### Covenry Four Items Are Passed

Four items on a town meeting agenda were passed by a narrow vote last night at a meeting held at 7:30 p.m.

Thirty residents were present at the high school to vote acceptance of the paved portion of Paden Rd. as part of the town road system. Request for town acceptance of the paved portion of Paden Rd. as part of the town road system was by petition of residents in the area.

The central office staff building committee was increased from five to nine members.

First Selectman Richard Galin said the reason for this was to include all members of the present school building committee. Currently five from this group make up the central office staff building committee, and since the two buildings will be closely allied, in terms of state aid, it was felt practical to increase the committee on both projects.

Town residents last night also approved transfer of the sale of beach stickers from the selectman's office to the town clerk's office. Since the \$2.50 fee is turned over to the town clerk anyway, the recommendation was to have the sale of beach stickers made in the town clerk's office.

The final item approved last night was for the designation of party affiliation, if any, on the registry list of voters. This request was made for the purpose of legislation in the recent session of the General Assembly. Names on the list will now carry a "D" or "R" for Democrat or Republican, or, in the case of those not affiliated after the name will be left blank.

### Code Breakers Not All Charged, Johnson Claims

HARTFORD (AP)—Arthur L. Johnson, executive director of Hartford's Human Relations Commission, has charged many city housing code infractions never get to the courts.

Johnson made the charge Monday before the State Vermin Control Committee.

When the code breakers do get taken to court, Johnson said, prosecutors' budgets are so small that many violations go unprosecuted.

Weak housing codes and poor housing code enforcement make American slums a national problem, Johnson said.

Johnson said "proceeds of attention and time would be devoted to stricter codes and enforcement."

According to John Fotky, chief of the Hartford Health Department's housing code enforcement division, fines in Hartford ranged from \$5 to \$50.

He cited a case where an attorney begged him to drop charges because his client had already paid \$1,500 to correct the infraction.

The lawyer said he feared that if the client was found guilty the lawyer might not be able to collect his legal fee of \$500.

"The cost of rectifying the infraction and paying the associated legal fees are deterrent enough," Fotky said.

### Film Make-Up Artist Once Army 'Surgeon'

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Almost any star from Anita to Zsa Zsa, Don Cash has made up. Recently he spent 3 1/2 hours a day turning Roddy McDowall into a chimpanzee for the movie "Planet of the Apes." At the moment he's fashioning 300 mustaches for the hands to wear in a Jimmy Stewart western.

Offbeat work? Yes, but for Don Cash the most rewarding phase of his 28 years as one of Hollywood's top make-up men was a sideline for which, at first, he didn't get paid.

"It's the greatest thing," he says, "to see depressed, discouraged men come to life again."

In World War II Cash—chubby, ruddy and now 52—was an artificial nose for Louis Hayward in a movie in which Hayward was playing five roles.

Somewhat of a magazine article about it. Someone at Los Angeles County General Hospital saw the article and phoned Cash: "Could he make an artificial nose for a man who had lost most of his own?"

#### Children's Services

Through the door at 577 Main St. into the Manchester office of the Children's Services of Connecticut walked three people... 15-year-old daughter, Marcy. This family group would make use of four phases of the work of Children's Services.

Marcy was a very young prospective mother and was facing the problems that 14 other unmarried mothers from Manchester brought to the social workers at Children's Services last year. With Marcy and the other unmarried mothers, the agency workers first discussed maternity home care and possible adoption of her babies. After finding the right maternity home the case worker continued to see Marcy discussing plans for her future and for the baby's future.

The case worker also continued to see Marcy's parents to try to help them guide Marcy in the future. Her mother, Mrs. Geyer, however, was an intelligent couple with no serious financial problem and were active in church and community but in furtherance of the program, it was evident that both parents had problems of their own. Soon Marcy's father called to read the report that they themselves needed counseling.

Children's Services offered them this opportunity for counseling and a case worker from the agency met with them over a period of time and they gained a better understanding of themselves and were able to be more adequate parents to Marcy when she returned home with her other children in the family.

When Marcy's baby was born, the agency provided temporary foster home care until the Adoption Department found a permanent home for the baby with his new adoptive parents.

Children's Services of Connecticut is a nonsectarian, staffed by professional social workers, a full-time office manager, and two part-time secretaries in full-time offices. This office is staffed by six professional social workers, a full-time office manager, and two part-time secretaries. The Family Counseling Service provides premarital and marital counseling; counseling on parent-child relationships and counseling for older adults. Last year, 81 families and 218 children received care under this Family Counseling Service (45 per cent of this office's Family Service cases). The assistance to unmarried mothers and the Adoption Department were documented in Marcy's story.

