Towns May Join Urban Sprawl

(This is the second in a series of articles on area planning.) By BETTE QUATRALE The towns of Manchester, Vernon and South Windsor...

Manchester and South Windsor will have areas of "urban density" where over eight families per acre will live.

The urban development of the three towns includes commercial, industrial and housing uses of land near present developed city areas such as Hartford.

Agency statistics predict a population of 83,100 for Manchester in 2000; South Windsor 62,400, and Vernon 41,400.

The report points to the roughly 1.3 million acres of land to be devoted to urban use by the year 2000.

These needs will include public services, water, sewerage, and power. Costs of running a town, providing schools and other needs increase as the suburbs spread out.

Even the U.S. Post Office Department has a "Gemini" program.

The first "twin" stamps ever produced by the United States will be issued on Sept. 20 and will salute the nation's first space complements in space. The design depicts a space-walking astronaut linked to his spaceship.

The new stamp is twice the width of a horizontal commemorative. A perforation divides each segment into a separate 5-cent stamp. One stamp features the astronaut and the other shows the spaceship.

The twin stamps go on first-day sale Sept. 20 at Kennedy Space Center—branch at the Orlando, Fla., Post Office. Two days later the National Aeronautics and Space Administration marks its ninth anniversary.

Collectors desiring first-day cancellations may send addressed envelopes, together with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Orlando, Fla. 32802.

The covers will be serviced with a single stamp (5 cents) or pairs showing both designs (10 cents). The covers will be plainly endorsed in the upper right corner to indicate the number of stamps to be affixed. Postage stamps and personal checks are not accepted in payment of the new stamps. The envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers Space Administration."

Remember requests must be postmarked no later than Sept. 20.

Hebron State Aid Increasing

Sheinwold on Bridge

Nature lovers tell us that there is a difference between hunting rabbits and firing point blank at a charging rhinoceros. If your hunting is limited to the bridge table, you may notice the same kind of difference between not and tough opponents.

Opening lead—queen of hearts.

West held the first trick with the queen of hearts and the next with the jack. Then West, a bridge-playing rabbit, continued with a third heart.

South ruffed and could afford to lead the jack of spades as a safety measure. East won with the queen of spades and returned the queen of clubs, but it was too late.

South took the ace of clubs and the ace of spades, and then two high diamonds. He continued by ruffing a low diamond and led a trump to dummy's spade. This put him in position to cash two good diamonds, disregarding his two losing clubs.

From South's point of view, he would enjoy odds of 8 to 2 in favor of an even break in either spades or diamonds. This looks better than the even chance of a spade finesse. As the play actually went, South didn't have to weigh these chances since West's ineffective defense allowed him to safeguard his contract against bad breaks in both spades and diamonds.

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Meany Backs LBJ Request For Tax Hike

WASHINGTON (AP)—President George Meany of the AFL-CIO backed President Johnson's request for an income tax hike today, but said Congress should give family incomes a break and double the increase on corporations.

"We are fully in accord with the President's concept that a temporary war tax is needed," Meany said.

But, he added, "we are firmly opposed to the administration's major recommendations on how to increase taxes."

His remarks were prepared for testimony before the House Ways and Means Committee. Johnson's proposal would impose an across-the-board 10 per cent income tax surcharge on both corporations and individuals to help pay for the war in Vietnam.

Meany said any cutback in spending on vital defense programs would be disastrous for the country. He urged that the preservation of our free society be the first objective.

"America has the human and material resources to achieve both an honorable settlement of the war in Vietnam and a strengthened social order at home," said Meany, a strong backer of Johnson's war policies.

A tax increase is necessary, Meany said, to reduce the federal deficit and lessen the danger of light money and high interest rates.

But he urged a stiffer tax on those he said are most able to pay it.

"Six loopholes of special privilege for wealthy families and corporations are numerous and notorious," he said.

Under Johnson's 10 per cent surcharge proposal, Meany said, a family with \$1,000 taxable income would pay no surcharge while a family with \$20,000 would pay a \$29 surcharge.

"For the extra \$2 of taxable income it would be required to pay \$29 in additional taxes," he said. "This is clearly unfair."

A 12 per cent surcharge on corporations and 6 per cent surcharge on individual incomes would yield \$5 billion in additional federal income compared with \$9 billion under Johnson's plan, Meany said.

A 20 per cent surcharge on corporations and 10 per cent on individuals under another AFL-CIO alternative proposal, would yield about \$13.4 billion, he said.

"Equality of sacrifice is the only basis on which to base a tax," Meany said.

Janet Popeleski Scores in Summer Ballet

Manchester's Janet Popeleski, 14, distinguished herself in New York ballet circles this summer as one of the two youngest members in the American School of Ballet's Group IV. She was awarded a full scholarship with living expenses at the world-famous institution whose chairman of the faculty is none other than George Balanchine.

