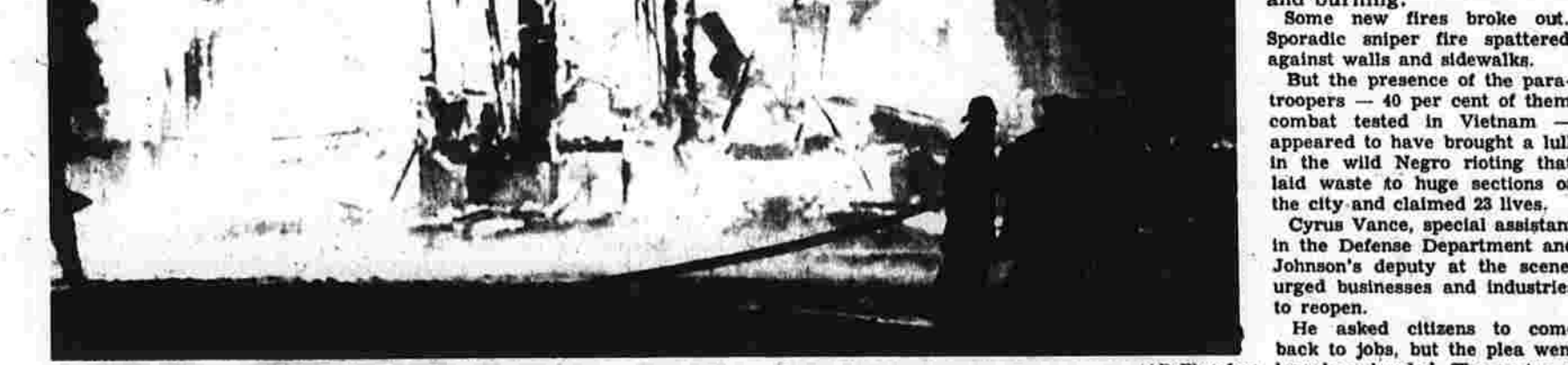

Every summer along our coast there are reports of sharks seen close to shore and the bathing beaches are closed until they disappear. Normally sharks prefer the deeper waters for hunting, but sometimes follow porpoises or fish into the shallows. They are basically fish eaters, but when hungry will go after anything, including octopus, tuna, sizable squid, and even whales! They are highly cannibalistic and instantly turn upon an injured companion. A weird assortment of articles has been found in shark stomachs, including tin cans, bottles, rocks, pieces of even a cow, and a piece of wire.

What makes sharks so vicious? What triggers their attacks on humans? Is there possibly some strange attraction in the human body that attracts them, or do they just kill for the fun of it? The answers to these and many more questions about sharks are still unknown.

Jacques Cousteau, the famous French oceanic expert, put it this way: "The more I see of sharks, the less I know about them. No one can say with certainty what one of them will do at any given moment." There is a story that a shark once bit a man's leg off, but he was able to swim back to shore and was rescued.

These "Wolves of the Sea" are not as ferocious as they are sometimes called. First appeared on earth about 350 million years ago. They have changed little through the ages and remain one of the most primitive forms of life known.

Shark teeth 5 inches long have been found, which scientists believe came from a 75 foot shark. The largest shark today there are some 350 species varying in size from about 18 inches to the whale shark of 50 feet. Depending on their age and kind, sharks weigh anywhere from two pounds to over a ton. A 15-foot tiger shark will weigh nearly 800 pounds. Sharks have been called the camels of the ocean because they can store enough vitamins in their liver to exist without food for two or three months.

For hundreds of years futile efforts have been made to find a completely effective shark repellent. During World War II the U.S. government tried to find one to protect downed air men and sailors from torpedoes. A black dye called "Nigrin" was developed.

Tollard 7,100 or 5,300 Residents? Town and State Disagree

This proved to be of limited value but nothing better has come along since. Scientists are conscious of shark hazards and there are few diving researchers who will not readily admit that sharks are a real menace, but so far only limited studies are under way to develop a truly effective repellent.

Growing interest in the vast untapped resources of the sea has resulted in the formation of many projects designed to penetrate its depths. Already \$2 million is being spent in Reynolds International "Alumina," a 50-foot craft designed to work at 15,000 feet. This was one of the specialized craft used last year to search for the 15-ton missing of Spain's Mediterranean coast.

Perhaps this interest and the accelerated programming will spur scientists to find a way to eliminate the shark menace. Until then, specialists call the shark the sea's Public Enemy Number One.

Sharks are classified as fish, but they are not fish in many ways. Most of them give birth to live young, like mammals, but they have no scales but tough hides with abrasive teeth-like blades that can inflict dangerous wounds. The hide of the dreaded tiger shark, called "leopard," is rated 10 times tougher than oxidite. Unlike other fish, sharks have no swim bladders permitting them to float; they must keep swimming or sink. Nor do they have lungs, the less I know about them. No one can say with certainty what one of them will do at any given moment.

The national bridge tournament, scheduled to begin late this week in Montreal, will cause thousands of North American experts to abandon the paths of righteousness. Today's hand, taken from the 1966 Australian National Tournament, is a sample of what will happen in Montreal.

Opening lead—two of diamonds.

West opened the duce of diamonds and most of the Australian experts won the first trick in dummy and returned a low club, losing the king to West's ace. This play would produce an overtrick if the five missing clubs broke 3-2, with the ace in the East hand. South would eventually get three club tricks with five tricks in the other suits.

Because of the actual club break those who tried this line of play got only one club trick. Down one.

American and Canadian experts will play this sort of hand in the same way in our own national tournament. The trouble is that overtricks are just as important in tournament bridge as making sure the play is safe for the contract.

