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### Tolland County Tolland, Bolton, Rockville Sweep Area Firemen Muster

The 21-member Tolland Volunteer Fire Department mustered to capture the first prize trophy in Tolland County's First Annual Firemen's Muster yesterday in Ellington, compiling a total score of 45 points.

Eight area fire departments competed in the muster events. The Bolton Fire Department placed second with 34 points and Rockville third with 30 points. Also competing were the crew of 800 were Columbia, Andover, Eagleville, Ellington and North Coventry fire departments.

Yesterday's event, with Ellington as host, was the first complete fire muster held in Tolland County in many years. Hartford County has been conducting musters for some time, and a state-wide event is also held.

Members of several Hartford County fire departments served as judges and a roster of 100 firemen labored under the hot sun for five hours participating in seven athletic events, climbing walls of practice for the teams.

Plans for the event were undertaken by the Ellington Fire Department less than two months ago. The sponsors sent out invitations and regulations to all fire departments, 19 of which indicated they would attend, eight of which showed up.

The primary benefit of the event was the development of teamwork, according to a member of the Tolland Muster team. This makes a lot of difference in the spirit of members of the fire department.

The practice in the various events also taught the firemen how to handle and correctly use many pieces of different equipment, as well as improving their skills and equipment.

They've proved it already by crushing Oakland, their No. 1 rival in the Western Division, 34-7.

The three returning starters from last year's Super Bowl are cornerback Willie Richardson and tackle Johnny Robinson and coach Hank Stram, the latter two who have scored on the top and top players in the league.
