Peace Moves Must Aim At Hano As was expected would be the case if the elections in South Vietnam went off without major scandal, we are now in an era where there is a great deal of unofficial talk and phantom maneuver about the possibility of some kind of attempt for peace in Vietnam.

All kinds of suggestions are being made, from many quarters. Undoubtedly, sooner or later, the Johnson administration itself will attempt some gesture to demonstrate its own willingness to participate.

Most of this talk, and most of the propositions advanced, and most of the gestures made, are likely to prove un-

Most of them, in fact, will be aimed at persuading the American people, and the South Vietnamese people who voted in peace directions Sept. 3, and the spectator nations of the world, that we on our side of the war are sincerely interested in finding an approach to a negotiated peace.

That will be the trouble with themthat they will be peace moves and gestures and propositions aimed at public opinion here rather than at the decision-making processes in the minds that rule in Hanol.

From the way he talks, General Thieu, the new President-elect in South Vietnam, is operating on much the same system. When he suggests that, i Hanoi should prove itself willing reciprocate, he might recommend week's pause in the bombing of North Vietnam, he is trying to sidestep the criticism of the doves, not trying to put to North Vietnam a proposition North Vietnam cannot refuse.

If there is to be, in this period, any real effort toward negotiation, it will have to shape itself something along the lines suggested by Congressman Jonathan Bingham of New York in a letter to the New York Times Monday. "If Hanoi were eager to start negoti-

ations," Congressman Bingham wrote, "even a pause might give it the opportunity. But if, as seems more likely Hanoi believes it is winning and has no desire to negotiate, then it will scoff at any pause, as it has in the past.

"It seems to be that if we really want negotiations we must try to find a way to make it impossible for Hanoi not to negotiate. The first step would be to remove altogether what U Thant and the East European Communists and many nonaligneds-and Hanoi itselfhave said is the fatal obstacle t

"The coming United Nations General Assembly offers an opportune occasion to make maximum use of such a decision. If, for example, President Johnson were to announce our willingness to stop the bombing and were at the same time to invite a group of neutral nations to arrange a time and place for negotiations, the whole political atmosphere would change. Hanoi would then e under tremendous pressure to enter into negotiations . . . "As Secretary McNamara's fact-filled analysis of the bombing in the North

makes clear, the military advantage of the bombing are not compelling, and the disadvantage of a cessation would be manageable. Indeed, there can be o certainty that Hanol would repond to cessation by stepping up the ed virulence. low of men and supplies to the South, as the generals so positively predict. evel when we started the bombing. "In any case, whatever the short-run military result of cessation, if such bold ection on our part were to open the way for negotiations and an end to the ghting, the saving of lives would be ndous. Do we have available t us a better method of achieving peace?

We believe the case is essentially as the New York Congressman has put it. Any genuine American effort for negotiation will begin with an end to the bombing of North Vietnam which will in itself be unconditional, but which will be accompanied by diplomatic moves which will command the participation of all those who have been telling us that an end of the bombing of North Vietnam is the one thing that can start a real movement toward peace.

### Fine Cure For Weak Ethics

On Friday, Sept. 8, the New York Times ran an editorial titled "Poor Choice For The Bench." The editorial opened as follows:

"The Democratic judicial convention for Brooklyn and Staten Island is reported likely to nominate Representative Abraham J. Multer today for the vacancy on the Supreme Court bench left by the death of Justice Victor Anfuso. His nomination would be deplorable.

"Representative Multer, now serving his eleventh term in the House, has been repeatedly accused of using his public position for private profit. He has always denied doing anything illegal, but he has acknowledged helping to establish a lottery in Bermuda and a bank which could be used as a tax haven in Nassau. His career in Washington is devoid of any notable contribution to progress.

"It would not be surprising if Mr Multer, who barely squeaked through o renomination after a bitter primary fight in his own district last year would like to avoid another primary battle next year by ascending the bench But it would be shocking for the Democratic machine in Brooklyn to help put him there."

That same day, just like the editorial predicted, the Democratic convention in question nominated Congressman Multer as its candidate for the State Supreme Court, in a district where Democratic nomination is considered tantamount to election. This action of the Democratic party

n Brooklyn-to rescue a member of Congress under fire for having used his public office for his private profit by nominating him to a position where he can dispense justice to men less honest that he-is one possible way of handling the future career of a member of Con gress whose ethics have been placed under question or cloud.

What can be more fitting, for any such case of questionable behavior or the part of any distingueshed member of Congress, than some promotion or spotlight which offers the individual in question in the role of exponent and defender of high principles and ethics?