There are only five groups in the selective curriculum and placement in the fourth of these indicates who has learned all the hundred-foot positions and steps which constitute the vocabulary of the classic dancer. If you are one to whom ballet simply means toe-dancing, you have yet to get very far by your understanding of the art.

Group IV, the next step upward, simply concentrates on refining the techniques already learned, and learning to combine them smoothly and gracefully in all possible combinations. Generally, 18 to 24 years of age is the range of students in the group.

After completing Group V, a student is ready to enter any of the world's great ballet companies with the rank of "corps de ballet," which is to say, a member of the corps de ballet. This may not seem like much, but in Europe, where they have regular, state-supported schools for ballet, the student has spent seven years studying anatomy and ballet all afternoon. A choreographer can call for any possible combination of movements from the corps and get them in the morning and high in the afternoon.

Janet has been a pupil of Joseph Albano in Hartford, and found to her delight that she and no new steps to learn even in New York. There was refinement of her knowledge of course, but her basis was sound and secure.

Mornings were devoted to "class" where she came under the tutelage of such famous masters as Andre Ekevich. "Class is something that even a prima ballerina assoluta" attends daily so as not to forget steps and movements not required in her current roles.

In the afternoon, Miss Popeleski worked out in "variations" and "adagio" for the record, there is no variation in a "variation." A "variation" (with the French pronunciation) is a solo dance in a famous ballet. The "Dance of the Sugar-Plum Fairy" in "Nutcracker" is an example.

"Adagios" are the duets for male and female dancers. Here Janet began to learn the various "lira" and how to help her partner as he could raise her off the floor with seemingly effortless ease.

Ford Suspends Installation of Shoulder Straps

NEW YORK (AP)—Ford Motor Company announced Tuesday it has suspended installation of shoulder harnesses, one of the most controversial of the new 1968 auto safety items.

Installation of the harnesses is mandatory for all passenger cars sold in the United States after next Jan. 1 under provisions of the new federal Highway Safety Act.

Highway administration safety officials in Washington were not available for comment, but a Ford spokesman said the Ford announcement came as no surprise.

There was no immediate comment from Chrysler and General Motors, but American Motors Voice President Victor Ravilio said his firm had not installed them as yet.

Asked why there were none on AMC cars at the first auto press preview now under way, he replied with a grin, "We have an even harder job trying to sell them on the safety value of shoulder harnesses," said a Ford spokesman.

For, in its announcement, Ford said it will cooperate in a federal highway administration review of the advantages and possible disadvantages of the upper torso safety belts by providing pertinent results of its tests with these belts.

A spokesman for the Automobile Manufacturers Association said the most serious problem involving shoulder harnesses had been uncovered in simultaneous collisions run with dummies in the cars.

He said that in some cases a rear seat passenger who had on the shoulder harness would be projected forward on impact and that the head of the rear seat dummy would bang against the head of the front seat dummy.

The National Highway Safety Bureau has asked American and four foreign car makers to report as soon as possible their findings on use of shoulder belts. In effect, this meant the government was considering reopening debate on whether the harness belts actually were an aid in the fight against traffic injury.

3 Men Cleared Of Drug Charges

HARTFORD (AP)—Three men, arrested last January in East Haven, have been cleared of narcotics charges in a reversal ruling by a Connecticut appeals court.

The Appellate Division of Circuit Court said, in a decision revealed Tuesday, that heroin and marijuana found in the men's car by police acting on mere suspicion could not be used as evidence in court against the men sitting in the car.

N.Y. Hippies 'Up in Beads' Over Arrest

NEW YORK (AP)—The hippies are up in beads and bells over the arrest of a hippie activist on a federal narcotics charge.

Anti-minded hippies calling themselves "Provos" for provocateurs marched and demonstrated Tuesday afternoon and spent the night sleeping on the sidewalk in front of the Federal House of Detention.

The demonstrations are in protest over the jailing of Irvin Dana Biel, 20, on charges of selling 48 capsules of LSD to a teen-ager. Biel was ordered held in \$5,000 bail.

The protest began when the Provos learned of Biel's arrest. After a visit to a police station, they converged about 200 protesters on the Federal House of Detention.

From there, some 200 hippies, many wearing sandals and beads, marched to the Federal House of Detention and Indian ritual bells went to the federal courthouse where Biel was arraigned. Outside they sang "LSD's Got a Hold on Me," accompanied by bongo drums, flutes and guitars.

After the arraignment, they went to Tompkins Square Park, heart of East Coast hippedom, and fanned out to beg for bail money. They reportedly collected \$1,700.

A crowd of 3,000 was in the park as the time for a rock 'n' roll concert and more than 100 patrolmen and riot policemen were on hand. There was no trouble.

