31 Marchers Held In Hartford Brawl

HARTFORD (AP)—Some 31 persons, including Negro militant John Barber, were arrested after police stopped a group of marchers last night from heading into a possibly hot reception in the city's South End.

The halting of the march from the predominantly Negro North End provoked an outbreak of rock and bottle throwing, and about 30 store windows were broken in the North Main Street area.

Police had been escorting the 200 marchers—some of them white pacifists—down Main Street.

But at Morgan Street, Police Capt. Benjamin Goldstein told Barber that the group had to be more orderly.

"We'll risk our lives to protect your right to demonstrate," Goldstein said, "but it must be orderly."

Goldstein spoke with Barber, who heads a militant group called "The Black Guard," which organized the march as a demonstration in favor of open housing.

Barber tried to get the marchers into two files, but the crowd was not very cooperative.

Finally Goldstein told the group through a loudspeaker: "All right, gentlemen, it's time going to ask you to disperse. Your intentions are not peaceful."

When Barber objected, he was hustled into a police van. The crowd did break up as more arrests were made, and some of the marchers broke bottles and windows as they headed back toward the North End. One policeman was stung when a bottle hit his helmet.

In the South End, a crowd of at least 200 white persons had gathered on Franklin Street and it was feared that a confrontation with the marchers would touch off racial violence.

GOLDWATER REVEALS Campaign Capers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Presidential hopefuls have available a manual on political fighting by Republican Barry Goldwater but if any of his novel tactics are adopted, it's not likely Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey's transportation crew will be the victims.

Goldwater, discussing his lead campaign strategy, announced his bid for the White House in 1964, told how his lieutenant attacked the opposition at the GOP convention in San Francisco where he won the nomination on the first ballot and of a Keystone Cops caper involving Humphrey's plane crew.

"I will not reveal the names of people responsible, but we had every cable of every television company and every radio company marked up in the left of the Cow Palace" in San Francisco, Goldwater said. "If anybody got a little too obnoxious," he said, "they could always have cable trouble. And you might recall Sen. Hugh Scott got up on one with the bullhorn and I closed it. The batteries weren't in it." Scott was backing fellow Pennsylvanian, Gov. William W. Scrantom, for the nomination.

"These are the things that you do," Goldwater said in a National Educational Television network interview Monday night.

"It is perfectly fair in love and war."

"We had all kinds of things planned. We even had a plan

once to try to keep Hubert Humphrey's crew of his plane looked up in their rooms so they couldn't get out and fly someplace."

The interviewer asked what happened. "They got out the window," Goldwater reported.

Whoever wins the GOP nomination next year, assuming President Johnson runs again, will be facing what Goldwater called "probably the toughest, smartest, throat-cutting political operator I have ever run into."

But Oregon Democratic Party officials said Republican Gov. Folsom would not.

73 Degrees Was Boiling In Hartford

HARTFORD (AP)—It was 73 degrees at 3:30 p.m. Monday in Hartford, but the city was at the boiling point.

In North Hartford an estimated 200 marchers were huddled at Main and Morgan streets—their avowed intention of walking into south Hartford to demonstrate for open housing was blocked by a force of more than 40 blue-helmeted policemen.

At Franklin Avenue in south Hartford, hundreds of persons tensely awaited arrival of the marchers.

At both ends of the city, police forces bolstered by additional manpower were stretched thin as they watched both factions.

As police tried to disperse the north Hartford marchers, a two-hour period of unrest and violence shook that section of the city. It resulted in:

- 31 arrests
- One instance of looting and

Bing Skips Party After 18-Hour Day

NEW YORK (AP)—"Oh well, it will soon be over," said General Manager Rudolf Bing as he stood on stage at the Metropolitan Opera House Monday night and the curtains closed on a rapturously applauded performance of "La Traviata."

Texas Coast Braces; Beulah's on the Way

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (AP)—The Killer Hurricane Beulah surged toward the mouth of the Rio Grande today, taking a potentially disastrous course for the populous lower Texas coast.

The hurricane storm, with 130 mile per hour winds, was picking up strength. The Weather Bureau put out hurricane warnings for miles of coastline, extending as far north as Port Aransas, Tex.

