New Tuition Policy Set By Hartford Archdiocese

A new tuition policy has been established for students attending Catholic elementary schools outside their own parishes, the Very Rev. Msgr. James A. Connolly, superintendent of schools for the Hartford Archdiocese, has announced.

Parents of students attending schools outside their parish will be asked to pay a maximum \$75 tuition fee. Pupils from within the parish will pay a tuition charge sufficient to meet the deficit in the school's operational costs.

The new fees will apply to more than 43,000 students in 407 elementary schools throughout 86 towns and cities in Hartford, New Haven and Fairfield Counties, comprising the Archdiocese of Hartford.

Last year, a \$100 minimum charge was in effect for students from outside the parish, of which \$75 was paid by the parish and \$25 by the parents.

This year, a maximum fee of \$120 has been set, with \$75 to be paid by the parish and \$45 by the parents.

The policy for students who wish parishes remains the same: "Each parent will determine the amount of tuition based on his 1967-68 operational budget," Msgr. Connolly said.

Lam's wife and three small children were taken to a hospital maternity division, said the guards were first born St. Louis and were rare in that multiple births are most frequent.

Cost of Living Leaps Highest in Nine Months

WASHINGTON (AP)—Living costs climbed four-tenths of one percent in July for the biggest jump in nine months, the Labor Department said today.

25 Indicted in N. Y. For \$407,000 Theft

NEW YORK (AP) — A federal grand jury has indicted 25 persons—being 12 men and 13 women—in connection with the theft of \$407,000 worth of blank American Express travelers checks at Kennedy Airport a year ago.

A sealed indictment, opened Thursday, accused the 25 of fraudulently passing stolen travelers checks.

Five of the defendants were arrested by FBI agents, arranged in U.S. District Court and held in jail ranging from \$1,000 to \$5,000.

Others were arrested in New York, New Jersey, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

Pressure from Pentagon Ends Army Housing Bias

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon, wielding an economic shroud, has opened thousands of rental units to Negro servicemen in the Washington area.

Two months ago non-discrimination pledges had been made by the owners of 10,000 units.

Now, the Pentagon says, 34,000 units are available to servicemen without regard to color and more are being listed each week.

The change was wrought through the first use of off-limits sanctions by Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara. On June 23 such an order was issued covering new rentals of housing within a 3 1/2 mile radius of Andrews Air Force Base in nearby Maryland. Eight days later a similar order was issued for a 7-mile zone around Ft. Meade, Md.

Because most apartment owners depend on renting to service members, they usually cause a turnover rate of one to two years—an off-limits order can be painful to the owners.

"You'd be surprised how many are coming around," says Brig. Gen. William E. Ekman, housing coordinator for the metropolitan area within the square level.

"They all agree that people working shoulder-to-shoulder, fighting shoulder-to-shoulder, and dying that way, should not come home and have the door slammed into their faces," he said.

The military services have accepted only open housing listings in rental housing since 1963. But never before has there been a ban against segregated units within the referral system.

"When an individual comes into the Washington area, one who is going to live off base must go to the housing referral office where he is told where units within the area are open," Ekman says.

"He cannot go to those with whom we have sanctions and signs a statement he has not violated them. If he should violate them he is subject to restriction."

Ekman says, 2,500 now have adopted open housing. Outside that area, there are 3,600 units and 217 trailer spaces open to Negroes and whites alike.

South Windsor Tax Forms Available For Elderly

Tax assessor Bertrand Mor-Namara has announced that application forms can now be obtained at his office in the town hall by property owners who are 65 years of age or over and who wish to apply for tax relief under a bill adopted by the last session of the Legislature.

The property owners, however, must meet certain requirements in order to be eligible for the benefits. In South Windsor the benefits will start with the 1968 grand list which becomes effective next Jan. 1.

Applicants must have been 65 years old on or before Jan. 1 and must have been a home-owner anywhere in Connecticut for at least five years before making application. The ownership does not have to have been consecutive in the total time.

Also, a home owner who is not married, or married and separated, must have a gross income of less than \$3,000 per year. Gross income includes interest, dividends, social security benefits, pensions, and interest on savings and on stocks and bonds.

A home owner who is married and living with a spouse is restricted to a gross income of \$5,000 per year to qualify for the tax relief.

A tax department explanation of how to obtain benefits notes that for each year persons with income of less than \$3,000 per year, or \$5,000 for married couples, can apply for a tax exemption. The exemption must be filed with the tax assessor's office.

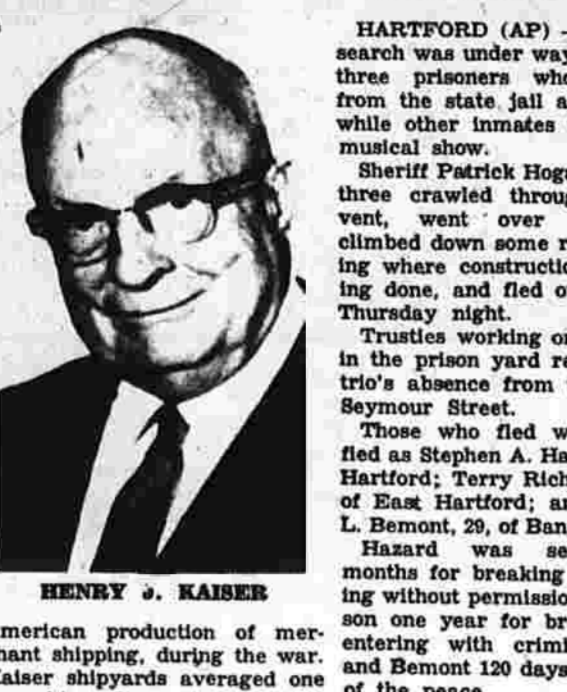

The confrontation arose last week when Finley suspended pitcher Lew Krause for a drinking incident on a plane. The players released a statement criticizing Finley and, in the afternoon, Dark was fired and Harrelson was released.

