"THE WAY I HEARD IT"

Last week I told you how up-winded the critics were at Tanglewood when the huge audience there broke up a performance of Tchaikovsky's Sixth Symphony with untimely applause, and how mad they were that with all the money spent for music education in the public schools the result was to leave about 90 per cent of an audience of second most commonly played symphony in the repertoire.

Why? Simply because if you're hearing it for the first time you have absolutely no way of knowing whether or not it was a good performance, a bad performance, or a mediocre performance. You've never had any standard of comparison.

It-illimed applause probably is the result of radio and TV programs, where somebody says "AL FLAUBERT" and the studio (if it's a good studio) immediately fully applauds immediately because it has been told to do so.

Opera audiences have always been bad offenders in this regard, particularly in this country. In Italy, the German-speaking countries you won't hear applause except when the curtains occur. This is because they use the "star" system there.

These "stars" employ claque and "fan-club" to applaud like mad and thus trigger audience reaction. Just because they don't have an agent is not impressed, knowing how phony the whole thing is. They have engagements one by one. It makes the audience look silly the next day when they see a critical points out the artist's shortcomings.

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Hong Kong Papers Closed Britain Ignores Red China Demand

HONG KONG (AP)—British officials said today they will ignore Red China's ultimatum that they allow three pro-Communist Hong Kong newspapers to resume publication and free the papers' arrested employees by Tuesday night.

The British Foreign Office said in London that its representatives in Peking had not heard about it as Hong Kong's local Communist agitators.

The Congo's Chances Vs. Chaos

For a time, there was concern in Congress over the fact that American military transports were being used in the Congo, to transport troops of the central government of President Mobutu.

The romantic spectacle of a mere 100 well-trained, disciplined, free-booting mercenaries finding themselves in a position where they can practically dictate to the legitimate government of the whole Congo is not really very romantic.

For better or for worse, President Mobutu is the nearest thing the Congo has to any hope of political stability and moderation, even though he himself may be in his present trouble because he designed the immediate measure of trying to hang Moise Tshombe.

Another good thing about this emergency alert on the part of our health officials is that they may lead to greater public and official awareness of some of the more extreme instances of constant air pollution.

There are residents of Manchester's North End, for instance, who think that no special smog emergency is required to render obnoxious and turbulent the regular belch of asphalt fumes to which they and their properties are subjected.

What is happening is that 150 white men, originally hired into the Congo to be professional soldiers, are all too close to being able to master the great big chunk of the heart of Africa, just as if we were in the early colonial conquest days of the last century.

In an effort to remain exempt from antitrust laws, major league baseball teams run a sport, not a business. While the argument has been and is shaky, it's true that some of them seem inclined to ignore sound business principles.

It will be a long time before the Congo has anything we might call political stability. Optimism, for the Congo, might ask merely a succession of avoid-

ances of chaos. At the moment that poor young big country's best chance of avoiding chaos lies in the Mobutu government and not with the mercenaries or with Tshombe, and the tragedy is that that much of a good kind of chance for the country is in grave danger.

The People Last. Unfortunately, as if they acknowledged allegiance last to the people of the country and first to any special interest, the committees of Congress are setting up a postal rate bill which will increase rates for mail which already pays its own way in order to continue subsidy to mail which very few recipients would choose to receive, if they were allowed a choice.

At present, the proposed increases will lift the cost of sending a first class letter from five to six cents, the cost of what used to be the great American institution of the postcard from four to five cents, and air mail from eight to 10 cents.

But for the junk mail which floods the postal system and jams the mail boxes, and loads the wastebaskets of the country, there is in prospect only the gentlest kind of rate increases—not nearly enough to make the junk mail pay its own way.

If there is any single thing the federal government ought to be willing to subsidize, it would be the privilege of ordinary communication by letter and by postcard.

If there is any single thing the federal government ought to be least willing to subsidize, it should be the use of a public facility for purely commercial gain.

