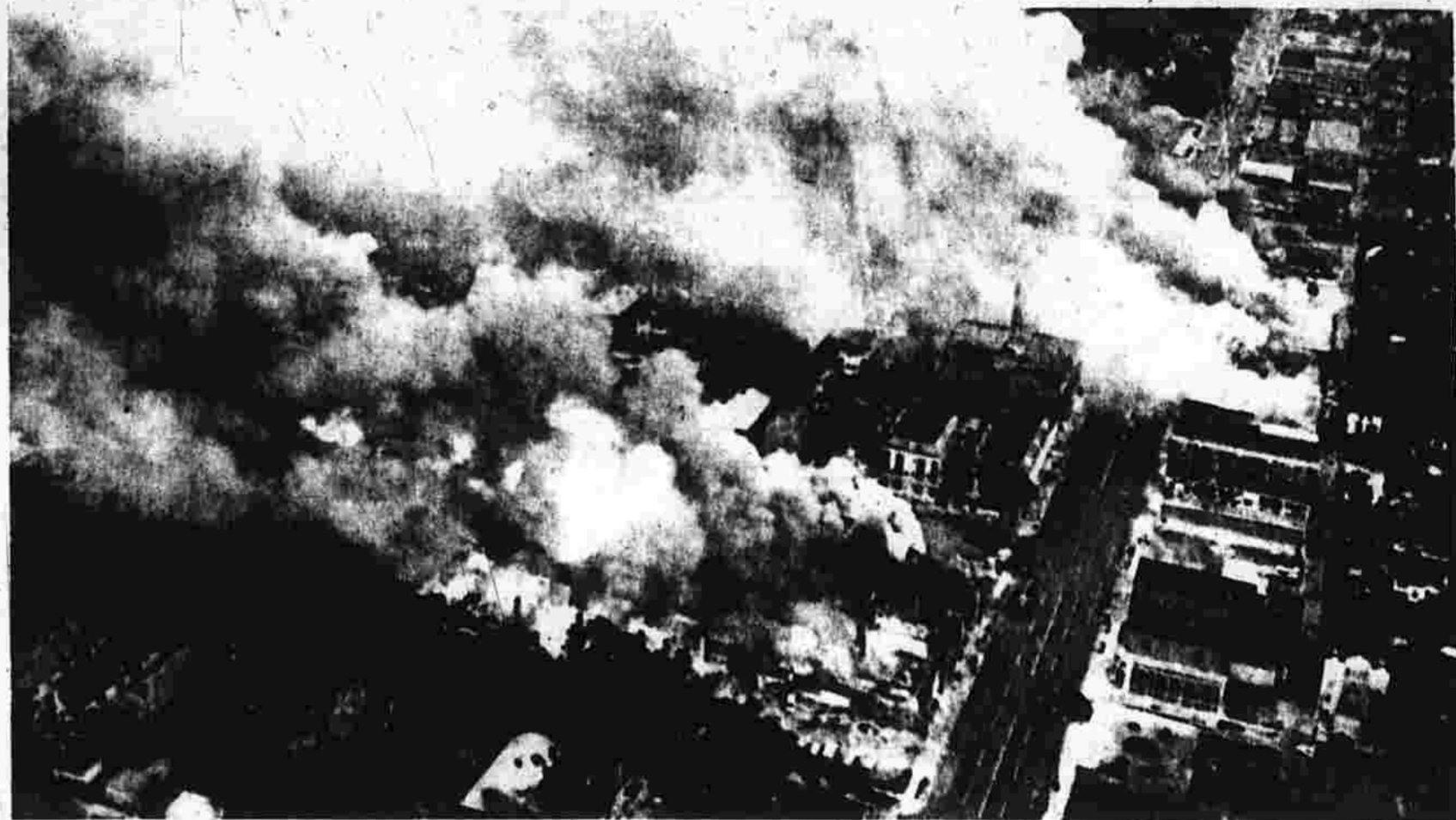
Sweeping along Route 9 just below the demilitarized zone, American Marines discovered 30 claymore mines—each capable of spraying deadly fragments a hundred yards or more—which the Communists had strung along the road for a mile. A convoy caught by the mines would have been battered terribly.

U.S. headquarters reported four B52 raids in South Vietnam today including two in the dense jungles of the A Shau Valley. The valley is a main Red base camp and infiltration route toward the central highlands and the northern section of the nation and has been hit about 25 times this month.

Air Force, Navy and Marine pilots flew 120 missions Sunday over North Vietnam despite spotty weather.

Marine pilots in one of their deepest strikes of the war hit the Thai Nguyen power complex some 40 miles above Hanoi before dawn.

