

Psychiatric Test Ordered For Nazi Leader's Slayer

Outburst Disrupts Preliminary Hearing

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP)—A psychiatric hearing was ordered today for John C. Patler, 29, accused of murdering Commander George Lincoln Rockwell of the American Nazi Party.

Patler's preliminary hearing was postponed until Aug. 31.

Today's proceedings were interrupted briefly by the cry of "you filthy assassin," shouted at Patler in the courtroom by a man identified as Eric Ray Wenberg, 21.

Court officials said Wenberg is an Australian, in the United States on a tourist visa and now living at the Nazi party headquarters near which Rockwell was shot to death last Friday.

Arlington County Judge L. Jackson Embrey sentenced Wenberg to 10 days in jail and a \$50 fine, for contempt of court.

Judge Embrey said he would appoint a panel of three psychiatrists to examine Patler.

Embrey said he would also ask for an official copy of a psychiatric report on Patler based on an examination at least 10 years ago. Arlington's commonwealth attorney, William J. Hassan, told the court the examination had been made at the Morrisania Hospital and Mental Hygiene Clinic for the probation department in the Bronx, N.Y.

After the courtroom had been cleared for 15 minutes after the outburst, newsmen and officials returned to find Patler seated at the defense table behind a cordon of police.

Two stood at his back, while six lined up across the bar. There were no further interruptions, and after the 12-minute hearing Patler was briskly escorted back to jail, where he is being held under \$50,000 bond.

Wenberg's outburst was brief. A trim, blond, crew-cut youth, he leaped from a bench in the courtroom shouting the "assassin" charge at Patler and also calling him "you filthy swine!"

A half-dozen policemen



swarmed over Wenberg, handcuffed him and carried him out of the courtroom by the hands and feet.

Patler was hurried back to the lockup behind the courthouse in Arlington County courthouse as the man was hauled away.

As police carried the demonstrator out, he shouted "Long live the American Nazi Party Long Live Mat Koehl!" Koehl is Rockwell's apparent successor as head of the small but vocal party headquartered in this Washington suburb.

Arlington County Judge L. Jackson Embrey ordered the courtroom cleared to all except official personnel and newsmen after the outburst. Six party members, wearing swastika lapel buttons as their only identification, had sat quietly throughout the interruption, but they were not permitted to return to the proceedings.

The demonstrator never got to Patler, as three reporters sat between him and the aisle where Patler, dressed in a dark suit and a black necktie, was being escorted to the bar.

Earlier, a veterans' group protested against plans of the American Nazi party to bury Rockwell in a national cemetery with full military honors.

Party members were awaiting a Defense Department decision on whether Rockwell, leader of the anti-Negro and anti-Jewish stormtrooper organization, can be buried Tuesday at the Culpepper, Va., National Cemetery, 65 miles southwest of Washington.

Red Mortars, Rockets Attack Marine Bases

SAIGON (AP)—The Communists kept up their intensified mortar and rocket attacks for the second day today, killing 10 U.S. Marines, wounding 108 and destroying or damaging 12 helicopters.

The barrages against two Leatherneck bases in the northern part of South Vietnam followed a series of 12 mortar shelling up and down the country Sunday which killed or wounded more than 300 persons, most of them civilians.

U.S. officials considered the attacks another Communist effort to scare the South Vietnamese from voting in the presidential election next Sunday. It had been months since the Communists made a coordinated effort like they did Sunday.

In the air war against North Vietnam, the U.S. Command announced that last week matched

the worst previous week for warplane losses, with 15 down over the North. Two planes—an Air Force F4 Phantom and an F100 Supersabre—went down Saturday and only one of the four crewmen aboard was rescued. A total of 22 flyers was reported missing during the week.

A delayed report from the command said U.S. B52 bombers killed 11 South Vietnamese policemen last Monday in the southern half of the demilitarized zone (DMZ) between North and South Vietnam. The command said the target area had been approved in advance by the South Vietnamese province chief and that all bombs hit in the approved area.

Communist gunners struck today at a Marine helicopter airstrip near Da Nang and at the Leatherneck base at Dong Ha, seven miles south of the DMZ. Four Marines were killed, 80 were wounded, three helicopters

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Donald Varney Dies, Hit by Car Saturday

Donald Varney, 43, of no certain address, died in St. Francis Hospital in Hartford yesterday morning from injuries suffered nearly 14 hours earlier when he was struck by a southbound car while walking across Main St. near Park St. in Manchester.