Yet the service it should be willing to subsidize is an actual practice in the service the federal government continually overcharges in order to be able to subsidize the service to which neither government nor people have the slightest obligation or responsibility.

The answer would seem to be that letter writers do not know how to lobby, but that somebody else does.

Where We Make Our Own Smog. It is a good thing to have state health authorities prompt to issue an alert and call for an emergency reduction of air-polluting activity.

The tragic experience of some of the world's larger cities, whenever such an attack of smog has had any special duration, constitutes warning sufficient to justify such emergency measures.

What is more, the whole development of this Atlantic seaboard into one vast city, which is releasing an ever increasing amount of pollution into its own air, is proceeding at a pace so fast no one can really judge what the risks are getting to be.

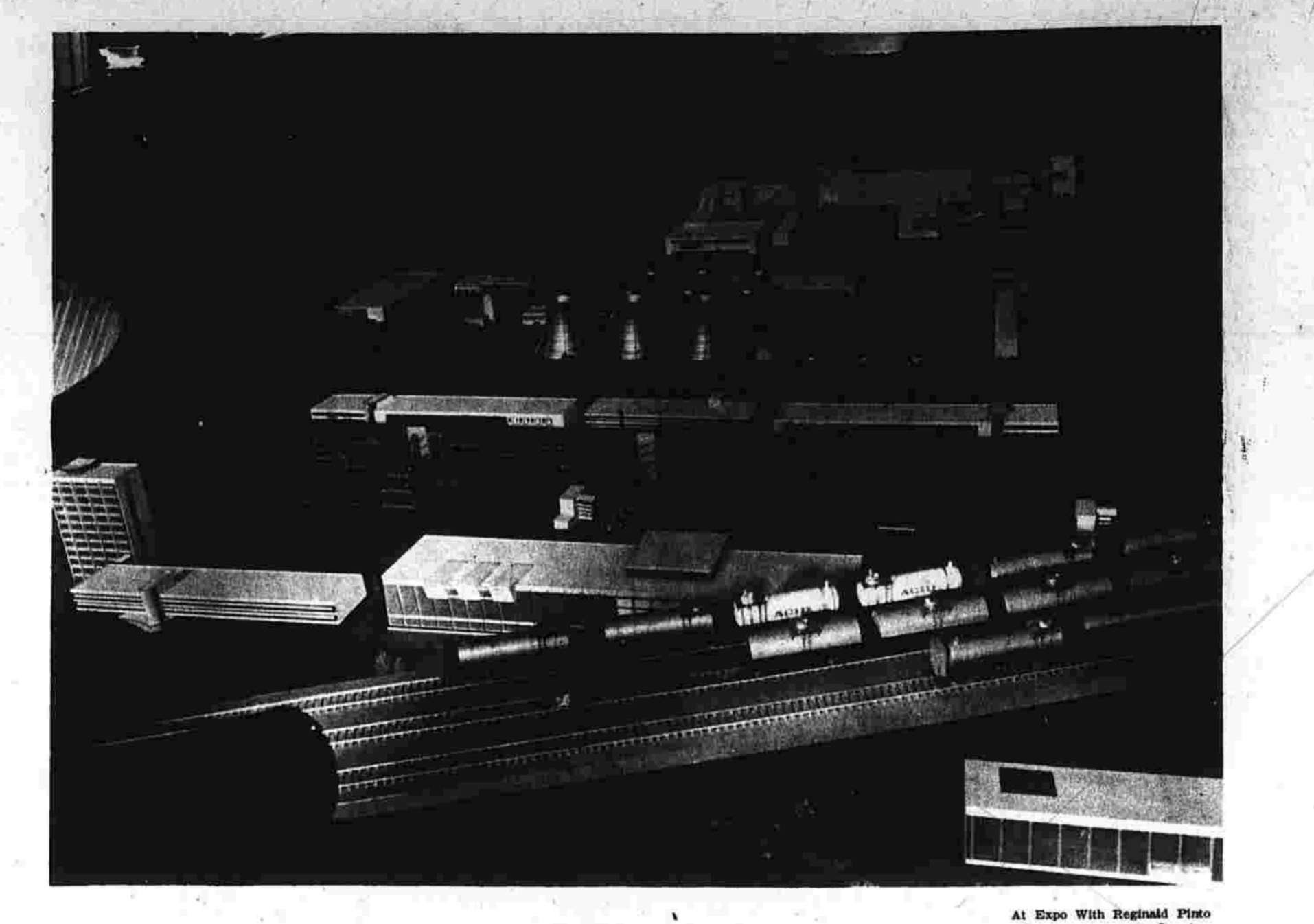

WASHINGTON — The major reason Senator Jacob Javits failed to win the liberal Republican nomination in New York, delivered another speech in the Senate on Friday.