Turkey Digs Out; 86 Bodies Found

ADAPAZARI, Turkey (AP) — Premier Suleyman Demirel, Turkish officials say 86 bodies have been recovered so far from the earthquake that rocked western and central Turkey Saturday. At least 110 were injured, half critically, and officials said the death toll could run into the hundreds.

Workers dug through rubble in Adapazarı and 458 other villages and towns under a scorching sun, seeking persons buried in the ruins of flattened communities.

The U.S. Consulate in Istanbul checked American personnel, including those at the U.S. Royal and Goodyear rubber plants near here and reported none killed or injured.

Republicans May Assail War Policy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Republican leaders could produce a fresh GOP assault on President Johnson's Vietnam war policies.

Eisenhower's suggestion that Congress consider declaring war on North Vietnam got a cold reception from party leaders late last week.

But his contention that the war must have priority over domestic programs seems to have solid support among members of the Republican Party Coordinating Committee.

The coordinating group, made up of congressional leaders, governors and former presidential candidates, meets today but had no specific Vietnam items on its day-long agenda.

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, however, forecast a policy pronouncement on defense spending likely to emphasize the threat of a huge deficit if domestic outlays are not reduced.

Highway Deaths Increase by 12 Over 1967 Total

HARTFORD (AP) — Traffic accidents in Connecticut during the first half of 1967 have caused 201 deaths—12 more than during the same period in 1966, according to the Connecticut Safety Commissioner.

Communities with a population of 10,000 or more registered 65 per cent of the total fatalities.

Thirty-eight of the traffic deaths, 19 per cent of the total, occurred in the state's six largest cities. Of those deaths, 11 were pedestrians.

Nasser Asks Sacrifices in New Budget

CAIRO (AP) — President Gamal Abdel Nasser's new budget being published today calls for sacrifices to enable war-crippled Egypt to struggle against Israel, but Nasser says the door is still open for a political settlement.

In a broadcast speech Sunday night, Nasser said he had "no objection to conferring with the Americans" on restoring peace to the Middle East and had instructed Egypt's United Nations delegation "to meet with the Americans if feasible."

Nasser's speech, his first in six weeks, was considered surprisingly restrained in tone although there were plentiful references to the United States.

The Egyptian leader again blamed it for the Israeli victory in the June 5-6 war but revised his charges.

Nasser dropped his claim during the war that U. S. planes attacked the Arabs. Instead, he said President Johnson engaged in deceptive diplomatic maneuvers which masked the Israeli attack and this enabled the Is- (See Page Ten)

Death Toll at Five; Nearly 1,000 Injured

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson ordered federal troops to the Detroit area today and promised every needed assistance in handling the riot which has ravaged the city. Johnson also drafted Cyrus R. Vance, former deputy secretary of defense, to fly to Detroit for conference to determine exactly what conditions are and what federal help is needed.

The troops are being flown to Selfridge Air Force Base, about 30 miles from Detroit. It will be up to Johnson to issue additional orders if they are actually to be sent into Detroit.

DETROIT (AP) — The death toll mounted to five and the number of injured climbed near 1,000 today as Gov. George Romney called for federal troops to help quash two days of wild Negro rioting.

Property damage soared over \$10 million. Fires set Sunday raged unchecked and many sections as rioting coursed crazily through an ill-defined area covering more than six of the city, the nation's fifth largest.

The governor retired to his home in Suburban Bloomfield Hills for a nap, after touring the city with Mayor Jerome Cavanagh and writing his plea for help to President Johnson and U.S. Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark.

Romney said experience had shown that the second night of racial rioting "usually was worse than the first."

"Without help, the situation could become uncontrollable," he told newsmen.

The latest deaths were that of a Negro looter shot down in a supermarket by a Negro guard, and that of an elderly Negro found burned to death in an alley on the city's East Side.

The latter was the first death reported on the East Side, almost a dozen miles from where the rioting, looting and fire bombing erupted early Sunday.

Quinlan's list included the three dead, plus 450 injured, eight by gunfire, but apparently none critically; more than 1,000 stores looted; 260 fires; more than \$100 million property damage.

Looters filled cartons and shopping bags and backed their autos up to stores, stuffing goods into the trunks and back seats. (See Page Ten)

Spanish Harlem Boils Over Again

NEW YORK (AP) — Puerto Ricans spilling from crowded tenements spread violence through Spanish Harlem again early today, bottle-bombing police from streets and rooftops and looting stores from the edges of high-rent white neighborhoods to Negro Harlem.

More than 1,000 helmeted officers struggled for a second night to return calm to the Spanish-speaking area, cajoling crowds and moving them with their nightsticks at first, while avoiding arrests.