Warnings against Beulah's far flung gale winds were in effect to the island city of Galveston two-thirds of the way up the Texas coast.

Padre Island lay evacuated in the hurricane's path. Corpus Christi, a city of more than 200,000, also was in the hurricane warning area.

The Weather Bureau said Beulah at 9 a.m. was centered near latitude 23.7 north and longitude 97.7 west, about 100 miles southeast of Brownsville.

Beulah was moving at 10 miles an hour but forecasters said it would pick up speed during the day. Forecasters said it was moving at 10 to 15 miles an hour and would reach the coast today and tonight.

"Present indications are that the center should move inland near the mouth of the Rio Grande tonight, and then turn northward paralleling the south Texas coast," the Weather Bureau said.

The biggest danger of coast areas was under way in exposed places. Schools in the Rio Grande Valley—where flood waters threaten a multimillion-dollar citrus crop if the storm kept its course—were closed as far as 80 miles inland.

The causative linking spraving Padre Island, a vacation resort area, to the mainland, was closed at 8:30 A.M.

The entire town of Port Mansfield was evacuated down to the little port's harbor master.

The 31-day-old hurricane, the biggest of the season, slowed late Monday night. The storm already is responsible for at least 22 deaths in a vicious sweep through the eastern Caribbean and across Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula.

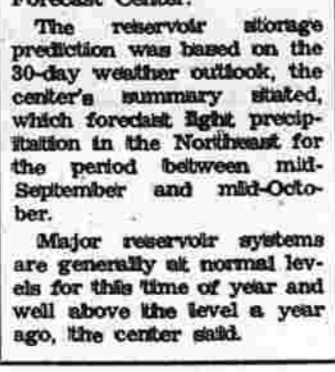
Hurricane force winds reached 70 miles from Beulah's center, with gales 200 miles to her north and 100 miles in her wake.

The Texas coast had been under a hurricane watch since Sunday morning.

Waters of the Gulf were deepened by the storm.

On other fronts U.S. planes rained inside North Vietnam's port of Haiphong for the second straight day Monday and Communist gunners rained a torrent of shells on U.S. Marine outposts below the demilitarized zone.

Throughout South Vietnam ground action was scattered.

Latest Antimissile Plan Will Cover Entire Nation

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Pentagon's plan to build a \$5 billion Nike X antimissile missile system will provide each region of the United States with at least one battery of far-reaching weapons interceptors.

Defense scientists made this clear today in guarded interviews about Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara's so-called "light" defense against nuclear attack, primarily directed to guard against a potential threat from Red China.

The decision to proceed with deployment of an antimissile system was announced by McNamara Monday in a speech to news editors at San Francisco.

Although the plan he announced is one of the biggest strategic decisions in U.S. history, it is not the often-discussed full-blown antimissile system which would have an estimated cost of \$40 billion.

McNamara opposes such an outlay.

The exact locations of the antimissile batteries, each with several missiles, remain a closely held secret. But one Pentagon official familiar with the plans said the main line of defense will center on several antimissile complexes stationed below the Canadian border.

Other antimissile sites will be interspersed along the western and eastern seaboard, in the Midwest and in the Southwest and Deep South. Each site will be protected by a battery of Sprint missiles.

Government sources also indicated Canada has given the United States permission to establish one of the vital missile-detection radar sites on Canadian territory near the Great Lakes.

The civil defense decision was but a preliminary skirmish on a bill which includes money for two key Johnson administration housing programs. The Senate appeared ready to approve the action of its Appropriations and Commerce committees which must act on the timing of any bill more than was approved by the House.

Senate approval on the committee recommendations would affect proposed spending reductions already provided by the House for the model cities plan. Rent subsidies would help the poor pay for their housing.

Johnson urged passage of his proposed 10 per cent surcharge on income taxes "as soon as practicable."

Asked how the decision to build an antimissile system would affect proposed spending reductions, Manfield told reporters Johnson already has provided the money for a start this year.

"I support Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara's plan to build a system of antimissile sites," he said. "I still hope, however, that we can negotiate an agreement with the Russians not to build a larger system."