The story goes back a week earlier, to Aug. 10, when Javits charged the Saigon military junta with rigging the Sept. 3 election. After that speech Javits began thinking about the desirability of postponing the election until Oct. 1 to give Saigon a fresh start at running a presidential election.

Disken and Percy, in fact, spent a good part of Wednesday together at the Illinois State Fair in Springfield, where the matter being mentioned, this silence indicated that Disken was not pleased by Percy's offer.

Senate liberals have some faint hope that the Senate Permanent Investigating Subcommittee's report of the urban Negro riots will look into the causes even though the Senate Rules Committee specifically voted against such a course in authorizing the investigation.

Moreover, the present one-division league is so unwieldy that it makes the club owners leery of planting embryo teams in new cities in the hope of reaping even more of the green stuff.

One thing the expansion ignores is that the extra teams they've already put through has made it difficult for even rabid fans to tell the players, even with the aid of color television, as well as gate receipts.

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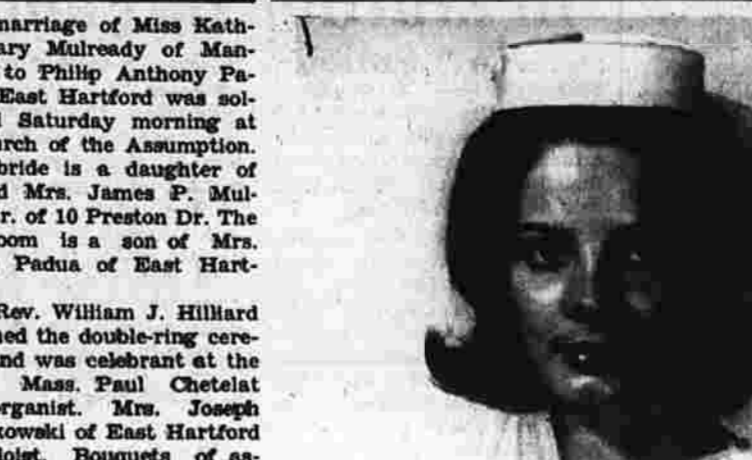

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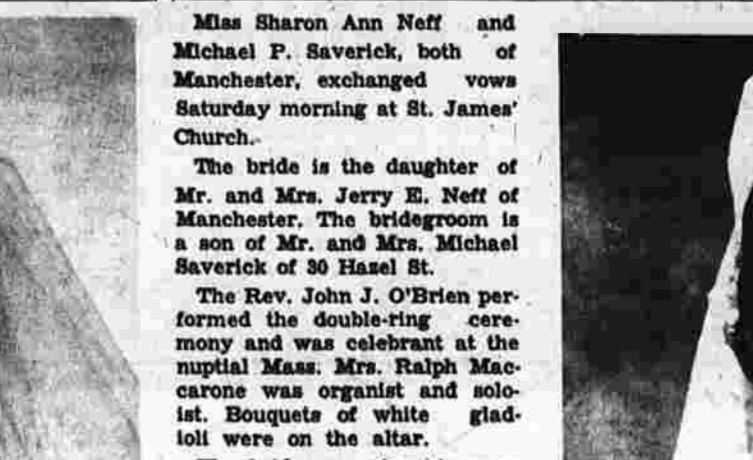

