## Only Few Incidents Blur Calm Civil Rights Scene

NEW YORK (AP) — Civil peace, with only a few exceptions, prevailed across the nation today amid federal, state and local efforts aimed at solving racial problems and preventing further rioting.

The trouble spots Sunday were: Wichita, Kan., where a white man was wounded by a sniper's bullet; Great Bend, Kan., where a Negro tavern was firebombed; and Pittsburgh, Pa., where teenagers rioted after a rock 'n' roll show.

Reporting no disturbances were previously riot-wrecked Detroit, Providence, R.I., Milwaukee, Wis., and Cambridge, Md.

At Wichita, as the city entered its second night of police-enforced curfew Sunday, a sniper shot a man in the leg. Six policemen were injured, none seriously, in a collision of two patrol cars at the shooting scene. The sniper was not found. Tension had eased during the day in the wake of a dry goods store fire and the arrest of 19 curfew violators on Saturday night.

A firebombing early Sunday in Great Bend was followed by a meeting of white and Negro civic leaders Sunday night at which a spirit of cooperation was pledged.

Seven youths were arrested after three firebombs were thrown. Earlier, police said, about 15 white and Negro youths battled at a drive-in parking lot, but the fight broke up before officers arrived.

Great Bend has had no racial trouble in the past. It has a population of about 18,500, with about 350 Negroes.

In Pittsburgh, police said about 4,000 youths got tired of waiting for buses after a show and tossed rocks and bottles in which windows were smashed and eight persons were injured, none seriously. A few items were stolen from a sporting goods store.

Although most of the crowd was Negro, said police Supt. James A. Slusser, "there were no racial overtones to the incidents."

At Providence, Mayor Joseph A. Dooley Jr. ordered a curfew and ban on liquor sales lifted Sunday in South Providence after four nights of calm.

### Ike Remains Satisfactory; Ills Minor

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, suffering a minor digestive ailment, continued under observation today at the Army's Walter Reed General Hospital, his condition unchanged since Sunday, a spokesman said.

The hospital issued a one-sentence statement saying, "There has been no appreciable change in General Eisenhower's condition; medical observations continue."

The 76-year-old five-star general became ill Friday night at his home in Gettysburg, Pa., and was flown to Walter Reed on Saturday by helicopter.

His ailment has been described by hospital spokesman only in general terms, as a "minor gastro-intestinal upset."

On Sunday his condition was reported as greatly improved, and the statement said Eisenhower probably would not stay long in the hospital.

Medical tests and X-rays, said Sunday, were encouraging.

Eisenhower's doctors, it was announced, planned to take advantage of his present stay to perform routine examinations and dental work which had been scheduled for later this month.

When Eisenhower, 76, was hospitalized in May for eight days with acute gastroenteritis, he was fed intravenously the first 24 hours or so. But in their report Sunday the doctors said the upset this time was minor and apparently the tests and X-rays made Saturday showed nothing more serious. They did not mention intravenous feeding.

The doctors did not say whether the current illness is related to the one suffered in May, which involved inflammation of the lining of the stomach and intestines.

### Bus Driver 'Gets Lost' In London

LONDON (AP) — A big, red, double-decker London bus lost its way in the heart of London Sunday.

Instead of heading down Haymarket from Piccadilly Circus, No. 9 rumbled straight on to Leicester Square.

A woman passenger called out: "He's going the wrong way."

Since a thick glass panel separated the driver from the passengers and the conductress, the driver didn't hear.

At Leicester Square, he cut to the right and headed for Trafalgar Square.

"I'm late for work, stop him," yelled a passenger who was doing Sunday's switchboard service in an exporter's office.

At Trafalgar Square the driver nosed down the Horse Guard's Parade—far off No. 9's route.

Near the houses of Parliament the driver drove with less certainty. The conductress pulled the stop cord, walked around to the front and gave some instructions. The driver headed back toward Trafalgar Square.

Up ahead was a No. 15 bus. "Follow the No. 15," shouted

### Mother Charged In Shooting of Four Children

DUNSTABLE, Mass. (AP) — The bodies of four children, all of whom had been shot, were found this morning following a fire at their Main Street home.

Dist. Atty. John J. Dronney of Middlesex County said the children's mother, Mrs. Mary Connolly, about 40, had been booked and that the charge would be murder.

The victims were the children had been shot and apparently had been dead since Sunday night.

The victims were the children of Mr. and Mrs. Francis G. Connolly Jr. Officials said the parents had returned to their home at 7 a.m., after the fire, which was discovered by a neighbor about three hours earlier, had been extinguished.