Gun Defeat Does Not Mean LBJ Bill Doomed, Says RFK

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, defeated in a Senate skirmish over firearms legislation, said today the setback does not indicate that President Johnson's gun control proposal is doomed.

But a Republican foe of the administration measure said the Senate decision to continue the Pentagon's civilian marksmanship program pointed in that direction.

He said he believes "a substantial number of senators" who voted against his amendment will vote in favor of the Johnson gun control bill.

Reliable sources reported that federal forces to the south also smashed an apparent attempt to infiltrate Lagos State through a complicated network of creeks. The sources said government soldiers early today rounded up some Biafrans who had boarded fishing boats at the town of Olu-tupa, about 18 miles south of Oyo, and sailed through miles of tangled creeks and forests to the town of Epe, at the tip of the state and about 40 miles east of Lagos.

On other fronts in the civil war, federal patrols reportedly reached the Midwest river port of Warri, which was seized Aug. 9 by the Biafrans.

The federal government also continued to claim that a major assault was imminent north of Enugu, the Biafran capital.

Meanwhile, the Nigerian government accused the United States of seeking to "balkanize" Nigeria to get control of its oil.

"It was one of the most vicious things I've heard," said an American diplomat.

7 Cruisers Are Ordered For Policed

The Board of Representatives agreed to purchase seven police cruisers from the low bidder, Clyde Chevrolet, at Monday night's meeting of the Board.

The cruisers will be 1968 Chevrolets with automatic transmissions. The quoted cost per car was \$2,300, or \$16,463 for seven.

The automatic transmissions were recommended by Police Chief George Trapp. He believes the automatic transmission would be in the best interest of the town to eliminate the cost of replacement of clutches, he stated.

Director of Administration Jay Edinger stated he would keep a comparison study of the repair costs for the non-automatic and automatic transmission cruisers.

Representative Richard McCarthy pointed out automatic transmission should bring the town a better resale value at the town auction.

The board also approved the purchase of a dictating and transcribing machine for use of Mayor Jack Grant. An appropriation of \$335 from the contingency fund was approved for the purchase.

Grant noted the purchase would eliminate the need for future office help. He sends out to 15 letters daily, he noted.

Also approved for purchase was a used snow blower for use by the Public Works Department in the removal of snow from the streets.

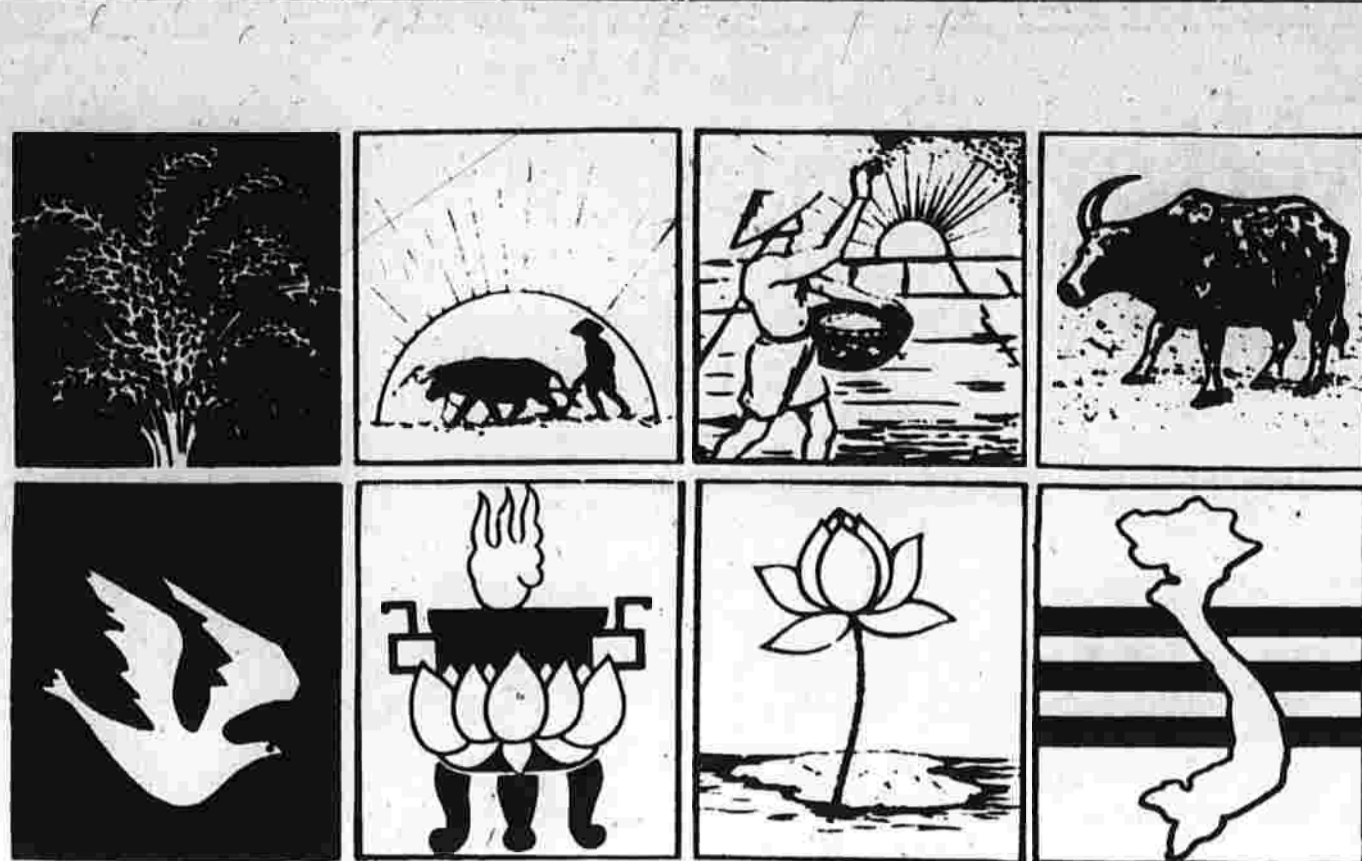
The board agreed to abandon two former streets in the re-development area, after a public hearing held earlier in the evening.

