A Calm, Good-humored Strike Ford, an automobile manufacturer accused by Walter Reuther, a union leader, of paying too much money to its ex-

ecutives and its stockholders, has just announced an average increase of \$100 n the wholesale price of the new models it will be offering the public this year. Simultaneous with the revelation of this price increase, Ford, a concern with eash assets of \$500,000,000 and total assets of \$8,000,000,000, and Mr. Reuther's union found themselves unable to agree on a new contract without having a strike first.

The union is seeking, money-wise, wage increase for its members which will add up to \$100,000,000 more a year than the company has offered to pay. The union is armed for its fight for this \$100,000,000, or some substantial part thereof, by a union strike fund which stands at some \$67,000,000.

As usual, the union isn't asking just money. It is asking for what it calls a principle, namely acceptance of the idea that there should be some standard formula for apportioning the earnings and profits of a company more equitably between its executives, shareholders, and employes.

All this has been discussed and prenegotiated in great calm and great good humor, which the professional repreactual moment in which the strike became real was the signal for a few strong words from each side. But still the atmosphere was that of captains playing a role on a stage rather than on a battlefield. Mr. Reuther, for his part, sees this atmosphere as a sign of advance and maturity in the field of la-







\$2 Million Later-'Africa'

By JOAN CROSBY

NEW YORK-(NEA)-It's called "Africa," which is simple enough. But right after the title things get complicated.

ABC wants to call attention to itself in a prestigious manner. One network (NBC) has already done two 31/2-hour programs, one about civil rights and the other about organized crime. Another network (CBS) has devoted an hour on four successive nights to a look at the findings of the Warren Commission. So what's left?

Well, you take one conti-nent, and you take four hours, all your prime time for the evening, and you spend a lot of money, \$2 million. The result is "Africa," which will be telecast by ABC from 7-11 on Sunday.

James Fleming is the execu-tive producer of this exceedingly ambitious project and it's a tribute to him that he has managed to stay outwardly calm and low-keyed.

Filming on the show, which hopes to explore all facets of the troubled continent, from its sports through its entertainment to its politics, began last May.

"We never had fewer than six camera crews there and sometimes we had as many as nine," Fleming said. "Since July, we have had 10 film editors working full-time. We have filmed the continent so extensively we could probably be on every night of the year.'

Fleming is not alarmed about an overabundance of material. "I have done shows that lasted an hour and we have really only had 45 minutes of material. I'm sure you've seen them. So it's nice to have an option with film."

During the past several months, Fleming has made five round trips to Africa. "One week I spent a total of 60 hours in the air," he says with a sigh.

Before Fleming and his group began filming the show, they had a series of seminars. "We spent nearly three weeks just asking ourselves every question about Africa we could think of. The next step was breaking down our timetable. Logistically we were quite well-organized. We visited 39 different countries, and we were running, in effect, a foreign office."