Senate Bars Civil Defense Budget Cut

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate refused today to slice by \$20 million the \$91 million budget for the Pentagon's civil defense program.

On a roll call vote of 55 to 32, the Senate spurned an amendment proposed by Sen. Stephen M. Young, D-Ohio, to a \$10.4 billion appropriation bill providing funds for 24 government agencies.

"This is the most overpaid branch of the Pentagon," Young said. "Here is an opportunity to save \$20 million."

But Sen. Gordon Allott, R-Colo., said civil defense measures could save as many as 60 million American lives "in case somebody does, accidentally or otherwise, push the panic button."

Sen. Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield told reporters after a White House conference that Johnson believes there will be some federal spending reductions.

Such reductions, Mansfield said, would exclude defense and atomic energy outlays and miscellaneous expenditures such as interest on the national debt.

William E. Melvin, state Public Utilities Commission safety engineer named by Gov. John W. King to probe the cause, said his team was investigating a switch on the steep mountain-side track.

Neither King nor Melvin would comment on the cause of the wreck. Two other probes are underway in the crash, one by state police and the other by the railway. King viewed the crash scene Monday.

Tourists an Oddity In Deserted Beirut

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)— "Are you a tourist?" The Lebanese customs man asked with an obvious accent of disbelief. Assured otherwise, the smiling official said he hoped at least the visitor was "for the Arabs."

Beirut Airport, normally one of the busiest in the Middle East, looked like a new kind of tomb. The downtown hotel, usually fully booked through the summer, had 25 guests. The restaurant was an expanse of untouched white tablecloths and shining glassware.

A fiercely loyal water volunteer informed the reporter that the big hotel across the way, with three times as many rooms, had only 12 guests.

Everything seemed to be in place in Beirut, a handsome and sophisticated city which attracted 600,000 tourists last year. Huge colored signs still urged the missing visitors to see the Holy Land in comfort, visit the Egyptian Bazaar and try the exotic dishes of three continents. But the people with their cameras were not the tourists, who hardly fired a shot. The Arab-Israeli war, which lost its tourists, at least for the moment, had not yet ended.

The contrast between Tel Aviv and Beirut is glaring. Tel Aviv hotels have been burning all season, restaurants jamming and tourist agencies joggling. Jerusalem, without harbored war and bunkers, is only an hour away.

Scores of buses, which early in June were transporting Israeli troops to the front, made a quick transformation after a six-day war and spent the afternoon taking tourists to Jerusalem, Bethlehem, Jericho and other Israeli-occupied tourist attractions on the west bank of the Jordan River.

The Mediterranean shore at Tel Aviv has been covered with bathers all summer. Beirut's even more attractive shoreline has been largely bare except on weekends.

Mansour Shalita, director of Lebanon's Council for Tourism, and other tourist officials have tried to dismiss the debacle as a bad summer after a bad war. But hotelkeepers have been demanding tax exemptions, reduction of their electric bills and long-term loans to assist newly built hotels.

The hotelkeepers even committed the ultimate heresy of asking that Lebanon open its border post with Israel at Nakoura so foreign tourists would have easy access to Jerusalem and other religious shrines now controlled by Israel.

This would be an open admission that Israel exists, and no Arab nation can take such a step unilaterally without taking the condemnation of the Arab world and even bloodshed.

Some members of the Lebanese Parliament, it is understood, refused even to discuss the proposal with the Israeli government when they got over the original shock of such an idea.

Lebanon has been a magnet for the cool mountain resorts. This summer even the sheikhs, preoccupied by the oil boycott, forsook Lebanon.

The drop in tourism led to a slowdown in trade generally. The construction business came to an almost complete stop after the war but is resuming slowly. A few days of riotous behavior by pro-Nasser elements in Beirut caused thousands of foreigners to leave the country. They are returning as confidence in the country's stability is restored.

Only recently the armored cars which were guarding the Jordanian Embassy and the American Embassy and the American University were withdrawn. Full diplomatic relations have now been restored.

Police Testify In Trial of 6 Demonstrators

HARTFORD (AP)— Two members of the State Police Department have testified in the trial of six persons charged with breach of peace and rioting in connection with a welfare demonstration last September.