The abandoned roads are Jacob St. from the north side of High Street to the south side of Brooklyn St. and Market St. from the north side of High St. to the south side of East Main St. which lies south of the re-located Brooklyn St.

Referendum Date Changed The board postponed the date of the referendum for approval of the new school and school administration building, until Sept. 25 to permit the Planning and the Zoning Commission time to study the plans.

It also approved a recommendation by Town Attorney Abbot Schwab that the referendum hours be reduced to 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. The hour earlier closing will save the town money, he pointed out. The referendum had formerly been scheduled for Sept. 11 from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Also approved was an additional appropriation to the election budget of \$1,200 to cover costs of the school referendum. The money will be funded from the contingency fund.

Viet Candidates Adopt Symbols

SAIGON (AP) — Like politicians everywhere, South Vietnam's candidates have adopted symbols that uphold the highest ideals and promise something for everyone.

Posters calling for the election of Nguyen Van Thieu and Nguyen Cao Ky, heads of the present military government and favorites in the Sept. 3 balloting, bear an outline map of South Vietnam and the national flag. Put together, this is supposed to symbolize national building, democracy and social improvement.

The symbol of the leading civilian ticket, made up of Tran Van Huong and Mai Tho Truyen, is a sower of rice seed. This is said to represent a call for restoration of national order, efforts to bring peace and build an "equal and bright society."

Other election symbols include a white dove for unity, prosperity and peace; a torch for democracy and respect of national laws; a white lotus and a black incense burner, meaning "pity and justice, the country pacified and happiness for everyone."

Campaign strategists also note that the symbols themselves play an important role in the voting, especially in rural areas where many people can't read.

Posters with the ticket symbols started going up when the campaign period began Aug. 2. Campaign workers are seeking to make symbols familiar to voters because the system calls for them to place one ballot in the box and tear up the other. If a symbol can be sold to the voter, that may determine which ballot goes in the box.

'Free' Visit to Kazan Supervised by Russians

KAZAN, U.S.S.R. (AP) — "Please don't write anything about us," a local Communist official urged. He was acknowledging his embarrassment at a series of awkward moments during the first official visit of foreign correspondents to Kazan, an ancient Volga River city closed to outsiders until last year.

An American journalist was told he could walk freely through Kazan and talk with the people. He started to chat with high school students as they strolled down a street. A Communist youth official cruised along behind them in a car, listened in and occasionally jumped out to inject his own comments into the conversation.

The official tried four times to make the correspondent return to his hotel—he claimed the youths did not want to talk to the American, although they gave him flowers and were named for his autograph.

At last the official organized the students into singing what he called a "farewell song," then escorted the American back to the hotel.

Next day the youth official was reprimanded by a Moscow woman accompanying the guests. "The visitors were told that the culture of the area's Tatars, ancestors and books," he said.

"Our languages used to be written in Latin letters. When the Russians changed it to fit their Cyrillic alphabet, it meant the loss of two Tatar sounds, which the Russians couldn't pronounce.

"Everything here is Russian. The Russians look at you and they say, 'Oh, him. He's just a Tatar.' This man, whose wife is Russian, insists on sending their two children to a Tatar language school, even though it means a long trip each day.

A newspaper listing of plays and movies in Kazan did not mention any in the Tatar language. The visitors were impressed by evidence of social and economic progress, such as efforts to wipe out illiteracy and the building of the area into the Soviet Union's No. 1 oil producer.