The bodies were identified as Brenda, 16; Gregory, 11; Gary, 7, and Thomas, 3. Dronney said three of the bodies were discovered in the living room, two of them on a mattress. The fourth child's body was found in a first-floor bedroom.

Capt. Daniel Murphy of the state police said the mother admitted shooting the children Sunday evening and setting fire to the house.

The names of the two officers were not disclosed pending notification of relatives.

### Exiles Held In Plan to Kill Castro

HAVANA (AP) — Five partisans of Fidel Castro hijacked a Colombian airliner with more than 70 persons aboard to take them to Havana Sunday.

Meanwhile, the Cuban government displayed six captured invaders from Florida whom it accused of planning to kill Castro.

The Cuban government said the plane, whose passengers included four U.S. citizens, was free to resume its flight today. All the passengers were reported safe.

The six captive Cuban exiles, paraded at a four-hour news conference, all said they were recruited and trained by the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency in Florida.

Two said they carried poisoned bullets intended for Prime Minister Castro. Two others said they were CIA agents. Cuban authorities declined to say whether the captives would be shot.

Guests at the news conference included delegates to the meeting of the Latin American Organization of Solidarity (OLAS)—a gathering of revolutionaries from 27 nations. Cuba apparently aimed to use the captives to offset Venezuelan charges that Cuba landed guerrillas near Caracas in May.

Uruguayan Sen. Rodney Arismendi said he felt sure OLAS would vote to condemn the United States for the exiles' action, and about 60 OLAS delegates, special guests and leftist observers at the news conference roared their approval.

The Colombian government said the DC-4 plane, flying from Bogota to the Colombian islands of San Andres and Providencia in the Caribbean, carried 71 passengers and four crewmen.

It said the pilot, Rafael Madero, telephoned from Havana to report that a group of pro-Castroites had forced him to fly there.

Havana Radio said the plane had 78 passengers and four crewmen and that the armed men who took it over were four Colombians and an Ecuadorian.

It said the hijackers asked to remain in Cuba and the government was considering the request. There was speculation the hijackers wanted to pay a dramatic visit to the OLAS meeting.

One passenger, U.S. Army Capt. Harris Wheeler, 25, honeymooning with his wife, Helga, 19, of Modesto, Calif., said the pilot announced the plane was

### In Viet Rescue Bid General Rescued On Copter Sweep

SAIGON (AP) — A U.S. Army brigadier general was wounded in the leg today when Viet Cong fire hit his helicopter as he was trying to rescue two crewmen from a downed helicopter on the outskirts of Saigon, U.S. sources reported.

There were other reports that three U.S. helicopters burned after being shot down and that two more were badly damaged in action 12 miles north of the capital.

The sources said the general, wounded in the lower right leg, was taken to the U.S. Army 3rd Field Hospital in Saigon, where he was reported in good condition. They said his aide, a lieutenant, was wounded in both legs and was also in good condition.

The names of the two officers were not disclosed pending notification of relatives.

The U.S. sources said the general was directing an air mobile assault of one American company and a company of South Vietnamese rangers when he saw that the helicopter had been shot down.

Just as the general's helicopter set down to try to rescue the crew, Viet Cong guerrillas opened fire with small arms and automatic weapons.

The helicopter quickly took off again without picking up the downed crewmen, the sources said. The crew of the general's helicopter was not hurt.

DETROIT (AP) — Detroit police said today that two Detroit policemen have been charged with murder in connection with the slayings of three young Negro men at a motel during the recent riots.

