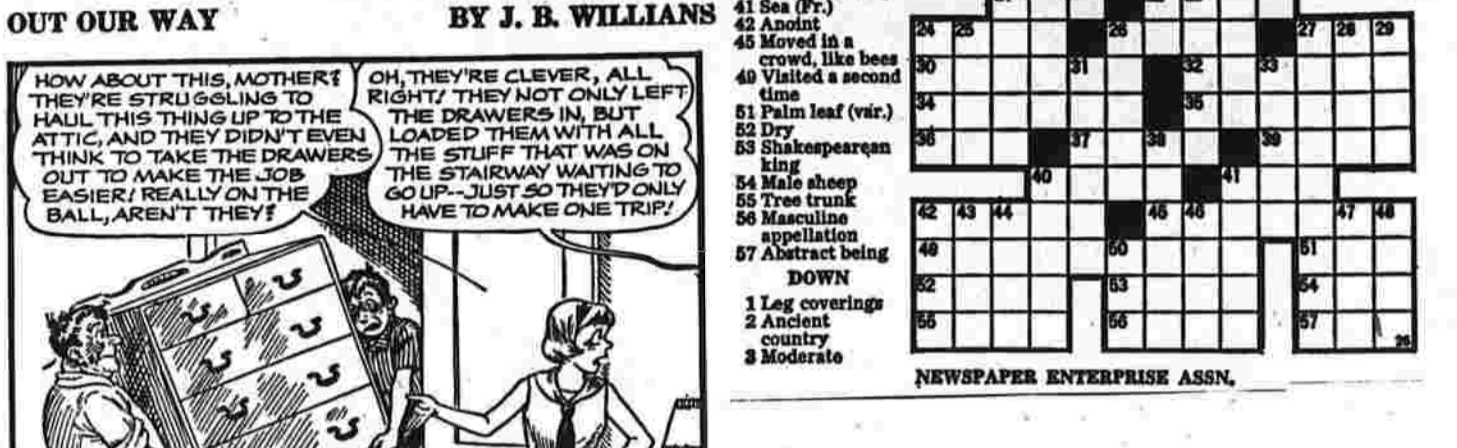

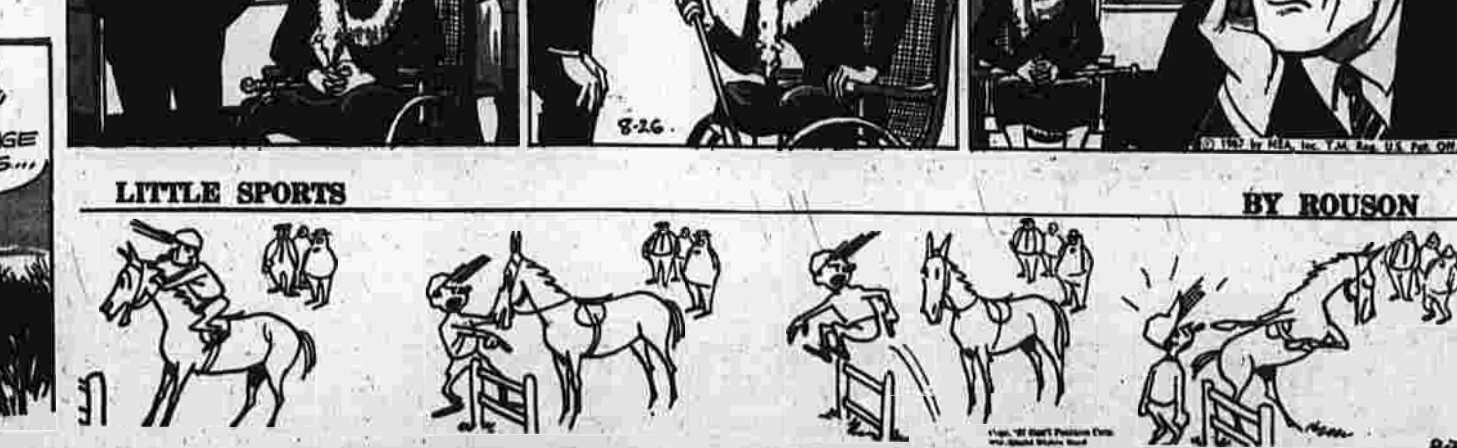

Joint Meeting Set On Northeast Sewer

A joint meeting of town directors and those of the Eighth Utilities District has been set for Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. at the North End Fire House.

The joint meeting was requested by Victor Swanson, president of the district board of directors, "to iron out details and speed up action on the \$3 million Northeast sewer project which the town and district are jointly undertaking."