Then officers fired a volley of about 15 shots at a suspected sniper atop a building, and cleared street corners with their nightsticks stalling.

A police official reported that the block on Third Avenue between 10th and 108th streets, usually throbbing with Latin music, was "destroyed" and that "the only thing we can do is stop the looting."

One policeman and one fireman were reported injured. The disturbance did not cross into the smart, virtually all-white upper East Side or central Harlem with its enormous Negro population, the scene of racial rioting in 1964.

The renewed violence in El Barrio, Spanish for "the neighborhood" came late Sunday night as Puerto Rican leaders discussed with Police Commissioner Howard R. Leary a similar five-hour outbreak Saturday. Mayor John V. Lindsay had worked out a short-lived truce with community spokesmen after the first night's trouble.

But Puerto Ricans charged the city had gone back on its word by sending the riot-trained Tactical Patrol Force into the area again Sunday. The special elite corps consists of six-footers specially trained for such disturbances. They were rushed (See Page Ten)

New Britain Is Calm After 2 Unruly Nights

NEW BRITAIN (AP) — Calm prevailed today—"It's all nice and quiet right now," police said—after two straight nights of scattered rock-throwing incidents in Negro sections of New Britain.

During the troubles, helmeted police kept the situation in hand with the help of shields and, in the initial incident early Sunday morning, with dogs.

"Everything is in pretty good order," Police said today. The first word of trouble Sunday evening came from near Hartford Avenue and North Street, where groups of Negroes were reported stoning passing cars. The intersection had been the scene of a scuffle early Sunday morning in which a white man had been pulled from his car and beaten and robbed by Negro youths.

Police reported that the Negroes at the intersection Sunday night were stoning selected cars on signal and letting others go by unscathed.

In another section of the city near the Mt. Pleasant Housing Project, a group of about 100 rock-throwing Negroes stoned a police cruiser.

Shortly before 11 p.m. Mayor Paul J. Manafort donned a riot helmet and set out with a group of police officials to quiet the Mt. Pleasant disorder. When he reached the scene, however, the crowd had dispersed.

Also around 11 p.m. the police called out their auxiliaries and activated their 12 o'clock shift. Forty-five officers barricaded five blocks of the Hartford Avenue section and began dispersing groups of Negroes.

There were no outright confrontations between the police and any large groups of Negroes. At about 11:30 p.m. Manafort (See Page Ten)

Puerto Rico Vote Hailed by Munoz

SAN JUAN, P.R. (AP) — Supporters of commonwealth government in Puerto Rico today had the vote of confidence they wanted from island voters, but their next move wasn't clear.

In a victory statement Sunday night, former Gov. Luis Munoz Marin said there were no immediate plans to request any additional powers from the U.S. Congress.

Elated, Munoz hailed the outcome as proof that Puerto Ricans support commonwealth "as the only political form that is fully adapted to the needs of Puerto Rico."

Commonwealth received 425,081 votes, 60.5 per cent of the total; statehood received 273,315 votes, or 38.9 per cent, and independence received 4,305, six-tenths of 1 per cent.

Most independence groups boycotted the plebiscite. Pre-election forecasts had said commonwealth would need at least 60 per cent for a clear-cut victory.

The victory was seen as a personal triumph for Munoz, 49, four-time governor of the island and chief architect of the commonwealth link with the United States in 1952.

The four cornerstones of commonwealth, according to Munoz, are common citizenship, com- (See Page Seven)

mon defense, common currency and a common market.

Munoz came out of semi-retirement to lead a vigorous campaign for commonwealth. He spoke in virtually every town and hamlet on the island.

In urging the plebiscite last year, a special advisory committee recommended naming a joint U.S.-Puerto Rican commission to study ways to implement the voters' mandate. It appeared that might be the next step.

Munoz said the chief result of the voting was an end to the "sterile debate" on the island's status that has raged since America took it from Spain in 1898.

In his victory statement, he said, "As far as I and the people of Puerto Rico are concerned, today's vote puts an end to the status debate."

Luis Ferré, chief campaigner for statehood, did not agree. At a celebration in his hometown of Ponce, one of a half-dozen areas to favor statehood, Ferré predicted eventual victory.

The total voter turnout of 702,801 was 55.3 per cent of the island's 1.1 million registered voters, somewhat below the pre- (See Page Seven)

Shriver Cancels Meetings On New Jersey Race Riots

NEWARK, N.J. (AP)—Sen. Frank Shriver, director of the Office of Economic Opportunity, has canceled meetings planned today with New Jersey Gov. Richard J. Hughes and Newark Mayor Hugh J. Addonizio on recent racial disturbances in the state.