Krause was later reinstated and Finley's demand that the players retract their statement was refused.

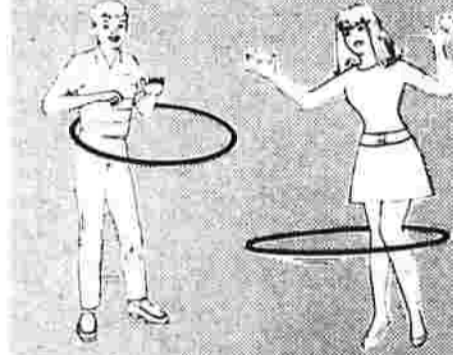

SAIGON (AP) — Communist saboteurs blew up a bus and killed 22 civilians passengers today 12 miles from a rally where South Vietnam's presidential candidates were speaking.

Six other passengers were injured when a mine demolished the bus on a main provincial road near the populous Mekong delta city of My Tho. It was the third such incident in the past few days.

At My Tho, campaigners for the Sept. 3 election included the military presidential aspirant, Lt. Gen. Nguyen Van Thieu, for the first time. This had been widely publicized in advance.

The My Tho area is heavily infested by guerrillas and the roads around it have been a special target of the Viet Cong recently. The timing of today's blast was a reminder of the Communists' continuing efforts to disrupt the election campaign.

Drum fighting continued in a lull and heavy weather restricted the first time in North Vietnam Friday.

In the last 24 hours, the Communists have blown up eight bridges near Da Nang, wounded a subdistrict police chief and 18 soldiers in a grenade attack on a delta post 55 miles below Saigon.

A Vietnamese spokesman said a hamlet chief was murdered Friday night by guerrillas dressed in Vietnamese army uniforms.

Three of the bridges were on Highway 1 along the coast. Emergency repairs allowed traffic to start moving again today.

In one area not obscured by bad weather, the U.S. Navy jets from carriers in the Tonkin Gulf attacked North Vietnam's main naval base at Port Walt, 80 miles from Red China, for the first time in 10 days.

Force pilots were able to strike supply lines and a military training center in North Vietnam's southern pashandale.

**Half of France
Wants DeGaulle
To Finish Term**

PARIS (AP) — Only about half the French electorate wants President Charles de Gaulle to finish his seven-year term, according to a public opinion poll published today.

Nearly a quarter, 23 per cent, of those polled wish De Gaulle would "leave as quickly as possible." Another 16 per cent said they wanted De Gaulle to stay in power "another year or two."

Twelve per cent, expressed no opinion. These figures were published in the afternoon paper France-Soir and were based on a sampling taken last week by the French Institute of Public Opinion.

The paper said that in a similar poll, taken in May 1966, 65 per cent of the electorate expressed hope the president would stay in power until his term runs out in 1972. Thus, De Gaulle's popularity has dropped seven percentage points in 12 months.

Even so, the statistics indicate De Gaulle could beat Socialist leader Francois Mitterrand if an election were held now.

The Public Opinion Institute reported that 47 per cent of those polled would prefer De Gaulle to stay in power for another year, 42 per cent would prefer De Gaulle to leave and 11 per cent would like neither. Two weeks ago, the pollsters said De Gaulle had a 58 per cent lead over Mitterrand and 21 per cent over Georges Pompidou.

HONG KONG (AP) — Hong Kong police said today the terrorist killing of a radio comedian who ridiculed Communist agitators indicates the Reds are switching from random bombings to planned assassination campaigns.

Police formed a special squad to ferret out terrorists who have marked themselves as Communist sympathizers.

After popular Chinese comedian Lam Bun, 47, was turned into a human torch and fatally burned, Hong Kong Communist newspapers carried the latest of Red terrorists that he had executed Lam for ridiculing the Communists.

The "Underground Traitor" Executive Outright Headquarters warned that others guilty of "similar crimes" would meet the same fate.

Lam's brother, Lam Kong-hoi, 26, was injured critically in the attack. Witnesses saw four terrorists running away after the attack, a police source said, but it was not known if the witnesses had seen the men.

A total of \$27,000 in rewards has been offered for information leading to apprehension of the terrorists.

In Hong Kong's business district, about 1,000 demonstrators calling themselves "the Students Struggle Committee against Government Oppression" yelled anti-British slogans and painted signs on the sides of buildings today protesting what they called "British slave education."

Police broke up the mob with tear gas and arrested five men. They later released one man.

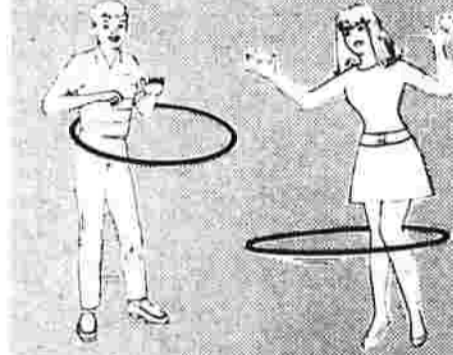