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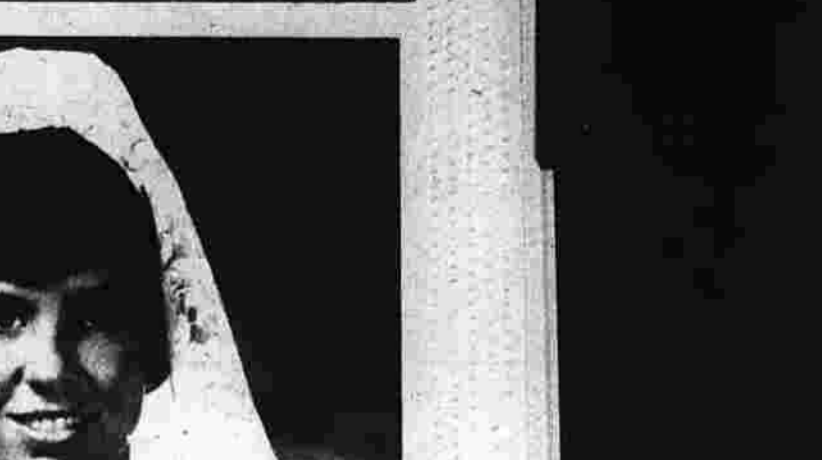

More Trouble Ahead For Foreign Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The administration's foreign aid program, fresh from a drubbing in the Senate last week, appears headed for more lumps in the House.

Despite 77 support from the House Foreign Affairs Committee for a \$1.1 billion aid measure close to what the administration sought, opponents were confident they could push through cuts in most of the economic assistance categories.

But military aid programs, cut sharply in the Senate, may survive reasonably intact.

"There's a feeling we ought to have some belt tightening," said Rep. E. Ross Adair of Indiana, who heads a group of committee Republicans seeking cuts.

"I think the chances are excellent for some substantial reductions," he told a reporter, adding he is unsure whether attempts also will be made to cut the military assistance program.

Supporters of the aid measure conceded privately that many members, probably faced with a later vote on President Johnson's income tax surcharge, will vote to trim the bill. Chairman Thomas E. Morgan, D-Pa., predicts "a very difficult time" for it.

Adair said an effort also will be made to limit the program to one year.

U.S. London Embassy Door Riddled by Machine Gun

LONDON (AP) — Police throughout southeast England searched today for three men who machine gunned a side entrance of the U.S. Embassy in London and left a note attacking American racial and foreign policies.

The burst of fire at 11:30 p.m. Sunday drilled holes the size of tennis balls in and around the side door of the big concrete and glass building, smashed three glass door panels and punctured lamps on the steps.

"The attack was sudden and sharp—just like something from the prohibition era," said a Scotland Yard spokesman.

NORTH BATTLEFORD, N.S. (AP) — A 23-year-old mental patient is being held for the murder of his mother and three other family members who were shot in their home on the edge of Canada's northern wilderness.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police arrested Victor Ernest Hoffman Saturday night, four days after the massacre of Mr. and Mrs. James Peterson and seven of their children at their home in Shell Lake. The Peterson 4-year-old daughter hid between the bodies of two of her sisters and escaped.

The police said Hoffman was arraigned on a murder charge and then probably would be given a mental examination.

The young man's mother, Mrs. Robert Hoffman, said in an interview that her son was released July 23 from a mental institution in North Battleford.

She said he was still under treatment and was to have been readmitted to the institution.

He is one of seven children and had worked on his father's farm 60 miles southeast of Shell Lake after quitting school in 1961.

Inspector Brian Sawyer said no motive had been established for the slaying. He said Hoffman was picked up without a struggle at home and had behaved normally since his arrest.

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Gen. Krueger Dies, Famed WW II Leader

VALLEY Forge, Pa. (AP) — The army's military history was enriched by the death of Gen. Walter Krueger, commander of the U.S. 8th Army in World War II, who died Sunday.

