One Result Of Escalation

President Johnson's authorization of newly intensified bombing in the neighhood of Hanoi has produced one result—a new statement from Russia. It is a statement which was handed out by Tass, the official press agency, as from "Soviet official quarters." That makes it a little short of a formal pronouncement from some responsible individual official of the government, like

Premier Kosygin. "Every new step of the United States to escalate the war in Vietnam inevitably leads to necessary reprisal steps. the Russian statement says.

The statement cites the intensified bombing around Hanoi and over North Vietnam in general, the increase in the number of troops for Vietnam, the attempt of Washington to get more support from its "allies and satellites" and then mourns, rather piously, Washington's lack of wisdom. "Fury and rashness." the statement

says, "are poor advisers. The danger of this short-sighted course of Washington lies in the fact that it further aggravates the international situation and may bring the world to a dangerous line." And, once again, Moscow tells Hanoi that whatever Hanoi will need and ask for, Hanol will get.

The reassurance Washington gives it-

self on this statement comes from the same well of optimism from which it munist China will do. The Russian statement, it is noted,

never gets really specific about what it is going to do to answer our escalation in Vietnam. Taking comfort and assurance from this is like feeling easy about Commu-

nist China by saying, as Washington spokesmen have been saying lately, that China knows we don't wish to engage China in war when we happen to fly war planes over Chinese territory. In both instances, we are gambling with processes of thought and intention about which we really know nothing. It is an exciting thing to push our gamble challenge closer and closer to

some point at which either China or Russia might react if we were'nt so sure they aren't going to do what we might do if we were in their position. But for real reassurance it might be

a wise policy to make quite sure, instead of merely part-sure, that our planes aren't going to be flying over China very often, and to try to see if we can't keep the whole Vietnam war at a tempo and at a level which halts a little short of challenging Russia to put up or shut up. None of us knows what Communist

China is likely to do. But one thing can be taken as fairly certain about Russia. If Russia does do something more than it has been doing. it is not likely to announce it first. If there is to be an answer to our escalation, from Russia, we will first find it out not from some announcement, but

The whole trouble with the Johnsonian escalation, from its very beginning in February of 1965, has been that it not only continually and progressively narrows the choice for the United States itself, but also keeps simultaneously narrowing and pressurizing the choices open to China and to Russia.

The two turkeys the computers fed Defense Secretary McNamara are an oil-fueled aircraft carrier, already considered obsolete in favor of nuclear carriers, and the controversial F-111 fighter bomber, selected by the computers as a money-saver, but since believed to have revealed faults and inadequacies which are going to be very expensive to correct, if the whole venture can indeed be rescued.

The investigating subcommittee intends to be fair about this.

In its own prospectus for its work, it concedes, with every appearance of the proper lingo, that "systems analysis is intended to present decision makers with a systematic and comprehensive comparison of the costs and benefits of alternative approaches to a policy goal, taking advantage of techniques various ly described as operations research or cost-effectiveness studies. . . . Computers have made it possible to handle large quantities of data and applied mathematics has provided ingenious statistic techniques for dealing with some kinds of uncertainty."

But the subcommittee also confesses, before it starts, a touch of doubt that we have arrived "at that technocratic utopia where judgment is a machine product," and it warns itself that systems analysis is "no magic wand . . . no substitute for experience and judgment." It is even more skeptical, the subcommittee, when it considers the possibility that systems analysis methods should be used to decide issues of oreign policy. It thinks, if it is totally reliable anywhere, it will be in the Department of Defense, which deals with 'end products that one can see, touch measure, test-fire and ride in" rather than in the Department of State, which "deals mainly with the battle of ideas and interests called diplomacy." When, of course, both the system analysis and the human judgment an experience systems keep coming u with the wrong decisions, then a natio is in trouble not even that most awe some and powerful thing, a Senate subcommittee, can cure.

The Ripe Peach

This is a year when Connecticut supposedly without a peach crop, thanks to the untimely deep freeze of last winter. Our peach growers, presumably, are vacationing elsewhere during what would be the normal harvest season, and are, therefore, not likely to notice what we are about to say. We wouldn't hurt their feelings, or their state pride, for anything, and we acknowledge that what they do to their fruit when they have it -which is to pick it green-is the only way they can pretend to handle it com-But the truth is that it does not make

very much difference, any more, where fruit comes from. It is all picked green, wherever it is grown, whether it is in California to be sold in Connecticut or n Connecticut to be sold in Connecticut. This means that, so far as the consuming public is concerned, there is no longer any such thing as a ripe peach. There may be, eventually, a soft peach, or a half-rotten peach, or a rubbery peach. But there is never such a thing as a peach allowed to come reasonably near ripeness while it is still on a tree, and thus has a chance to develop natural fulces and natural flavors.

Most of us have to reach far back into some personal past-to the day when a tree stood and vielded in our own yard or we were neighbor to some professional orchard where we could go for drops -to remember what it is to hold in the hand and present to the mouth a warm. fuzzy-skinned mixture of dribbling juice and tender fruit flesh. The nearest one can come to the taste of a fresh peach these days is to buy the frozen package or the expensive can, in which case the canning process has created at least an imitation of ripeness. The commercial peach has to be picked to keep; in a year when the commercial peach happens to be absent from Connecticut production we dare express our true sentiment-as far as we are concerned anybody who picks a peach that green can

A Beautiful Thing

The selectmen of Cheshire didn't pass the resolution originally proposed by Selectman William E. Kennedy Jr. when they met on Thursday night. Instead, they passed a watered-down version. Kennedy's original resolution proposed that "the Board of Selectmen in its capacity as the administrating board of the town of Cheshire affirm its welcome to non-white families as members of the community on exactly the same basis that it has traditionally welcomed the new white families."

The board voted, four in favor, one abstaining, to adopt an amended version that substituted "all creeds and all races" for "non-white." Kennedy made an impassioned plea for the original version. "It is a good thing to affirm to my Negro neighbor

that I welcome him as a neighbor," he affirmed. And he appealed to principles of patriotism in urging his fellow-selectmen to make Cheshire an example for other communities by reaching out to responsible Negro leadership. He terms the amended version "only half a step" -a "scatter shot" compared to a "rifle

Legally, technically, selectmen who demurred at the orginal proposal are right. "As long as I have been first selectman, no one has been denied the right to live or work in town and it will continue to be so as long as I am in office." declared First Selectman John M. Bishop. As he pointed out, the antidiscrimination laws of the state cover the situation. In point of fact, the reso-

TV Pilots Say It Will Be a Good Season, But...

By JOAN CROSBY NEW YORK — (NEA) — If you could honestly judge a tele-vision series from its best-footforward pilot, then you could flatly state that the 1967-68 season will be good news.

But it must be remembered that, judging from pilots, last season's picks for viewing highlights were "The Man Who Nev-er Was" and "The Hero", both of which died in mid-season.

When a producer makes a pilot, he is out to sell it. So time and care are taken, money is spent and the script, while somewhat confined by the necessity of introducing regular characters, is as good as it can

When it is sold, time and money are budgeted and what follows is often below the pilot's standard.

Twenty-six new shows will preview beginning Sept. 5, the week when ABC and CBS launch their new season. NBC's fall schedule begins Sept. 10. ABC has 11 new shows. NBC eight and CBS seven. Of these six are westerns, six are family adventure series, three are detective, three are comedy-variety, two are drama, one is a war series and one is an interview show.
