Nor are we sure that the members of the profession itself are ever really as nanimous as some of their mass surface actions might indicate in their feeling that the threat to withhold the fruit of their own training is somehow an ennobling gesture in itself, or the only way to get the kind of economic return for their work which permits them to live in respectable style.

The dollar has its place everywhere. But it never deserves too clear and obvious a priority in the conduct of any of the occupations whose special training and special functioning for society entitles them to the classification of pro-

Unfreezing Liberalism

racial rioting, Daniel P. Moynihan lays a sizable chunk of blame on contem porary liberalism.

Mr Moynihan, of course, is himself a certified liberal. He was a member of the Kennedy and Johnson Administrations, and is now head of the urbar studies center at Harvard University and the Massachusetts Institute of Tech nology. He writes in the Washington Post that "the streets of the Negro slums contain the wreckage of a generation of good intentions on the part

Liberals, of course, do not draw all the blame. Mr. Moynihan also talks of "racists and reactionaries and so-called conservatives in Congress," of "shrewd "the great indifferent American mass." But most important, he cites a number of reasons why liberalism has been unable to find workable solutions to the problems of Negro slums. "First, in our concern to protect the

good name of the poor, especially perhaps the Negro poor, we have entangled ourselves in positions that have had he effect of preventing effective action to help them." For example, Mr. Moynihan drew a good deal of heat from civil rights leaders when he wrote a report saying the heart of the problem was the deteriorating Negro family talk about that

"Second, in our eagerness to see some progress made we have been all too willing to accept the pathetically under financed programs which have normally merged from Congress, then to oversell them both to ourselves and those they are designed to aid." Almost certainly, he adds, this has "raised hopes out of all proportion to our capacity t deliver on our promises."

"Third, in our desire to maintain pub lic confidence in such programs, we have tended to avoid evidence of poor results." In particular, "somehow lib erals have been unable to acquire from life what conservatives seem to be endowed with at birth, namely a healthy skepticism of the powers of Government agencies to do good."

Since he is a good liberal, Mr. Moynihan does have some ideas for Government action, and they are hardly mod est in sweep or cost. He suggests the Governments hire those who cannot fine work elsewhere, pay a direct allowance to all families with minor children and rebuild the neighborhoods riots have destroyed.

lie in the fact that the people of Chicago were ready and eager to disengage themselves from all the unpleasant memories of their recent association with the Democrats. But another element in the situation

may have been that the American mind is in the process of undergoing a shift in its opinions of Mr. Nixon, and there may be a possiblity that American emotions are altering themselves away from their previously almost stereotyped reactions to the known political figures of

It is quite possible that, before election day, there will be millions of Amerteans who find themselves liking and respecting Richard Nixon, or Hubert Humphrey, much more than they themselves ever expected to.

Nixon had the first taste of such-s possible bright change in the public mood toward him in his unparalleled reception at Chicago.

And maybe, who knows, Hubert too has some pleasant discoveries ahead of

It may be the American people, in all their own ultimate good instinct and sense, have grown sick and tired of the cynical, down-grade approach to the cossibilities which are, after all, the t we have produced for ourselves. It may be that what once seemed likely to develop into a campaign of aversions is going to become famous for its display of positive, affectionate thinking on the part of us all.

Captured in a giant's office, they are strapped down by strips of plastic mending tape and threatened with a paper

Allen says the new ABC series, which will be a Sunday evening show, "is the most ex-pensive filmed program in the history of television," with each costing in excess of hour \$250,000.

"We prepared for 17 months before it went to the cameras," he explained. "There were all sorts of complications to be ironed out. 