The request came after Town Manager Weiss had answered Swanson's first request for a meeting with a letter stating the progress being made on the project, but with no mention of a meeting.

Final plans for the project are now being prepared and the entire program will be supervised by former Director of Public Works Walter S. Fuss.

It includes the erection of a secondary sewer treatment plant and interceptor sewer.

The treatment plant is expected to relieve the district's primary treatment plant off Hilliard St. as well as the town's primary treatment plant off Olcott St.

In addition, the interceptor mains are expected to take care of the overtaxed industrial, commercial and domestic sewage in both ends of town.

At the meeting the district will request the elimination of the Duval St. pumping station if the alternate route for the center relief sewer proposed in a letter to the district from William O'Neill, town director of public works, is to be used.

The alternate route for the center relief sewer would run from the west end of Hilliard St. along Hilliard Pond to the intersection of Hilliard St.

O'Neill said that the estimated cost would be \$44,000 more than the original cost, but there would be a \$175,000 saving to the town in the correction of the Parkade pumping station and the elimination of pollution in Hilliard Pond.

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Bids Asked for Phase Two Of Renewal Area Site Work

The Manchester Redevelopment Agency has announced through its executive director, Edward Rybczyk, that it will receive bids early next month for a second segment of site improvement work in the North End Renewal Project.

Bids will be opened in the agency office at 388 Main St. Friday, Sept. 11, at 11 a.m. Rybczyk said the contract will include work on Main St. between Hilliard St. and the railroad crossing at Depot Square, and on Hilliard, Hudson and Woodbridge Sts. within the project area.

The work will include widening the east side of Main St.; installing "rubberized" pavement over the railroad crossing, repaving streets, reconstructing sidewalks and curbs, installing storm and sanitary sewers, and making improvements to all private utilities.

Also included will be the installation of a traffic light at the Main and Hilliard Sts. intersection. The contract is the second to be let for site work within the 26-acre renewal tract. The first, completed last October, was for improvements to N. School St. between Robertson Park and Gowlay St.

The remainder of the project's site improvement work will be included in a third contract now being prepared and scheduled to go out to bid at a date to be announced.

Use of Soviet Planes Admitted by Nigeria

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP) — Nigeria's government admitted today that it has Soviet jet planes and technicians, and held out the possibility that it might hire mercenaries to fly them in the civil war in Biafra.

Chief Anthony Enahoro, commissioner of labor and information, said the government bought Soviet-made aircraft but refused to tell a news conference how many planes or what type they are. Reliable sources have said the Soviet Union delivered 15 or more MIG15 fighters, an older model, more than a week ago.

Enahoro said Nigeria has jet pilots trained in Germany, Canada and India and that the military government felt free to employ mercenaries "in any capacity," if necessary. The chief announced formation of a new war cabinet to conduct the war "with all vigor and bring it to conclusion as soon as possible."

He said the cabinet was drawn from the federal executive council, of which Maj. Gen. Yakubu Gowon is chairman, but declined to list its members. Enahoro said Gowon's position as head of state and military commander-in-chief was unchanged but there was speculation that formation of the cabinet signaled a reduction in Gowon's authority.

Enahoro reported no fighting at the Western town of Ore, 115 miles from Lagos, where federal troops have counterattacked against a rebel force.

He repeated government attacks on the United States for its refusal to permit arms shipments to Nigeria and its criticism of the Soviet planes purchase.

Biafran agents have been permitted to enter the United States and an American-built Constellation plane is believed in Biafra, Enahoro charged.

"The United States is playing a game which is extremely difficult to understand, for reasons only they, themselves, know," he said.

Judgment Against Union Leaves Labor Uncertain

WASHINGTON (AP) — A \$1 million federal court damage judgment against the United Mine Workers union leaves organized labor's position under antitrust laws as clouded as ever.

A top labor lawyer said the impact of the damage award—which will be trebled automatically to \$3 million unless federal antitrust procedure won't be known until the Supreme Court reviews it.

The case involves alleged monopoly by the UMW in the Tennessee Valley coal market.

The union said it "will exercise all legal remedies open to us to obtain a reversal of this decision," leaving little doubt it eventually will go to the high court along with a number of similar cases involving the Mine Workers.

The key Supreme Court decision so far came two years ago in a three-way split ruling that uninvolved most labor leaders by applying antitrust laws to a union for the first time.

"There isn't any question that unions are under antitrust laws," said a number of labor lawyer said, "the question is how much and under what circumstances."