But, after 50 years of Communism, Kazan's main thoroughfare, Bauman Street, retains the drab, dirty appearance of its image in revolutionary photographs at the local museum. There is a magnificent opera house in the city of 600,000 but few other new buildings. Houses and carts deliver goods to run-down stores. Only blocks from the center of town women carry buckets of water home from corner pumps.

The African section of the shop is called ekhaya—Zulu for "going home." It offers copies of African dress, some of African design. Most are made in Los Angeles of printed cotton imported from Ghana and Nigeria.

Louis Smith, president of Bootstrap, said the organization started its store without government money. He said it expects to have its own factories in operation within six months.

"All The Way" With LBJ

One particular passage in President Johnson's press conference last Friday provided, for better or for worse, a deep glimpse into the logic and mood in which Lyndon Johnson commands our forces in Vietnam.

First, this was the question: "Mr. President, it'll come as no surprise to you, that there are a number of critics of your Vietnam policy, inside and outside the press. But the Minneapolis Tribune, for example, has in the past rather consistently supported your objectives and policies in Vietnam. But on Tuesday of this week, its lead editorial called your permission to bomb within 10 miles of China a dangerous escalation of the bombing which could lead to war with China. What would your counsel be to this implied anxiety?"

And this was the President's answer: "First, I would like to make it clear that these air strikes are not intended as any threat to Communist China. And they do not, in fact, pose any threat to that country."

"We believe Peking knows that the United States does not seek to widen the war in Vietnam. The evidence has been made quite clear. We think that the strikes were made against major military staging areas. And that the lines of communication which the enemy has been concentrating his supply troops, and the transportation routes and bridges, over which those troops have been moved against our men, have been hit."

"We think that these targets are directly related to the enemy's capacity to move material into South Vietnam to kill American boys. The targets, to us, were clearly identifiable, they were carefully selected, they were all within North Vietnam."

"The strikes were made by the most highly trained pilots that we had. They employed every human and every technical precision that we have. The ordnance fell on target—end it did."

"And while every one is entitled to his opinion—a good many of them express it. The tougher the going gets, the more difficult it will be for some to stay with us and go all the way and last it out. Nevertheless, we believe that if we're going to be there, it's essential to do everything we can to protect the men we have there. And we're going to try to provide the maximum deterrent at the minimum loss."

The President, in this passage, exhibited three things. First, he exhibited the same bland kind of assumption about the conduct of another nation which General MacArthur sold to President Truman in 1950 when he got the President's permission to march up to the Yalu River. That march was begun with all kinds of assurances we merely intended to operate in North Korea, not touch China. But the physical approach of our troops was enough, in actuality, although not in bland theory, to bring the Chinese into the war.

Second, the President was once again using our own "American boys" as hostages against American public opinion. We must so think and act as to defend and protect them against the attempt of the enemy to kill and wound them. This is a natural instinct, upon which the President relies. It has never ceased to be part of the picture in this particular war, however, that the President himself is the man who has given the command and who takes responsibility for the policy which puts our American boys in a position and a situation where it inevitably becomes the business of other soldiers to shoot at them. The President makes the commitment of American lives and then uses the commitment he has made as the lever for trying to compel from his nation the whole-hearted consensus commitment he himself has dreamed of obtaining, but has never come close to obtaining, in reality.

Third, the President came close to a visceral definition of his own qualities and those of more average Americans. "The tougher the going gets," he said, "the more difficult it will be for some to stay with us and go all the way and last it out." The "us" is, we take it, the President and his advisers. They, he assures us, are "tough" enough. They, no

matter what others say or feel, intend to "go all the way and last it out." In such language and mood, the President made it fairly clear that he himself has reached the stage where he is going to trust his own decision and his own resolution no matter how long or costly or disastrous it proves to "go all the way," no matter how much against his decision and policy the national "consensus" at home may prove to be. For we have it now, in plain meaning, what has got into all the erstwhile "hawks" who have lately been taking new positions, all the erstwhile supporters of "escalation" who have now turned to advocacy of "negotiation now." They are, in the book the White House keeps on them, weaklings and cowards all.

They Like Reagan's Style

There are all kinds of petty side comments that can be made about the special congressional election in San Francisco. The Democratic candidate was young and without much of a record except that of association with his brother who is already a Democratic Congressman from the San Francisco district next door. The Republican candidate was something of a personal moderate, who had actually been pretty close to former Governor Brown, the now jobless Democrat.

Such factors may have played some small part in the result of the special election, which was, in turn, an election decided by a slender margin.

