Some 31 persons, including Negro militant John Barer, were arrested after police stopped a group of marchers last night from neading into a possibly hot reception in the city's South End.



John Dempsey's concern over holding the state tax line was an indication of what he called the governor's failure "to accept the challenge of our urban crisis.' The Republican mayor said the Democratic governor's concern during the 1967 General Assembly session, as far as taxes were concerned, was made at the expense of solving the problems of Connecticut cities.