A federal court jury in Chattanooga, Tenn., Thursday ruled that the United Mine Workers conspired to monopolize the Tennessee Valley coal market and drive two small firms out of business.

The Chattanooga ruling awarded \$1 million damages to the Tennessee Consolidated Coal Co. and its subsidiary Grundy

in some miles to the south, the command said. The Korean newspaper Dong-a Ilbo reported from Saigon that South Korea sent another marine combat battalion to South Vietnam July 15. One marine battalion usually has about 600 men. Previously, South Korea had about 46,000 men in Vietnam—two infantry divisions and their supporting units.

Five Americans were missing after a helicopter crash in a mountain river near Kontum in the central highlands. Rescue crews from two other helicopters pulled a Red Cross girl and three soldiers safely from the swirling waters.

Stricken by engine trouble, the helicopter crashed in a spot where the river is about 200 feet wide with deep jungle on both banks.

Eight-engine B52 bombers flew two missions inside and just below the demilitarized zone between North and South Vietnam today, making a total of five runs in two days following Communist attack from there.

Recent ground action below the buffer zone was among indications the Communists might try again, as they did early in the summer, to push into Quang Tri, South Vietnam's northernmost province.

The B52s dumped tons of bombs on infiltration routes and staging areas as they have been doing frequently in recent months, trying to check any Communist buildup.

the shopping center, one block from party headquarters. The shots, fired from a low roof over a barber shop, struck him in the head and chest. He fell out of the right side of the 10-year-old, rusted car, soap powder mixing with his blood.

On the seat were his trade marks, a corn-cob pipe and sunglasses.

Pattler was arrested 45 minutes later, a half-mile from the scene. Police would not say if a weapon had been found or whether he had made a statement.

"I haven't done anything, this is a nightmare," he said to reporters as he was led, manacled, into police headquarters.

Pattler often was in the forefront of Nazi party harrasing activities and it brought him a long string of arrests.

On June 8, 1964, he leaped to the platform at a Washington meeting where Mississippi Negroes told of shootings, beatings, bombings they had suffered.

"You're a bunch of filthy swine," he cried. "You're trying to force white Americans to join you."

He changed his name from John Patalas in 1960, married a 19-year-old girl, and was discharged honorably from the Marines in the wake of a party rally at which he was arrested.

# TV Pilots Say It Will Be a Good Season, But...

NEW YORK — (NEA) — If you could honestly judge a television series from its best-foot-forward pilot, then you could flatly state that the 1967-68 season will be good news.

But it must be remembered that, judging from pilots, last season's picks for viewing highlights were "The Man Who Never Was" and "The Hero", both of which died in mid-season.

When a producer makes a pilot, he is out to sell it. So time and care are taken, money is spent and the script, while somewhat confined by the necessity of introducing regular characters, is as good as it can be.

When it is sold, time and money are budgeted and what follows is often below the pilot's standard.

Twenty-six new shows will preview beginning Sept. 5, the week when ABC and CBS launch their new season. NBC's fall schedule begins Sept. 10. ABC has 11 new shows. NBC eight and CBS seven. Of these six are westerns, six are family adventure series, three are detective, three are comedy-variety, two are drama, one is a war series and one is an interview show.

The best news is that of the 26 shows, only two fit into the "gimmick" category. One is "The Flying Nun" — she really flies, you see. It's something to do with the fact that she weighs only 90 pounds and the wind, plus lift, plus thrust, plus her wing-shaped coronet, carry her into the wild blue yonder a lot. But the ABC-TV series benefits greatly from a delightful performance from cute-but-not-sticky Sally Field and hard-to-criticise hookum from Peter Pan and The Sound of Music.

The other gimmick show is ABC's "The Second Hundred

Years" (like The Flying Nun, from Screen Gems where gimmickery is a way of life).

In this Arthur O'Connell is a 67-year-old who learns his father, frozen in a glacier 67 years earlier at the age of 33, has been found and defrosted, just like a TV dinner. Physically and mentally dad is 33, the exact age of his grandson.

One of the most promising series is "Cimarron Strip", starring Stuart Whitman, an Academy Award nominee. It sports the biggest budget in television, between \$350,000 and \$400,000 per week. A lot of the

budget is going for scripts, the best news of all. The story is where it all begins.

The CBS series will be 90 minutes long and it and a first-run movie compromise the network's entire Thursday schedule. The setting of Cimarron Strip is a period of western history that hasn't been overly used, and it lends itself to a variety of stories. Whitman is a marshal in the lawless, rowdy territory called the Cherokee Outlet during the period before the government opened it to settlers.

