LOS ANGELES EXPERT DISLIKES GUESSWORK

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD
 Sixteen pairs of bridge experts will play at the end of the month in a special tournament in Atlantic City, competing for places on the U.S. Olympic Team. Lew Mathe, who qualified to play in the tournament with three different partners in three different national championships, stars in today's hand, taken from the 1966 Team Selection Tournament.

Opening lead—Three of hearts. West opened the three of hearts, and Mathe won in dummy with the jack. This was a help, but the main problem still was to avoid the loss of two trumps and two diamonds.

South could limit the trump loss to one trick by guessing the right way to start the suit. Anything that would work as the cards actually lay would suit if West had three trumps instead of only two.

To avoid guessing Mathe decided to make the opponent lead trumps first. He cashed the top hearts, discarding a diamond and gave up a diamond. No safe return.

East had no safe return at return with the queen of diamonds. If East returned a club or a heart South would ruff in his own hand and discard the last diamond from dummy. East therefore had to return a trump.

Mathe could comfortably play low from his hand. West with the queen of spades and cashed the king of diamonds but then he could not get to the king of spades through the king of spades. The rest was easy.

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Epstein Death
Accidental, Says
London Coroner

LONDON (AP)—Brian Epstein, the Beatles' manager, died accidentally from "incalculable" overdose of sleeping tablets, a coroner's verdict said today.

There was no suggestion of suicide.

The verdict said: "Accidental death, the cause of which was poisoning by carbital, due to incautious self-overdosing." Carbital contains barbiturate and bromide.

A pathologist, Dr. Donald Teare told Coroner Gavin Thurston: "The amount found in the body was equivalent to a small lethal dose, but in digestion was of repetition, rather than a single dose."

At the time of Epstein's death in his home in fashionable Belgrave on Aug. 27, he and the four Beatles were planning a trip to the United States and Canada. A letter relating to the trip was introduced at the inquest.

Epstein was 32.

Recreation Panel Proposes

Henry Hamm and Peter Moeckel, co-chairman of the Recreation Council, have attacked the selection on the possibility of moving the boat ramp at the Community Beach to the site at Erdos Hill.

The men stated that graphs, projecting figures for the next several years, indicate an increasing need for enlarging the present beach area for swimming.

It is expected the council will bring up the question at the October town meeting.

The co-chairmen of the council felt a start should be made in some direction and pointed out the new ramp could be started when the water is down in the fall.

They admitted parking would be a problem and supervision a must.

Since both Chrysler and General Motors refused union requests to extend current contracts, union members at the two firms are working, reluctantly, without a contract.

If and when a contract is reached at Ford, the union will use it as a pattern for a settlement at the other two companies.

As the Wednesday midnight deadline approached, both sides awaited with an air of equanimity that suggested they considered a walkout inevitable.

It reminded me of the time a few years ago at one of the companies when we knew we couldn't reach an agreement by the midnight deadline, one veteran negotiator was quoted as saying, "But we had to sit there to play out the scenario. We had to make it look like we were trying for the benefit of the union members, the stockholders and the public."

Union pickets patrolled Ford plants throughout the country with no incidents reported.

In Ohio, second only to Michigan in its Ford employees, Cleveland-area pickets sipped coffee, talked about negotiations, their gardens, football and weather.

Ford says its workers will be losing \$2 million wages for every day they stay out.

The company will be losing its average daily production of 8,000 cars, 1,300 trucks and 144 tractors.

Ford dealers throughout the country have enough new cars to last a month, 85,000 1966-models and 175,000 1967-models, the company said.

The union is backing its strike with a \$87 million fund which will be distributed at the rate of \$20 to \$30 dollars a week to each striker depending upon marital status and number of dependents.

Dealer's comments on the strike ranged from the very pessimistic by the Ford men to the optimistic from vendors of competitors' products.

"The strike certainly will hurt our company badly," said Dick Blosser, a Dallas, Tex., Ford dealer. "We have a total of 236 new cars on order through October and there's no guarantee we'll get any of those."

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But nothing really points the way out. Nothing shows our situation or our prospects improving. To the contrary, our basic future deepens.

To fashion a hope for the moment, one has to steer in between two extremes and settle upon an almost equally unsatisfactory middle course. One extreme would be to try to redeem our failure with such force violence that we bring the whole world around about our heads. The other extreme would be to tuck our pride between our legs and turn and run.

The dreary middle course would be to stay about where we are, but to try to do a little killing and destroying as possible, and prove that we can play stalemate with as much patience and philosophy as Hanoi.

These are the only three choices we are able to make by ourselves. If, in the meantime, any third party should prove able to work its way into the situation—and third party intervention or diplomacy has, ever since February of 1965 been the only possible way we could be rescued from our commitment to escalation—we should be very grateful for such a possible reprieve, and stand totally willing to agree to a new unconditional cessation of bombing of the North as the first contribution to the possible success of such mediation.

MDC Is Selected to Supply Water to the New Town Hall

The town council has designated the Metropolitan District Commission to be the supplier of water to the new town hall site on Sullivan Ave. and Eltington Rd.

At this week's council meeting, Mayor James Throve said the only agency that was not in favor of this move was the town planning and zoning commission.

The cost of the MDC lines to the town hall site was considerably more than the town board of the Connecticut Water Co. facilities.

Councilman Howard Pitts noted that considerable discussion has been carried out on both the MDC and Connecticut Water Company proposals.

The fire department assumed Robert R. Sills, Republican candidate for the town council in the Oct. 2 election, today called for an "in depth" study of South Windsor fire protection.

Sills said that while the equipment in the department is maintained in excellent condition by the department and its volunteer firemen, "there is not enough equipment to keep pace with the accelerated growth of the community."

In addition, he said that particular attention should be given to the firehouse at Eltington Rd. and Beechbush Rd. "I do not think that the present firehouse is the standard our fire department most personnel desire. More importantly, it does not meet the code that is sufficient to properly protect all the housing in the Avery St., Orchard Hill and Birch Hill housing complexes."

He contended that the feasibility study be conducted in the light of a massive community development program, "not the conditions of the 1949" Sills promised to pursue the investigation through proper charter constituted authority.

Building Permits Monthly building totals for August show permits issued for 14 dwellings for a valuation of \$266,000.

Donald McLaughlin, town building inspector, said two industrial permits were issued for a total evaluation of \$40,000, and 11 additions and/or alterations, \$36,065.

College Loans Studied WASHINGTON (AP) — A White House study group recommends a federal bank be set up to lend money for college education costs to all academically qualified students.

The loans would be repaid over 30 or 40 years when the borrowers file their annual federal income taxes. The study panel suggested this be done on a schedule of one per cent of the gross income over 20 years for each \$3,000 borrowed.

Although the White House hasn't endorsed the plan, government education officials are looking it over.

The National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges, along with some independent education experts, criticized the plan, contending it would create inflationary college prices and holding indebtedness for the borrowers.

Support is expected from some private colleges anxious to find ways of financing the cost of education.
