South Windsor Conference On Schools Is Scheduled

The Board of Education this week voted to hold the third annual conference on education on a weekday night. The program will include dinner and will be held at the high school. The conference will be Regional Education - From and On.

In the past the conferences have been held on Saturday and have included morning and afternoon sessions with a luncheon scheduled in the program. Alternate dates for the conference are Oct. 26 or Nov. 3. The final date will be announced later.

The conference format will include a speaker and individual discussion groups on the topics. Invitations will be extended to all interested people to participate in the program, as well as to civic and school groups.

The total enrollment in South Windsor schools is estimated at 4,802 students. A breakdown shows 849 students at the high school, 1,890 students in kindergarten through and the remainder at the elementary and middle schools.

A total of 621 students are enrolled at the Hill Perry School; 217 at Elmwood; 123 at Union; 396 at Wapping Middle School; 468 at Wapping Elementary School; 567 at Pleasant Valley School; 459 at Avery St. School; and 602 at Orchard Hill School.

Commissioner Reinstates Man's Insurance Pact

HARTFORD (AP) — A North End property owner can thank the state insurance commissioner for reinstatement of his fire insurance policy after being threatened with mortgage foreclosure on the property.

Barber, referring to the foreclosure threat as an example of "white power," in his letter to Hartford Federal's controller, Howard E. Zoners Hear Complaints

Members of the local Historical Society, attending a Zoning Board meeting, this week went on record as "opposing certain flagrant violations of present zoning regulations by The Landmark," and said they would repeat their views in a public hearing slated for early October when the Landmark will apply for full use of the premises.

Dr. Gene MacDonald, speaking for the Historical Society, asked why the Landmark had not been "reprimanded." He was told that many of the new regulations were instituted by the board, primarily for future expansion of The Landmark, "but they still have to conform to board rulings."

"It would be ridiculous," the board stated, "to fine them when regulations would be changed within a short time."

The board added that proper plans for expansion had not been submitted within the past year and said "zoning would provide the kind of town people want, but if nobody ever states a preference, how are we to know what the townpeople want?"

The illuminated free-standing signs at The Landmark are a bone of contention, and board members said a certificate of occupancy for a delicatessen (gift shop) could not be granted until these violations are corrected.

The area in question is the basement of The Landmark which has been used previously for storage.

Decision on School Use  
The Board of Education has voted not to allow the use of Porter School classrooms to any outside organizational or committee use.

This decision was in answer to a request from the Rev. and Mrs. Hugh Murphy of St. Columba's Church, regarding the use of the school for catechism classes for Grades 1 through 6.

Father Murphy had stated there are about 150 children registered in the classes, held Monday and Tuesday afternoons. The students are transported by school buses as a safety measure. He felt that the church facilities were not large enough to handle the enrollment and said holding classes in the school would eliminate dangers of crossing the intersection, as some children enter the bus or driveway to walk to the church.

He added this would not be a temporary arrangement but the church is not planning any expansion at the present time.

The board pointed out that "to open the door to one group, others would request the same arrangement and we can't say yes to one and no to another."

Three new teachers were added to the school staff.

Joseph Sarkone will teach Grade 4; Mrs. Margaret Russell, Grade 2, and John Conzola, physical education.

Charles Sanborn and Frank Zanotti, fathers of students with severe cases of polio, try appeared before the board asking for elimination of an overgrowth of poison ivy plants at the school.

The board, under the impression the ivy had been sprayed, said the matter would be taken care of immediately.

Principal George Patros said there are about 695 students registered with a few more expected within the week.