Another good pilot is "High Chaparral," which will kick off on NBC with a two-hour episode, pre-empting Bonanza for the night (both shows are produced by David Dortort), and thereafter follow it on Sunday nights. Bonanza elements are there, but the setting is Arizona near the Mexican border. Acting from Left Erloson, Cameron Mitchell, Maria Stade and an exciting newcomer named Henry Darrow, is all competent.

"Judd, for the Defense," on ABC could be a powerful drama in the mold of The Defenders. Carl Betz, far from the wispy-washy husband he was on The Donna Reed Show, is excellent as the country's highest-paid defense attorney.

ABC's "Hondo," starring Ralph Tesser in the role John Wayne played in the movie, is a realistic look at life in the West, spiced with fights and action.

"The Danny Thomas Hour" on NBC is an anthology which will include several musical-comedy variety shows. But the bulk of it will be guest stars (Olivia de Havilland, Richard Todd, Sid Caesar, Geraldine Chaplin in her television debut) and good scripts.

"He and She" on CBS-TV could be the successor to The Dick Van Dyke Show. Richard Benjamin and Paula Prentiss are a pair of attractive, deft comics. But the show is very nearly, stolen by Jack Cassidy as an egocentric, hambone actor who plays Jetman in a television series based on the comic strip Benjamin draws.

ABC's "Garrison's Gorillas" could be subtitled The Dirty One-Third Dozen. Ron Harper is the leader of a gang of four cons, recruited from prison for special undercover missions.

"Ironside" on NBC-TV has the benefit of Raymond Burr and is almost presold due to a pilot that was popular when it ran as a feature film on World Premiere. "Dundee and the Culhane" on CBS-TV stars the noted British actor John Mills. He plays a literate lawyer traveling the Old West to try cases.

"Custer" on ABC is an O.K. western that doesn't whitewash the controversial general (he's a lieutenant colonel here) too much, and introduces a compelling personality in the role, Wayne Moulder.

"Mannix" on CBS returns Mike Connors to television, co-starring him with Joe Campanella in a detective series about a man trying to fight the computerized organization for which he works, while also solving cases.

"Good Morning, World" on CBS is another maybe-Dick Van Dyke Show. Sheldon Leonard and Carl Reiner are the executive producers. Reiner directed the first six episodes, and Bill Persky and Sam Denoff (who wrote many of the Van Dyke shows) are the creators. Once you get over missing Van Dyke and Mary Tyler Moore, you can learn to like and laugh with stars Joby Baker and Ronnie Schell as disc jockeys and Bill

De Wolfe and Julie Parish. Sheldon Leonard is also the producer of "Accidental Family," on NBC, which stars Jerry Van Dyke as a night club comic who must win over his motherless son, played by darling little Teddy Quinn, who has been brainwashed, by the relative with whom he has been living, not to like his father.

"The Mothers-in-Law" on NBC is produced and directed by Deal Arnaz. It's filmed before a live audience (as is Good Morning, World) and is lucky to have two of the world's best comedienne, Eve Arden and

## Through the Gates Swept F. Lee Bailey

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — F. Lee Bailey, the defense counsel and television star-to-be, went calling on his first celebrities recently and while his company may have been good, it was also large.

Bailey—who has dropped the "F." for show biz purposes—was taping his first "Good Company" program for the new ABC series, and was received by the Tony Curtises at their magnificent and manicured Holmby Hills residence.

Members of Bailey's entourage started arriving at the \$800,000, five-acre, walled estate shortly after 7 a.m. Trucks, portable sound studios, miles of electric cable and some 55 technicians, cameramen and even

uniformed guards scattered around the 17-room house, around the formal gardens. They even penetrated the pool house with a roof which can be rolled back electrically to admit sunshine.

At 2 p.m., Bailey was making his first on-camera appearance—driving a yellow convertible through the gates, and sweeping up to the formal facade of the huge Mediterranean-style mansion built 30 years ago.

Then there was a length pause for adjustments to the six color cameras and to the lighting.

Curtis, in slacks and sports jacket, and smoking a fat cigar, stood around patiently waiting to be filmed greeting his guest. He chatted with "Good Company" producer John Aaron.

Mrs. Curtis, formerly actress Christine Kaufmann, appeared in white lace slacks and jacket over a body stocking, and stayed at one side of the house by the children's playground. Their two youngsters ignored the mob and amused themselves under the watchful eyes of their nurse.