At rubber bridge South should play safe for the contract. He wins the first trick in his own hand and leads a low club. He will therefore make his contract.

The advantage of leading the low club first is that South protects himself against one of the dangerous 4-3 breaks. In this case West must play his single club.

Firemen in Crossfire; Policemen Shot Down

DETROIT (AP)—The firemen who were shot down in a second-floor window across the street from the scene of the riot, were not the only ones to be shot. Somebody fired at them, or so it seemed. They crunched back and forth on the roof of the building. The fireman crunched.

The firemen were supposed to put it out, but they couldn't. They were caught in a crossfire of bullets. They never got past the second floor. They were shot down.

Three Detroit policemen were shot during the exchange of gunfire, which went on for more than an hour. One is in critical condition, two are in serious condition.

The fire broke out in a half-block stretch of stores and apartments. The snipers started firing when the firemen arrived, so the police and the National Guard were called in. Then everybody started firing at everybody and it's hard to tell just who shot whom.

Two firemen and a newsmen sat huddled against the side of a fire engine, breathing tear gas and watching the rioters. The rioters were armed, so they just crunched against the truck and cried tear-gas tears.

"Yep, looks like they had a 4,000-volt line in there," the other said.

Then there were shots, so they all shut up and squeezed smaller.

"Here we are in the middle of a war," said the first fireman, with no weapons, no way out and our thumbs stuck up our noses.

The newsmen said he'd like to get to a phone so he could tell his office about all this. He started for his car, some three blocks back, but he was greeted by sniper fire.

"I think it would be unwise of you to leave," one of the firemen told him.

After a while, though, an armored personnel carrier, which looks like a 20-foot-long, olive drab grue boat on wheels, lumbered past going in the right direction. So the newsmen said goodbye to the firemen and ran behind it.

Annual Report

BUILDING DEPARTMENT
A sharp decline of 43 per cent under the previous year was reported in new construction in Manchester for the year which ended June 30.

The figures show total building value of \$5,520,034 for the 1966-67 fiscal year, compared to \$9,113,721 for the 1965-66 fiscal year.

The local drop follows a trend to similar drops throughout the area.

Building permits were issued in Manchester last year for 20 dwellings, compared to 125 the previous year; 41 apartment units, compared to 138 the previous year; 10 commercial buildings, compared to 11 and 1 industrial buildings, the same amount as the previous year.

The Building Department acts as agent and clerk of the works on all town-owned construction. It now is serving in those capacities for the Manchester Green Firehouse and the Globe Hollow School.

The department is charged with the task of enforcing the town's zoning regulations and has instituted action to enforce the "junked-cars" ordinance.

Resigning Guidance Head Urges More Flexibility for Students

Grading, the truck system, the lack of electives and notice of dropouts were among items suggested by Dr. Raymond W. Pope, resigned guidance director, William Pope, complained of during a special board of education meeting last night.

Pope said he requested a chance to explain why he is resigning as guidance director. He said he had the board give it to him last night.

He gave a detailed analysis of what he meant by resigning from his position in educational planning and lack of a clear cut guidance program.

The full board and an audience of about a dozen, mostly teachers, listened carefully.

He began by pointing out that the school system must make a radical career choice in the eighth grade. The Rockville High School has a six-course program including college preparatory, industrial arts, business and agriculture.

That eighth grade student must enter ninth grade in one of those programs.

Pope called the system "very unbending."

"We can't close the doors" of students who have not made up their minds whether to go to college, business or something else, he explained.

"It's premature for the eighth grade to make these 'hard' decisions," he added.

No Switching Allowed

And the student cannot step out of his program to take courses in any of the other programs, he added. It is nearly impossible to switch programs part-way through also.

Pope suggested the students be put in classes according to their ability and not the course they chose when about age 13. This would mean a tailor-made program for each student.

Students could also be in different levels in different subjects. A boy could be in the highest level English but lowest in math at the same moment.

"Careful review" of the student's program would be made each year by him and his guidance counselor, Pope added.

Students would associate with different good students with the same ability.

Even within the six programs, the student has few subject choices, according to Pope. He pointed out the heavy and pre-arranged set of courses in and the trouble of scheduling every subject separately. But, he said, "the people deserve better."

He pointed out several nearby school systems that each student could choose from.

"We should be able to do it, too," he said.

Among concrete suggestions he made were a developmental course, a general program and honor courses.

A developmental course would pick up the students who get lost along the way.

The general program would give average students a chance to pick up the knowledge learned in college preparatory courses without the rigor. But they would not have to choose a special field.

The honors courses would give brighter students a chance to go further ahead, reach out and move as fast as their talents will let them.

Courses to add, he suggested, are: Mechanical drawing, music, rudiments, more math courses, economics and speed reading.

Grading System Hit

Pope criticized the numerical grading system at the high school and said most schools have thrown it out years ago.

He said a student should be graded on a pass-fail basis. A student who fails a course should be given a chance to repeat it.

His main criticism centered on the poor chance of a boy receiving a first grade 50 try-but did not retake Pope on most of his points.

Detella agreed with Pope the guidance department needs direction but pointed out the principal is his head.

Also, the Board member said, "Somewhere in here, there was a loss of communication" between administration and the department.

Board member Marie Herbst said, "We tend to put kids in a box too early."

Details also said the curriculum should be set of guidelines and not set programs.

Dr. Raymond W. Pope, superintendent, said there must be flexibility. But he said it must come "step by step" and as the budget allows it. He added checks on full flexibility must be included.

Dr. Ramsdell disagreed with what he said. He said that the superintendent cited using proper channels for making changes. Fagan agreed.

Dr. Ramsdell said he was reviewing 15 applicants for Pope's position. He said they may not have a director in September.