But they do nothing to alter the one big interpretation of the election which will survive. This was Governor Ronald Reagan's first chance to go to the voters of California in something of a referendum test on how they think of him after his first year in office. The test was located in a traditionally Democratic district, where the registration is two to one Democratic. It was located in a city which Reagan failed to carry in his big victory in 1966. For this contest, both sides put everything on the line. Reagan with repeated endorsements of Judge Milton Marks, the Republican candidate, and the Democrats with endorsements for Assemblyman John Burton from Senator Robert Kennedy, Vice President Humphrey and former Governor Brown.

In addition, both sides funneled campaign workers into the district from the rest of the state. It was an added importance for the contest that the Republicans, if they won, would have a strong voice in the State Senate away from the Democrats. All these things being so, the Republicans won and Governor Reagan has, therefore, a triumph and a further rise in his national stock. He has, in his first year, done some things he said he would do and nobody expected him really to do, and he has done some other things he said he never would do, like push through an historic increase in taxes. But the report seems to be from the voters of this congressional district in San Francisco, that they like his style.

At The Racetrack Too?

Senator McIntyre of New Hampshire, a member of the Banking Committee, heard a couple of prestige economists testify a few weeks ago that a purely random selection of stocks for investment would come out just as well as any selection made by Wall Street professionals. So Senator McIntyre decided to put their claim to the test.

He took an actual list of stocks on the New York Stock Exchange, and some actual darts, and then put a mythical \$10,000, a mythical 10 years ago, into the first 10 stocks he hit when he threw the darts at the list.

The mythical investment of \$10,000 made a mythical 10 years ago turned out to have a value at present listings of \$25,300, which is just a little bit better than the record for most expertly managed investment programs.

This, then, is one preliminary investment, is going to be the system we follow and recommend, henceforth, to all and sundry.

The one thing we plan to do first is buy a few shares of the stock of whatever firm it is that manufactures darts.

Roasted Corn

It is good to see that the Litchfield Hills Historical Automobile Club is planning to hold a corn roast in connection with its antique car show on Sunday, September 10. There aren't many corn roasts as there used to be. It would be a pity for that institution to pass completely from the New England scene.

A corn roast, of course, should be arranged for the main purpose of eating roasted corn. We don't mean corn that is shocked and boiled. We don't mean corn that is merely steamed. Corn roast corn must be cooked with its husk on. It must be cooked in the hot coals of a fine open fire. And the best is early yellow corn that grows on Western Connecticut cornfields with a warm southern exposure.

Corn roast corn has the flavor of Connecticut summer. It has the taste of the fresh June days when the plants came through the brown clay soil. It has the essence of evening rain. It has the truth in its flavor that made Indians plant corn here—and the rich aroma that makes this fine grain so uniquely American and so firmly our own.

Inside Report

WASHINGTON—As soon as a subcommittee of the House Post Office and Civil Service Committee established a chummy breakfast in Speaker John McCormack's dining room in the Capitol one morning last month, one of the breakfasters—union boss Jerome Keating—headed down the hall to the office of Representative Udall.

The reason for the success of these postal treasury raiders can be found in the financing of political campaigns such as Jimmy Morrison's in Louisiana last year. While losing, Morrison spent about \$275,000, most of which came from the Letter Carriers and Postal Clerks unions.

With some of organized labor's fattest treasures and an exemption from the financial reporting requirements of the Landrum-Griffin Labor Reform Act, the postal unions have more raw muscle on Capitol Hill than more famous lobbies. Their muscle is used for a purpose: To scratch the backs of the members of the Post Office and Civil Service Committee and keep their water glasses filled, and dictate both postal pay

Rode the Rails North Negro Named President Of White Chicago Bank

CHICAGO (AP) — He graduated from high school in New Orleans in 1940, hopped a freight and rode the rails to Chicago. He did it for the adventure, because there was no money to pay his fare, and because Chicago was where the action was—goal for the great Northern migration of Southern Negroes. Today, Norman Simon, 45, sits behind a broad oak desk in a paneled office of the Guaranty Bank & Trust Co. on Chicago's South Side. He is the first Negro to be named president of a bank in an all-white board. "I'm on trial, I know that," he says. "But anyone with any intelligence at all realizes I am a professional man first. Anyone who waits in that door meets the president of the bank rather than Norman Simon who happens to be a Negro." Simon's green pastel phone rings constantly with calls from politicians, white and Negro city leaders, and just plain depositors. He picks up the receiver with a finely manicured hand. His voice is crisp, and his philosophy is pure Horatio Alger: "Anyone given a substantial degree of drive and hope can come from the humblest of backgrounds and get any place he wants to go." "My finance professor at Roosevelt University told me I was an absolute idiot to try for a career in banking," Simon said. "He said it was a low paying field and there were no opportunities for Negroes."