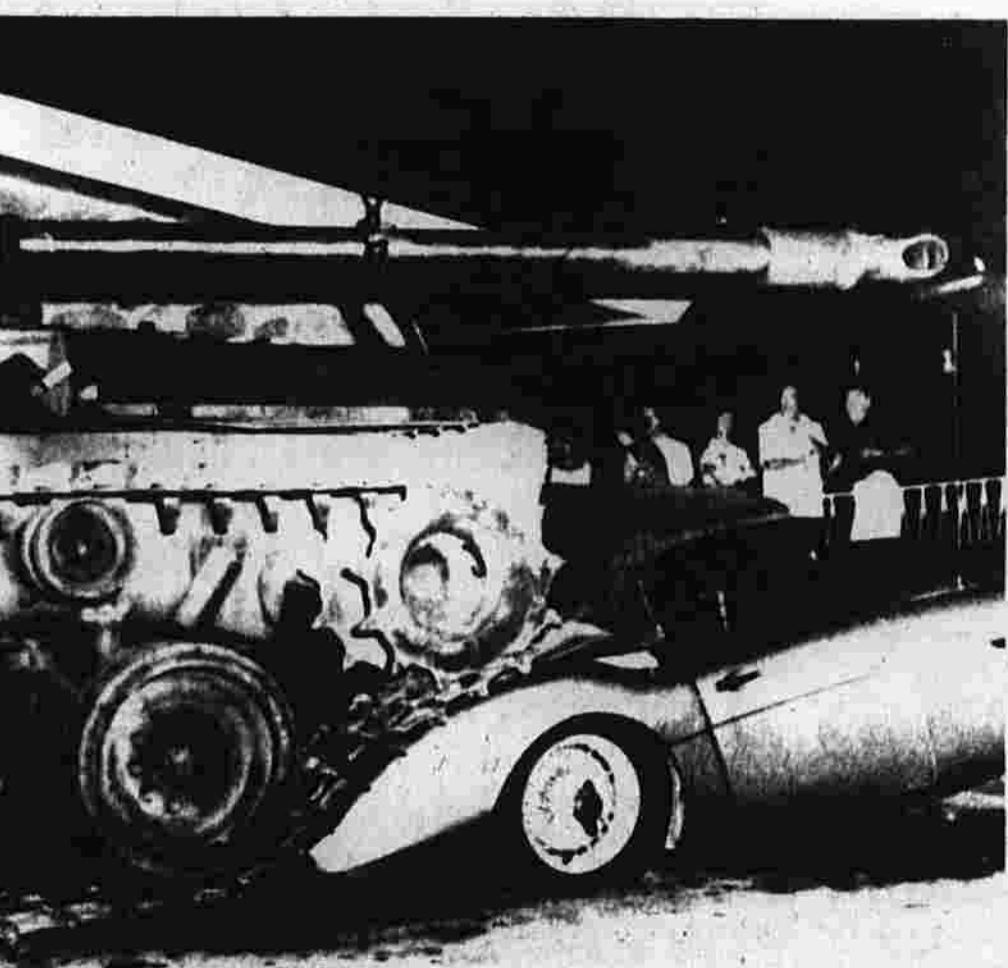

## Marines in Salute To 'Canal' Heroes

DA NANG, Vietnam (AP) — The massed flags and battle streamers of the 1st U.S. Marine Division flapped in the wind on the parade grounds overlooking Da Nang Air Base today. A rifle squad fired a salute, and bugles played taps.

It was the Marines' tribute to their comrades who 25 years ago stormed Guadalcanal in the first major ground attack against Japanese forces in World War II.

Twenty-five years ago today, men of the 1st Marine Division went ashore on Guadalcanal and Tulagi to make another mark on the pages of history.

Gen. Wallace M. Greene Jr., commandant of the Marine Corps, told the assembled Leathernecks.

Guadalcanal and who are still Marines in the Vietnamese war were honored guests at the Da Nang ceremony.

Among them were 1st Sgt. Marvin A. Delgado, 46, of Peoria, Ill., and M. Sgt. Wade D. Curtis, 44, of Mount Dora, Fla.

Delgado, now with the 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines, and Curtis, division embarkation chief, recalled that other war a quarrel of a century ago, Delgado then was a private and a rifleman. Curtis was a private first class and a scout.

"When we first hit, we expected to charge across the beach, but we just walked in," Curtis recalled. "There wasn't anything there. We killed our first enemy at the airstrip the second day.