Shriver's office in Washington, D.C., said the cancellations were forced by "unforeseen circumstances" but that the principals had agreed to postpone the talks without setting a new date.

Shriver was expected to confer with Hughes on racial violence during the past two weeks which left 27 dead. He also was to discuss with Addonizio charges that members of the city's anti-poverty agency—the Newark Community Corp.—helped instigate the riots in Newark.

Hughes, a Democrat, said in a television address that "young militants" who turn to violence must be isolated from the community to prevent future race riots.

He did not say how they were to be isolated. But he warned "there are many other Newark in this country."

In a session with newsmen after the Sunday program, Hughes announced new progress toward a Negro to the post of school board secretary.

The man who set Newark's anti-poverty agency disagreed with Addonizio, Cyril Tyson, now deputy administrator of New York City's Human Resources Administration, appearing on WNBC-TV's "Searchlight" program, said it was politics rather than poverty that caused the rioting.

Tyson, a Negro, said the Newark riots stemmed from the City Council's foot dragging on anti-poverty funds, the plan to put the medical school in the heavily Negro area allegedly without supplying alternate housing, and the mayor's backing of a white city councilman for school board secretary instead of a better-educated Negro.

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Troop Tour Seen Eclipsing McNamara Visit to Vietnam

SAIGON (AP)—Some observers in Saigon consider the visit of Gen. William C. Westmoreland, commander of U.S. forces in South Vietnam, indicated Sunday that the United States will increase its advisers with the military. Sources here say the Philippines has been asked to provide advisers also for these forces.

Korean sources in Saigon indicate that Korean military leaders would like to increase the force in Vietnam. It is considered unlikely that President Johnson would have sent the two men around to the allies if he did not have advance indication that some of them are willing to increase their contribution.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT Communicable diseases rose sharply in town this year, Dr. Nicholas A. Marziano, the town's director of Health, reported.

A total of 13 diseases accounted for 474 cases this year, compared to 266 last year.

Inspections of meat, restaurants, houses, septic tanks and pool rooms totaled 2,523 this year, compared to 4,807 last year, the director's annual report showed.

A major activity of the health department this year was inspecting 2,638 housing units, Dr. Marziano said.

Although the department has never installed an inspection under the Housing Code ordinance, the doctor said, the department has adopted a policy of requesting inspection.

Dr. Marziano said the department maintains a file on unsanitary dwelling units and hopes that after the initial inspection of the whole town, the department again may request inspection of the unsanitary units.

"It is anticipated that the initial go-around will require another three or four years to complete," he said.

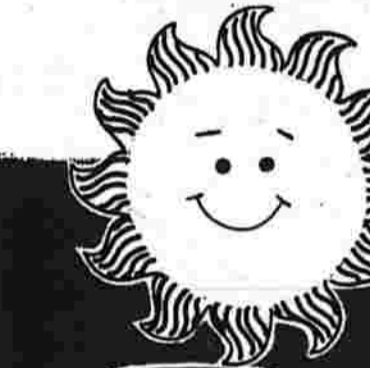

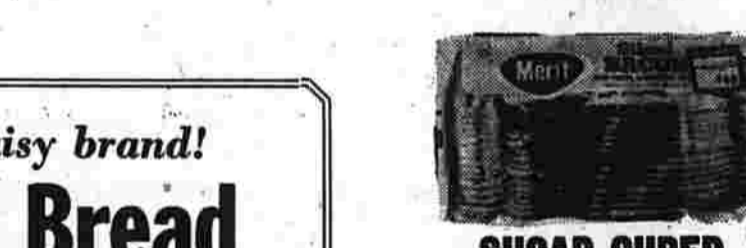

Funeral Service Set For Carl Sandburg

FLAT ROCK, N.C. (AP) — News hired him as a writer and he had served as foreign correspondent for a feature syndicate.

Then his literary career began. He collected songs of mountain people, cowboys and railroad gangs. With his guitar he gave poetry readings, folk concerts across this country.

The Sandburgs lived for years in Harbort, Mich., but in 1945 left the Lake Michigan winters and moved to Flat Rock, a village of old homes amid towering trees along a plateau on the crest of the Blue Ridge.

Sandburg, a familiar figure in the Blue Ridge Mountains since moving here more than two decades ago, had been in ill health two years. At his bedside at the end of his wife Alice 1966, Lillian Paula Sandburg.

He liked to be referred to as a spokesman for the little man. Sandburg was particularly noted for his Lincoln biography. Both men were poor, obtained haphazard educations and struggled hard to make a living.