Railroad Sorting Car Losing Out to 'Mr. Zip'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The railroad mail sorting car, once a key to America's postal system, is losing ground to Mr. Zip despite efforts of congressmen and postal workers to preserve it. Removal of the sorting cars without more study is opposed by congressmen who say they still are the most efficient method for distributing mail to sparsely populated areas. Nearly identical bills introduced by Sens. Quentin N. Burdick, D-N.D., and Gordon L. Allott, R-Colo., would urge no more elimination of the cars pending a thorough study of the policy by the Department of Transportation. Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield has endorsed the proposals. But, there is little indication of action on them. Elimination of the cars has been opposed for two years by the United Federation of Postal Clerks, which says they still are the most efficient sorting method for cities as well as rural areas. Beginning Sept. 16, most first class mail moving east or west among a number of major cities will travel in bulk shipments by air instead of by rail. Officials say they hope to get letters to their destinations 24 hours sooner. Among the cities to be included in the first class mail airift are New York, Philadelphia, long shot. Washington, Chicago, Minneapolis, Milwaukee, Seattle, Portland and Los Angeles. All other classes of mail, including parcel post, will continue to be handled by rail. 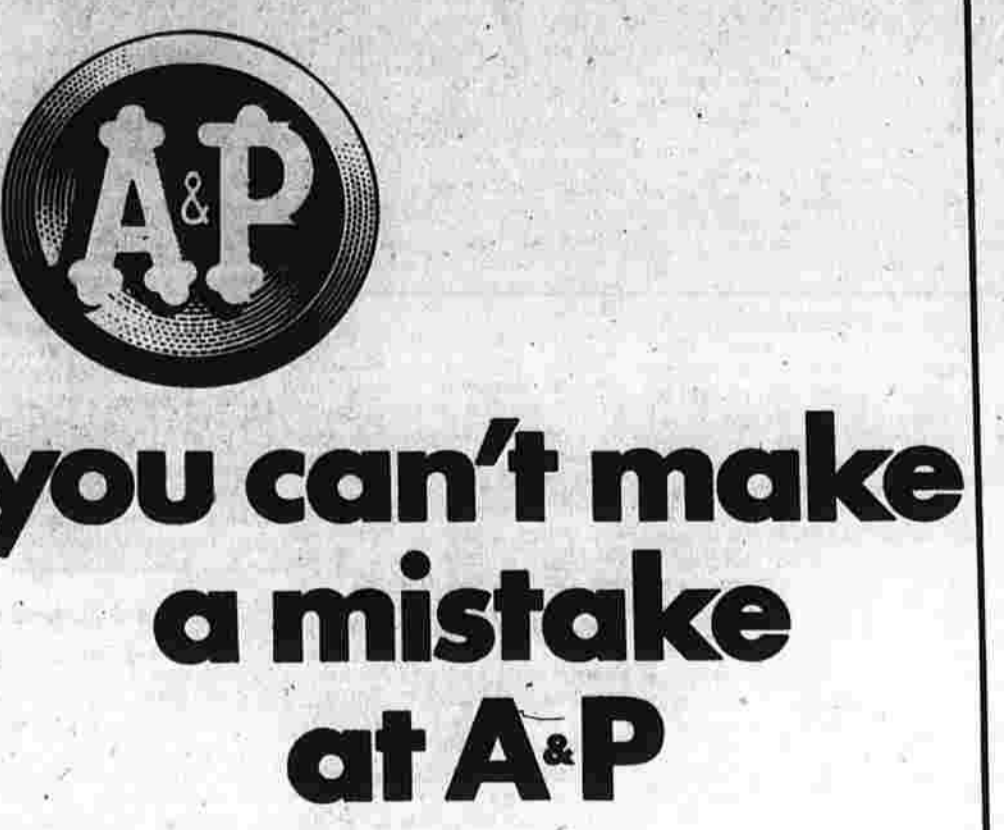

Developer Of 'the Pill' Dead at 64.

BOSTON (AP)—Dr. Gregory Pincus, the research biologist who developed the first practical oral contraceptive pill, died Tuesday night. He was 64.

With Dr. Hudson Hoagland, he was co-founder in 1964 of the Worcester Foundation for Experimental Biology, now located in Shrewsbury, Mass., where laboratory research on the pill began in 1960.

His death came 10 years after the pill he developed was approved by the Food and Drug Administration for use in treating threatened abortion and menstrual disorders, and seven years after its approval as a prescription contraceptive.

Peter Bent Brigham Hospital listed the cause of death as myeloid metaplasia, a disease of the blood and spleen akin to leukemia.

Although he achieved worldwide fame for his contraceptive pill Dr. Pincus also developed estrogens, a hormone used in treating breast cancer, and was recognized as an authority on both the reproductive cycles of mammals and sex hormones.

A \$2,100 grant from the Planned Parenthood Research Fund started research on the contraceptive pill.

In determining the goals for a new approach to birth control, Dr. Pincus rejected the idea of painful and potentially expensive injections and settled on a pill as the ideal physiological contraceptive.

