



Policies Of Lurch And Lunge

One might well accept the idea that President Johnson and many of his advisers are just as confused and tortured by the question of Vietnam as anybody else, and that, consequently, they urch and lunge at actions and policies without having any very firm idea of what the results are going to be. Their military lunges, ever since the olg lunge across into North Vietnam in February of 1965, have produced none

of the results predicted and claimed for them, but have, instead, built up into a stalemate which seems to have only one capacity—that to grow bigger and more obstinate and more bloody. Their great show piece strategies statesmanship — the sudden impromptu Presidential hegiras to Guam - have been pitiable in the silliness of their claim to accomplishment, in their proclamation of aims and revisions of aims. and then in the almost complete lack of later confirmation or follow-through for the high pronouncements so handsomely and glibly made.

The same air of sudden improvisation, as if somebody had suddenly decided the world air must be instantly filled with this or that kind of noise, featured the Johnson administration highly advertised moves toward peace, back in the days when the administration wasn't mite as afraid of having its peace bluffs called as it is now.

But of all the half-considered impromptu strokes of policy by the Johnninistration on Vietnam. the policy birds loosed to fly on a fraction of a wing, the current special mission of two special Presidential envoys to try to get more troops for Vietnam from our "allies" in the Pacific is sure ly entitled to special citation.

This mission was given to Clark Clifford and Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor as one of the "solutions" to the problem raised y General Westmoreland's request for dditional troops in Vietnam. he government has so far let the Unitd States hire some 40,000 troops t fight in Vietnam, the Cabinet held special meeting and formulated a tentative answer to Envoys Clark and Taylor, refusing more troops to Vietnam because they might be needed in South Korea itself.

Perhaps, when it comes to Australia and New Zealand, the Johnson administration had some better idea of what i was going to find when it sent out this special mission. But so far the mission which was supposed to demonstrate and rally and augment that pitifully small degree of support we have from anyody else anywhere for our role in Vietam has had the unpleasant effect of making that support seem smaller and more grudging than it seemed before. When it produces a result the opposite of that hoped and intended, this mission is par for the course for Johnson adinistration policy on Vietnam.

The Moons Are Out

Thenks to a combination of circumstances—a tessening of interest on the part of our military, and a fresh piece disapproval from scientists—there is mminent danger that we will reach for artificial moons in our drive toward

Plants react in different ways to the durations of light Astronomers might be confused by so many artificial presences in the night

Over in Britain there is some trouble and annoyance because snails have been attacking the mail in transit, apparently attracted by a taste for ink. This poses a rather unique problem for British postal authorities, who so far have thought of nothing better to do than apologize to their patrons for snaildamaged mail, but it offers a compliment to the United States Postal Service.