It was Krueger's 8th Army that led MacArthur's spearhead against the Japanese and the Philippines. Krueger, a four-star general, died in Valley Forge General Hospital at the age of 84. He had been a patient there since Sept. 14, 1965.

Krueger, a master of military tactics, remained a doughboy at heart during a half century of soldiering in the Spanish-American War, the Philippine Insurrection and two world wars.

He was commissioned a second lieutenant in 1901 while serving under MacArthur's father, Lt. Gen. Arthur MacArthur, during the Philippine Insurrection. He returned to the Philippines 44 years later in command of a powerful army. He became a full general in 1945.

Round Up of Ibo Tribe Under Way in Nigeria

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP) — The Nigerian army corporal tightened his small hide whip and asked the African driver: "What is your tribe?"

The man, obviously frightened, stuttered out a satisfactory reply and was allowed to drive off.

It had been spotted as a member of the Ibo tribe, he would have been whisked away to an army camp for interrogation.

This is the federal capital of Lagos, a city of tension, where the Ibo—whose tribe has formed the backbone of Biafra in Eastern Nigeria—are being rounded up as tribal hatred rises.

There are reports of Ibo being beaten and killed. No one believes that the men at the top, such as the federal leader, Maj. Gen. Yakubu Gowon, are in favor of beating up Ibo, but his instructions for "all-out action against the Biafrans and their collaborators" are being freely interpreted.

The police and army in some cases look the other way when they see Ibo dragged from their homes and beaten by Lagos citizens.

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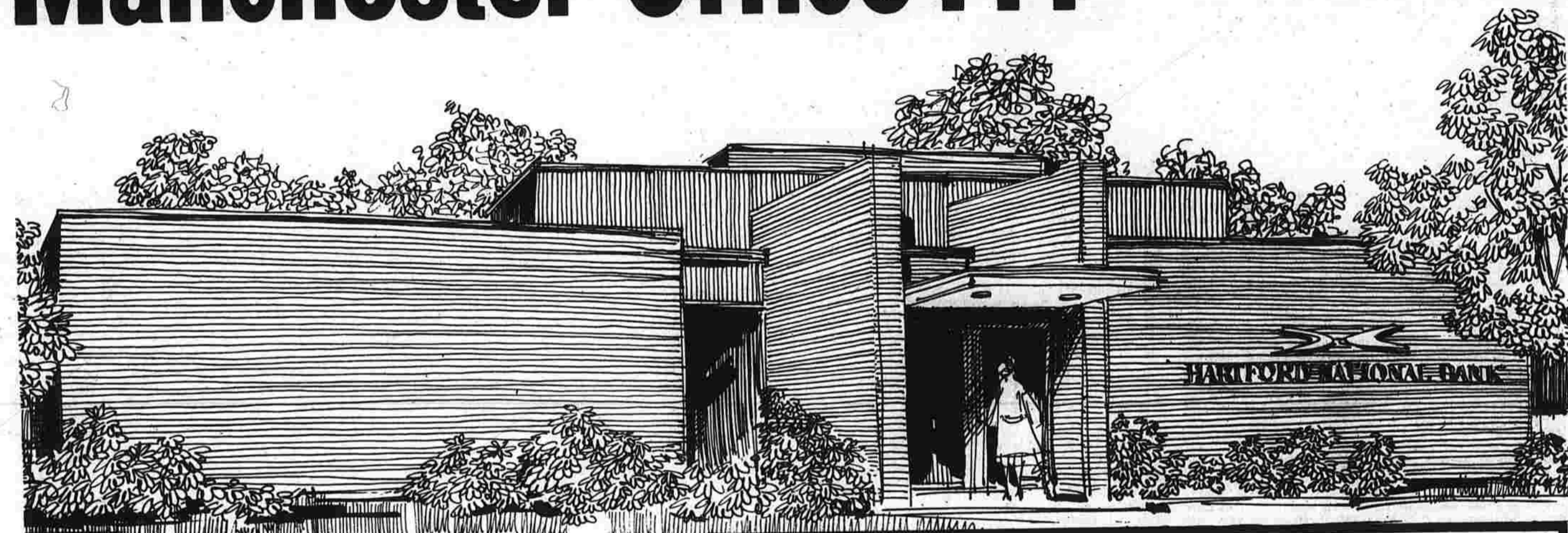