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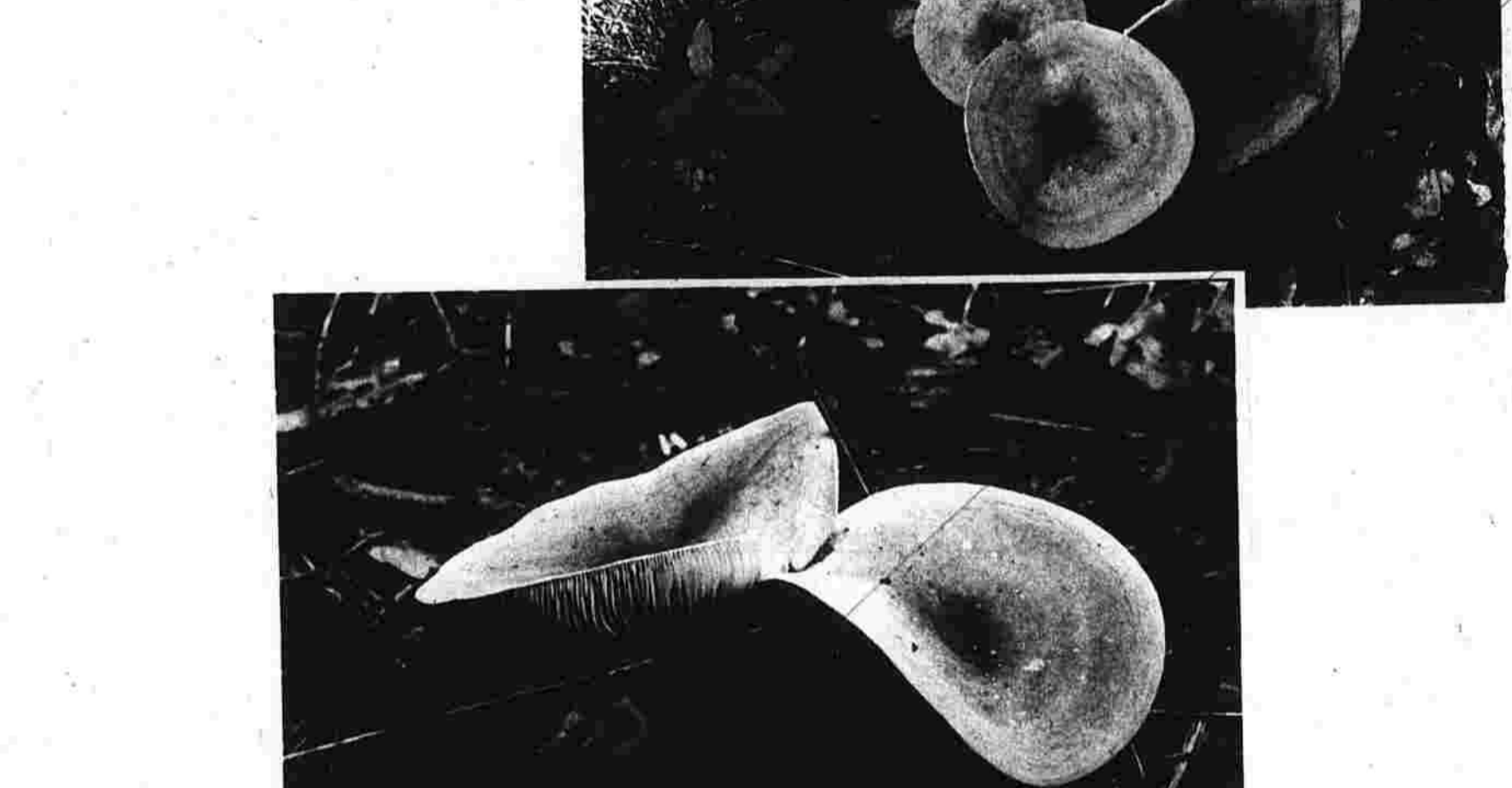

### Ex-NAACP Leader Charged In Hartford Fire Bombing

HARTFORD (AP)—Four men, including one identified as the former head of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in New Haven, have been charged with arson in connection with two fires in Hartford's North End.

Arrested later were John Barber, 29, and Leroy Moton, 22, both of West Haven, and James Brown, 23, and Marion Brown, 25, both of Hartford. They were held in lieu of \$20,000 bail each.

Barber was identified as the former New Haven NAACP head. A graduate of Morehouse College, Barber holds a political science degree from Yale and is a former Yale school student.

Moton was identified as a former civil rights worker, originally from Selma, Ala., who had been riding in a car alongside Mrs. Viola Luzzo when she was shot to death in Alabama on May 25, 1965.

Moton was said to have been working with Mrs. Luzzo, a white woman from Detroit, and others in transporting civil rights workers to Selma.

Marion Brown, police said, was the twin brother of Aaron Brown, who was shot to death June 25 in what they said was an apparent personal feud in the same restaurant—the Kenesha Park Restaurant on Barbours Street—that was burned early Saturday.

Each of the four men arrested was charged with two counts of arson in connection with the fires at the restaurant and at the Kenesha Market on Barbours and Judson Streets.

