Surveyor 5 Lands Gently Despite Leak

Pasadena, Calif. (AP)— One satellite, with bees in its bonnet and another, with bugs in its system, have fulfilled the dreams of U. S. space engineers just by landing in one piece. The first, called the astrobug

satellite, was snagged in flight over the Pacific Saturday as it came down from space after 30 trips around the earth.

The second, called Surveyor 5, landed gently on the moon Sunday after scientists at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory here feared some leaks—the bugs—in a helium pressure system had killed the mission.

Surveyor Project Manger Howard Haglund told a news conference Sunday night the Surveyor 5 landed on a gentle slope, perhaps as much as 10 degrees off horizontal, about 18 miles northwest of its original aiming point in the dry Sea of Tranquility.

The surveyor program manager, Ben Milwitsky, credited fast-figuring engineers with saving the mission after a valve stuck and caused a loss of the helium-used to force rocket fuel into three small braking engines that help guide the de-

Milwitsky said the engineers who designed the flight pattern saved the mission by doing in 40 hours what usually takes a week of planning. He said they redesigned the mission after the helium problem cropped up. They held off firing the main re-

Romney chose to try it. He could have admitted that he had been brainwashed in general on the issue of Vietnam, he could have claimed that the Johnson administration had been engaged in a steady process of brainwashthe American public, and that he himself had begun to emerge from this brainwash when he and his foreign policy consultants began reading a little of the real history of our times, and he

need not have suffered. This, we can surmise, is probably what Romney intended to do. He is however, the master of the blur when it comes to expressing himself in public, and what he actually did blurt out on this occasion was an accusation that he personally had been brainwashed at such and such a time by such and such specific individuals. As it came out, it was not his own humility and open minded inquiry he emphasized, but the trickery and allegedly deliberate dishonesty of other human beings in public life. He left no room for the possi-

bility that they may have believed sincerely, encouraged by their own particular philosophies and political intersts, in what they told him. The result was that, instead of obtaining sympathy for himself as one who nad been hoodwinked, Romney created even some sympathy for those he accused of having blinded him. And instead of inspiring the public to note how candid and honest he can be, Gov-

ernor Romney had the public wondering

how gullible he must have been and might still be. The chief and first penalty Governor Romney pays for blundering into such a display of poor taste is that he himself is made vulnerable to some of the political vultures who have been waiting for some opportunity to rip the viscera out of his candidacy. But, in this instance, some of those who seek to exploit the Romney weakness may be falling into a mistake similar to his own. Whatever the Romney crudities or gullibilities, they may still seem preferable to the somewhat smoother and faster talk of the candidate whose followers have been first to jump on Romney. Even Romney's blunders at least have an atnosphere of genuineness about them.