The busy scene looked like a well-organized location filming by a movie company—except that there seemed to be an inordinately large number of press agents around: the Curtises' press agent, press agents for "Good Company" and ABC press agents.

Inside the house cables

snaked from drawing room to breakfast room to den to formal dining room. The paneled walls were covered with oils and watercolors—the Curtis collection—for Tony to describe. In the breakfast room was set up his bobby—a "picture box" collection—glass-fronted boxes in which he pastes and paints compositions that look like third-dimension decoupages.

It was all well organized and, since Bailey and the Curtises had done several run-throughs of the house tour, was going with unexpected smoothness.

But it was a long day for the Curtis family: It was after 8 p.m. before the last cable was

back in its truck, the last camera rolled away.

Bailey, accustomed to public appearances, seemed unruffled by anything except the mid-afternoon heat which brought drops of perspiration through his light makeup and wrinkled his suit.

The visit to the film star's home has been chosen—pretty shrewdly, too—as the opening show on Sept. 7 of the series which is closely patterned after the old "Person-to-Person" shows.

The experts on blondeness he will talk to include Anita Loos, who wrote the novel, "Gentleman Prefer Blondes;" Betty Friedan, who wrote "The Feminine Mystique," and Dr. Joyce Brothers, the television psychologist.

In addition to talk, there will be, of course, blondes.



## TV Hopefuls Await Supermarket Test

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Scattered through the Hollywood film studios and on hot location sites are a lot of attractive young people eagerly anticipating the day, hopefully not more than a few weeks off, when they can no longer go shopping in their neighborhood supermarkets.

They are the television stars of tomorrow; the unknown, ambitious young performers who have been talented enough or handsome enough or just lucky enough to be cast in the two dozen or so new network television programs of the approaching season.

Over the seasons, the supermarket has emerged as actor's test of fame.

At this moment stars-to-be like Joby Baker, Wayne Maunder, Monte Markham, Jill Townsend, Sean Garrison, Beth Brickell or Linda Cristal may gather their groceries and push their carts with anonymity.

But after a couple of weeks of exposure in their upcoming shows, heads will start turning, recognition will begin to dawn. Success has arrived when admiring shoppers forget the chopped meat and start blocking aisles to stare, and the management looks pained.

Each year television produces its quota of "fresh faces" in new series. So — in fact, most — disappear quietly when their programs have run their brief course. They encounter a difficult period of unemployment because television exposure has led their agents to increase unwisely their prices. But newcomers remember Dick Van Dyke, Steve McQueen and James Garner, whose careers took off like rockets from television series.

Unknowns Joby Baker and Monte Markham have landed leads in two new comedies — "Good Morning World" on CBS and "The Second Hundred Years" on ABC. Golden-haired Wayne Maunder and Sean Garrison are tall, handsome heroes of a pair of new Westerns, ABC's "The Legend of Custer" and CBS's "Dundee and the Culhane."

There is the usual number of pretty young girls but it is harder for them to make an impact in the action series where the focus is on chases and fights and gun duels, and 1875 crinolines don't do much for a girl's figure.

"Gentle Ben" also stars an animal, a bear. The CBS-TV series, with Dennis Weaver and appealing young Clint Howard, is produced by Ivan (Flipper, Daktari) Tors. "Cowboy in Africa," on ABC returns Chuck Connors as a man trying to teach Africans to conserve their game. It's also a Tors production.

Now we come to "The Guns of Will Sonnet," an ABC western with Walter Brennan and Dick Rambo as grandfather and grandson searching, searching, searching for son-father, who may or may not be a bad guy. Some shows, like the "Kraft Music Hall," "The Jerry Lewis Show," "The Carol Burnett Show" and "Good Company" (with lawyer F. Lee Bailey in a Person to Person kind of interview program) are taping close to air date, so they remain unknown factors. "N.Y.P.D." was sold without a pilot. But it has the benefit of a talented cast (Jack Warden, Frank Converse and Robert Hooks), New York locations and access to the files of the New York Police Department.

Finally, "Off to See the Wizard" on ABC is a Walt Disney-like show. Produced at MGM, it uses as "hosts" some of the characters from the Wizard of Oz in cartoon form to introduce some old movies and some new ones made for the series. None of this takes into account the specials, which will be all over the dials this season. CBS and ABC have heavy schedules of drama, some original, some adaptations of famous works; documentaries; sports events; music events; you name it. NBC will also have some, but president Julian Goodman has coined a new phrase to describe the season in Peacock land: Event Television.

The theory is that a series like I Spy, for instance, might suddenly do a drama about race riots, making this a Special within the series.