The police witnesses, Maj. Samuel Rome and Trooper Robert Rasmussen, were in the demonstrator's office next to the office of Bernard Shapiro, the state welfare commissioner, when a crowd of demonstrators rushed in. Seventeen persons were arrested.

On trial in Circuit Court are Wilbur Smith, 22-year-old president of the Hartford NAACP chapter; the Rev. Charles Feniston, 54, of West Hartford; Mrs. Mary Harris, 38, Carl Miller, 22, John Wilhelm, 22, and David Struzan, 24, all of Haven.

Both witnesses recalled seeing Smith and Harris scuffling with police and Miller with blood on his face.

Rome said he may have cut Miller with a blackjack, then added: "I'm not sure I did it though."

Both Rome and Rasmussen agreed that Fred Harris, president of the Hill Parents Association of New Haven, was first to enter with the demonstrators.

Harris and the others arrested in the incident pleaded no contest to breach of peace charges last Thursday and their cases were continued to Oct. 20 for sentencing.

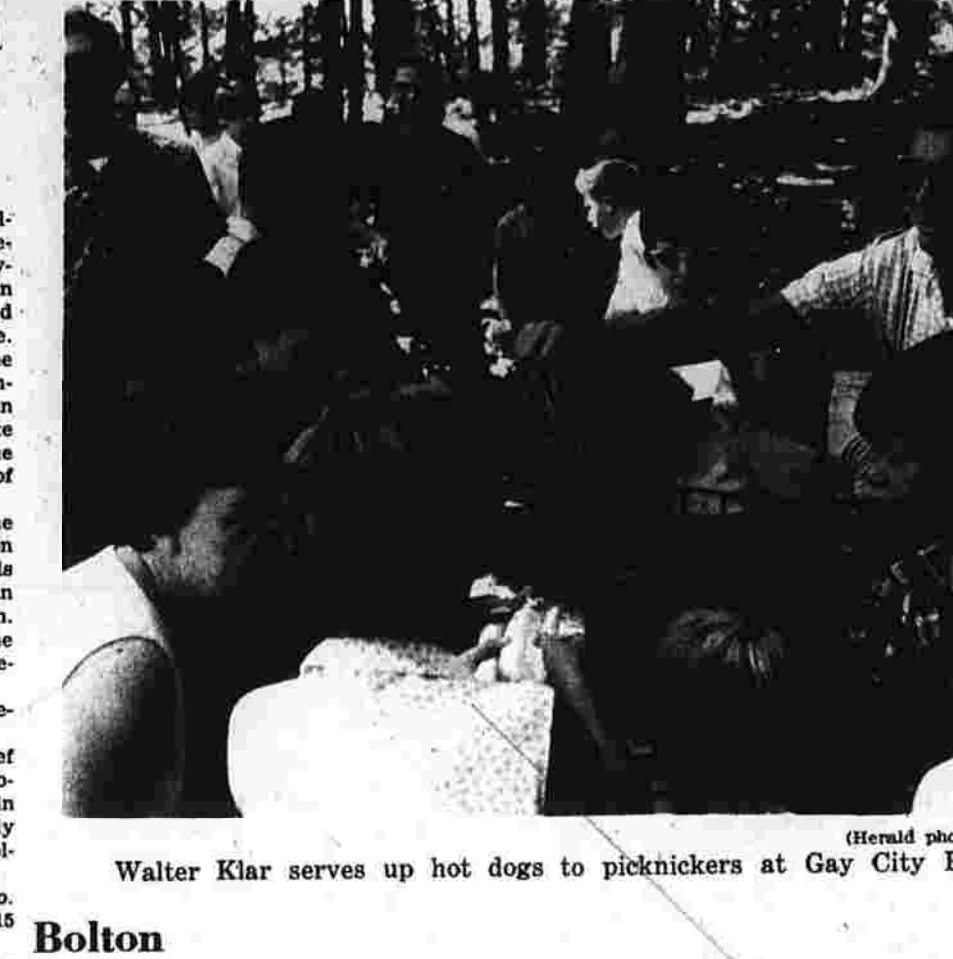