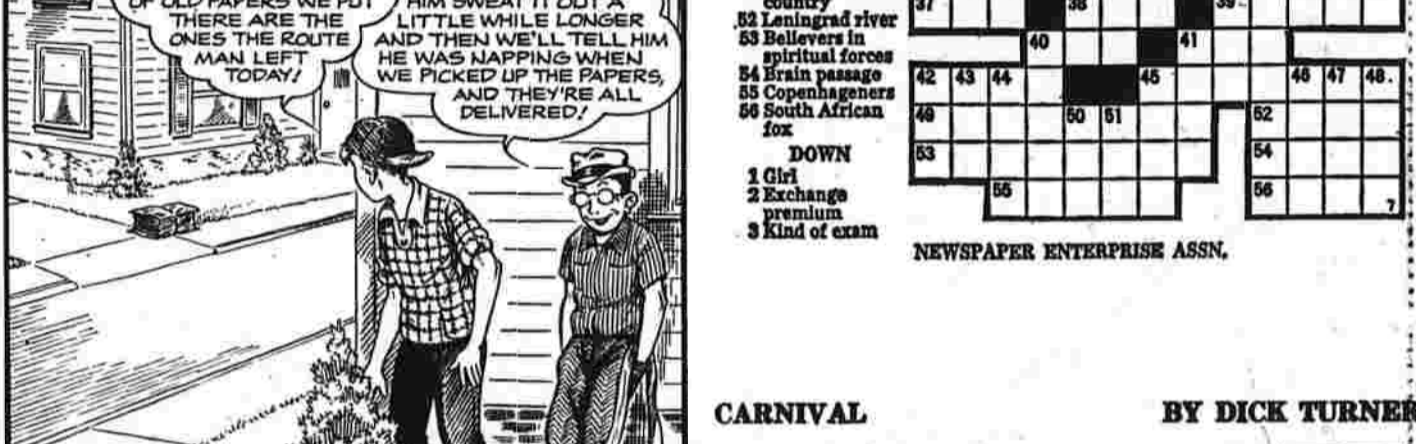
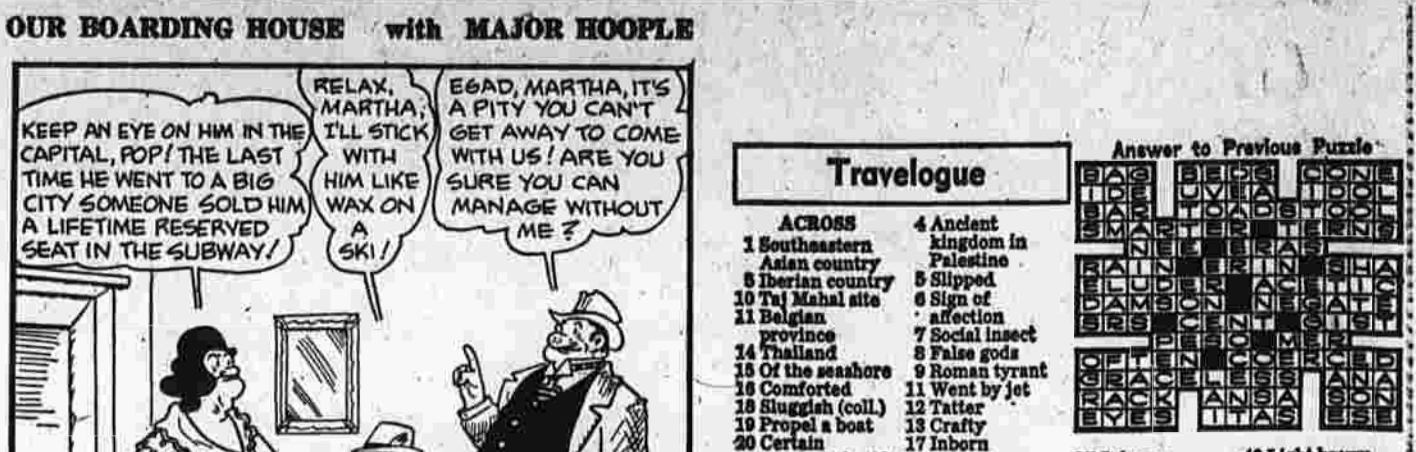

Missing Girl Found Murdered in Pennsylvania

GIRARD, Pa. (AP)—The partially clothed body of little Connie Rae Carstater, missing since Sunday in swamplands near her home, was found today, and a deputy coroner said she was murdered. Minutes later state police took one of the searchers into custody for questioning. The girl was found face down in about a foot of water. It had been covered with leaves and branches in a dense thicket about 100 yards from a highway.

Employment Hits Highest U.S. Peak

WASHINGTON (AP)—Employment increased more than usual in July, reaching 78.2 million, the highest ever in the United States, the Labor Department said today. The unemployment rate for July was 3.9 per cent, practically unchanged from 4 per cent last month and from the July 1966 rate.

Says 50,000 U.S. Boost Not Enough

SAIGON (AP)—Chief of State Nguyen Van Thieu said today more allied soldiers are needed in South Vietnam to win the war. He indicated he believes the 45,000 to 50,000 additional U.S. troops President Johnson intends to send by next June 30 will not be enough. "We have to accept that," Thieu said. "But if we have more it's better." "We still need more troops. We have not enough troops to clear all the Viet Cong bases at the same time... to occupy the whole (South Vietnamese) territory and to stay long enough with the people in the villages to provide them with enough security to support our pacification program."