The Lincoln biography, a painstaking work of 15 years, won him his first Pulitzer Prize. Sandburg, a picturesque figure of broad mouth and full head of straight, snow-white hair, won his second Pulitzer Prize in 1951 for his "Complete Poems."

He was born Jan. 6, 1878, in Galeburg, Ill., the son of Swedish emigrants. The blacksmith railroad worker father was poor, and Carl dropped out of school at 13 to work. He drove a milk wagon, harvested ice, swept out a barber shop, labored in pottery and tin shops.

At 17, he hopped to Kansas City and worked as a dishwasher, at Denver and Omaha as a railroad section hand.

When the Spanish American War broke out he was back in Galeburg as an apprentice house painter. He enlisted in the Sixth Illinois Infantry and served eight months in Puerto Rico.

After the war he spent a year at Galeburg's Lombard College, then was selected for appointment to the U.S. Military Academy. He was at West Point only briefly for he had to undergo entrance examinations. After that he returned to Lombard.

After finishing Lombard, he pursued all sorts of jobs including an organizer for the Social Democratic party, secretary to Milwaukee's mayor, and newspaperman. The Chicago Daily

Weekend Mishaps Claim Nine Lives

FAIRFIELD (AP) — The performance of the Democratic-dominated General Assembly will make it easier for Republicans to win in local elections this fall, according to the House minority leader.

The first Connecticut legislative under one man-one vote referendum demonstrated that the Democrats "do not intend to strengthen local government in preparation for the new partnerships to come with the state and federal governments to solve the urban problem," said State Rep. Nicholas A. Lange, R-West Hartford.

Speaking at a GOP picnic Saturday, Lange said the earmarks of the Democratic Party are "too many overlapping functions, suffocating bureaucracy, inefficiency and the vain attempt of higher level government, state and federal, to administer local."

The majority Democratic Legislature was "responsive to the needs of the people," he said, but "not responsive to the hopes, wishes, requests and needs of the people in Connecticut communities."

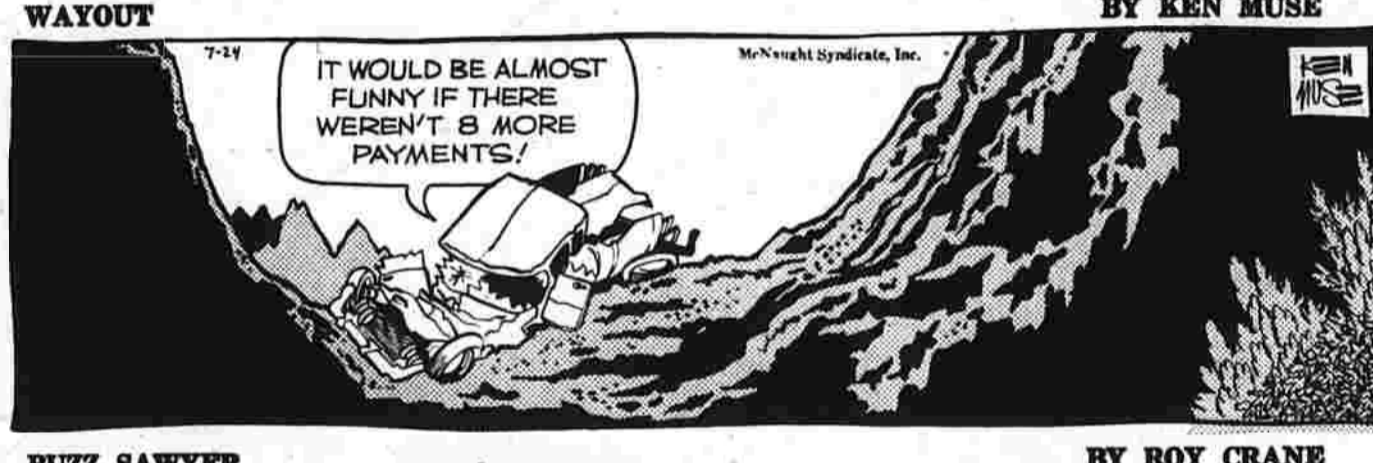

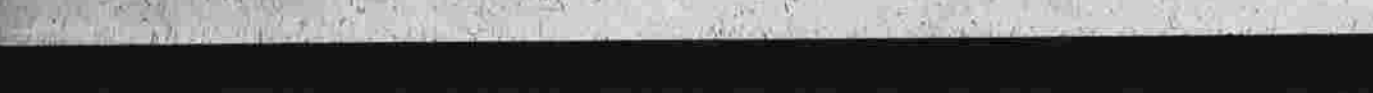