His approach centered on progesterone—a hormone, or one of the chemical controllers of body processes—which is secreted by a woman's ovaries in large quantities after ovulation.

Working with Dr. Min-chueh Chang, who conducted the experimental observations on rabbits and rats, Dr. Pincus demonstrated that progesterone administered orally could inhibit ovulation in animals.

Then in collaboration with Dr. John Rock at the Free Hospital for Women in Boston, Dr. Pincus began to apply the work to humans—using progesterone compounds first to correct infertility in women.

The large doses of progesterone required to inhibit ovulation were a drawback for its use as a contraceptive, however, and Dr. Pincus began a search for a progesterone-like compound that could be effective in small doses. He and Dr. Chang tested almost 200 compounds that had been supplied by drug manufacturers and selected a handful that were most effective. They did the chemical analysis work which described a progesterone-like compound that combined the best chemical features of those they had experimented with. The result was a pill marketed under the trade name Enovid.

Dr. Pincus, a native of Woodbine, N.J., is survived by his widow, Elizabeth; a son, John, of Washington; a daughter, Mrs. Michael Bernard of Cambridge; three brothers and a sister.

No Extra Funds Needed For Town Hall Heating

The Board of Finance decided against an open-air heating system Monday night that no additional appropriation will be necessary to cover the cost of a new heating system in the Community Hall, just a bit of transferring in the budget.

However, since the heating system will run at least \$1,000 over the amount budgeted, the town must vote on the amount at a town meeting.

The extra money will come from that saved on the purchase of a truck, which came in some \$4,000 below the amount appropriated. With this savings, a new tractor for mowing and snow blowing will also be purchased.

The heating system bid exceeded the appropriation because individual circulators will be installed in each room. The hall is being changed from hot air to hot water. The fire marshal has ruled that the new boiler room must be insulated also.

The board of finance approved a request from the public building commission for a map file at \$150. This requires a transfer within the FPC budget.

The board voted to take \$252.46 from cash surplus and return it to the fire department. This is the money earned from the pool-filling endeavors of the department, minus expenses.

The board of finance had forgotten to encumber it in the last fiscal year.

The board will send out letters to all boards and commissions next week requesting that annual reports be completed and sent in.

Lacking a key to the selectmen's office, the board conducted its brief business in the parking lot.

Park Road Approved

The planning commission was meeting in the town office conference room. The commission asked some questions about the conservation plan for Herick Memorial Park, then gave its approval for the proposed road into the area.

Quintler Winkler, conservation chairman, and Stanley Bates, secretary, attended the planning meeting.

They were asked about plans for acquiring Freja Park, across Notch Pond.

Under the open space law, Bolton's 18 or so acres would cost \$1,500. But James Hasset, planning commission chairman, said he felt that there was "a lot of

University Talks with Firms About New Cigarette Filter

NEW YORK (AP) — Columbia University, in the cigarette filter business through a strange sequence of events, is negotiating with a dozen tobacco companies but the dollars-and-cents deal has scarcely started.

Suit, an advertising man, asked Strickman to determine the cause of death, the Times said, and after he had done so, the cows had licked road tar.

Strickman told Suit of his filter. Suit discussed the filter with Robert Katz, attorney and secretary of Segram's Distillers Co., while Katz was seeking a way to express his gratitude to Columbia College of Physicians and Surgeons for saving his son's life following an accident.

Katz suggested to Tapley that if Strickman's claims for his filter were found to be true, Columbia should support the project in return for royalties.

Proceeds from Columbia's half interest are to be used for education and research, including cancer research. Estimates of possible proceeds range up to 100 million a year.

Testimony concerning the filter is to be given to the Senate Commerce Committee Thursday by Dr. Grayson Kirk, president of Columbia, and Eric Donald Tapley and Cushman Haegensen, medical consultants to the university on the project.

The committee, headed by Sen. Warren Magnuson, D-Wash., opens hearings today on smoking hazards and efforts to make cigarettes less dangerous to health.

John E. D. Grunow, former cement company executive named a special assistant to Kirk to handle commercial aspects of the Strickman project, said that besides the six major American tobacco manufacturers, a number of foreign tobacco firms have started discussions with Columbia about purchase of rights to the filter.

"One or two have just touched on the question of dollars and cents," he said. "But we haven't had any serious discussions with any of them on this point. The main point of discussion now is to describe to them the tests we've done and the arrangements we can make for them to do their own testing."

Columbia has had the filter tested by an independent Manhattan laboratory. Results reportedly confirmed Strickman's tests.

Columbia also has conducted tests which officials say indicate that the Strickman filter could be produced at about the same cost as filters now in use, and has run tests on the comparative taste of cigarettes with the Strickman and other filters.