Police said Mr. Varney was walking east shortly after 9 p.m. when he was struck by a southbound car driven by Martin W. Longfellow, 28, of 3 Robin Rd. The pavement was wet at the time, police said.

The victim, taken to Manchester Memorial Hospital by ambulance, was transferred about two hours later to St. Francis Hospital. A hospital official there said he never regained consciousness. He was

pronounced dead at 10:40 a.m. Police declined to give further details on the accident, pending a coroner's investigation and report.

A native of Farmington, Maine, Varney formerly lived in Williamsville and had lived in the Manchester area for about 12 years. He was a U.S. Navy veteran. His last place of employment was at Dillon's Sales and Service, 319 Main St.

Survivors include his mother, his wife and two children, all of Farmington.

Missing in Lake Erie

Search Intensifies For 14 Sky Divers

HURON, Ohio (AP)—Searchers intensified their hunt for 14 sky divers missing in Lake Erie Monday despite rain, blustery winds and choppy waters.

Of the 15 veteran sky divers who made a converted World War II bomber, only two were known to have survived.

Two bodies recovered within half an hour of the off-target jump were being kept in a temporary morgue across the street from city hall. Officials, meanwhile, tried to identify the owners of seven gloves, three chutes and four reserve chutes, the only items recovered from the lake.

Two other sky divers missed the jump by staying on the plane for a second pass at higher altitude.

Helicopters, planes and an armada of Coast Guard and military and private boats that included the 110-foot ocean-going tug Kaw combed a 100-square mile area of the lake Monday.

Nine civilian skin divers joined the search, probing the shallow 30-to-40-foot waters of the lake.

Coast Guard Lt. Paul Potter, who saw the multi-colored chutes descend through overcast skies into the lake Sunday at 4:30 p.m., said chances for the 14 missing jumpers survived the night in the 72-degree water were "slim."

Exactly how the 18 Ohio parachutists—most of whom had more than 100 jumps to their credit—missed their target by 10 miles was unknown. "As far as I knew, I was right

where I was supposed to be," the pilot, Robert Karns of Vermillion, told Ohio Highway Patrolman John Shimp.

Shimp quoted Karns as saying he was flying by a radar fix furnished him by the Federal Aviation Agency tower at Hopkins International Airport in Cleveland and a Loran Station at Amherst.

The divers were unprepared for the landing in water. None had floating equipment, the two survivors said. Each carried about 50 pounds of equipment.

Patricia C. Lownsbury of Akron—who had celebrated her wedding on June 28, 1964 by sky diving with her husband—was found dead in the water.

"She loved sky diving," said her husband, Alvin, as he waited on the dock as the Coast

Storm Floods New York

Plane Shears Tower, Crashes into Sound

NEW YORK (AP)—At least two persons were killed Sunday when a single-engine plane sheared off most of a 900-foot radio transmitter tower in the Bronx during a blinding rain-storm and then plunged into Long Island Sound.

Divers prepared today to search in 52-foot-deep water for the plane and other possible victims, including the pilot. The bodies of two men were recovered. Police said both were believed to have been passengers.

The crash demolished all but 80 feet of the tower, used for AM broadcasting by WCBS and WNBC. The stations went dead at 4:21 p.m., when the accident occurred. Both stations switched to emergency transmitters for regular operations today.

The storm dumped two inches of rain on the metropolitan area, stalling traffic, knocking out subway service, and some electric power, flooding streets and basements, and disrupting airline operations.

The six-passenger plane hit the tower on High Island, off City Island, apparently while heading for nearby La Guardia Airport after a flight from East Hampton on Long Island.

The two men, recovered by police launches in the area, were tentatively identified as William Sedutto, 52, and Ronald Bumbalo, 31, both of Manhattan. Bumbalo's mother, police said, was en route from her home in Jamestown, N.Y.

Police said the bodies recovered were still afloat but that the aircraft sank instantly. Among objects that came to the surface was a woman's overnight bag.

A power failure hit the Con Edison plant on Staten Island, leaving 2,800 homes without electricity for more than two hours.

Basements were flooded in dozens of homes in Coney Island and lowlying sections of Staten Island. Many streets became young rivers until the drainage systems could absorb the overflow.

Flooding stalled cars along the Franklin D. Roosevelt Drive and the West Side Highway, where traffic was heavy as weekend vacationers returned to the city.

Affected by the power black-out, but comparatively briefly, were the Westchester County communities of Yonkers, New Rochelle, and Mount Vernon.