This office of Children's Services of Connecticut also places and supervises children in foster homes at either the request of the parents or of public welfare agencies responsible for their care. Twenty-nine, or 13 per cent of these cases from Manchester and is one of the 18 agencies depending upon the success of the United Fund which start on Oct. 9.

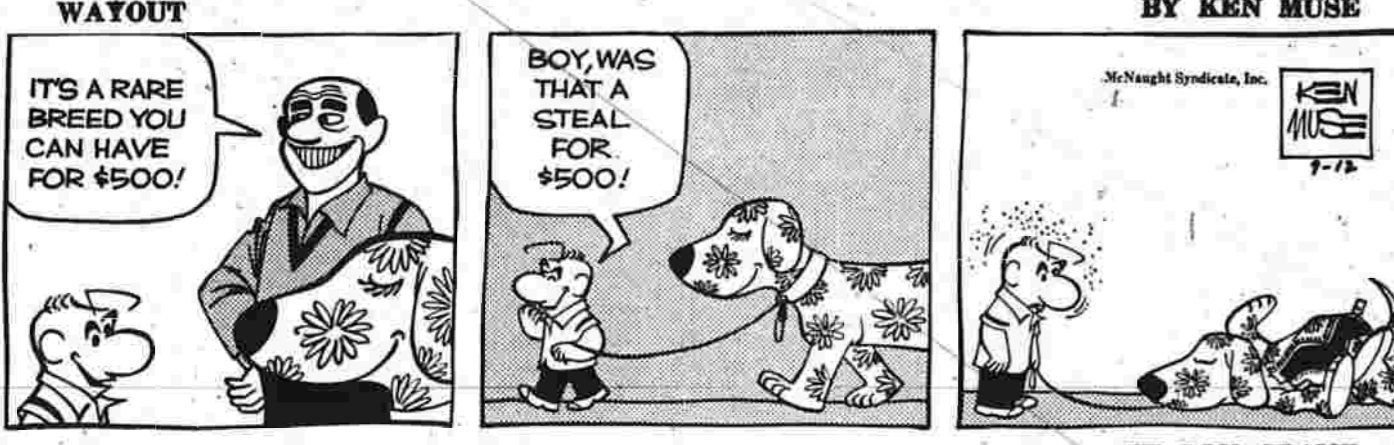

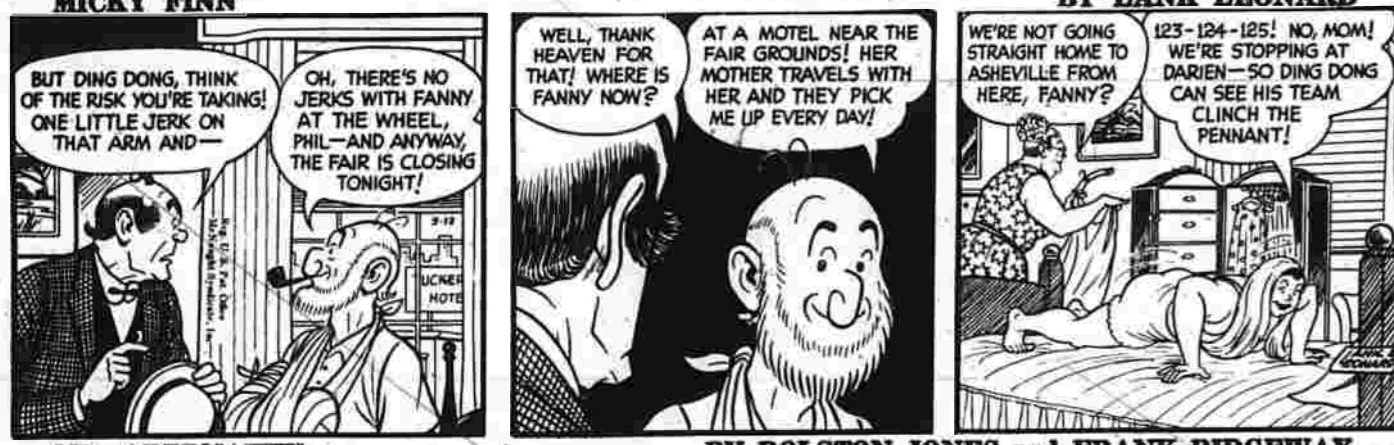