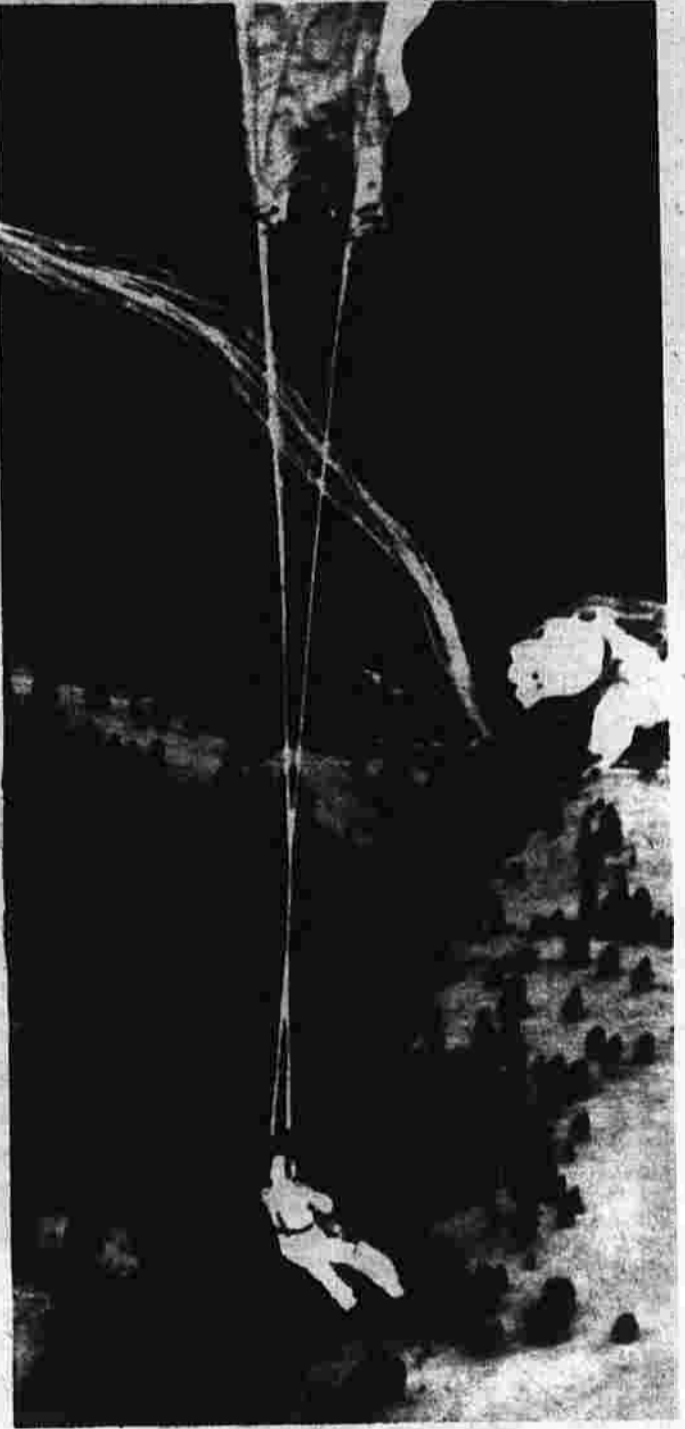

U.S. Loses Six Planes Over Viet

SAIGON (AP)—One of the heaviest attacks of the Vietnam war on the Hanoi-Haiphong area coast the United States lost six warplanes Monday, including two jets lost in Red China trying to escape Communist MIGs and surface-to-air missiles, the U.S. Command announced today. The raids were among the war's costliest for U.S. Air Force and Navy pilots, but the rewards may have been large.