Free Vietnam Elections? Survey Finds Slender Hope

(Editor's Note—Are South Vietnam's forthcoming presidential elections being rigged by the Saigon military government? Two Associated Press reporters investigated for a week in the northern Mekong Delta, home of more than a million voters. Here is their report.)

TAN AN, Vietnam (AP)—In the thatched-roof villages that line the canals criss-crossing the Mekong Delta, and in the government towns surrounded by barbed wire, the official word—delivered by millions of leaflets, by radio broadcast, loudspeaker announcements and television—is that South Vietnam's presidential election Sept. 3 will be the first opportunity for the Vietnamese people to make a free choice for a government.

But the hard facts in a country that has been dominated by dictatorship for years threaten hopes that democracy is even beginning to recast events in the northern Mekong delta are duplicated elsewhere.

A government official suspec-

ted of supporting a presidential slate other than that of Gen. Nguyen Van Thieu and Premier Nguyen Cao Ky might lose his job, the fate of the deputy province chief for security in Long An Province, Maj. Nguyen Van Xanh.

At a rally in Tan Tru district, two questioners expressed interest in the income of military leaders and their hopes for a peaceful solution to the war.

Two known secret policemen loudly began inquiring for the questioners' names and addresses. When word got around the province, no more embarrassing questions were asked.

Market-goers see the smiling faces of Thieu and Ky on 95 percent of all government-printed election posters, particularly at busy intersections and on government buildings.

Should the peasants be unsure of a choice among the 11 presidential slates, he might be enlightened by any of the district chiefs. All openly favor the Thieu-Ky ticket.

Special booths are being provided for voters in some districts, suggesting to some ob-

WASHINGTON (AP)—"The President wishes to tread on the necks of the Senate," an angry senator wrote during a dispute with the administration over foreign policy.

The President was George Washington, the senator was William Maclay of Pennsylvania. But the dispute over respective powers of the executive branch and Congress in foreign affairs continues to now.

The Senate currently is being asked to declare that, or the full Congress, should have a voice in determining whether the United States should pledge itself to defend another given country.

Chairman J. W. Fulbright of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, sponsoring a resolution to that effect, said there had been a "gradual erosion of the role of the Congress, and particularly of the Senate, in the determination of national security policy."

Fulbright and others list escalation of the Vietnam war, the sending of U.S. forces to the Dominican Republic and dispatch of three planes with troops to the Congo as among recent actions they say should not have been taken without prior approval of Congress.

Fulbright contends there are signs in Congress of "growing uneasiness over the extent of executive power" and a growing willingness to challenge the administration.

A similar viewpoint was reported Sunday by the National Committee for an Effective Congress, which said in a report: "Not since the Wilson administration has any president been so rebuffed in foreign affairs as has Lyndon Johnson."

The Senate, the committee said, "is moving the retrieve those blank checks in foreign policy which were issued in a period of presidential trust and confidence."

It cited the Fulbright resolution on U.S. commitments, sharp cuts in the administration

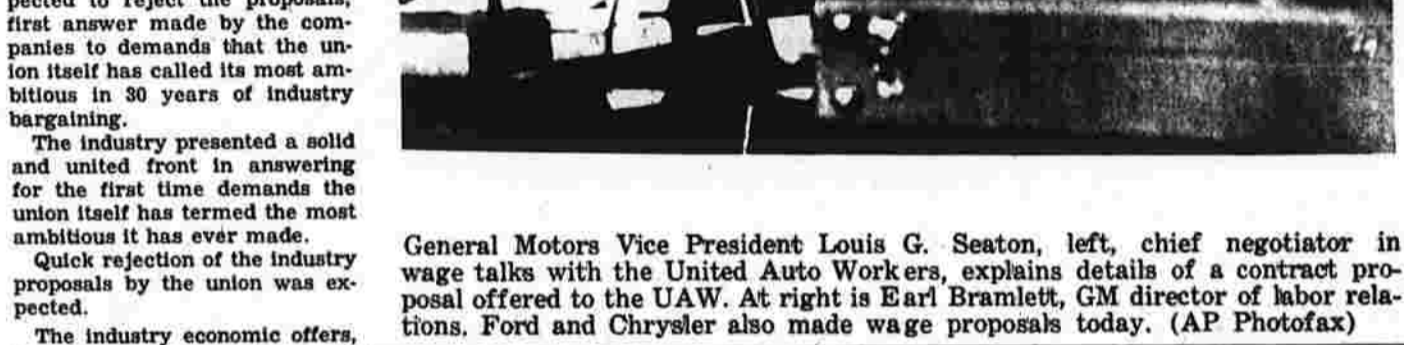
